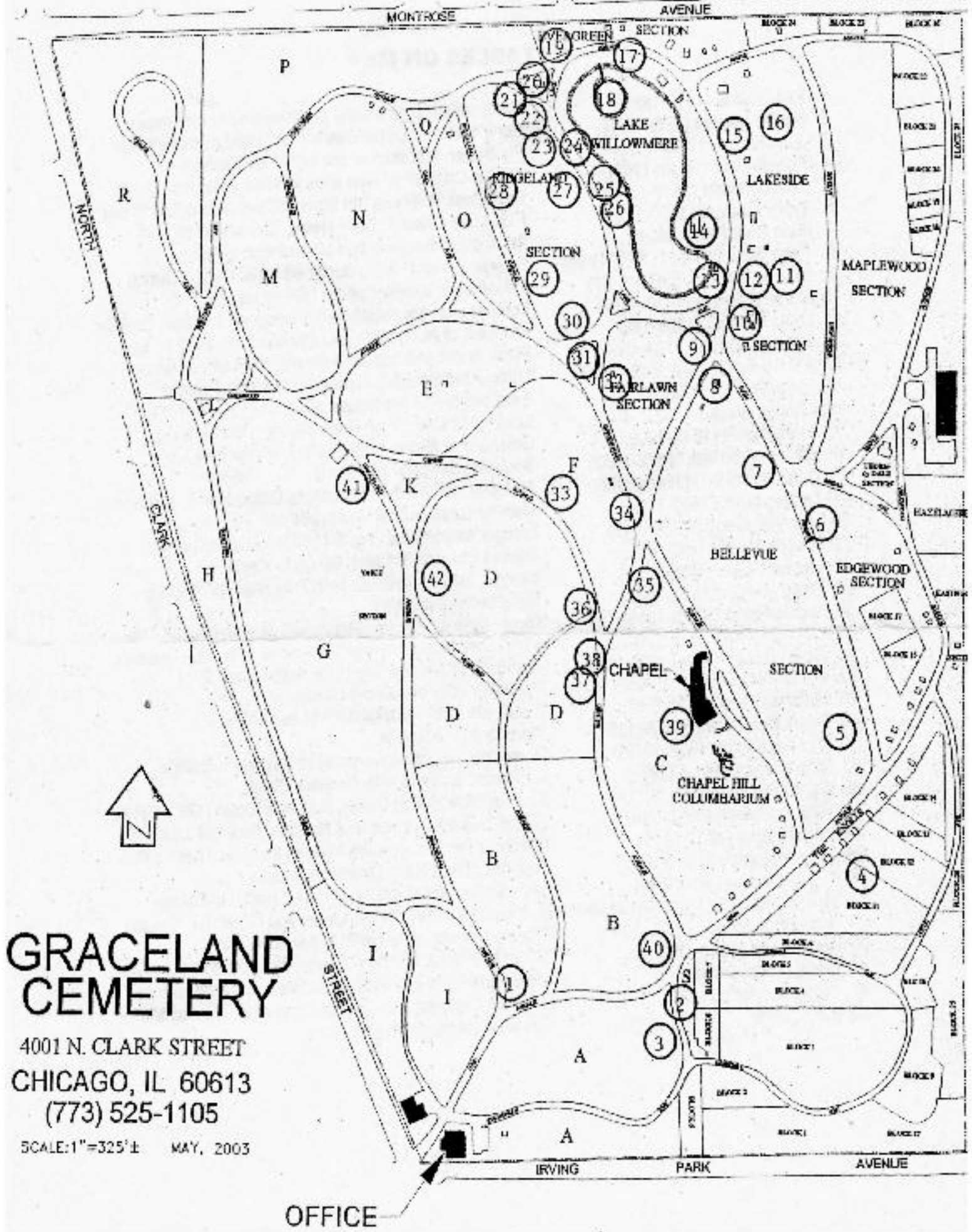


NOTABLES ON MAP

| 1. Eli Williams (1799-1881) | Early settler, built a hotel and invested in real estate |
| 2. Dexter Graves (1789-1844) | Early settler; "Eternal Silence" sculpted by Lorado Taft |
| 3. John Kinzie (1763-1828) | Fur trader, first permanent settler in Chicago |
| 4. Robert Fitzsimmons (1862-1917) | Boxing Champion, won titles in three divisions |
| 5. Jack Johnson (1878-1946) | First black Heavyweight Boxing Champion of the World |
| 6. Victor Lawson (1850-1925) | Published Chicago Daily News, "Crusader" by Taft |
| 7. John Root (1850-1891) | Architect of Rookery and Monadnock buildings, etc. |
| 8. Peter Schoenhofen (1827-1893) | Brewer; pyramid tomb designed by Richard Schmidt |
| 9. George Pullman (1831-1897) | Industrialist, inventor of the railway sleeping car |
| 10. Martin Ryerson (1818-1887) | Lumber and real estate; tomb designed by Louis Sullivan |
| 11. Louis Sullivan (1856-1924) | Architect of Auditorium and Carson Pirie Scott buildings |
| 12. William Kimball (1828-1904) | Piano and organ business, home on Prairie Avenue |
| 13. William Goodman (1848-1936) | Lumber industrialist, founded Goodman Theater |
| 14. Potter Palmer (1826-1902) | Real estate-Palmer House, sold his store to M. Field |
| 15. Charles Wacker (1856-1929) | Chair of Chicago Plan Commission; Burnham Plan |
| 16. John Altgeld (1847-1902) | Governor of Illinois (1893-1897), lawyer and judge |
| 17. Edith McCormick (1872-1932) | Socialite; daughter of John D. Rockefeller |
| 18. Daniel Burnham (1846-1912) | Architect, 1909 Plan of Chicago; Columbian Exposition |
| 19. Ludwig Wolff (1836-1911) | Manufactured copper and brass supplies |
| 20. Henry H. Getty (1837-1920) | Lumber industrialist, Tomb (1890) by Louis Sullivan |
