

## CONA Update

Hello DHCA! Since this is my first article let me briefly introduce myself. My family has lived in Disston Heights since 1958, almost as long as the association has existed.

In fact, my wife Reyna and I are homeowners of the same house where my dad was raised. We have been members of DHCA since 2013 and both served on the board in 2013 and 2014. I am serving as CONA Delegate for the remainder of 2017.

Part of what I'll be doing is writing an article for "The Heights" about CONA's monthly meetings. I do not have expertise in all the issues but will do my best to be both accurate and informative.

February's CONA meeting featured guest speaker Elizabeth Abernethy, zoning official and manager of St. Pete's Development Review Services. Abernethy's department reviewed 2007 zoning changes adopted by the city as part of Vision 2020. They propose 68 changes to update and clarify the city's Land Development Regulations. Bob Jeffery from the "Traditional Neighborhood Study Group" spoke next. Overall the group is happy with the city's work on LDRs. However, there are a couple of issues they would like to bring to the attention of the neighborhoods. Jeffery provided a handout for this purpose that I will send to anyone interested.

Short updates were given by audience members on the St. Pete Pier and the "Mayor's Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Committee." There will be



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### Plants, cheap and free, and more at the Green Thumb Festival

Spring has arrived and if you are thinking about sprucing up your yard, celebrate Arbor Day weekend by checking out the Green Thumb Festival, held from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on April 22-23 at Walter Fuller Recreation Center.

Veteran attendees of this festival know to arrive early to get a close parking spot and to bring a wagon or cart to make it easier to tote back to your car all the plants you buy or get for free.

Many people look forward to

this annual event where you can get free mulch or free butterfly plants (limit of 500 plants given away each day), ask an arborist questions, enjoy some entertainment or attend environmental programs. More than 1,000 trees will be on sale for \$5 each.

One popular activity at this festival is the tool sharpening booth. Have a dull tool? Drop it off at this booth to get sharpened while you walk around and explore the various booths. Tool sharpening costs \$3 per tool. Many vendors will be there with all kinds of plants as well as yard decorations. Look for the garden railroad display. Children will have the opportunity to climb a tree or attend other programs.

There will also be representatives from various city and county departments as well as organizations with information about how to conserve water while landscaping your yard, recycling, and the environment.

If you get hungry walking around the booths, head over to the food court to quench your thirst or grab something to eat. On Saturday at noon, there will be a parade of decorated garden wagons. Decorate your wagon and enter the parade with a \$5 registration fee, if you register in advance. Registration on the day of the parade will be \$7. The best decorated wagon will earn the owner \$100. Second place wins \$75, third place wins \$50 and honorable mention earns \$25.

## CONA Update

March's CONA meeting featured two guest speakers; Officer Crawford of the St. Petersburg Police Department and former mayor and president of the Edwards Group, Rick Baker. I'll start with the latter. Baker spoke at CONA to pitch expansion of the Tampa Bay Rowdies soccer club from second tier North American Soccer League to top tier Major League Soccer. One requirement to qualify for MLS is stadium capacity of 18,000. The Rowdies home field Al Lang Stadium seats approximately 7,000. In order to privately fund

redevelopment of the stadium to accommodate the additional seats, the Edwards Group needs to secure a 25-year lease on the property. The lease extension will be decided by St. Pete voters in a May 2 special election referendum. Much has been written on this issue over the past month in local media. APAD participants must meet program criteria to qualify and are required to complete community service hours instead of jail time. 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
As we approach summer break (no meetings will be held in July and August), I encourage you to stay involved in your community ... in our community of Disston Heights.

## CONA UPDATE

April's CONA meeting featured two guest speakers; John Norris from the city's Stormwater, Pavement and Traffic Operations (SPTO) Department and Sharon Wright from the city's Office of Sustainability (OS).

Norris gave an overview of the department and staff. They are essentially a maintenance department that is complaint driven. Their webpage states they "maintain ... the city's drainage, sidewalks, roadways and traffic signal systems." They also work on alleys, sign replacement, bridges, seawalls, mowing, hand ditch digging and more.

Norris says SPTO is the department that gets things done in St. Pete. They recently completed improvements at Sirmons Lake here in Disston Heights. Norris reminded the audience to help keep our inland and coastal waters clean by not blowing leaves and lawn debris

into the street. This adds nutrients and pollutes our waterways. It's also against city ordinance and can result in a \$500 fine.

Wright spoke about St. Petersburg's participation in the STAR Communities system.

STAR stands for Sustainability Tools for Assessing and Rating Communities. According to the OS website, STAR is "the nation's first framework and rating system for evaluating community sustain-ability."

This data-driven approach assesses a city's commitment to sustainability by looking at "economic, social and environmental goals and measures."

St. Pete received three out of a possible five stars, scoring high marks for education, arts and

community.

However, the city received low scores for equity and empowerment, which includes civic engagement and civil and human rights. For more information please visit http://www.stpete.org/ sustainability/.

Lisa Frank from the Florida Consumer Action Network spoke briefly about the "Complete Streets for St. Pete" program. You can find information about making our streets safer for pedestrians and bicyclists at http://www.fcan.org/ Complete%20Streets/.

## Summer Adventure: Check out a Little Free Library

Summer is the time for adventure. Add literary adventures to your summer things-to-do list. We have several Little Free Libraries in our neighborhood. What is a Little Free Library? It is a library planted by a neighbor in the front yard to share books with the neighborhood.


The philosophy is take a book, leave a book. If you have a book that you are done reading, drop it off at one of these neighborhood libraries and pick up something new to read. These libraries have no overdue fines and no due dates. You never know what books you will find waiting for you.

