AMENDED INTERLOCAL SERVICE BOUNDARY AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF CENTER HILL AND THE CITY OF WEBSTER

This Amended Interlocal Service Boundary hereinafter the "Agreement" is made and entered into this _____ day of <u>October</u>, 2025, by and between the City of Center Hill hereinafter "Center Hill"), and the City of Webster • (hereinafter "Webster").

WHEREAS, Center Hill and Webster possess Municipal Home Rule Powers pursuant to Article VIII, Section 2 (b), Florida Constitution and Section 166.021, Florida Statutes; and,

WHEREAS, the Florida Interlocal Cooperation Act of 1969, Section 163.01, Florida Statutes, encourages and empowers local governments to cooperate with one another on matters of mutual interest and advantage, and provides for Interlocal agreements between local governments on matters such as annexation and joint planning; and,

WHEREAS, the Local Government Comprehensive Planning and Land Development Regulation Act, Chapter 163, Part II, Florida Statutes, requires that counties and cities include in their respective planning efforts intergovernmental coordination and particularly, mechanisms for identifying and implementing joint planning areas; and,

WHEREAS, Chapter 180, Florida Statutes, provides municipalities with the power to extend utilities outside of municipal limits; and,

WHEREAS, both Center Hill and Webster have extended water and wastewater into unincorporated areas of the county; and,

WHEREAS, the State Comprehensive Plan requires local governments to protect the substantial investment in public facilities that already exist and to plan for and finance new facilities in a timely, orderly, and efficient manner; and,

WHEREAS, Center Hill and Webster find that the benefits of intergovernmental communications and coordination will accrue to both Parties.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants set forth in this Agreement, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, Center Hill and Webster agree as follows:

- 1. **Incorporation of Preamble.** The Preamble above is true and correct and incorporated into this Agreement as if fully set forth herein.
- 2. Termination of Agreement. Center Hill or Webster may terminate this Agreement at anytime upon delivery of a notice of termination to the other Party at least 180 days prior to the proposed date of termination. A party delivering such a notice of termination as aforesaid may, in such Party's sole discretion, revokes such notice of termination at any time prior to the termination date.

3. Utility Service Areas (USA).

- a) The Webster Utility Service Area (WUSA) is the area within which Webster provides water, wastewater, and reclaimed water services, consistent with Chapter 180, Florida Statutes, as indicated on Attachment A in the green shaded area.
- b) The Center Hill Utility Service Area (CHUSA) is the area within which Center Hill provides water, wastewater, and reclaimed water services, consistent with Chapter 180, Florida Statutes, as indicated on Attachment A in the blue shaded area.

4. Right of First Refusal.

- a) The Parties agree that retail customers and new development within their respective USA's, which require central water and/or sewer services, shall be required to connect, if available, to the respective City's water and/or sewer system.
- b) Within its respective USA, each city has first right of refusal to provide water wastewater, and reclaimed water services to a project.
- c) If the city in whose USA the project is located cannot serve that project, the adjacent USA nearest to the project has the first right of refusal.
- d) If no City can serve the project, the developer may construct a system approved by the city in whose USA they are located; and if agreed upon by the city and developer, turn the system over to that city.

5. Portion of Property in USA.

- a) If at least 50% of the area of a property or combined contiguous properties under the same ownership or control, is within the Webster USA, then the property shall be treated as if it were all within the USA for purposes of this agreement. If at least 50% of the area of a property or combined contiguous properties under the same ownership or control is within the Center Hill USA, then the property shall be treated as if it were all within the USA for purposes of this Agreement.
- b) If less than 50% of the area of property or combined contiguous properties under the same ownership is within the Webster USA, then it shall be outside of the USA for purposes of this Agreement. If less than 50% if the area of property or combined contiguous properties under the same ownership is within the Center Hill USA, then is shall be outside of the USA for purposes of this Agreement.
- 6. Webster will not provide service in the CHUSA unless Center Hill and Webster agree in writing to such service or under the provisions of this agreement.
- 7. Center Hill will not provide service in WUSA unless Webster and Center Hill agree in writing to such service or under the provisions of this agreement.
- 8. Dispute Resolution. Webster and Center Hill agree to resolve any dispute related to the interpretation or performance of this Agreement in the manner described in this section. Either Party may initiate the dispute resolution process by providing written notice to the other Party. Initiation of the dispute resolution process shall operate as a stay of the action which is the subject of the dispute.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the event that either Party determines in its sole discretion and good faith that it is necessary to file a lawsuit or other formal challenge in order to meet a jurisdictional time deadline, to obtain a temporary injunction, or otherwise to preserve a legal or equitable right related to this Agreement, such lawsuit or challenge may be filed, but upon the filing and any other act necessary to preserve the legal or equitable right or to obtain the temporary injunction, the Parties shall thereafter promptly file a joint motion with the reviewing court or administrative law

judge requesting that the case be abated in order to afford herein. If the abatement is granted, the Parties shall revert to and pursue the dispute resolution procedures set forth herein.

- a) Within ten (10) days of the abatement order, the allegedly aggrieved party shall then effect the transmittal of a notice of conflict, in the form of a certified letter, to all governmental bodies involved in the dispute at issue. Upon receipt of the notice, which shall specify the areas of disagreement, the Parties agree to conduct a conflict assessment meeting at a reasonable time and place, as mutually agreed upon, within thirty (3) days of receipt of the notice of conflict.
- fail to resolve the dispute, within forty (40) days of the receipt of the notice described in subparagraph a, above, the Parties shall conduct mediation on the presence of a neutral third party mediator. If the Parties are unable to agree upon a mediator, the County shall request appointment of a mediator by the Chief Judge of the Circuit Court in and for Sumter County, Florida. The mediation contemplated by this Section is intended to be informal and non-adversarial processes with the objective of helping the parties reach a mutually acceptable and voluntary agreement. The decision-making shall rest solely with the Parties. The mediator shall assist the Parties in identifying issues, fostering joint problem-solving and exploring settlement alternatives.
- c) If the Parties are unable to reach a mediated settlement, within fifty (50) days of the receipt of the initial notice of conflict, the parties shall hold a joint intergovernmental meeting. If the joint intergovernmental meeting does not successfully resolve the issues identified in the notice of conflict the entities participating in the dispute resolution procedures described herein may avail themselves of any otherwise available rights, including the suspension of abatement of existing actions.

- d) The Parties agree that this dispute resolution procedure satisfies the requirements of Chapter 164, Florida Statutes.
- 10. Noticing. All notices, consents, approvals, waivers, and elections that any Party requests or gives under this Agreement will be in writing and shall be given only by hand delivery for which a receipt is obtained, or certified mail, prepaid with confirmation of delivery requested. Notices will be delivered or mailed to the addresses set forth below or as either Party may otherwise designate in writing.

Notices, consents, approvals, waivers, and elections will be deemed given when received by the Party for who intended.

