## **BOARD NOTICES**

We welcome Sean Raymond as our full-time



ad as our full-time assistant to the maintenance staff. Sean started work on April 14 and we are grateful for the talent he brings to the maintenance team.

The engineers continue surveying the conditions

of our water and sewer infrastructure. They will be sending cameras down all the sewer lines in the east side of the community in the next few weeks to determine their condition as the oldest and most troublesome of all. The septic system on Country Way continues to operate well. We may not have to replace it for a year or two. Between now and then we expect to apply for some grant money to help defray the cost of replacing these four fields and the pump station.

We are planning a community volunteer spring clean-up for April 26 starting at 9 AM and ending around 12:30 for pizza and beverages--and yes, there will be beer and wine as a reward for your hard work! We will be working mainly around the clubhouse at Donald Drive along with some of the common areas, removing brush, raking leaves and spreading bark mulch. There will be a rain date of the following Saturday. Cross your fingers for warm, sunny weather.

Yard waste pick-up has started. Just a reminder to keep leaves and lawn clippings separate from branches, twigs etc. We use some of the lawn clippings and leaves for composting and creating loam for general use.

Loam and dark brown bark mulch will continue to be delivered to homes as requested. The loam is \$20/yd and dark brown much is \$40/yd delivered to the designated spot on your lot. You may order and pay at the office and delivery is usually within 24 hrs.

Now that warmer weather is here, please check under your home for leaks. Leaks happen without you being aware until you investigate by looking under your home with a high-power flashlight. Undetected leaks can cause serious damage to the insulation under your home as well as breed dangerous mold. If you have mobility issues and need assistance, please fill out a work order and when we are in your area, we can check for you. I think I can safely say that undetected leaks are adding \$60,000 to \$75,000 a year to our water bill. Please be responsible and help us alleviate costly water loss under the home as we continue our search for leaks underground and repair them.

Speeding in our community continues to be a problem. Our community speed limit is 15 mph and although **Our speed limit is 15 mph.** Although that may seem too slow for you, it is for the safety of all who walk in our community. As we age, we all know our reflexes are not what they used to be so please, be thoughtful and keep your speed to 15 mph for the safety of us all. When we get numerous complaints about a particular area, we will be putting in temporary speed bumps. We all hate them so let them be a reminder that they could become permanent. To those dog owners who use bags to pick up their dogs' poop, thank you. However, our Maintenance Team will not be picking up the small, multiple bags any longer and if they find these bags in your trash can, you run the risk of not having your trash picked up. It's very important that those small, individual bags be put together into a larger bag, such as those from a grocery store, and sealed before going into the trash. Please make sure these bags are not over-filled and that they are tied or otherwise sealed. We appreciate your attention to this matter. And do not leave poop bags by the side of the road for the Maintenance Team to pick up. Take them home and dispose of them yourself.

Thank you to all who do their best to keep Medvil the envy of all home cooperatives in NH and across the country. You make it happen. Until next month, hoping for pleasant weather this spring season and for a not too hot summer season to follow.

### **RULE REMINDER OF THE MONTH**

Spring has arrived and along with the good weather (and the pollen) comes lawn care so it seems to be good time to remind folks of our rules that pertain to the care of our lots.

D. SITES

3) The maintenance, appearance and cleanup of lot yards are the homeowner's responsibility.

a) Yards are to be kept neat and free of debris and yard tools.

b) Lawns must be kept trimmed and mowed, not allowing the grass to get any higher than 6 inches.

c) If your lot is neglected, the Cooperative reserves the right to have the lot maintained at the homeowner's expense.

d) Sheds are allowed for the purpose of keeping yards, driveways, and carports free of any materials not associated with lawn care or snow removal, such as lawn mower and snow blower. All other materials, debris and off-season yard maintenance equipment are to be kept in your shed.

e) Lawn furniture may be stored in the back of the home covered with tarps. Tarps used for this purpose will be green or brown so as not to present an eye sore to your neighbors.

f) Grass clippings and leaves must be placed in

biodegradable bags for pick up by cooperative personnel. Large branches must be placed in a pile at the edge of the road. Shrub trimmings and small branches must be placed in a separate bag with top left open. It is not permissible to dump your yard waste on Medvil grounds. The Goffstown Transfer Station requires that yard waste be separated as noted above.