| 21. Joseph Medill (1823-1899) | Owned Chicago Tribune, Chicago Mayor |
| 22. Lambert Tree (1832-1910) | Lawyer, judge, diplomat; built Tree Studios building |
| 23. Philip Agmour (1832-1901) | Meat packing industry |
| 24. Lucius Fisher (1843-1916) | Real estate developer, Fisher Building on Dearborn St. |
| 25. John Glessner (1843-1936) | VP of International Harvester; Glessner House museum |
| 26. Mies van der Rohe (1886-1969) | Architect, chaired architecture department at IIT |
| 27. Cyrus McCormick Jr. (1859-1936) | President of International Harvester |
| 28. Marshall Field (1835-1906) | Retail merchant; Marshall Field and Company |
| 29. Cyrus McCormick (1809-1884) | Inventor of the reaper |
| 30. Richard Nickel (1928-1972) | Photographer, preservationist of Sullivan buildings |
| 31. John Kranz (1841-1919) | Candymaker, store was on State Street |
| 32. Melville Huller (1833-1910) | Chief Justice United States Supreme Court (1888-1910) |
| 33. William Hulbert (1832-1882) | Founder Chicago Cubs and National Baseball League |
| 34. William Hoyt (1837-1925) | Grocer, 4 family members killed in Iroquois Theatre Fire |
| 35. Allan Pinkerton (1819-1884) | Founder of Pinkerton Detective Agency |
| 36. Henry Clarke (1801-1849) | Early settler; home (1836) is oldest house in Chicago |
| 37. Howard Van Doren Shaw (1868-1926) | Architect, North Shore homes and Goodman Theater |
| 38. John McCutcheon (1870-1949) | Tribune Cartoonist; created "Injun Summer" |
| 39. John Jones (1816-1879) | Tailor; first black to hold elective office in Cook County |
| 40. Outdoor Mausoleum | Three structures containing cremains; columbarium |
| 41. Carter Harrison (1825-1893) | Mayor of Chicago; son (buried here) also Chicago Mayor |
| 42. Inez Clarke | Statue of young girl in glass case |
