

Today's Gospel begins with the final verse from last Sunday's Gospel. Jesus has identified his own flesh with "the living bread that came down from heaven" and says that only those who eat this bread will live forever.

It is a dramatic and shocking statement. Today we hear the crowd's response to it. As long as Jesus described himself as "bread of life," it was possible for the crowd to hear his teaching. Now that he starts to talk of himself as "flesh" that people must eat, the crowd reacts with shock and horror.

Jesus' response is to offer a solemn teaching beginning with "I tell you solemnly," which always signals an important statement to follow. Jesus' language becomes even more explicit. Not only does he talk of someone eating his flesh but now he adds the idea of someone drinking his blood. Both are required for eternal life. The language is difficult but it is obvious to the Christian reader that Jesus is talking about the Eucharist. It is by taking part in the Eucharist that Jesus' followers will receive his gift of life.

Notice that now Jesus no longer talks about himself in the third person, using the title "Son of Man." Instead, he speaks directly in the first person, using the pronoun "I." Jesus will raise on the last day all those who eat his flesh and drink his blood.

In the final verse, Jesus concludes his teaching on the bread of life. His emphatic message - his promise - is that whoever eats the bread from heaven that he offers will have eternal life.

#### REFLECT

esus ends his sermon on the Bread of Life with a mighty promise: "Whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world."

When we receive Holy Communion, we receive the Body and Blood of Jesus, our Saviour. "Body and Blood" is but an expression that means the person. But the "body" we receive is a body broken for us on the cross; the "blood" we receive is the blood, the life of Christ, poured out for us.

When we receive the Body and Blood of Christ we are saying that we want to be the body of Christ in the world today. Like Jesus, we want to give ourselves for others wherever a brother or a sister of Christ is in need. What's the use of recognising Christ in the bread and wine if we cannot recognise him in those around us?

When the priest raises the host and recalls the words of Jesus, "This is my body which will be given up for you," Jesus is also saying to his Father, "In these people gathered here today is my other body ready to give themselves for others."

That is our challenge and our privilege.

### PRAY

We can take the gift of the Eucharist for granted. Thank God for your parish community and for the opportunity you have to celebrate the Eucharist together.

Pray to be able to see the face of Christ in all those you meet this week and every week.

### LEARN

The Eucharist is our food for eternal life

In the Eucharist, the bread and wine are really changed into the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ

True wisdom is knowing that Jesus is the Bread of Life, the one who shows us the way to salvation

#### DO

Think about your reasons for going to Mass. Why do you go, really? Ask the Lord to deepen your faith.

#### SAY

Lord, I thank you for the privilege of being able to receive you in Holy Communion."