9) Homeowners must not plant, relocate, cut, trim, or remove trees on their lots without prior approval of the Board of Directors. No materials such as rocks, bark, soil, etc. shall be placed within 12 inches of the trunk of any trees on lots, as this will cause trees to die prematurely.

10) Irrigation (sprinkler) systems must be properly designed and approved by the Board of Directors prior to installation. A copy of the approved design plan will be placed in the homeowner's file.

11) Watering Utilization. Be aware of when and how much you water your lawns. Watering should take place every other day (use your house number and water on the odd or even days accordingly) and is to be limited to twenty minutes (20") per zone. The best time to water is early morning (not during the heat of the day) and not at night because the lawn stays wet for a longer period of time which can promote the growth of moss and affect the health of your grass. Sprinklers must be turned off during rainy or windy weather conditions.

Lawn watering is also subject to the restrictions of the Grasmere Water District:

Water Use

a) Lawn watering is prohibited between the hours of 5:00-8:00AM and 5:00-8:00PM.

b) Watering restrictions apply between May 1 and October 1.

c) Odd numbered homes will water on odd numbered days; even numbered homes water on even numbered days. This ensures that only half of the homes in Medvil are using water during the designated watering times.
d) Homes with automatic sprinkler systems will operate between 3:00 and 4:00AM every other day as outlined above and no more than twenty minutes (20") per each zone.

e) Homes with manual sprinkler systems will water each zone for no more than twenty minutes (20") every other day as outlined above.

f) New automatic sprinkler systems should install operating rain sensors set to detect one quarter inch  $(\frac{1}{4})$  of rain.

g) Homeowners are responsible for repairs/replacements of any sprinkler heads/piping to a system that does not maintain a one-foot (1') setback from the road.

### TASTY TIDBITS

Can you believe it's already May—where do the months go? Asparagus has been abundant in the markets, so how about some tasty recipes that feature veggies, seafood, and a bit of pork this month, with a lovely rice side dish to round out the menu. Buon appetito!

#### Quick Shrimp and Asparagus Stir-Fry

(Makes 2-4 servings)

#### Ingredients:

 pound peeled and deveined frozen shrimp (16-20 count)
 Salt
 Canola or grapeseed oil
 sweet onion, diced
 garlic cloves, thinly sliced
 small red, hot chili, thinly sliced
 (seeds removed for milder heat)
 bunch asparagus, trimmed and cut at a sharp angle into 2" pieces
 Tbs. soy sauce
 tsp. granulated sugar
 1/2 Tbs. butter

#### Directions:

• Rinse the shrimp in a colander under cold running water until no longer rock-hard (3-4 minutes). Sprinkle very generously with salt and toss in the colander. Let stand for about 1 minute, then rinse well. Pat dry with paper towels.

• Heat a wok or large skillet over high heat. Add enough oil to coat the bottom generously. Add the onion, garlic and chili. Sprinkle with salt and cook, stirring, until the onion starts to turn translucent, 1 to 2 minutes.

• Add the shrimp and cook, stirring, until curled more tightly, 1 to 2 minutes. Add the asparagus, soy sauce, and sugar, and cook, stirring, until the asparagus is just tender, 1 to 3 minutes more.

• Turn off the heat, add the butter, and stir until melted. Serve immediately.