11. Sole Benefit. This Agreement is solely for the benefit of Center Hill and Webster, and no right or cause of action shall accrue upon or by reason hereof, to or for the benefit of any third party. Nothing is this Agreement, either expressed or implied, is intended or shall be construed to confer upon or give any person, corporation or governmental entity other than the Parties any right, any person, corporation or governmental entity other than the Parties any right, remedy or claim under or by reason of this Agreement or any provisions or conditions herein contained shall inure to

- the sole benefit of and shall be binding upon the Parties and their respective representatives, successors and assigns.
- 12. Authority. The County and City each represent and warrant to the other its respective authority to enter into this Agreement, acknowledge the validity and enforceability of this Agreement. The County and City hereby represents warrants and covenants this Agreement constitutes a legal, valid and binding contract enforceable by the Parties in accordance with its terms, and that the enforceability hereof is not subject to any impairment by the applicability of any public policy or police powers.
- **13. Enforcement.** This Agreement shall be enforceable by the Parties hereto by whatever remedies are available in law or equity, including but not limited to injunctive relief and specific performance.
- 14. Defense. If this Agreement or any portion hereof is challenged by any judicial, administrative, or appellate proceeding (each Party hereby covenanting with the other Party not to initiate or acquiesce to such challenge or not to appeal ant decision invalidating any portion of this Agreement), the Parties collectively and individually agree, at their individual sole cost and expense, to defend in good faith its validity through to a final judicial determination, unless both Parties mutually agree in writing not to defend such challenge or not to appeal any decision invalidating any portion of this Agreement.
- 15. Periodic Review. Each month, during the term of this Agreement, the City Manager or City's designee and County Administrator shall meet to discuss and resolve any issues or concerns related to this Agreement.
- 16. Amendments. Amendments may be proffered by either Party at any time. Proposed amendments shall be in writing and must be approved by a majority of the governing boards of each Party or shall be considered not adopted.
- 17. Supremacy. The Parties agree and covenant, having given and received valuable consideration for the promises and commitments made herein, it is their desire, intent and firm agreement to be bound by and observe the terms of this Agreement wherever such terms are more stringent than those

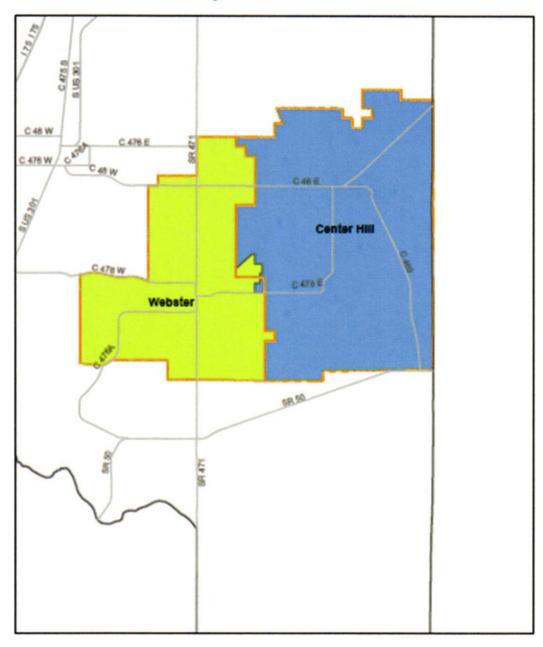
subsequently enacted by the Legislature. Should the terms of this Agreement conflict with previous agreements between the Parties, the terms of this Agreement shall control.

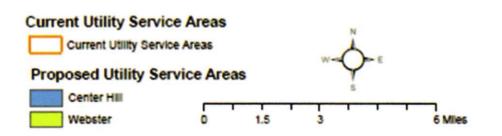
- 18. Entire Understanding. Except as otherwise set forth herein, this Agreement embodies and constitutes the entire understanding of the Parties with respect to the subject matters addressed herein, and all prior agreements, understandings, representations and statements, oral or written, are superseded by this Agreement.
- 19. Governing Law and Venue. The laws of the State of Florida shall govern this Agreement, and venue for any action to enforce the provisions of this Agreement shall only be in the Circuit Court in and for Sumter County, Florida. Federal Jurisdiction and venue, if applicable shall only be in the Middle District of Florida, Tampa Division. If circumstances arise which cause a conflict between this paragraphs and paragraph 7 ("Dispute Resolution") paragraphs 7 shall control.
- 20. Severability. Any term or provision of this Agreement that is invalid or unenforceability of the remaining terms and provision hereof or the validity or enforceability of the offending term or provision in any other situation or in any other jurisdiction.

CITY OF WEBSTER/ WASTE CONNECTIONS OF FLORIDA, INC. SOLID WASTE FRANCHISE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into on this 16th day of October, 2025, by and between the City of Webster, hereinafter referred to as "City", and Waste Connections of Florida, Inc., hereinafter referred to as "Contractor".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the City is desirous of securing the services of the Contractor to operate a waste hauling service for the City; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor desires to provide the operation of a waste hauling service for the City;

NOW, THEREFORE, FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION of the respective covenants herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

Section 1. - COMMENCEMENT OF WORK

The refuse collection work provided for in this Agreement shall commence December 1, 2025.

Section 2 - TERM

The term of the Agreement shall be for an initial 3-year period beginning December 1, 2025, and terminating November 30, 2028. This Agreement may be renewed by mutual agreement of the parties for 2 additional 2-year extensions.

Section 3 - DEFINITIONS

- 3.1 <u>Biohazardous Waste.</u> Means any solid waste or liquid waste, which is defined as Biohazardous pursuant to Chapter 17-7, *Florida Administrative Code*.
- 3.2 <u>Bulk Waste.</u> Means stoves, refrigerators, water tanks, washing machines, furniture, and other waste materials other than Construction and Demolition Debris or Hazardous Waste with weights or volumes greater than those allowed for Garbage Receptacles.
- 3.3 <u>Commercial Service.</u> Means the Garbage and Trash service provided to business establishments, City owned property, churches, schools, Multiple Dwelling Units, office buildings, industrial facilities and other commercial establishments.
- 3.4 <u>Commercial Trash.</u> Means any and all accumulations of paper, rags, excelsior or other packing materials, wood, paper or cardboard boxes or containers, sweepings, and any other accumulation not included under the definition of Garbage, generated by the operation of stores, offices, other business places and non-residential property.

- 3.5 <u>Construction and Demolition Debris.</u> Means materials defined as such form time to time by the Department and Chapter 17-7, *Florida Administrative Code*.
 - 3.6 Agreement. Means this Agreement and the attached Exhibits.
 - 3.7 City. Means the City of Webster, Florida.
 - 3.8 Contractor. Means Waste Connections of Florida, Inc.
- 3.9 <u>End-User.</u> Means each and every residence, business, or other entity billed as an account within the City under this Agreement.
 - 3.10 Department. Means the Florida Department of Environmental Regulation.
- 3.11 <u>Disposal Costs.</u> Means the "tipping fees" or other costs charged to the Contractor for disposal of refuse.
- 3.12 <u>Garbage.</u> Means all kitchen and table food waste and/or animal or vegetative waste that is attendant with or results from the storage, preparation, cooking, or handling of food materials; and any bottles, cans or other containers, utilized in normal household use, which due to their ability to retain water, may serve a breeding place for mosquitoes and other insects.
- 3.13 <u>Garbage Receptacle.</u> Means a Contractor owned and provided 95-gallon rollout cart, or such other receptacle approved by the City and the Contractor.
- 3.14 <u>Garden and Yard Trash.</u> Means vegetative matter resulting from residential yard and landscaping maintenance and shall include materials such as tree and shrub trimmings, grass clippings, palm fronds, or small tree branches.
- 3.15 <u>Hazardous Waste.</u> Means any solid waste, (even though it may be part of a delivered load of waste) which:
- (a). Is required to be accompanied by a written manifest or shipping document describing the waste as "Hazardous Waste", pursuant to any state or federal law, including, but not limited to, the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, 42 *United States Code*, 7901, et seq. as amended and the regulations promulgated there under; or
- (b). Contains polychlorinated biphenyls or any other substance the storage, treatment or disposal of which is subject to regulation under the Toxic Substances Control Act, 15 *United States Code* 2601, et seq. as amended and the regulations promulgated there under; or
- (c). Contains a "reportable quantity" of one or more "Hazardous Substances", as defined in the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act, 42 *United States Code*, 9601, et seg. as amended and regulations

promulgated there under or as defined under Rule 17-7.020(24), *Florida Administrative Code*, and other laws and regulations of a similar nature; or

