DAVIS LAKE ENDURO

ARKANSAS DIRT RIDERS

Davis devastates the competition at Davis Lake Enduro!

Mayflower, AR, June 18

The Arkansas Dirt Riders provided an event for the seventh round of the Black Jack Enduro Circuit that puts the "E" back in Enduro. Sunny skies and 90 degree temperatures combined to make open trails very dusty. Trail boss James Nash insured this wouldn't be a problem by placing the course totally on virgin trail that went beyond the term . . ."tight." The first loop consisted of 34 ground miles ran at a straight 18 mph average with long sections that took points from all the AA riders. The two resets on the loop were a welcome sight to the short course riders when they popped out of the woods momentarily for a sip of water even though none got to enjoy the entire reset due to across the board late points. Steve Leivan on his Surdyke Yamaha of Marionville/ Motorcycle Stuff/ Pro-Action Suspension/ Answer/ Sprocket Specialist/ Dunlop/ Mike's Machine/ Camelbak/ Scott/ RK Chain backed Yamaha 250 WR, led the AA riders at the end of the first loop with a one point advantage over Vincent Davis ('94 ISDE Junior Team Rider.) The second loop was a repeat of loop one with the speeds bumped up to 24 mph and one reset removed creating a 24 mile test section. Davis took charge during this loop on his Moose Racing/ Pirelli/ Pro-Action Suspension/ Scott/ Davis Cycles/ Mike's Machine backed CR-250 Honda losing two fewer points than Leivan ending the day with 28 to Leivans 29 point drop. Steve Travis another '94 ISDE rider and current BJEC points leader struggled with slower riders finishing the day with a 35. Jeff Plunkett, the '92 BJEC O/A Champion, came back from a year layoff due to a broken leg to easily take A Overall honors, and third O/A. This was easily one of the better events on the BJEC schedule with perfectly groomed trail, good course marking, and very challenging, tight terrain. A truly excellent job by the Arkansas Dirt Riders on virgin terrain.

Sure the speeds were a little higher than maybe necessary on the first loop for the C-riders and no, long course maybe didn't need to go 24 on the second loop, and yes, there could have been a punch check here and there to keep every honest, but the bottom line is that it was one of the finest events to date on the BJEC schedule.

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
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BIKING


