Jesus Goes Back to Heaven

After Jesus rose from the dead, more than 500 people saw him. He did many miracles for 40 days. If you wrote them down, the world could not hold all the books!

These were written that we might believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God. By believing, we have life – real life, forever life.

The disciples were eating fish on a beach together. Jesus asked Peter, “Do you love me?”

“Yes,” Peter said. “You know that I love you.”

“Then take care of my sheep,” Jesus said. This meant that Peter was to take care of the believers.

Questions


1. What did Jesus do in the 40 days that he was back on earth after he rose from the dead?
2. What commands did Jesus leave us?
3. Did the disciples obey him? How do we know?
4. Which believers can you love? Who can you teach?

Before you read:

Activate Prior Knowledge

- a) Where did Jesus come from? Where did he return to? How did he get there?
- b) Have your parents ever gone away on a trip and left you with instructions?
- c) What instructions do you think Jesus left with his disciples?

After you read:

Departing Directives

Bring a suitcase and a few other travel props like a map and sunglasses. Ask the kids if their parents ever left for a few days. What instructions did they (or would they) leave behind? Maybe: brush your teeth; take the dog for a walk; do your homework. Go through the story, find, and write the six directives that Jesus told his followers. Write them on the left side of a folded piece of paper under a column called "Jesus Said." On the right side, write down how you can obey under a column called "So I Will..." Fill them in and ask God to help you obey.

A Waterfall of Joy


Jesus meant for his words and instructions to spread around the world and throughout every generation. To make this concept come to life, get four buckets. Label them: Jesus said; the disciples did; adults I know do; I will do. Fill the first bucket with water. Look at the instructions Jesus left behind (see Departing Directives above). Take one directive at a time. As you pour the water from one bucket to another, say something like: "Jesus said that we are to care of his sheep, which means our Christian brothers and sisters. The disciples did this. They took care of the sheep by sharing God's word and food with the other believers. Adults I know take care of Jesus' sheep. My uncle posts a Bible verse every day. I will take care of Jesus' sheep, too. I will share my snack with Juan and write a Bible verse on our Christmas cards."

Eye Witness: I Witness

Seeing the resurrected Jesus Christ, after knowing he had died, shook the disciples and changed them instantly, radically, permanently. They went from fearful, hidden believers to bold witnesses who gave their lives for Christ. The empty tomb changes everything. Today, we have even more resources than the apostles did. We have two millenniums of miracles, proven prophecies, God's full word in many form, comforts, blessings, and for many of us, the freedom to witness without fear of persecution. Choose a child to retell the story from Peter's point of view, using passion and persuasion. Use the phrase "I witnessed it with my own eyes!" How can you be a witness to the resurrection?

A Worldwide Plan

Jesus' last instructions: "Be my witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth (Acts 1:8)." Jerusalem means your own family or city. Judea is a larger area around you, perhaps your state or country. Samaria stands for places or people that are hard to reach, perhaps hardened nonbelievers or those in prison. The ends of the earth means that we are to go to other countries to share the good news. Write down near the corners how you can serve others in each area in your world. Also, consider also turning this into a bulletin board. Pray for missionaries who obey these words. Write a prayer in the globe asking the Lord to show you how to serve him near and far.



Sing Hallelujah, Sing, World!

Clouds in our Pasture
