I visited Eileen during her stay at the VA hospital at which time she asked that we remember her as we continue helping Veterans. It is my intention to seek formal permission to rename our relief fund as "Eileen Hadbavny Relief Fund" or if necessary establish a separate relief fund in her name. I would hope that succeeding Post Commanders will honor this Fund.

THE WASHINGTON MONUMENT History

One detail that is never mentioned, is that in Washington, D.C. There can never be a building of greater height than the Washington Monument.

With all the uproar about removing the ten commandments, etc., this is worth a moment or two of your time. I was not aware of this amazing historical information.

On the aluminum cap, atop the Washington Monument in Washington, D.C., are displayed two words:

Laus Deo

'Praise be to God!'

These words have been there for many years; they are 555 feet, 6,660 inches high, perched atop the monument, facing skyward to the Father of our nation, overlooking the 69 square miles which comprise the District of Columbia, capital of the United States of

America.

Though construction of this giant obelisk began in 1848, when James Polk was President of the United States, it was not until 1888 that the monument was inaugurated and opened to the public.

It took twenty-five years to finally cap the memorial with a tribute to the Father of our nation,

Laus Deo

'Praise be to God!'

From atop this magnificent granite and marble structure, visitors may take in the beautiful panoramic view of the city with its division into four major segments. From that vantage point, one can also easily see the original plan of the designer, Pierre Charles l'Enfant a perfect cross imposed upon the landscape, with the White House to the north. The Jefferson Memorial is to the south, the Capitol to the east and the Lincoln Memorial to the west.

A cross you might ask? Why a Cross? What about separation of church and state? Yes, a cross; separation of church and state was not, is not, in the Constitution. And so, when the cornerstone of the Washington Monument was laid on July 4th, 1848, deposited within it were many items - including the Holy Bible presented by the Bible Society.