Some libraries have guest books. Feel free to leave a note for your Little Free Library steward, the neighbor who planted the library. Remember if you find a #StPeteRocks in one of these libraries, don't forget to post that on social media. Some people like to post pictures of Little Free Libraries to Instagram or Pinterest.

If your kids get bored this summer, take them for a walk or a bike ride to one of the Little Free Libraries. It can be fun to see the different designs of these libraries. Along the way, perhaps you'll pass one of the lakes in our neighborhood and get a chance to observe the many birds residing there. It's an opportunity for some fun exercise and the bonus is finding a new book to read.

Headed up to Philippe Park in Safety Harbor for a picnic or a day at the beach at Honeymoon Island State Park? Look for libraries along the way or at the parks. Both Honeymoon Island State Park and Phillippe Park have a Little Free Library. Safety Harbor has libraries at many city parks. Dunedin also has several libraries outside the buildings of several city departments.

Want to know where to find a library? Check out the map at https://littlefreelibrary.org/ourmap/ (or see above).



Online, you can search by ZIP code or "near me" or by city. Keep in mind that the "near me" or ZIP code searches are better. In some cases, if there is a city like St. Petersburg, it might be in the database as Saint Petersburg, St. Petersburg or St Petersburg. That's three different searches.

Headed out of town, perhaps out of state on a family road trip? Bookmark the website for the map and look for a Little Free Library along the way or once you arrive at your destination. Books can be a good way to pass the time for the passengers in the car.

Sometimes you'll find books on CD at these libraries. Finished reading the book? Find another Little Free Library along the way to drop off the book and pick up a new one. Leave a note in a guest book, letting the steward know they had a visitor from warm, sunny Florida!



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## CONA Update

May's CONA meeting featured several guest speakers. Chief Anthony Holloway of the St. Petersburg Police Department (SPPD) talked mostly about auto burglaries. This issue was the subject of an April 26 series in the *Tampa Bay Times*.

Holloway said there had been 17 cars stolen since the *Times* series. Thirteen stolen cars had the keys left inside the car and two were left running. Locking car doors reduces auto burglaries. These are usually crimes of opportunity. Most thieves will not break windows but move on in search of an unlocked car. Home burglaries are down for the year.

Eliana Aguilar from the

Florida Dept. of Health discussed the Community Resource Bus.

The CRB is sponsored by SPPD and rotates between the three police districts in the city. The bus provides free health screenings, safety information, giveaways and activities. For more information contact *Eliana.Aguilar@ flhealth.gov*.

Mayor Rick Kriseman provided several updates. The pier is on budget and will be built.

Foundational work begins soon. New police station is on budget. The city has spent \$51 million on repairing the sewage system which includes manhole upgrades. Kriseman cannot promise there will be no more sewage dumps but they are doing everything within their power to make the necessary fixes.

No news on the Tampa Bay Rays stadium search, but there will be no millage rate increase to fund a new stadium. The mayor will recommend that City Council approves spending 78 percent of Penny for Pinellas funds on infrastructure. St. Pete stands to lose \$5 million annually if the property tax exemption is approved in 2018.

If this money is lost, millage rates will have to increase or city services will be cut. The city hosts Fiscal Year 2018 Budget Open House on June 19, 6 p.m. at the Palladium. More information at www.

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# St. Petersburg voters asked to approve Vinoy improvement project in November referendum

Voters will be asked to sign off on adding a privately funded one-story parking garage behind the hotel

The historic Vinoy Renaissance Resort and Golf Club is seeking St. Petersburg voters' approval in November for a privately funded one-story parking garage, part of a larger multi-year \$50-million-plus redevelopment project at the hotel. The improvements do not involve taxpayer funding, will not alter the hotel's footprint or St. Petersburg's waterfront parks system, and will add approximately 270 new parking spaces.

The parking garage is needed to better accommodate people who stay at the Vinoy and attend the many events there, in turn minimizing the need for people to park in surrounding areas like Beach Drive and the Historic Old Northeast neighborhood.

The proposed garage will be one-story and located immediately behind the hotel. Eight existing tennis courts will be replaced on top of the new parking garage.

Voters are asked to vote yes on the referendum question in the Nov. 7 election. As a historic part of downtown St. Petersburg, approximately 2.4 acres of The Vinoy property are subject to deed restrictions and re-

quire approval from the City's residents for construction.

The voter approval process was put in place during a 1984 agreement when The Vinoy helped complete the city's waterfront park system by trading its waterfront property for some of the area immediately behind the hotel. Voters approved similar improvements to The Vinoy in referendums in 1997 and 2007.

"We think voters will be pleased to support the idea of additional parking at The Vinoy, because it does not involve taxpayer dollars, does not alter the footprint of the hotel, and does not impact our waterfront parks system," said Barbara Readey, General Manager at The Vinoy Renaissance Resort and Golf Club.

The entire redevelopment project is privately funded by the hotel owner,

FelCor Lodging Trust. The project includes updates and expansions to the spa, fitness center, golf course clubhouse, tennis courts, public restaurant facilities and parking garage. Paul's Landing, the new 200seat marina-front restaurant, will be open to the public and includes indoor and outdoor seating as well as a large grass event space.

The Vinoy referendum has received positive reception across the city from residents and businesses. As an example, WFLA News Channel 8 spoke to Chuck Prather, owner of The Birchwood on Beach Drive.

"There is so much volume of traffic that happens here, not just on the weekends anymore, but all week long," Prather said. "To have an extra almost 300 parking spaces right in