# Paprika Baked Pork Tenderloin with Potatoes and Broccoli

(makes 4 servings)

Ingredients: 3/4 lb. Yukon Gold potatoes, scrubbed and cut into 1" pieces 1 medium red onion, cut into 1" pieces 2 Tbs. olive oil, divided 3/4 tsp. salt, divided 4 cups broccoli florets (about 1 lb.) 2 cloves garlic, peeled

1-1/2 tsp. smoked paprika
1/2 tsp. ground pepper, divided
2 tsp. Dijon mustard
1 (1 lb.) pork tenderloin trimmed
2 jarred roasted red bell peppers (6 oz.)
2 Tbs. low-fat sour cream or low-fat plain
Greek yogurt
1 tsp. lemon juice

Directions:

• Place a large rimmed baking sheet in the oven; preheat to 425°F.

• Combine potatoes, onion, 1 Tbs. oil, and 1/4 tsp. salt in a medium bowl; toss to coat.

• Remove the pan from the oven; coat with cooking spray. Spread the potato mixture on the pan and roast for 15 minutes.

• Meanwhile, combine broccoli florets, 2 tsp. olive oil, and 1/4 tsp. salt in a medium bowl; toss to coat. In a separate small bowl combine paprika, 1/4 tsp. ground pepper, and the remaining 1/4 tsp. salt. Spread mustard all over the pork. Coat with the paprika mixture.

• Place the garlic on a small piece of foil. Drizzle with the remaining 1 tsp. of oil.

• Remove the pan from the oven. Stir the potatoes and onions and move them to one side. Place the pork next to the potatoes; spread the broccoli on the other side of the pan and place the garlic packet wherever there's room. Roast until an instant-read thermometer inserted in the thickest part of the pork registers 145°F, about 25 minutes.

• Let the pork rest while you make the sauce: Carefully unwrap the garlic and transfer it to a

mini-food processor or blender. Add the roasted red peppers, sour cream or yogurt, lemon juice, and the remaining 1/4 tsp. ground pepper. Purée until smooth.

• Cut the pork into 12 slices. Divide the pork, potatoes, and broccoli among 4 plates and drizzle with the red pepper sauce. Serve hot.

#### **Creamy Coconut-Lime Rice with Peanuts**

(Makes 4 servings)

#### Ingredients:

1 cup uncooked jasmine rice, rinsed 1 (13 to 14 ounce) can coconut milk Salt and pepper 1 (1-1/2") piece ginger 2 large garlic cloves 2 limes 1/2 cup roasted and salted peanuts, crushed 2 Tbs. peanut butter 2 tsp. granulated sugar 2 tsp. sambal oelek (available at Whole Foods) or substitute sriracha 2 cups ripe cherry tomatoes, halved (about 10 oz.) 1 cup roughly chopped mixed herbs (such as dill, cilantro, or mint) Directions: • Cook the rice according to the package

instructions until tender, replacing 1-1/4 cups of the cooking water with 1-1/4 cups of coconut milk. Fluff the cooked rice with a fork, transfer to a serving bowl, and season with salt and pepper—it should taste well-seasoned and almost buttery—and let it cool.

• While the rice is cooking, make the dressing: add 1/4 cup coconut milk to another bowl. Finely grate the ginger and garlic into the bowl, followed by the zest of one lime. Next, juice both limes into the bowl. Whisk 1/4 cup of the peanuts, the peanut butter, sugar, and sambal into the bowl, and season with salt.

• When ready to serve, add the tomatoes and 3/4 cup of the herbs to the rice bowl. Pour in the

dressing, tossing well to coat. Season with pepper and top with the remaining 1/4 cup of crushed peanuts and 1/4 cup of herbs. For the best flavor, serve at room temperature on the day it's made.