- (d). Contains a radioactive material the storage or disposal of which is subject to state or federal regulation.
- 3.16 <u>Household Trash.</u> Means accumulations of paper, magazines, packaging, containers, sweepings, and all other accumulations of a nature other than Garbage or Garden and Yard Trash, which are usual to housekeeping and to the operation of residences. Special Waste, furniture, White Goods, and construction material is not Household Trash.
- 3.17 <u>Landfill.</u> Means any solid waste land disposal area for which a permit, other than a general permit, is required by Section 403.707, *Florida Statutes*, that receives solid waste for disposal in or upon land other than a land-spreading site, injection well, or a surface impoundment.
- 3.18 <u>Mechanical Container.</u> Means any detachable metal container designed or intended to be mechanically dumped into a loader/packer type of Garbage truck used by the Contractor.
- 3.19 <u>Multiple Dwelling Units.</u> Means any building containing 2 or more permanent living units, not including motels and hotels, which are serviced by mechanical Container(s).
- 3.20 <u>Recyclable Materials.</u> Means any newspaper and steel, plastic and aluminum containers and other commercially viable recyclables as designated by Contractor that are generated within the Service Area.
- 3.21 <u>Refuse.</u> Means Garbage, Commercial Trash and Household Trash. Construction and Demolition Debris, Garden and Yard Trash. Hazardous Waste, Biohazardous Waste, Special Waste and Recyclable Materials are excluded.
- 3.23 <u>Residential Service.</u> Means the Refuse collection service provided to persons occupying dwelling units within the designated area who are not receiving commercial service.
 - 3.24 Service Area. Means the City limits of Webster.
- 3.25 <u>Special Waste.</u> Means large accumulations of Refuse or Bulky Waste not accumulated within the normal scope of household or business activities.
- 3.26 White Goods. Means inoperative and discarded refrigerators, ranges, water heaters, freezers, small air conditioning units, and other similar domestic and commercial large appliances.

Section 4 - GRANT OF RIGHT; GENERAL CONDITIONS

- 4.1 Exclusive Right. The Contractor shall provide Refuse collection services within the Service Area. The Contractor shall have and is hereby granted the exclusive right to provide residential and commercial Refuse collection services in the Service Area in accordance with the terms hereof. In furtherance of such grant, City shall take any and all actions, which may be necessary or desirable to enforce the grant of such exclusive right to Contractor in the discretion of the City; provided, however, that the City shall have the right to grant the exclusive right to provide residential single stream recycling, once per week collection, in a contractor provided 18-gallon bin by providing a written 30-days notice to Contractor. Contractor may independently enforce the exclusivity provisions of the Agreement against third-party violators, including, but not limited to, seeking injunctive relief and/or damages, and the City shall use good-faith efforts to cooperate in such enforcement actions brought by Contractor. The City shall use its best efforts to adopt ordinances, rules or regulations that have the effect of requiring third parties, including, without limitation, customers, to comply with the provisions of the Agreement, including, without limitation, the exclusive service rights granted to Contractor pursuant to the Agreement.
- 4.2 <u>Independent Contractor.</u> The Contractor shall be an independent contractor and shall provide, at his own expense, all labor, insurance, supervision, machinery and equipment, plant building, trucks and any other tools, equipment, accessories and things necessary to provide the service required herein.
- 4.3 <u>Spillage</u>. The Contractor shall not litter or cause any spillage to occur upon the premises or the rights-of-way wherein the collection shall occur.

Section 5 - RESIDENTIAL COLLECTION SERVICE

- 5.1 <u>Duties</u>. The Contractor shall collect and dispose of all refuse from single-family homes, Multiple Dwelling Units and mobile homes in the Service Area. Rates shall be as established in Exhibit "A".
- 5.2 <u>Frequency of Collection.</u> The Contractor shall collect Refuse from places of residence within the Service Area one time per week for Garbage, and household trash.
- 5.3 <u>Point of Pickup.</u> Collection of residential Refuse by the Contractor shall be at curbside or other such locations as will provide ready accessibility to Contractor's collection crew and vehicle. Those residents that qualify as disabled and approved by the City shall receive rear door service for garbage at no additional cost.
- 5.4 <u>Method of Set Out.</u> Garbage and household trash shall be placed only in garbage receptacles. The Contractor shall provide collection and disposal services for all household trash and garbage generated from residential End-Users, which, has been properly prepared and stored in a garbage receptacle container provided by Contractor.

At the City's request, the Contractor shall provide End-User additional garbage receptacles at a rate of \$10.68 per month for each End-User garbage receptacle above one. Garbage receptacles that have been lost or damaged due to negligence or abuse of the End-User shall be replaced or repaired at the expense of the City.

The City shall pass on charges billed to the City by the Contractor to the End-Users and transmit payment to the Contractor upon collection of such charges. The City will administer and assess all charges, End-User complaints and all direct interaction with the End-Users.

- 5.5 <u>Hours of Collection.</u> Garbage shall not be collected between 7:30 PM and 6:00 AM.
- 5.6 <u>Exclusions.</u> Special Waste, Hazardous Waste, Biohazardous Waste, Recyclables are excluded from the Contractor's obligation to provide Residential Service.

Section 6 - COMMERCIAL COLLECTION SERVICE

- 6.1 <u>Duties.</u> The Contractor shall collect and dispose of Refuse from or generated by any commercial or industrial use, and any use not included within residential service. Rates shall be as established in Exhibit "A".
- 6.2 <u>Frequency of Collection.</u> Commercial waste may be collected by the Contractor at any time and service will be available Monday through Friday, up to 5 times per week to prevent containers from becoming overloaded.
- 6.3 <u>Point of Pickup of Commercial Refuse.</u> Commercial Refuse End-Users shall accumulate Refuse at locations that are mutually agreed upon by the End-User and the Contractor.
- 6.4 Method of Collection of Commercial Refuse. The Contractor shall make collections with as little disturbance as possible. Any Refuse spilled by Contractor, or spilled as result of the Contractor missing a pick-up, shall be picked up promptly by the Contractor, unless spillage is caused by overloaded containers in which case the End-User shall be responsible for picking up the spillage.

End-Users shall be permitted to use garbage receptacles provided the amount of commercial trash and garbage per collection can be stored in a maximum of 4 garbage receptacles with 95 gallons of capacity; otherwise, End-Users shall use 1 or more of the following: mechanical containers, compactor service, roll-off containers.

At the City's request, the Contractor shall provide a commercial End-User additional garbage receptacles at a rate of \$19.23 per month for every commercial End-User garbage receptacle above one. The Contractor will charge the City at a rate as set forth in Exhibit "A" for each commercial End-User garbage receptacle above one. Garbage receptacles that have been lost or damaged due to negligence or abuse of the End-User shall be replaced or repaired at the expense of the City.

The City shall pass on charges billed to the City by the Contractor to the End-Users and transmit payment to the Contractor upon collection of such charges. The City will administer and assess all charges, End-User complaints and all direct interaction with the End-Users.

6.5 <u>Exclusions.</u> Special Waste, Hazardous Waste, Biohazardous Waste, Recyclables, Garden and Yard Trash, White Goods are excluded from the Contractor's obligation to provide Commercial Service.

Section 7 - SCHEDULES AND ROUTES

- 7.1 <u>Schedules.</u> The Contractor shall provide the City with schedules for all residential collection routes, indicating service day. The Contractor may adjust routes to maintain maximum efficiency and will provide City with adequate advance notice of any such proposed changes.
- 7.2 <u>Holidays.</u> Contractor shall not provide service on the following holidays: New Years Day, Fourth of July, Thanksgiving and Christmas. If the regular collection day falls on any of the aforementioned holidays, the Contractor shall collect the Refuse on the next day.

Section 8 - SPECIAL WASTE COLLECTION

The Contractor may offer Special Waste collection and disposal services to the City in the Service Area upon terms and conditions acceptable to the Contractor and the City.

