- Q. Are you familiar with that area right around where It's known as the gravel pit?
  - A. Sure.
- Q. All right, sir. Now, just And you have spent your entire life in this general area?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. All right. Now, can you describe generally for the purposes of raising crops, what is there about this area that all farmers practice? And I'll have to ask you in terms of -- How do they manage water?
  - A. Nature take care of it mostly.
  - Q. Right.
- A. But the farms -- Once in a while somebody is raising a special crop, they can try to irrigate it a little bit. Like cabbage or cauliflower. But most of the time they depend upon mother nature to furnish the water.
- Q. So these would be natural channels, water channels, or --
  - A. Well, yes, they are natural channels.
- Q. All right. Now, what did that area look like over the years, as far as you can think back in terms of years? Let's gc back to 1977, say.

MR. DANA: Objection. What area are you talking about?

MR. WARD: The arta right around the

intersection of Greenlee Road and South Hill Foad. MR. DANA: The area you were calling the 3 gravel pit area for this purpose? 4 MP. WARD: Yes. Right. It's right below the 5 intersection there. 6 There's Greenlee Road, and there's South Hill Road (indicating). 8 All right. Now, generally what does that area -9 What has it looked like over the years? Do you recall? 10 For many years it was all farm land. Then the A. 11 beavers got in there and kind of dammed up the water and 12 made this so as they couldn't farm it so good. They could 13 pasture it. But their water backed up there from the beaver 14 dam. 15 And in 1977, do you recall how that piece of 16 property was being used? At that time, I believe Mr. 17 Brace's father cwned the farm. 18 Yes. A . 19 Up until '77. · Q. 20 A. Mostly pasture land. 21 Now, generally from time to time could you see 22 water on the surface of that area? And, again, we're 23 talking about the intersection of Greenlee Road or anyplace 24 else in that whole area. 25

Not unless it was in the spring of the year, for λ. a little while, and the late fall. That would be the only time? Q. (Witness nods head affirmatively.) A. Were there beavers in the area? Q. A. Beavers, yes. 6 MR. DANA: Again, the area is just --MR. WARD: Again, the area is -- I'm still . 8 referring to -- When I use the word "area", I 9 am referring to that area immediately south 10 of Greenlee Road and South Hill Road. The 11 intersection. Let's see if I have --12 THE WITNESS: North of -- It would be north 13 of Greenlee Road and South Hill Road. 14 MR. WARD: Let's do this, if the intersection 15 shows up here (indicating). I'm trying to go 16 back before this picture was taken now. 17 MR. DANA: But, John, just for the record, 18 I'd like to interpose a general objection to 19 the use of the word "area" here. It's too 20 imprecise a term for this case. You've only 21 defined it as sort of south of these two 22 roads. 23 MR. WARD: Let me explain it for Mr. Sharpe. 24 BY MR. WARD: 25

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MR. WARD: Yes, 19 is up here. MR. BRACE: It doesn't show on there. MR. DANA: We should also just add for the 3 record that Mr. Brace is attending the deposition, as is his daughter, Miss McAtee. Turn this map around. 6 Q. Does that help? There's Sibleyville Corners. Here's where they Α. 8 are farming. Right in here (indicating). Right, okay. Q. THE WITNESS: Right, Bob? Q. He can't talk right now. 12 Α. Oh, he can't talk. 0. No. Here's Tamarack Road? Yes. That's another road here. And this is Greenlee Road (indicating). 16 Right. This (indicating) is South Hill Road. 17 Okay? 18 A. Yes. 19 Generally, you say that water would be -- you 20 could see water in the spring? 21 Very early in the spring. There was a little 22 stream there. After -- Before the beavers come there, there 23 was very little. There was just a little -- wet weather 24 stream you might call it.

MR. DANA: You may have said this for the record, but the area Mr. Ward has marked on the map he's marked with a circle in ink, and that's being used on the exhibit. Here's where they --We don't have to pinpoint them, but if we just Q. generally know that beavers came in the area. They came across this road right here (indicating); was Sibleyville Corners. But do you remember in terms of years when it was more noticeable, as far -- how far back? Well, gosh, I can't pinpoint the year, but --Well don't worry about that. But it was prior to 1977? Yes. A.

- Q. Now, I believe you mentioned in 1977 that Mr. Brace's father used this -- the area in the circle here for pasture land.
  - A. A lot of it, yes.

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- Q. Did he use it for any crops, do you know?
- A. He -- He did at certain times, I think, but mostly pasture land there at that time. Because these beavers, see, they would back that water up here and ruin it for plow land.

MR. DANA: What time frame are we talking

about?

MR. WARD: 1977.

- A. And before that.
- Q. And before. There's been testimony that Mr. Brace purchased property from his father.
  - A. Yeah.

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- Q. Which included this encircled area.
- A. Sure.
- Q. In 1977. Did you ever work for Mr. Brace at all on any of his farm properties?
  - A. Not this man.
  - Q. Not this man?
  - A. No.
- Q. Did you notice the activity -- Can you tell us of the activity in the surrounding area, and including this area, as to agricultural, farming, pasturing, whatever you --

MR. DANA: Objection. What area -MR. WARD: I said the general area including
the area that's encircled. You know, we can
call it a site if that's going to make you
feel comfortable.

MR. DANA: Well, no. Your question isn't clear as to what area you're asking him to respond to.

MR. WARD: I said the general countryside 7 around the area that was within the circle. And I don't know how else to express that. 3 MR. DANA: So both in and outside the circle? MR. WARD: Yes. 5 MR. DANA: I'm just trying to understand, Mr. Ward. I'm not trying to be difficult. MR. WARD: Yes, you are. 8 BY MR. WARD: 9 Within the circle and surrounding the circle, did 10 Q. you see Mr. Brace operate a farm? 11 Yes, I saw him clear that off so he could work it 12 all. 13 Q. What about the surrounding area outside the 14 circle? 15 Well --A. 16 Q. If you know where his property is. 17 Α. Yes. 18 What other kind of activity did he do? Q. 19 Cabbage and potatoes. . A. 20 Any other crops? ٠Q٠ 21 Hay. Corn, I suppose. I know he used to raise 22 potatoes and cabbage there a lot. 23 Q. All right. This up here (indicating) was grown up through 25

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fault of the beavers being back in there. This kind of grew up to brush and weeds. It has been pastured, but --

- Q. Somewhere within that circle.
- A. Yes. But he straightened the creek out and --
- Q. Now, did you see this property -- You said straighten the creek out. Within that circled area, can you tell us what you recall of how the water moved across the property?
- A. Well, when he first got there, it was all over on account of these beavers here, see?
  - Q. Yes, all right.
- A. And they took them out, and then he made it so the water all run down one area. There's a low spot through there (indicating).
- Q. But prior to that, was there any -- like a channel or creek at all, or did it --
- A. It was kind of a channel like, but it was a natural course for the water there. But he cleared -- After them beavers was taken out, then he could get in here and work that. Because when they was in there, that flooded this area, see (indicating).
- Q. What did the area look like when the beavers were taken out after --
  - A. It was brush and weeds. Grass.
  - Q. How often do you go by this area, say on a
