What's the coolest, hippest and most unique thing for the home today that people "must" have? The Metro Sac by Jaxx Sacs bean bags. It's more than a bean bag, it's a destination within my living room. This piece is super comfortable and it is filled with micro-foam, so it doesn't sink in like a typical bean bag and it's very functional.

What is "out" for homes now and what are people doing instead? Primer is out! Gone are the days of having to prime walls before painting over a dark paint color with a lighter color. Paint and primer all-inone is the new "in" for painting. I personally love Behr Paint and primer in one.

Grays and blues are paint "must haves," in addition to paints that are tinted with a touch of your favorite colors. These paints make your room perk up without being boring or bland because they incorporate color in a gentle complementary fashion.

What is a practical home "must have" that most folks wouldn't think of? Most people totally overlook area rugs. Many people associate an area rug with an expensive investment. Area rugs are very affordable; you can get a 5-foot-by-8-foot area rug on any budget in almost any style. Area rugs can warm a space and unify areas while still maintaining separation between areas within the same room.

What would you buy for your home if price were no object? I would install concrete countertops in my kitchen and baths. Concrete is versatile and it can be molded into different shapes, providing for unique designs. With concrete countertops, undermount sinks are a thing of the past. "What's the coolest, hippest and most unique thing for the home today that people "must" have? The coolest thing to have in any home is pattern on the walls — either with wallpaper or backed fabric. Oftentimes, people are kind of scared of bold prints, mostly for commitment reasons. The trick is to vary how it's used throughout the home; one room can be fully wallpapered, while others may simply sport a single boldly patterned throw pillow or graphic club chair.

What is "out" for homes now and what are people doing instead? That chocolate-brown-and-light-blue thing has been done to death. While it's classic and clean – enough already! Coral is going to start showing up everywhere next. It's genderneutral, depending on what you pair it with. I did a vanity area pairing a coral-painted sink cabinet with brown-bronze geometric wallpaper. It actually looked rather masculine. Sticking coral with powder blue and white can evoke a more feminine feeling.

What is a practical home "must have" that most folks wouldn't think of? There are two practical must-haves I like to