Section 9 - CONTRACTORS OFFICE

The Contractor shall provide at its expense, a local or toll free phone number where complaints shall be received from the City, recorded and handled during normal working hours of each week and shall provide for prompt handling of emergency complaints and all other special or emergency complaints or calls. The Contractor shall maintain an adequate record of all complaints received and the disposition thereof for a period of one year after receipt and the City shall have the right to review the Contractor's records regarding the receipt and handling of complaints.

Section 10 - Payment and Billing

10.1 <u>Billing.</u> The Contractor shall bill the City for services provided during the previous month and City shall pay Contractor within 30 days of receipt of such invoice as set forth herein. The rates for such service shall be initially as set forth in Exhibit "A" which is attached hereto and incorporated herein. The intent of this Agreement is that the City shall pass on charges billed to the City by the Contractor to the End-Users and transmit payment to the Contractor upon collection of such charges. The City will administer and assess all charges, End-User complaints and all direct interaction with the

10.2 Adjustments to Rates.

(a). Changes in Collection Price. Compensation payable to Contractor for all solid waste services hereunder may be adjusted upward or downward each November to reflect changes in the cost of doing business measured by fluctuations in the consumer price index (CPI) for all urban consumer items as published by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of labor Statistics. Annually, on each November of this Agreement, the net change in collection rates may reflect such increase or decrease in the CPI as defined in the following mathematical formula.

New Rate = [CPI2 (Annual 2013) - CPI1 (Annual 2012)] + 1 Current Rate CPI1 (Annual 2012)

CPI1 The published annual CPI for the prior preceding year.

CPI2 The published annual CPI for the preceding year in which the rate is being adjusted.

If CPI1 and CPI2 are not expressed in relation to the same base period or if the material change is made the method of establishing CPI, the City and the Contractor shall make an appropriate statistical adjustment or conversion. If the CPI is discontinued, the City and the Contractor shall mutually select another index published by the United States Government or by a reputable publisher of financial and economic indices.

- (b.) Changes in Disposal Costs. It is recognized that, from time-to-time, the actual Disposal Cost charged to the Contractor for disposal or the generation rate of residential solid waste, of whatsoever nature, collected pursuant to this Agreement will change. In the event of such change in the Disposal Cost (including any fees, taxes or other charges or adjustments), the collection rates may be increased in such amount as will compensate the Contractor for the actual change of Disposal Cost. Decreases in Disposal Cost or generation rate shall be cause for a like dollar decrease in the collection rates. The adjustments to the per unit rates shall include a landfill disposal portion based on each resident generating 0.95 tons of Refuse per year. The density of commercial dumpster service shall be 100 pounds per cubic yard.
- (c.) Change in Disposal Site. Should a change of disposal sites become necessary due to circumstances beyond the Contractor's control, the Contractor shall be entitled to an equitable adjustment in rates to take into consideration distance, tipping fees, transportation costs, time and other relevant factors. The Contractor shall provide the City with supporting documentation justifying the claim for such adjustment and the City shall respond to such claim within 30 days of receipt of document.
- (d.) <u>Change in Law.</u> Compensation, as set forth herein, shall be increased to offset the increased costs of the Contractor as a result of increases in costs of

operations resulting from changes in controlling Federal, State or local environmental or other law or regulation which substantially changes the operations on or after the date hereof concerning the receipt, handling, transportation, or disposal of solid waste pursuant to this Agreement. No change shall be allowed hereunder for increases due to increases in income taxes or increases already compensated.

(e.) <u>Maximum Increase</u>. If the increase during any calendar year is over 3%, the City may terminate this Agreement, without penalty, after providing 30 days written notice to the Contractor.

Section 11 - REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES OF CONTRACTOR

The Contractor makes the following representations and warranties:

- 11.1 <u>Organization, Power and Authority.</u> The Contractor is a corporation duly organized and validly existing under the laws of the State of Florida, with full corporate power and authority to enter into this Agreement and perform its obligations hereunder.
- 11.2 <u>Due Authorization; Binding Obligation.</u> The execution, delivery and performance of this Agreement by the Contractor and the consummation of the transactions contemplated hereby have been duly authorized by all necessary corporate action on the part of the Contractor. This Agreement has been duly executed and delivered by the Contractor and is a valued and binding obligation of the Contractor enforceable in accordance with its terms.

Section 12 - DEFAULT

In the event either party defaults in the performance of any obligations to be performed by it hereunder, the non-defaulting party shall give the other written notice of each default, specifying with particularity the default complained of. In the event that the defaulting party fails or refuses to cure each default, or to commence and diligently pursue the cure of each default, within 30 days from receipt of such notice, then the non-defaulting party, may at its option, terminate this Agreement, or otherwise pursue all its legal rights and available remedies.

Section 13 - PERMITS AND LICENSES

The Contractor shall obtain, at its own expense, all permits and licenses required by law or ordinance and maintain the same in full force and effect

Section 14 - INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

14.1 <u>Certificate.</u> During the life of this Agreement, the Contractor shall procure and maintain insurance of the types and to the limits specified below. The Contractor shall provide the City with a certificate of insurance evidencing the required coverage and naming the City as an additional insured on all but the Workers' Compensation coverage. Cancellation or modification of said insurance shall not be effected or

effective without providing 30 days prior written notice to the City. The Contractor shall require each of its subcontractors to procure and maintain, until completion of that subcontractor's services, insurance of the types and to the limits specified below, unless the subcontractor's work is covered by the protection afforded by the Contractor's insurance. It shall be the responsibility of the Contractor to ensure that all its subcontractors comply with all of the insurance requirements contained herein relating to such subcontractors. Except as otherwise stated, the amounts and type of insurance shall conform to the following minimum requirements:

- 14.2 <u>Workers' Compensation.</u> The Contractor shall provide and maintain during the life of this Agreement, at his own expense, Workers' Compensation Insurance coverage to apply for all employees for statutory limits in compliance with the applicable State and Federal laws. In addition, the policy must include employers' liability insurance with a limit of \$100,000 each accident.
- 14.3 <u>Comprehensive General Liability.</u> The Contractor shall provide and maintain during the life of this Agreement, at its own sole expense Comprehensive General Liability and shall have the City named as an additional insured. Coverage must be afforded on a form no more restrictive than the latest edition of the Comprehensive General Liability Policy filed by the Insurance Services Office and must include:

Minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence combined single limit for bodily injury liability and property damage liability, Premises and/or operations coverage, Independent contractors coverage, and Products and/or completed operations coverage.

14.4 <u>Business Automobile Policy.</u> The Contractor shall provide and maintain during the life of this Agreement, at its own sole expense and shall have the City named as an additional insured, Comprehensive Automobile Liability Insurance. Coverage must be afforded on a form no more restrictive than the latest edition of the Business Auto Policy filed by the Insurance Services Office and must include:

Minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence combined single limit for bodily injury liability and property damage liability, Owned vehicles coverage, Hired and non-owned vehicles coverage, and Employer's non-ownership coverage.

Section 15 - BOOKS AND RECORDS

The City shall have the right upon reasonable notice to inspect and review the Contractor's books and records regarding the Contractor's performance of services hereunder. The City shall maintain such records in a confidential manner to the extent permitted by law. The Public Records Laws of the State of Florida shall control under this Agreement.

Section 16 - NOTICES

Section 17 - SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Agreement is declared illegal, void or unenforceable, the other provisions shall not be affected, but shall remain in full force and effect provided that the public health, safety and welfare are protected by such remaining terms.

Section 18 - ADDITIONAL SERVICES

During the Initial Term and Renewal Term, if exercised, the City reserves the right, but not the obligation, to negotiate at any time with the Contractor without completing the competitive bidding process for services, materials, and products. The terms and conditions of this Agreement may be amended upon written approval of both the City and the Contractor.

