

In May, Oaks' residents and three graduates joined women from two other transitional homes for a weekend retreat in the piney woods. The Freedom Retreat was designed to help the attendees identify their emotional strongholds and the vulnerability associated with those feelings. The ladies learned through faith and prayer how to reconcile these emotions which have enslaved them.

During the day, the women attended seminars with various speakers featuring key topics regarding strongholds such as abuse, fear, and insecurity. Each session was followed by intentional prayer time with prayer partners. The women learned to forgive oppressors. The women described the experience as one of the most emotionally healing opportunities since coming to the Oaks. The weekend refuge was considered a safe space to learn and process the topics. Their time was also blessed with prayer, music, recreation, and a dinner in their honor.

As one attendee stated "It was the most healing experience emotionally and spiritually; giving me a chance to understand my brokenness, accept my strongholds and let them go. I realize with God; I have power to overcome the grip of the strongholds which I previously allowed to hurt me."

PHASE ONE of the Oaks' Program

Recently five Oaks' residents completed Phase One of their program at the Oaks. This phase is typically sixteen weeks beginning upon arrival at Oaks of Righteousness, immediately following release.

The principal goal of Phase One is for each participant to learn more about themselves, while observing and participating in a Christian lifestyle as a member of a family in a Christian home. The ladies learn to have accountability with one another as Sisters in Christ.

Phase One of the program is made up of several classes all of which have a spiritual emphasis. Classes include Anger Management, Spiritual 12 Steps, Co-Dependency, Relational Life Skills, and (REAL) Resentments, Expectations, Acceptance and Letting Go, by Laura McPherson, LPC, LMTC. Through the help of instructors and class content, the participants recognize their hurts, hang-ups, wrongdoings and need for healing. They learn how to make God a priority, while learning to show grace to others.

The residents also participate in counseling, Celebrate Recovery, Bible studies, money management classes, meetings with mentors and recovery sponsors, and community service in Phase One.

The last step of Phase One is an outside class conducted by WorkFaith. The women take part in a five-day program, Job Search Accelerator, which has a spiritual emphasis. Participants learn many skills related to a successful job search culminating in mock interviews. Students are taught how to handle difficult interview questions about employment gaps and incarceration.

Collectively, lessons learned in Phase One help prepare the women to live a Christ centered life as they prepare to step into the world outside the Oaks of Righteousness.
