The Rector Writes

Dear Friends

As we enter a new month, one of the features of the month of February is the beginning of the season of Lent. Lent starts on Wednesday 14th February. We have a simple Communion service in church at 10.30am and a Communion service at 7.00pm in St Mary's to which you are all invited. Lent is a season in which Christians try to draw nearer to God, sometimes by engaging in different practices. Often people use this 40-day period as a time of resetting or trying to engage in disciplines like Bible reading, silence, prayer and fasting. Both in the secular and spiritual world, people use the opportunity to maybe give up some treats, perhaps to embark on a programme of exercise or pursuing a healthier diet.

Like any season of the year, we can sometimes make the mistake of trying to do too much. We try to make huge changes all at once and if circumstances go against us and we fail to complete our targets we can be consumed with guilt and shame.

The church does not want to add to the weight of those burdens so this year I would encourage you to use the period of Lent to look and reflect on your lives with the following question.

How do you go about making difficult decisions?

You know the sort: those situations where there isn't an obvious solution, or where none of the available options is without some cost or upset for someone. Perhaps most difficult of all are those occasions when, if we're honest, we know the right decision from the start but just don't like it!

Making good, Godly decisions is one of the biggest challenges in my role. But I find there are three things that help me to do it better:

- 1) Don't make big decisions in a hurry. The value of pausing, reflecting and praying is often underestimated but it can reveal the sort of creative solutions we would otherwise have missed.
- 2) Talk to others. I've lost count of the times I've worried about something for days (or longer) but found the weight lifted once shared with one or more others. There still may not be an easy answer but at least the question doesn't weigh so heavily when you can say 'we 'not 'I'.
- 3) Take some expert advice. We all have our own gifts and skills but we're none of us experts in everything. It takes some magnanimity to admit that. But reading about people who've done it before, or involving those who know what they're talking about, can avoid countless pitfalls.

The Christian tradition has a lot to say about this sort of decision-making. In spiritual language, we call it 'discernment'- that thoughtful, prayerful, patient process of really listening to God and others to discover the right path. It certainly doesn't always lead us straight to a 'correct' answer but can give us confidence we 're on the right track, even if it's a surprising one.

As the PCC continues to discern how best to manage and steward our resources for the future, we're going through exactly this sort of process. The decisions are far from easy but as we continue to pray, talk and research, we're trusting that solutions will emerge which are more fruitful than any of us might have come up with on our own.

Last night our wifi stopped working, so I had to spend a few hours with my family. They seem like nice people.

SEVERN VALLEY COUNTRY PARK

We have suffered a bit of damage as a result of the recent high river levels. A wooden footbridge has been washed away. The bridge is located on the Alveley side of the river at the pedestrian exit to the park between Hall Close Coppice and Little London Coppice. The path is part of the public Right of Way network and the Rights of Way team have been informed. A replacement bridge is being organised. We do apologise for any inconvenience this may cause and thank you for your understanding.

In February the visitor centre and café opening days will be increasing. From Friday 9th February to Sunday 18th February, they will be open daily for half term. The following week (w/c 19th February), they will return to opening Wednesday to Sunday for the season. Weekday opening hours will be 11am-3pm, Saturday 9.30am-3.30pm and Sunday 10.30am-3.30pm.

Parkrun continues each Saturday. The run starts at 9am. It's free to join. If it is your first parkrun, you need to register online. You only need to register once regardless of how many different venues you visit or whether you intend to run, jog, walk or volunteer. Visit www.parkrun.org.uk for more details.

Our Nordic Walking sessions continue on Wednesdays. The group meets outside the visitor centre before 10am and the sessions usually end with a coffee and a piece of cake baked by one of the group. There's always something to celebrate. It costs £3.50 or £4 per session depending on if we provide Nordic Walking poles. The sessions are run by qualified instructor Sally Orton and her team of volunteers, Jo, Jackie and Mike.

During half term we have a ranger led activity for the children on Tuesday 13th February, 11am – 12.30pm. Join us to make a bird feeder; find out what tasty treats native birds enjoy to eat; explore our wetlands and bird hides; see if you can recognise native birds from their bird song. It's £4 per child (accompanying adults free). Call 01746 781 192 to book and pay for your place for the Severn Valley Bird Bonanza.