Section 19 – Addendum

Any portion of this Agreement may be amended by an Addendum mutually agreed upon by the City and the Contractor.

Section 20 – Handling Complaints

The Contractor shall perform a service of high quality and keep the number of legitimate complaints to a minimum. The Contractor shall maintain a telephone listing in the name in which it is doing business as a Contractor and provide adequate employees. The City shall be able to contact the Contractor during collection hours Monday through Friday. After hours, an answering machine shall be provided by the Contractor.

In order that the City may be informed of the quality of service, the Contractor must enter into the electronic tracking system (Trac EZ) all calls regarding complaints, requests and compliments from the residential and commercial End-Users. This system shall be provided for by the Contractor for the City and the Contractor to record all complaints and

resolution of said complaints or inquiries of service for inspection by the City. All complaints whether received in person, by mail or telephone, shall be recorded into the electronic tracking system (TRAC EZ) as received.

Section 21 – City Controlled Property

The Contractor shall provide City with 2 containers with 30 cubic yard capacities plus disposal with service as needed, 3 4 cubic yard front load dumpsters with weekly service, and 1 95 gallon wheeled cart with weekly service free of charge to the City with the Contractor being responsible for all disposal costs. Locations shall be as designated by the City.

Section 22 - Excused Performance

Except for the payment of amounts owed hereunder, neither party hereto shall be liable for its failure to perform or delay in its performance hereunder due to contingencies beyond its reasonable control including, but not limited to, strikes, riots, compliance with laws or governmental orders, inability to access a container, fires, inclement weather and acts of God, and such failure shall not constitute a breach under this Agreement.

MUTUAL AID AGREEMENT FOR WATER/WASTEWATER

ARTICLE I. PURPOSE

The Water/Wastewater Mutual Aid Program was established to provide a method whereby water/wastewater utilities sustaining physical damage from natural or man made disasters could obtain emergency assistance, in the form of personnel, equipment, and materials and other associated services necessary, from other water/wastewater utilities. The purpose of this Agreement is to formally document such program.

ARTICLE II. DEFINITIONS

- A. AGREEMENT The Water/Wastewater Mutual Aid Agreement. The original agreement and all signatory pages shall be kept at TREEO Center 3900 SW 63rd Blvd., Gainesville, FL 32608
- B. PARTICIPATING UTILITY Any Water/Wastewater utility which executes this Mutual Aid Agreement.
- C. DAMAGED UTILITY Any Participating Utility which sustains physical damage to its water/ wastewater system due to a natural or manmade disaster and seeks assistance pursuant to this Agreement.
- D. ASSISTING UTILITY Any Participating Utility which agrees to provide assistance to a Damaged Utility pursuant to this Agreement.
- E. AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE An employee of a Participating Utility authorized by that utility's governing board to request or offer assistance under the terms of this Agreement. (A list of the Authorized Representatives for each Participating Utility shall be attached to this Agreement as Appendix A)
- F. PERIOD OF ASSISTANCE The period of time beginning with the departure of any personnel of the Assisting Utility from any point for the purpose of travelling to the Damaged Utility in order to provide assistance and ending upon the return of all personnel of the Assisting Utility, after

- providing the assistance requested, to their residence or place of Work, whichever is first to occur.
- G. SCHEDULE OF EQUIPMENT RATES The latest rates published by Federal Emergency Management Agency under the response and recovery directorate applicable to major disasters and emergencies.
- H. WORK OR WORK-RELATED PERIOD Any period of time in which either the personnel or equipment of the Assisting Utility are being used by the Damaged Utility to provide assistance. Specifically included within such period of time are rest breaks when the personnel of the Assisting Utility will return to active Work within a reasonable time. Also, included is mutually agreed upon rotation of personnel and equipment.

ARTICLE III. PROCEDURE

In the event that a particular utility becomes a Damaged Utility, the following procedure shall be followed:

- A. The Damaged Utility shall contact the Authorized Representative of one or more of the participating utilities and provide them with the following information:
 - 1. a general description of the damage sustained;
 - the part of the water/wastewater system for which assistance is needed;
 - the amount and type of personnel, equipment, materials and supplies needed and a reasonable estimate of the length of time they will be needed;
 - the present weather conditions and the forecast for the next twenty-four hours; and
 - a specific time and place for a representative of the Damaged Utility to meet the personnel and equipment of the Assisting Utility.
 - The identification of Work conditions and special constraints such as availability of fuel supplies, lodging/meal support, medical facilities, security, communications, etc.

- B. When contacted by a Damaged Utility, the Authorized Representative of a Participating Utility shall assess his utility's situation to determine whether it is capable of providing assistance. No Participating Utility shall be under any obligation to provide assistance to a Damaged Utility. If the Authorized Representative determines that the Assisting Utility is capable of and willing to provide assistance, the Assisting Utility shall so notify the Authorized Representative of the Damaged Utility and providing the following information:
 - a complete description of the personnel, equipment and materials to be furnished to the Damaged Utility.
 - the estimated length of time the personnel, equipment and materials will be available;
 - the work experience and ability of the personnel and the capability of the equipment to be furnished;
 - 4. the name of the person or persons to be designated as supervisory personnel; and
 - the estimated time when the assistance provided will arrive at the location designated by the Authorized Representative of the Damaged Utility.
- C. The personnel and equipment of the Assisting Utility shall remain, at all times, under the direct supervision and control of the designated supervisory personnel of the Assisting Utility. In instances where only equipment is provided by the Assisting Utility, the ownership of said equipment shall remain with the Assisting Utility and said equipment shall be returned to the Assisting Utility immediately upon request. Representatives of the Damaged Utility shall suggest Work assignments and schedules for the personnel of the Assisting Utility; however, the designated supervisory personnel of the Assisting Utility shall have the exclusive responsibility and authority for assigning Work and establishing Work schedules for the personnel of the Assisting Utility. The designated supervisory personnel shall maintain daily personnel time records and a log of equipment hours, be responsible for the

- operation and maintenance of the equipment furnished by the Assisting Utility, and report Work progress to the Damaged Utility.
- D. The Damaged Utility shall have the responsibility of providing food and housing for the personnel of the Assisting Utility from the time of departure from their regularly scheduled Work location until the time of return to their regularly scheduled Work location. The food and shelter provided shall be subject to the approval of the supervisory personnel of the Assisting Utility. If not agreeable, food and shelter shall be provided and paid for as determined by mutual agreement.
- E. The Damaged Utility shall have the responsibility of providing communications between the personnel of the Assisting Utility and the Damaged Utility.

ARTICLE IV. REIMBURSABLE EXPENSES

The terms and conditions governing reimbursement for any assistance provided under this Agreement shall be agreed to prior to the providing of such assistance and shall be in accordance with the following provisions:

- A. PERSONNEL During the Period of Assistance, the Assisting Utility shall continue to pay its employees according to its then prevailing rules and regulations. The Damaged Utility shall reimburse the Assisting Utility for all direct and indirect payroll costs and expenses incurred during the Period of Assistance, including, but not limited to, employee pensions and benefits.
- B. EQUIPMENT The Assisting Utility shall be reimbursed for the use of its equipment during the Period of Assistance according to the SCHEDULE OF EQUIPMENT RATES established and published by FEMA. If an Assisting Utility uses an alternate basis of rates for equipment listed on the FEMA Schedule of Equipment Rates it shall provide such rates to the Damaged Utility prior to providing assistance. Rates for equipment not referenced on the FEMA Schedule of Equipment Rates shall be developed based on actual recovery of costs.

