The Rector writes

Dear Friends

As many of you know I have over the last couple of months had time to reflect on my last 14 months with you, firstly from my hospital bed and lately convalescing at the Rectory. May I take this opportunity in thanking you for all your well wishes. As I reflect on what a good 14 months it's been, I've loved getting to know the area, the churches, the villages, and of course the people; and my wife and I have been really struck with the warmth of welcome we've received and continue to receive. Thank you.

One of the gifts I believe God has given me for this work is my love for people and my enjoyment of getting to know them and building relationships; those of you who have already met me will know I love to chat! There are many varied and different aspects to this job, which means I'm able to get involved with community life and the local school. It's been great to have been welcomed and be involved with many of the village groups, both in the community and also welcoming you into the churches of Alveley and Quatt. I love going into the school as part of the open the book team, taking assemblies and being a governor.

One of the things that has really impressed me in the villages is the sense of community. There is so much life going on, so many varied activities and groups to be a part of; there is, it appears to me ,to be a real sense of belonging. In these politically unsettled times and with increasingly busy lives where our families are often stretched, there is a real need to have a wider support network a community to which we feel we belong. SEVERN VALLEY COUNTRY PARK

This month our volunteers have begun closely monitoring the butterflies on site. Each week, until September they will be performing a butterfly transect. A butterfly transect is a walk along a set route and any butterflies seen along this route will be recorded. Generally, transect routes are between 1km and 1.5km and where possible, pass through different habitats. Butterflies within 5 metres of the route will be included. (This is 5m above, 5m ahead and 5m either side of the route.) The same route will be followed each week with the results of the survey being sent to the Butterfly Conservation group. The data is used to save threatened species, improve landscapes, increase knowledge and raise awareness.

Some Shropshire Council sites such as Stanmore Country Park have been completing transects for a number of years. This year the programme is being rolled out to other sites across the county.

<u>Opening times</u> The visitor centre and cafe are open Wednesday to Sunday until May Half term, when they will be open every day of the school holidays.

THE ORIGIN OF THE NAME 'QUATT'

I have had an enquiry, via Pat and Ken Morton of our village, from a reader of this magazine who lives in Wagga Wagga, New South Wales, Australia. The aboriginal name for a crow is Wagga but in their language they have no plurals so a place with many crows becomes Wagga Wagga. This most far flung of our readers wants to know the origin of the name Quatt. Well I didn't know so off to Bridgnorth library to find out. The first book I found on Shropshire villages didn't even mention Quatt or Quatford. The second book by the Shropshire branch of the Women's institute did have some history of Quatford, but relatively recent. It said there was a ferry there until 1940 which used to bring the parishioners from Eardington over the river for church services and when the road was widened in 1960 a vicarage, schoolhouse and 3 cottages were demolished, but it said nothing on the name.

The next book, a Dictionary of English Place Names, said Quatford: Ford with obscure first name and Quatt-originally Quattun. Tun meaning farmstead with obscure first name. So the library was not very helpful.

The next book, The Concise Oxford dictionary of English Place Names, which I found for just £2 in a second hand bookshop, had a much larger entry but was still none the wiser. And then a bit of luck. Whilst rummaging in another second hand bookshop (there are worse hobbies!) I found a booklet of historical transactions and an article by a David Horovitz of over 7000 words on the very subject. This is what he found.

Quatford is first mentioned in the Anglo Saxon chronicle when the Danes (Vikings), having been pursued across England by an army, settled there in the late autumn of 895. It is variously recorded as Bryce, Bricge and Cwatbrycge. It is also mentioned in the tenth century chronicle of Aethelweard when a Danish army crossed the river in 910 before being defeated at the battle of Tettenhall by a combined West Saxon and Mercian army. The use of the word Brycge (bridge) has caused some confusion amongst historians who originally thought Cwatbrycge and brygce (Bridgnorth) were one and the same place. However there is no evidence for a Roman road crossing the Severn at Bridgnorth whereas there is evidence of a Roman road from Wenlock Edge via Morville and Upton Cresset to Eardington over the river at Quatford then up towards Swancote.

