# SEVERN VALLEY COUNTRY PARK

I have missed the last couple of editions of the magazine so the staff and volunteers at Severn Valley Country Park would like to wish everyone a (belated) Happy New Year!

Through February the visitor centre and cafe are continuing to open Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Of course, they will be open everyday of half term – so that's from Friday 14<sup>th</sup> to Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> February. Our rangers will be leading an activity on Wed 19<sup>th</sup> February (11am-12.30pm, £4.50 per child, accompanying adults free). It's called Clay Faces, Seed Planting and Scavenger Hunt Fun! It does what it says on the tin but if there is time, we'll be looking for mini beasts in our woodland log piles too. On Friday 21<sup>st</sup> February there will be a free craft drop-in session in the visitor centre from 11am-12.30pm. There will be a take-home craft to make that will take around 10-15mins so please drop in any time.

Parkrun continues on Saturdays at 9am and Nordic Walking continues on Wednesdays 10am-11am, with the last session of each month at Comer Wood. For the park's monthly newsletter I was looking at the statistics for parkrun here at Severn Valley. Christmas Day saw 269 participants starting the day at parkrun. (I was at home opening presents!). This was the largest number for a Severn Valley Country parkrun. Over the 5 years of hosting parkrun there have been 218 runs with 5475 participants who have managed 18,598 race finishes. The parkrun at Severn Valley Country Park is made possible by the parkrun volunteers. Over the last 5 years there have been 492 of them! They are out in all weathers (it was minus 6 when they were checking the course on one Saturday last month). This Spring some permanent markers for the 5k parkrun course will be installed on site. Last year, money was raised through a raffle to provide posts and signage for the route. So you'll be able to pop down any time to run the course — I'll cheer you on from the visitor centre!

Wild Toddlers is returning in March so we'll have some details for you very soon.

## **SUSTAINABILITY**

2024 was a rollercoaster year for the planet, with everything from a historic deal to fund conservation to shocking revelations about greenhouse gas emissions. The Met Office reports that it was provisionally the fourth warmest year on record, behind 2022, 2023, and 2014, even though the UK didn't seem to see much of it. In 2025, the triple planetary crisis—climate change, biodiversity loss, and pollution—still needs urgent action since they continue to have a devastating impact on the well-being of the planet and people.

Sadly, the community-owned 'Our Green Shop' low-waste Refill Shop on Waterloo Terrace will have closed by the time you read this. On a positive note, a new Refill Shop will be opening at Lasyard House, in Low Town, Bridgnorth, as part of a private enterprise collaborating with local suppliers and selling artisanal products made in-house.

Following last September's Sustainable Bridgnorth AGM and the Repair Cafe presentations, progress is being made in discussions about setting up a monthly pop-up version in Bridgnorth. Stay tuned for more information. Potential helpers are being sought to organise logistics or coordinate volunteers. There are also discussions about organising another Green Festival. Sustainable Bridgnorth is on the hunt for volunteers to lead the organisation of the festival. Please contact <a href="mailto:secretary@sustainablebridgnorth.org.uk">secretary@sustainablebridgnorth.org.uk</a> if you can help with either of these.

Want to know how you can keep warm, save energy, and cut carbon? Following training from the Marches Energy Agency, Sustainable Bridgnorth will now be able to offer free home energy surveys and advice on a range of issues, including reducing energy bills, grant funding for home upgrades, reducing carbon emissions, and free low-cost measures.

## A FIELD GUIDE

We are very lucky to live in Alveley or Quatt. Wherever you live in our villages you will be within a five minute walk of open countryside, and these fields and woods have names, some of them very old or unusual. Most field names are self explanatory. The Paddock, Big Hay Field, Bull Pasture, Colts Piece etc. Others need an explanation. STONEY FURLONG. A furlong was the length of ground a pair of oxen could plough before taking a breather, (a furrow long) THE ENCLOSURE. A field on a farm called the Common near Worfield which would have been taken off the commoners (naughty!) and kept for the use of the local bigwig after the act of enclosures 1773. THE CLEM GANDER. on the same farm. Clem is an old English word meaning to starve. So the field was so poor it would not feed a few male geese.