- C. MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES The Assisting Utility shall be reimbursed for all materials and supplies furnished by it and used or damaged during the Period of Assistance, unless such damage is caused by negligence of the Assisting Utility's personnel. The measure of reimbursement shall be the replacement cost of the materials and supplies used or damaged, plus ten (10) percent of such cost. In the alternative, the parties may agree that the Damaged Utility will replace, with a like kind and quality as determined by the Assisting Utility, the materials and supplies used or damaged.
- D. PAYMENT Unless mutually agreed otherwise, the Assisting Utility should bill the requesting utility for all expenses not later than ninety (90) days following the Period of Assistance. The requesting utility shall pay the bill in full not later than forty-five (45) days following the billing date. Unpaid bills shall become delinquent upon the forty-fifth (45th) day following the billing date, and once delinquent shall accrue interest at the rate of prime plus two percent (2%) per annum as reported by the Wall Street Journal.
- E. DISPUTED BILLINGS Those undisputed portions of a billing should be paid under this payment plan. Only the disputed portions should be sent to arbitration under Article VI.

ARTICLE V. INSURANCE

Each Participating Utility shall bear the risk of its own actions, as it does with its day-to-day operations, and determine for itself what kinds of insurance, and in what amounts, it should carry. Nothing herein shall act or be construed as a waiver of any sovereign immunity or other exemption or limitation on liability that a Participating Utility may enjoy.

ARTICLE VI. ARBITRATION

All disputes between two or more participating utilities arising from participation in this Agreement, which cannot be settled through negotiation, shall be submitted to binding arbitration before a panel of three persons chosen from the members of this Mutual Aid Agreement which are participating utilities, excluding those members that are parties to the dispute.

Each party to the dispute shall choose one panel member and those panel members shall agree on one additional panel member.

The panel shall adopt rules of procedure and evidence, shall determine all issues in dispute by majority vote and shall assess damages. The decision of the panel shall be final and binding upon the parties to the dispute.

BE IT RESOLVED AND ADOPTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WEBSTER, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND INTENT.

- (a). The City of Webster has complied with all requirements and procedures of Florida law in processing this Resolution.
- (b). The City of Webster, Florida, is interested in attaining maximum utility of the assets owned by the City, such as interests in surplus property (equipment and motor vehicles) of the City, for the benefit and enjoyment of the citizens of the City and, to the maximum extent practicable and consistent with the public interest, dispose of such property by the sale and transfer of such motor vehicles to appropriate persons or entities all of such disposition of City motor vehicles being accomplished in the most efficient manner as determined to be appropriate by the City Manager in consultation with the City Attorney.

SECTION 2. DISPOSAL OF SURPLUS MOTOR VEHICLES.

(a). The City Council of the City of Webster hereby declares the following equipment and motor vehicles detailed as follows to be surplus and available for sale and purchase:

- (d). Upon disposition of the City surplus equipment and motor vehicles being implemented in accordance with the provision of this Resolution, the City Manager shall advise the City Council as to the actions taken with regard to such City surplus property.

SECTION 3. SAVINGS.

The prior actions of the City of Webster relating to the disposition of City surplus property, as well as any and all related activities and matters and with regard to all other types of properties, are hereby ratified and affirmed.

SECTION 4. IMPLEMENTING ACTIONS.

- (a). The City Manager is hereby granted authority to take any and all necessary actions that may be desirable or necessary to implement the actions taken in this Resolution as is in accord with controlling law.
- (b). The City Attorney is instructed to assist the City Manager in the implementation of this Resolution and to make such recommendations as may be prudent relative to legal issues and matters.

SECTION 5. CONFLICTS.

All resolutions or parts of resolutions in conflict with this Resolution are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6. SEVERABILITY.

If any section, sentence, phrase, word or portion of this Resolution is determined to be invalid, unlawful or unconstitutional, said determination shall not be held to invalidate or impair the validity, force or effect of any other section, sentence, phrase, word or portion of this Resolution not otherwise determined to be invalid, unlawful or unconstitutional.

SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon adoption.

ORDINANCE NO. 2025-35

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF WEBSTER, FLORIDA, AMENDING THE CITY OF WEBSTER LAND DEVELOPMENT CODE; MORE SPECIFICALLY, AMENDING ALL ARTICLES AND DIVISIONS AS PROVIDED HEREIN; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS AND SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Webster desires to provide for the maximum freedom of use of private property and the greatest economic opportunity for its citizens and property owners as is consistent with the health, safety and welfare of the public; and,

WHEREAS, the City's Land Development Code is the principal authority for regulation of the use of private property and the primary instrument for the implementation of City policies related to development control, growth management and land use; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Webster desires and has directed the periodic review of all chapters of the City's Land Development Code and Official Zoning Map to eliminate redundancies, conflicts, inconsistencies and ambiguities, and to ensure that all statutory references are current and accurate; and,

WHEREAS, City staff has reviewed the Land Development Code and Official Zoning Map, identified deficiencies and has proposed amendments, revisions and changes necessary to ensure clarity, accuracy, efficiency and enforceability of the Code and Map, and has prepared documents incorporating these changes for Council review; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Webster has determined, for the reasons stated herein, that amending the current Land Development Code and Official Zoning Map is reasonable, appropriate and necessary; and,

WHEREAS, the Council, after the appropriate publication of notice of its intention to consider this Ordinance, has determined that in consideration of the health, safety and welfare of its citizens, it is in the best interests of the City of Webster, Florida to approve this Ordinance.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Webster, Florida as follows:

SECTION 1. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to Amend the City of Webster Land Development Code and Official Zoning Map, as incorporated by reference; amending specific articles, divisions and sections for the reasons set forth in the above Whereas clauses, which are incorporated herein, *in haec verba*.

SECTION 2. AUTHORITY.

Pursuant to Article VIII, Section I of the Florida Constitution and Sections 125.01 and 125.66 of the Florida Statutes, the City Council of the City of Webster has all powers of local self-government to perform county functions and render county services and facilities except when prohibited by law, including the authority to establish and amend its Land Development Code and Official Zoning Map.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT TO THE "LAND DEVELOPMENT CODE".

The City Council of the City of Webster hereby amends the City of Webster Land Development Code as shown attached hereto as Exhibit "A", and incorporated herein, in haec verba.

SECTION 4. CODIFICATION.

It is the intention of the City Council of the City of Webster, and it is hereby ordained that the provisions of this Ordinance shall be reflected and made a part of the Land Development Code of the City of Webster, Florida, with the exception of Sections 2, 4, 5 and 6. The word "Ordinance," or similar words may be changed to "section," "article," or other appropriate word or phrase and the sections of this Ordinance may be renumbered or re-lettered to accomplish such intention. The Code codifier is granted liberal authority to rescind those sections of the Code declared null and void as set forth herein.

SECTION 5. CONFLICTS AND REPEALER.

This Ordinance shall be cumulative of all provisions of the Ordinances of the City of Webster, Florida, except where the provisions of this Ordinance are in direct conflict with the provisions of such Ordinances, in which event all Ordinances or parts thereof in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION 6. SEVERABILITY.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance, or application hereof, is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion or application shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions thereof.

SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE.

Once adopted by the City Council of the City of Webster, this Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon enactment, or as otherwise provided for by law.

SUBJECT: City of Webster Land Development Code Update

Sumter County retained Inspire Placemaking Collective, Inc. to assist with the update of the City of Webster's Land Development Code (LDC) for consistency with the recently updated Comprehensive Plan and Sumter County's LDC. This memorandum summarizes the update and review process, the public input received, and the major changes proposed. The full draft LDC (showing the changes in strike-through and underline) may be downloaded from the project website at https://www.inspire-engagement.com/webster-ldc-update.

Process

Inspire held stakeholder interviews on April 16, 2025, and facilitated a workshop with City Council on August 28, 2024, to obtain initial input.

Inspire also created a project website that included a description of the project, a timeline that was regularly updated, and documents available for download. The website also hosted an online community survey, which ran from February 10 to July 11, 2025.

