to my need to let go of material possessions,


to my need to reach out for invisible gifts

#### Eighth Annual World Day of the Poor. November 17th

In 2017, Pope Francis established that the Catholic Church set aside one day each year to "reflect on how poverty is at the very heart of the Gospel." He designated this day as the World Day of the Poor, to be celebrated on the 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time each year.

"The prayer of the poor rises up to God" is the theme for this year, selected by Pope Francis based on the Book of Sirach.

Ben Sira, the author of Sirach, discovered that the poor hold a privileged place in God's heart. "God knows the sufferings of his children because he is an attentive and caring father," said the Pope. "As a father, he takes care of those who are most in need: the poor, the marginalized, the suffering and the forgotten. No one is excluded from His heart, for in His eyes, we are all poor and needy".

Pope Francis challenges us to be authentic witnesses of Christian hope and to accompany the poor through a personal and constant commitment over time by:

- Offering financial support to the poorest and most vulnerable people worldwide.
- Leading the way through prayer and action to a more just world.