NABOTHS VINEYARD near Alveley in 1770 so named because a neighbour may have coveted it. The following fields are all near Alveley or Quatt: THE POT HOOK. so named for its unusual shape. THE BOWELS which is a corruption of Bowhills and denotes a curved boundary, from the old English word 'boga'. Fields, or farms, called LITTLE LONDON were set aside for cattle drovers on their way to London. SNEYD GROUND is the name for a detached field from the old English word 'snaed' meaning something cut off. NIGHTSLEYS is a field where animals were kept at night. There were still wolves in the UK until around 1760.

A ley is a temporary pasture or clearing in a wood ie AlveLEY, ClaverLEY, High-LEY. There is a DOE BANK in Alveley which of course means deer must have used the field regularly.

Around the Buttercross there is a field called SOW AND PIGS and I guess there is a story to this. When a sow gets very near to giving birth (farrowing) she much prefers to be quiet and on her own. I think at some time a sow broke out of a nearby farm or cottager's sty and found herself a warm spot under a hedge and gave birth. Now a sow on her own can be obstinate (pig-headed) but a sow with her young is not an animal to be trifled with as I know from personal experience. A crocodile with toothache would be easier to drive back home! A wise man would wait until the hungry sow returned on her own with piglets following.

The field called BANNUTS is the old name for walnut trees. The field called SMOCK SHIRT MEADOW refers to the cup shaped flowers of Lady's smock (cardamine protensis). However 'smock' was once a slang name for a woman and the field name may have alluded to certain spring time activities in the meadows.

Many field names are associated with the church, such as STEEPLE FURLONG or BELL MEADOW or CHANTRY LEASOW. (Leasow is an Anglo-Saxon term meaning meadow or rough pasture) but these fields are always near the church. However there are two fields called CHURCH YARD or GREAT CHURCH and LITTLE CHURCH FIELD (1770) that are not near the church of St Mary's and are so called because skeletons were found there. They are very near to the field called BATTLE FIELD where a skirmish took place in 1645 during the English Civil War. Is this where they buried their dead? Or does it refer to a dispute over ownership? The field called COLLEGE FIELD was probably owned by a priest. As you would expect in a border county we have a field called WELSH CLOSE spelt Welch. There is one field that the experts cannot agree on and that is SCRILL SCROLL. It could be slang for a roll of bank notes. Possibly. Similar to a wad of wonga. Maybe. A field in Quatt is called AMERICAN GROUND because it is remote from the main farm. Also In Quatt a field called DEVILS BIT from an uncommon flower 'devils bit scabious' (succisa pratensis) or possibly referring to the poor quality of the soil. Another field with a flowery connection is THUN-DERBOLT PIECE from the common red poppy (papover rhoeas) or the bladder campion (silene cucubalus) And finally, in the parish of Quatt, which is about as far as you can get from Wales in the county of Shropshire, the Welsh influence shows itself in some unexpected places. In an old tithe document is mentioned COMMER alias CWM MAWR WOOD which surely is COMER WOODS and very

popular with dog walkers (canis lupus familiaris, + homo sapiens).

The Roman Emperor Claudius II needed soldiers. He suspected that marriage made men want to stay at home with their wives, instead of fighting wars, so he outlawed marriage. A kind-hearted young priest named Valentine felt sorry for all the couples who wanted to marry, but who couldn't. So secretly he married as many couples as he could – until the Emperor found out and condemned him to death. While he was in prison awaiting execution, Valentine showed love and compassion to everyone around him, including his jailer. The jailer had a young daughter who was blind, but through Valentine's prayers, she was healed. Just before his death in Rome on 14<sup>th</sup> February, he wrote her a farewell message signed 'From your Valentine.' So, the very first Valentine card was not between lovers, but between a priest about to die, and a little girl, healed through his prayers.

This makes it more important than ever to care for our remaining birds. By feeding, providing water and putting up nest boxes we can give them a safe space to raise their chicks.

The National Nest Box Week initiative encourages bird conservation across the UK, and it's easy to get involved, whether you're a teacher, part of a local wildlife group, or just wanting to boost the bird numbers in your own garden.