The full Draft LDC was also made available through the project website. The release date was August 2, 2025.

The City Council first hearing for adoption of the LDC is tentatively scheduled for September 18, 2025, and the second reading for October 16, 2025.

Public Input

Online Survey. The consulting team, in conjunction with County staff, developed an Online Survey and uploaded it to the project website to help gather public sentiments, ideas, and preferences regarding the update of the Land Development Code. Seventy people took the survey online. The survey results summary is available on the project website. The following are the main takeaways from the survey.

- 1. Webster should preserve its rural and small-town character.
- 2. Growth should be smart, limited, and low-density.
- Infrastructure should be in place before new development occurs.

- 4. Downtown should be revitalized with support for small businesses.
- 5. Essential services and amenities such as grocery stores, healthcare, parks, and restaurants are needed.
- 6. Residents want more input and transparency in the development process.
- 7. Agriculture and the natural environment should be protected.
- 8. Webster should maintain its own distinct identity and not become another Villages.

LDC Major Changes

Reorganization. Article V (General Development Standards) was split into several articles to make it easier to find the standards. The current and proposed outlines are shown below:

- Added language on non-conforming uses regarding sludge and septage
- Added new language to clarify the Historic Preservation requirements & require a letter of clearance

Article X. Sign Standards. The following changes are proposed.

- Added cross-reference to sight triangle
- Clarified Billboard regulations are handled by FDOT

Article XI. Floodplain Management. No changes.

Online Survey Summary



SURVEY INFORMATION

An Online Survey was developed and uploaded to the project website to help gather public sentiments, ideas, and preferences regarding the update of the City's Land Development Code. There were 70 contributions to the survey.

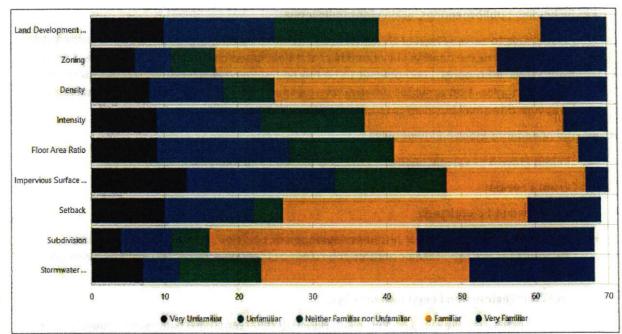
SURVEY RESULTS

Question 1.: What is your zip code?

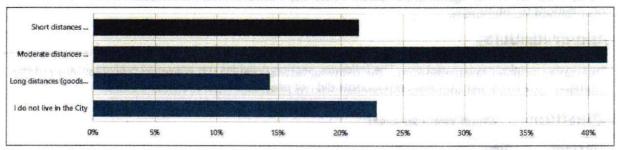

Question 2. How familiar are you with the following terminology? (Very Unfamiliar, Unfamiliar, Neither Familiar nor Unfamiliar, Familiar, Very Unfamiliar)



The survey responses indicate varying levels of familiarity with terminology commonly used in land development regulations. Most respondents understand basic terms such as subdivision and zoning. Terms like setback, stormwater management, and density are somewhat understood, while more technical terms such as development code, impervious surface ratio, intensity, and floor area ratio are the least familiar. The actual percentages can be found in the appendix.

Question 3. If you live in the City of Webster, how far do you think it is ok to travel to receive basic goods and services (e.g., grocery stores, gas stations, barber shops, etc.)?



When asked about acceptable travel distances for basic goods and services, 41% of respondents favored moderate distances, believing that goods and services should be available in select rural locations. The rest of the respondents were split between short (21%) and long (14%) distances for basic goods and services. Several respondents (22%) do not live within the City limits. Overall, most respondents showed preference for having some level of services available within rural communities.

Question 4. How can the City ensure that new development occurs in a manner which retains what you feel makes Webster an ideal place to live, work, play, and grow?

- By holding public meetings, asking for public input
- I would love to see a revival of the downtown area to include more businesses and potentially
 multi-family housing nearby. I live outside of the developed city limits, but across the street
 from annexed property. I do not want to be forced to join city water or sewer. Webster should
 be seeking grants that provide infrastructure for more residents and traffic, and grants that can
 be awarded to small businesses to encourage business growth.
- We need more jobs and lower bills
- Limited growth as we still need the farmland for food and animals.
- Do not develop
- Roads need to be updated
- I think the city should plan for business development plus housing development for new residents to move to. Make or enforce the rules to Cleanup some of the existing homes and lots.
- Not build! Restore and keep it a small city.
- I love Webster the way it is, I don't mind traveling to a larger city to buy what I need. I can do
 without the big city traffic, and crime that comes with big cities.

- Keep residents informed of land that has been sold with a purpose other than what it was being
 used, i.e. pasture farmland bought by developers for the purpose of building houses. How many
 and impact to community.
- · Limit the number of new homes being built. Maintain small town living with paced growth.
- Make it a work, live and play community.
- Ask the Residents before approving development. Webster is such a beautiful place and the
 farmland should be left alone. I for one do not want to see the villages take over our beautiful
 quiet city. Would like to see a grocery store like Publix nearby.
- Clean up the buildings, allow golf cart use, add manufacturing, add grocery
- No subdivisions! Too many people in one spot causes traffic and hardship on the few retail
 places we have. More development of larger parcels. We also need more restaurants.
- More shopping plazas ... grocery stores, pharmacies etc. Restaurants and parks
- Specific standards should be laid out for incoming developments that bring in a mix of uses to
 prevent the small community from being overrun by houses. Commercial and open spaces are
 also needed.
- I purchased some land near the center of town in June 2024. I love the small tight nucleus of
 Webster and the rural feel when you drive out a couple minutes from the city proper. I don't
 wish to see the development sprawl into a bunch of subdivisions with generic grocery-anchored
 shopping centers. I love the charm of local business in the City of Webster. I am content with the
 school locations and fire station location. Perhaps a police annex would fit well near the fire
 station.
- More safe pedestrian and bike crossings/lanes would also be nice.
- Leave farmland alone. No major big box stores. No huge, overpriced, or gated communities. I
 hope the "downtown" area along 471 stays "small town"
- Proper infrastructure before building subdivisions
- Don't let it get all the growth like the villages. Some growth is okay but not like the villages The Villages is overrated
- Add in more provisions but keep subdivisions out. Allow some modern amenities but keep it rural and farm community.
- As long as you don't let The Villages come in and take over, I'm fine with small, smart growth.
 We chose this area several years ago to get away from busy, overgrowth and too fast paced development.
- Require a hospital be built, some storefronts for businesses, set aside 20 acres for a beautiful park before it is all developed. Set subdivisions as 1 house per 1/2 acre, no smaller. Keep it upscale nice, not crammed all together, something special to set this area apart from typical growth areas. Set aside another large plat of acreage for concerts, etc. Make this a place people like to come to. Fix up downtown Webster and Bushnell together. Landscape it, make it attractive. Some is here already but it could be much better. Give Webster a main street that can be shops and a large walkable shopping area off away from 471. Same for Bushnell. And do

not raise property taxes for the existing people, the developers need to pay for the roads/infrastructure as it is usually done, not the cities.

