So what do your BEE babies need this winter?? Here are a few ideas you can start this Fall...

This is the time of year to feed as much syrup as you can get them to take so they can insulate the brood nest with honey.

Replace broken equipment and make sure they have good tight hives to survive the cold winter months. Not much bee activity from here on. Easy to remember and no snow or freezing weather to worry about! Check list...

- <u>Strengthen your hives and check your queens</u> (Combine weaker colonies and make sure all queens are accepted, present and producing brood.)
- <u>Make sure there is enough stored food to get them through the colder months</u>. (Heading into fall, you will want to feed a 2:1 sugar water syrup (as opposed to the 1:1 syrup in the spring). They will store the thicker syrup in place of nectar, bolstering their winter stores. Refined white cane or beet sugar works, but never give them raw sugar; the solids will upset their little bee bellies.)
- Check for those little home invaders; MITES!
- <u>Repair or replace bad equipment and insulate if needed</u> (It's cooler weather- Here's your chance!)
- Attend Bee Meetings (YES!!)