Wild Toddlers returns on Wednesday 21st February. We're in the process of finalising the themes for each session. Join us to discover, play, connect and learn. Your little ones will get hands-on with the outdoors or get crafty indoors (depending on the weather). It's £5 per session and the price includes toast and squash. Please call 01746 781 192 to book and pay for your place in advance. Suitable for ages 18 months-4 years (toddling toddlers). Younger siblings are very welcome (no charge for under 18 months). ALVELEY STROLLERS AND STRIDERS WALKING GROUP

The last time I was in the Londis shop I picked up a copy of the "parkrun" magazine. They were on the counter, were free, and as an ex-runner (most definitely ex I'm afraid) I thought it might be interesting to have a look through. I was surprised at what an excellent little magazine it is with some very good articles, most of which are about running of course, but then I thought some could equally apply to walking.

One article is entitled "better together" which tells us how one GP, a Dr Simon Tobin, has become increasingly aware of the link between social isolation and mental health conditions such as dementia, stress, anxiety, low mood and depression. There is also a wealth of medical evidence of an increased risk of heart disease. The article admits that taking that first step into a new social situation can be difficult, but being outdoors can make it easier.

Natalie McCandless, a psychotherapist, says that when we engage in a physical activity such as walking or running it releases chemicals (endorphins) into the body which make us feel happier and more likely to engage with other people, including strangers.

Our walking group is a very welcoming group of people. All the walks are led by caring walk leaders who will make sure everyone is walking safely, on public rights of way, and at an appropriate pace for the group. There's no pressure to talk to anyone, but conversations just start up naturally as we walk. Our Tuesday morning walk can definitely leave us feeling as though we've had a session of therapy, and it doesn't cost a penny!

Do feel welcome to join us at any time throughout the year. We meet for a 10.00am start every Tuesday morning in The Three Horse Shoes car park (arriving a little earlier to register). For more information you can ring Bill Smith on 01746 780841 or Norma and myself on 01746 780478.

THE BUTTER CROSS - PART TWO

The butter cross is obviously very old and very worn, but the markings on it appear to be a cross with equal length arms and flared ends contained within two circles. This is remarkably similar to the symbol used by the Knights Templar and their supporters. The Knights Templar were an order of warrior monks originally formed to protect pilgrims on their way to Jerusalem where they were frequently robbed and murdered by bandits. They were formed in 1118AD and eventually became a well trained and highly disciplined force that took part in the crusades, built castles and fought many battles in the Holy Land. They also established the first international banking system. They existed on donations from kings down to commoners and became very wealthy. They were eventually disbanded by the Pope who wrongly accused them of heresy and King Philip the Fair of France, who owed them a great deal of money. Many were horribly tortured and then burnt at the stake. But some, particularly in the UK, escaped and disappeared which has given rise to endless conspiracy theories regarding buried treasure, the holy grail, the ark of the covenant and the blood line of Jesus and Mary Magdalene.

So is there evidence of the Knights Templar around Alveley? Claverley church is associated with them, probably because of its wall murals depicting knights on horseback engaged in warfare. Enville church apparently has eight templar graves, three of which are easily found just inside the entrance from the car park. And then I found a closer connection.

William Marshall (1146-1219) is described as England's greatest knight. His tomb and effigy are in the Temple Church just off Fleet Street in London. He was the only knight to ever unhorse King Richard the Lionheart and was advisor and mentor to no less than four kings. (Henry 11, Richard 1, John and Henry 111). He is believed to be the architect of the Magna Carta, the document issued in 1215 that said the King and his government were not above the law. William was related by marriage to Roger de Morfe, son of Henry de Morfe. Their family seat is near Enville and there may have been a Templar preceptory - a sort of local headquarters - nearby. Roger's known Templar grave is at Enville Church. He was related to a William de Harcourt who was lost on a crusade in 1223 and to his cousin John de Harcourt who died in 1219 in Egypt when the crusaders captured Damietta. William's wife was Alice de Harcourt, the daughter of Margaret l'Estrange. Her brother was Ralph l'Estrange and his father or possibly brother (I wish people wouldn't name sons after their fathers!) was Guy l'Estrange, the founder of Alveley Church. His grave is the stone sarcophagus immediately to the right of the main door. In 1172 Guy sent 400 hogs and 60 axes to help with Henry 11's invasion of Ireland led by the templars. William I'Estrange, a cousin of Guy's, became the first incumbent of St Mary's in 1223 and another relation, a Hamo l'Estrange, died on crusade in 1270.