Bridgnorth is not mentioned in the Domesday book (1086) but Quatt and Quatford are. There has probably been a ford at Quatford since prehistoric times and certainly since 1056. A bridge across the Severn existed by 988 and probably in 910 when Aethelweard said it was crossed by the Danes. Aethelweard was the great great grandson of a brother of King Alfred (he that burnt the cakes). There was no settlement at Bridgnorth until Robert de Belleme built his fortification on Castle Hill and probably the bridge at the same time in 1101. The 'north' was adopted in or around that time to avoid confusion with Brycge (ie Cwatbrycge). The Anglo Saxon bridge at Quatford was probably destroyed around 1101 and it reverted to a ford.

But what about the name? Cwat is first recorded as a personal name in 1015. One Leofrine Cwat is mentioned in a will, and Cwatt could be a nickname from middle English meaning lump, hump or mound. And of course Quatt Church is built on a small mound or slightly domed plateau. And there was a motte and bailey castle at Quatford on top of the 60 foot sandstone knoll, which could indicate that the two villages were separate and not named after one another. We had better leave the last word to one William Shakespeare. In Othello he uses the word Cwatt as meaning a pimple or pustule. So Quatt or Quattun could simply be a farmstead associated with a pimple like lump or owned by a farmer with acne. Roy 'Spotty' Page

ALVELEY STROLLERS AND STRIDERS WALKING GROUP

The Alveley Strollers and Striders walking group is not strictly a "walking for health" group. Norma and I joined the group, when we retired, for the companionship and personal contact, as well as the enjoyment of walking in the countryside around the village. We thought of it as a bonus if it was good for our health too.

For the benefit of people's health German, Austrian, Czech and Swiss spa towns attracted people, from about 1800 onwards, by offering sessions of water treatment. For anaemia, tuberculosis and age-related problems people flocked in large numbers to spa towns to "take the waters". Between bouts of water-treatment they were tempted outside for restorative walks by the carefully engineered panoramic walking trails. Spa towns became famous as much for the healing power of their good clean and healthy air as for their mineral springs.

The fashion soon spread to England and in the new spa towns like Bath, Buxton, Cheltenham and Harrogate public gardens were laid out to encourage patients to take advantage of fresh air and exercise as well as the waters. That must have seemed a real tonic after continually breathing the polluted air of towns and cities. Charles Darwin, on completion of his "The Origin of Species" in 1859, went to recuperate in the small spa town of Ilkley in West Yorkshire. Although no longer a spa town, Ilkley has kept its many "health paths" on the edge of the moor, complete with artificial tarns (small lakes), waterfalls and ornamental walkways.

Alveley has never laid claim to healing springs, but we can boast clean air and our own natural "health paths". What's more these can be enjoyed free of charge in congenial and entertaining company every Tuesday morning.


ALVELEY ART GROUP

The flower borders, lovingly tended by volunteer members, are in full bloom. Add to this the sights, smells and sounds of nature at her most sublime: trees arrayed in bright blossoms, the smell of new mown grass, birds singing and even the knocking of woodpeckers. We spied one great spotted woodpecker, but when we thought we heard another it was actually a stray golf ball rattling through the trees!

Nature is indeed wonderful. We have so many examples around us in Alveley and Quatt, let alone the unforgettable films of Sir David Attenborough and others. Unfortunately, however, there is a less positive side to nature that we have recently discovered. When we moved here in 2020 we had to rip out the garden, which consisted largely of concrete slabs and gravel, and landscape with lawn and raised beds. The process included extensive drainage and this has worked well-till recently apparently. In contrast to the golf course fairways and greens, our lawn started to disappear, leaving great swathes of bare earth, growing browner slowly but surely. We came sadly to the conclusion that the drainage had given up the ghost after the deluges of recent months. Last week, however, the operatives arrived to give the grass its regular treatment. I explained that I thought the lawn had drowned but the operative asked if the birds had been active on the grass. I said that they had, assuming that they were getting worms and maybe some moss for nesting. Not so. Soil samples were taken from different parts of what had once been a lawn. We are plagued by leatherjackets, the larvae of the caddis fly (daddy longlegs) who lay their eggs in the autumn. The leatherjackets eat the roots of plants from underneath causing death and destruction to the lawn.

It is said that each of God's creatures has a purpose, but for the life of me I haven't got a clue what the purpose of a daddy longlegs or its leatherjacket larvae might be, other than to wind me up!
