President' Report February 2013

The world did not come to an end on December 21, 2012 as previously reported; we are all still thankfully here, and 2013 promises to be a very busy year for our Local.

There is a crucial provincial election in May which will hopefully lead to a more progressive government that puts working people and their families ahead of the wealthy and big corporations.

We have also offered our Local's assistance with helping his campaign get the message out to students on campus, in respect to ensuring they are registered to vote and given notice of advanced polling.

Our Local will be implementing a political action plan to mobilize our membership to get involved with this election. As we all know, our membership has been hit hard by twelve years of regressive and harmful policies by the B.C. Liberal government. We cannot afford to sit silent in this upcoming election. We need to make our voices heard in our workplace, in our union, in our communities, and at the ballot box.

The Union has a responsibility to protect members' jobs and services, and influence public policies that impact our members and their communities.

Voting is more than a right, it's a responsibility!

Before you can vote in a provincial election you must register as a voter with Elections BC.

Registering to vote couldn't be easier. Just go to elections.bc.ca and follow the links to register on line, or by phone call to 1-800-661-8683, or by mail.

I strongly encourage all our members to confirm that you are registered to vote!! In the last provincial election, nearly 50 percent of eligible voters stayed home. Look what happened.

CUPE members can have a huge impact for positive results in the upcoming May election and elect a progressive government that cares for working people in BC.

Workplace Bullying

Are we making a difference yet?

Currently there is little occupational health and safety legislation in Canada that specifically deals with bullying in the work place. Quebec legislation includes "psychological harassment" in the *Act Respecting Labour Standards*. Some jurisdictions have legislation on workplace violence which include bullying, and as we start to recognize the effect it has to the bottom line of business, most employers are creating policies and promoting zero tolerance, but is this enough?

Yes, awareness is growing in Canada, but physical and emotional violence are becoming some of the biggest issues we are confronted with in the workplace. I have no doubt that many of you reading this article have seen this trend grow over the last few years.

We all know the effects of bullying on an individual and the impact it has in the workplace and to its productivity, but yet it continues to go on. So to say we are going to stop it by changing laws and raising awareness is a good start, but it takes a long time to change laws, and although the awareness campaign includes celebrities speaking out in a 30 second ad on TV is a positive, immediately it has an impact, but long term? People forget.

Bullying is perceived in such a massive range, from small rumors to actual physical abuse, and everyone perceives things differently. What's funny to me may be offensive to others, and cultural and gender differences make it even a more delicate topic. We need to be more aware of our audience and to think twice before we speak.

The University has a policy on harassment and discrimination and it states, "A comment or conduct that one knows or ought reasonably to know is unwelcome, that creates a negative impact for the recipient, and that is related to one or more of the prohibited grounds of discrimination as set out in the *B.C. Human Rights Code*."

The recognition that bullying takes place, and the available resources for people to reach out to are good, but it really has to start with all of us individually. We all need to take a stand and not believe it is someone else's issue to deal with; then perhaps we will start to make a difference.

"Some people will not be happy until they pushed you to the ground. What you have to do is have courage to stand your ground and not give them the time of day. Hold on to your power and never give it away."

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Thank you for your local's generous donation to Protein for People. Perhaps you'd also like to consider becoming a full member of Protein for People, a charity owned and operated by BC unions in partnership with BC food banks. If so, I'd suggest a meeting at your convenience to discuss what this might entail.

Meanwhile I'm pleased to be able to report that Protein for People, with its membership of 30 BC Union organizations, had its most successful year. Over 100,000 cans of salmon were delivered to BC food banks and labour Community Forums were held in 10 BC communities. This is an increase from 55,000 cans and 3 Community Forums the previous year.

The trade union movement is the beneficiary of significant, positive media coverage of Community Forums by both local and mainstream news outlets. Labour promotion on can labels reached over 100,000 food bank clients, 4,500 of whom were also able to meet representatives from local unions at the labour Community Forums.



It is a first for labour and demonstrates the growing value we have in the eyes of our partners in the community.