Then we find another connection: Henry de Morfe, mentioned above, sold part of the huge Morfe forest to the Knights Templar. The forest stretched from the River

Severn in the west to the river Worfe in the north across to Abbots Castle Hill in the east and, intriguingly, to King's Nordley in the south. On O.S. maps there is a lane and bridle way that leads from King's Nordley right past the butter cross through Moor farm down to the river. So does the butter cross mark the boundary of the Knights Templar property or the way to it? Or am I making the facts fit the story? And then I found some more possible connections. Next month eh! THE HISTORY OF ALVELEY RECREATION GROUND

It is thought the idea of the recreation ground was suggested by Mr Leslie Pitt. He noted over the years how the football and cricket pitches were never situated at one site for very long. His vision was to see an area where various sports could be played and belong to the people of the village.

Minutes show the first meeting was held 15th April 1944. The chairman, Mr Howard Thompson reported negotiations had taken place with the owners, Mr and Mrs Sylvester, of Church Farm and the 6 acres could be purchased for £100 per acre. The deeds verify this.

22nd April 1944, 3 trustees were appointed, Mr Howard Thompson, Mr Simpson Williamson and Mr Leslie Pitt (these 3 families contributed at least £350 towards the purchase of the land). Colonel Marsh was also involved at this time and the founder group also included local residents, D Link, T Childs, C Knowles, R Bache, J Harris, J Honeybourne, S Humphries, A Milson, S Tomkins, S Surrell, A Bint and J V Morgans.

Their aim was to promote and assist amateur sports in the parish, through the formation of a sports club. A letter was drafted and appeals for funds commenced, a dance arranged for the Whit Monday at the village hall, 2/6 admission fee, many more of these and fetes were organised in the future. It is documented on 13th October 1944 a house to house collection was to commence to help raise funds. We have one of the small note books with names of local people and how much they donated. On 19th December 1944 the deeds were signed and the official opening was the first football match played on 10th May 1947. A team brought to the village by Joe Knowles from West Bromwich Albion met Bridgnorth and surrounding village players. In 1948 the Amateur Athletic Association was formed, 1949 the cricket pitch was laid and 1951 saw fencing erected around the area for tennis courts. Colonel Marsh paid for the first changing facility, an ex-army unit, in 1951. In June 1956 the sports club was disbanded, the committee was to be a management committee on behalf of the village people and the sporting clubs were to sort own events and maintenance. All sporting clubs have had financial difficulty at times and the recreation committee has helped where they can. There has been progress over the years with replacements to the changing facility on several occasions. There have been numerous local people holding the caretaker and groundsman positions. Many fund raising events have been held over the years, some of us will remember the carnivals, fun days, half marathons and donkey derbys just to name a few. The minutes show how much work and time previous committee members and Trustees gave to the recreation ground to maintain and improve the environment.

There was devastation when the pavilion was destroyed by fire in December 1977. The committee worked very hard to raise funds and Mr Ray Twyford launched the President's fund, local people donated funds, this followed a difficult time after

money had gone missing. The new pavilion was opened 25th September 1982. We now have a wall cabinet in the pavilion to display and share the history with everyone.

RECENT YEARS AND THE FUTURE

Grants have been obtained over the years to help support projects. The Parish Council recognise this is a green area belonging to the village and have generously given regular grants, they also maintain the children's play area. The last few years they have paid for the general maintenance of the grass area on the recreation ground. The sporting clubs pay an annual fee for use of the recreation ground and changing rooms. The pavilion is rented out to help maintain it. We are fortunate that keep fit and pilates groups use it on a regular basis. W.I and the parish council use the room for meetings.

Prior to covid the present committee did several big fund raising events including a scarecrow fun day and donkey derbys. In 2017 we celebrated the 70th anniversary since the first football match was played on the recreation ground. Local footballers played a team brought from Wolves All-Stars. The Queens Platinum Jubilee and King Charles III Coronation were celebrated with a picnic on the recreation ground.

Again we say the residents of Alveley are in a privileged position to own the fantastic facility and the people living in this community need to maintain it for future generations. To maintain health and safety we ask that dogs must not go on the ground and there be no bike riding.

In the pavilion there is a board with wooden bricks on it. It is £10 a brick to have your name put on it, this helps with fund raising.
