The purpose of my letter is to inquire about the requirements to change community's speed limit. Currently in Jupiter Inlet Colony, Palm Beach County, Florida, a 248 resident community, located on the south end of Jupiter Island, our speed limit is 25 mph. Our narrow streets are also our sidewalks and the number of speeders and "close calls" potentially causing injuries, are numerous. Another situation is the Jupiter Beach Club. A certain percentage of the club's members are not residents of Jupiter Inlet Colony and a large number of those members race down the streets to get to the beach club with little concern for the residents' safety.

How can one get the speed limit reduced to 15 mph? Maybe then cars will go 20 mph! I was told by a City official that this speed limit is "set in stone" and cannot be changed. I find that hard to believe—nothing should be set in stone when it comes to people's safety.
