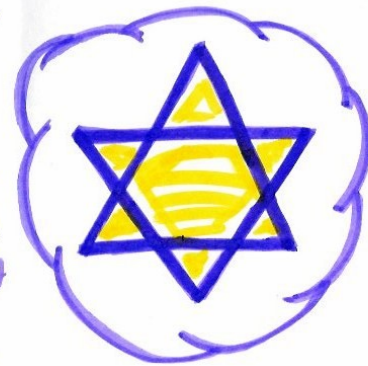
Dear Ms. Hauser,