- Keep it rural. It's already too crowded.
- People move to Webster to get away from the hustle and bustle. Bringing the hustle and bustle to Webster is the opposite of what people want. The rural area of Webster is what makes it an ideal place to live, work, play and grow. People move to Webster to raise their children away from the city. For a slower pace of life. Just like it always has been. We do not want the city life brought into Webster. Webster needs to remain rural. We already have plenty of stores that are close by in The Villages. We do not need to bring The Villages to Webster. 471 is already jam packed with traffic from the increase of people. The last thing we need is more housing developments. KEEP WEBSTER RURAL!!!!
- Build roads before building homes
- I didn't move here to have all the comforts of a large city. There are basic needs met withing a
 15-20 min drive and major cities with everything I need within 45-60 min. Ensuring that quiet
 country life stays possible here is the most important to me.
- Ensure there is no encroachment that jeopardizes agricultural land
- Stop approving every single development. [Evaluate] how to keep Webster's rural charm by
 maybe approving 1 house per acre or two. We don't want or need any more HOA communities
 with high density population of several houses per acre. Most move to this area because it's
 rural. We don't mind driving to already established areas to go shopping.
 - Keep the rural, small-town feel, even with development. There are many new development concepts that include communal gardens, farm to table, which align with the existing environment.
 - Do not allow subdivision, no home sites under 2 1/2 acres, no strip malls. No new chain stores (mom and pop type stores only).
 - There are many communities that the live, work and play have been successful. Webster needs
 to study these areas and copy a plan that is suitable.
 - It can allow business to grow
- traffic flow is very important; widen roads
- Limit growth. Keep agricultural zoning agricultural. Limit the density of building to low density.
 Retain the rural setting of Webster. We do want to be The Villages. Pay the fire, department,
 EMT and law enforcement more. Unprivatize the library. Publicize events better for city events
 and library events. Very poor marketing for both. Keep Beville's Corner as it is. Webster
 government has gotten greedy and uncaring. The destruction of that land is not necessary; nor
 is removing it from the tax roll.
- Do not allow subdivisions anywhere near webster. We don't need or want to be like Zephyrhills
 or Wesley chapel or anything like the Villages! This is a farming community not a city!
- Leave Webster as a rural area, no more buying up land here, leave it as it is, so we can enjoy the land where cattle roam and the trees give us shade and fresh air and kids can play outdoors

- Keep development concentrated within the ACTUAL city limits and stop annexing and approving
 dense development for properties 1+ miles outside the contiguous city limits. People who live
 outside the city limits live there for a reason to be away from dense development.

And every time I turn around something is being built or new houses going in, that are supposed to be "low income" for low-income families!!! But that hasn't happened! You find out how much rent is and it's like you have to choose to have a roof over your head or food in your belly!!!
- Keep The Villages from encroaching too much on the city and surrounding areas.
- Don't bring the chain restaurants and box stores. We moved into the country for a reason. Don't
 want more development and cookie cutter no-name towns.
- By honoring its small-town charm.
- Leave it alone! At this point Sumter County is becoming something that we were born and raised in a cesspool of housing! Farming land and cattle land will soon be a thing a new generation will not witness here! Sad
- No more RV parks, more normal streets with houses on small plots. More choice of stores.
- Determine what you want the City to look and feel like; create an overlay for the core area to help direct new and re-development. Make zoning consistent -- keep residential in residential areas.
- Webster is a beautiful farm community with the availability of fresh produce and farm goods.
 We love the country feel and wide-open spaces. Subdivisions and strip malls would be a huge deterrent. We don't mind traveling a little for the bigger stores to keep the rural atmosphere.

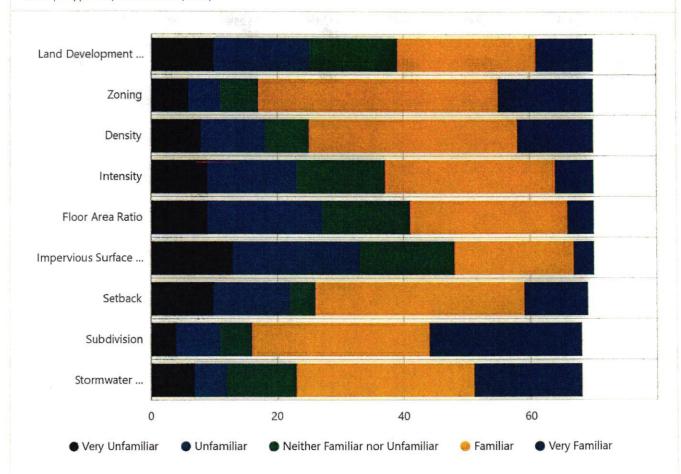

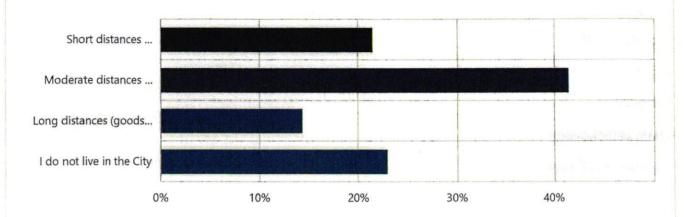

Approval of Ordinance 2025-35 - Land Development Code

Update.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Webster has prepared Ordinance 2025-35, an amendment to the Land Development Code ("LDC") to ensure consistency with the adopted Comprehensive Plan and the Sumter County Land Development Code. The amendments include a comprehensive reorganization of all articles and divisions of the LDC, the elimination of obsolete provisions, and the addition of new standards and definitions designed to improve clarity, usability, and enforcement.

The update process included stakeholder interviews, City Council workshops, a project website with regular updates, and an online community survey conducted between February and July 2025 with seventy respondents. Survey input emphasized preserving Webster's rural and small-town character, supporting limited and well-planned growth, improving infrastructure prior to development, and revitalizing downtown with support for small businesses.

The draft LDC was released on August 2, 2025, and public hearings were scheduled beginning September 2025. City staff and the consulting team, Inspire Placemaking Collective, prepared and presented the proposed revisions. The Planning and Zoning Special Master conducted a public hearing on September 11, 2025, and considered public comments, the staff report, and all supporting materials.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

The Planning and Zoning Special Master finds that the proposed LDC update represents a necessary and reasonable reorganization and modernization of the City's development regulations. The amendments eliminate redundancies, conflicts, and obsolete language; consolidate Planned Development districts; revise administrative procedures to reflect statutory requirements; add new zoning districts and conservation subdivision standards; clarify definitions; and update development standards including parking, circulation, buffering, and signage.

The amendments reflect extensive public input, as documented in the survey results and stakeholder meetings, which consistently expressed a desire for rural preservation, infrastructure improvements prior to growth, support for small businesses, and protection of agricultural and natural resources.

Further, the Planning and Zoning Special Master finds that all statutory changes enacted during the 2025 Florida Legislative Session have been reviewed and discussed. The record demonstrates that none of the proposed revisions impose standards more restrictive than those permitted under

state law, in accordance with SB 180 (2025), which prohibits the adoption of more restrictive land development regulations until 2027. Remaining changes are directed toward alignment with new laws, improved clarity of use, and ease of reference. Additional revisions were made collaboratively with Sumter County to ensure consistency between codes and to remove provisions that are moot.

LEGAL CONCLUSION:

Section 163.3202, Florida Statutes, requires that local governments adopt and enforce land development regulations that are consistent with and implement their adopted comprehensive plan. The proposed amendments to the City of Webster Land Development Code are consistent with the Comprehensive Plan, implement its provisions, and ensure coordination with the Sumter County Land Development Code.

The amendments provide predictable and consistent standards, eliminate unnecessary duplication, and facilitate lawful, orderly, and sustainable development. The record further demonstrates that none of the proposed revisions impose standards more restrictive than those permitted under state law, in accordance with SB 180 (2025), which prohibits the adoption of more restrictive land development regulations until 2027. The changes therefore satisfy the statutory requirements of § 163.3202, Fla. Stat., as well as the broader policy objectives of Chapter 163, Florida Statutes, related to growth management.

RECOMMENDATION:

Based on the foregoing Findings of Fact and Legal Conclusion, the Planning and Zoning Special Master hereby recommends that the City Council approve Ordinance 2025-35, amending the City of Webster Land Development Code.
