JUNE 17 LAKE BLUFF PLEIN AIR WITH ANTIQUE CAR AND LIVE MODELS

The Lake County Art League Plein Air Group will be participate in an unusual plein air opportunity hosted by Artists on the Bluff at their annual Lake Bluff Arts Festival on the Village Green. Their festival is the weekend of June 17 and 18. From 10:00 to 1:00 on Saturday June 17 there will be one or two experienced artist's models in period costumes posing with a 1923 Ford Model T.

The festival otherwise features local and area artist display tents and food vendors arrayed around a large gazebo platform used for musical entertainment. Hands-on activities will be included for children. The models, provided by a local figurative art group, will do long and short poses in a variety of positions in and around the car, a visual center of an energetic tableau for our artists.

The 1923 Ford Model T will be on display in conjunction with the Waukegan-North Shore Chapter of the Antique Automobile Club of America as a preview of their auto show the following weekend. The Model T will be raffled off at the auto show.

Artists from Chicago will find easy connection to the Lake Bluff Metra station just 500 feet from the event. The Chicago to Kenosha train arrives at 7:42 and 9:36, and the return train leaves at 12:21 and 2:21. Come early or stay late to enjoy the many fine Lake Bluff restaurants.

Artists on the Bluff is asking for 10% of any sales made at the event.

CLC STUDENT SHOW WINNERS SELECTED APRIL 12

On April 12 Art league members Paulette Colo and Denis Rogers judged the College of Lake County Student Art entries. Paulette says that the entries had already been narrowed down and hung as a show in the gallery so it was very easy to view the pieces. Second place is a \$200 cash prize. It went to Chuck McCann, "Winter Comes and Winter Goes," an acrylic on glass shown on the previous page. Paulette and Denis were unaware that Chuck has been an art league member since 1993, and is now 86 years old. May we all be taking classes and making award-winning art at that age.

More on April 17 request for art materials donation

At our April 17 General Meeting art league member Alice Winter asked us to donate art materials and tools we no longer need but that would help people paint where she volunteers. Alice volunteers at NorthPointe Resources, a respected provider for people with disabilities and mental illness. The organization serves Lake, Cook and McHenry counties, supporting approximately 500 people who are often housed in 17 Zion homes. Alice says that many of the people being provided for have outlived their parents. Her work is in the Art Therapy Program, which NorthPointe describes as an "integrative tool for encouraging creative ways to go beyond verbal expression."

At our meeting Alice specifically asked for acrylics and watercolor pigments as well as brushes and paper, but said that oil and easels would not work well in the program. GRAYSLAKE ART ALLIANCE OFFERS QUALITY DISPLAY VENUES

"The Grayslake Arts Alliance is a new community group that came together last summer and is dedicated to promoting the arts in the community through education, participation and development," wrote Wendy Petera, Community Contributor in an April 10 Chicago Tribune article. She was drawing attention to GAA's Saturday April 22 Fine Art Show at the Grayslake Heritage Center. At that time a total of ten artists had committed to the show, but event organizer Marie Hines was quoted as saying their goal is to have 16 artists at each show, including students from Grayslake schools. The article also noted a GAA presence at the Grayslake Farmers Market.

LCAL On-The-Wall director Chris Tanner visited both the show and the market on April 22, and found them to be active and intimate venues for GAA members to display their art in person. Both venues share a warm and friendly downtown area with modest eateries and a park. Both venues were well attended. The Grayslake Heritage Center show is essentially a 30 by 20-foot meeting room adjoined by a small food space and a staffed museum reception area. Music was provided by a professional jazz guitarist, and refreshments came from a local brewer and a local confectioner. About ten local artists, including LCAL's Phil Schorn and Jim Brooksher, were there. Chris felt more artists would have seemed crowded. The Farmer's Market is a one-block section of a barricaded street, and the 10 by 10-foot GAA tent was prominently located at the main entrance. There were no similar tents so it stood out for that reason as well. The market was open earlier in the year than others in the area and featured well-known local vendors of quality agricultural and home-cooked goods. It was very busy that sunny morning.

Professional photographer Ernie Schweit seems to be the driving force behind the GAA, and was interviewed by LCAL. He said that monthly shows at the Grayslake Heritage Center meeting room usually draw between 500 and 150 people, featuring art, a demo, music and a kids/student display. He said they recently decided to end monthly shows in May and resume them again in the Fall, probably October or November.

The GAA will have a weekly tent Saturdays in the Spring and Wednesdays in the Summer. Ernie acknowledged that "we are a new group, so our being at the market is to raise public awareness of the GAA and its mission while giving our members the added value of free exposure. ... We've worked out a nice partnerships with the people who run the market and, if we can fill at the dates with artists or other activities, we will have a presence." Art sales need to be conducted privately and offsite."

GAA is in a growing mode at the moment. Meetings are the last Sunday of the month at 11:00 am at the Heritage Center, or at a local coffee shop when there is a schedule conflict. Joining is as simple as "liking" the Grayslake Arts Alliance Facebook page. Yet for now members must live or work in the Grayslake zip code. Ernie said he understood that might seem a bit parochial "but at this stage its important that we establish a strong local base. I suspect we'll expand in the near future, but for now, we are sticking to 60030 zip code.

GAA is officially organizing as an Illinois corporation and is about to start the process of seeking charity status with the IRS. They are also developing strategic plans for business, marketing and branding. This is a lengthy process, but they believe that doing so is the right way to build a strong and lasting organization.



"I am a graduate of the Art Institute of Chicago (BFA, MAE), and have worked many years as an art therapist and art educator both in the Chicago Public Schools and in Glenview District #34. I officially retired in June of 2016, and have continued my education at CLC in a painting class with Bob Lossmann.

"I have dabbled in almost every imaginable medium, from weaving, pottery, printmaking, drawing and painting to sculpture. Combining mediums and found objects into 'constructions' are a favorite way of expressing myself while including three dimensions into my finished product. Two years ago I worked with a mosaic artist in residence to build a huge mural for the school where I taught. It was like taking a master class in mosaics; learning and creating at the same time. A year ago, I took a special weeklong museum education class for Chicago Public School teachers (I snuck in); they selected 12 teachers from across the city, and we spent one day at each museum; the Mexican Fine Arts

I am enjoying the freedom and peace that retirement brings as well as the time to work for extended periods on my projects. My husband is from Mexico, and we often travel to the 'colonial' areas to collect pottery, woodcarvings and weavings.

In a closing comment, Susie said "I think many of the 'eclectic' membership of the art league will understand how exciting retirement can be, with the freedom to explore their bucket lists of interests!