# **Pasta Primavera with Asparagus and Peas** (makes 4 servings)

Ingredients:

- 1/4 lb. sugar snap peas, stems trimmed
- 1/2 lb. asparagus, end snapped
- 2 Tbs. unsalted butter

3/4 cup fresh English peas

- 1/4 cup thinly sliced spring onions, white part only
  - 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped 1/2 tsp. fine sea salt, more as needed Black pepper, more as needed 12 ounces fettuccine or tagliatelle 2/3 cup grated Parmigiano-Reggiano,
  - at room temperature
  - 1/2 cup creme fraiche or whole milk Greek yogurt, at room temperature

3 Tbs. finely chopped parsley

1 Tbs. finely chopped tarragon

Directions:

• Bring a pot of salted water to a boil over mediumhigh heat.

• While the water is coming to a boil, slice the snap peas and asparagus stems into 1/4" pieces; leave asparagus tips whole.

• Melt the butter in a large skillet over mediumhigh heat. Add the snap peas, asparagus, English peas, and onion. Cook until the vegetables are barely tender (but not soft or mushy), 3 to 4 minutes. Stir in the garlic and cook 1 minute more. Season with salt and pepper and set aside.

• Drop the pasta into the boiling water and cook until al dente (1 to 3 minutes for fresh pasta, more for dried pasta). Drain well and transfer the pasta to a large bowl. Immediately toss the pasta with the cooked vegetables, Parmigiano Reggiano, creme fraiche, and herbs. Season generously with salt and pepper, if needed. Serve hot.

# Loaded Sweet Potatoes with Black Beans and Cheddar

(makes 4 servings)

#### Ingredients:

2 medium sweet potatoes (8 to 10 oz. each), scrubbed and dried
1 Tbs. olive oil
Kosher salt
1 cup cooked black beans (if canned, rinsed and drained)
1 cup shredded sharp Cheddar
Black pepper

#### Directions:

• Heat the oven to 425°Fd and line a sheet pan with parchment paper.

• Halve the sweet potatoes lengthwise, then brush them all over with olive oil and sprinkle both sides with salt.

• Place cut side down on the prepared sheet pan and roast for 30 to 40 minutes, or until completely cooked through. Take the sweet potatoes out of the oven, turn them over, and let cool slightly. Use a fork to rough up the flesh and slightly flatten the potatoes. Season with salt and pepper.

• Divide half the cheese among the potato halves. Spoon the black beans over them, then cover with the remaining cheese. Return the pan to the oven and bake for another 5 minutes, until the cheese has melted and the beans have warmed through. Season with salt and pepper. Serve warm.





In the last issue of the newsletter, I wrote about a kitten found on Rachael Circle that I am fostering. She had a chest deformity called *pectus excavatum* that has now been treated. I thought some of you might be interested in this condition and treatment. While it is not uncommon in people, it is a rare condition in cats. Basically, the sternum, or breast bone, is caved in. Stinky, the kitten, had a moderate case that would have gotten worse with development, affecting her heart and lungs. I was able to get a diagnosis because several people donated to pay for a consultation. Upon diagnosis, the next challenge was to find an experienced surgeon and the money to pay for the treatment.

I couldn't find a vet in New Hampshire with the experience, so I got an excellent recommendation to see Dr. Sue Casale at Angell Memorial Animal Hospital in Boston. The treatment in young kittens is to essentially tie an external brace to her sternum to pull it into a more normal position. Stinky's brace was made of thermoplastic that was formed to the shape of her chest and was attached using sutures (stitches) that were threaded under her sternum in several places, then threaded through holes in the brace and tied in place. She wore the brace for four weeks, and it was recently removed. The X-ray taken afterward showed that she is now on the border between normal and mild deviation! This was all possible because of the generosity of two Medvil residents, who will also become Stinky's new family!

Dr. Casale and the staff at Angell are all great to work with – knowledgeable, kind, compassionate and helpful! We spent a lot of time in the waiting

area on two occasions, so not only got to observe lots of staff and their interactions with people and their pets, but also got to see, and often greet, lots of dogs. As a retired dog trainer and behavior consultant, I must say it was wonderful to be around so many dogs representing a myriad of breeds and mixes! We met dogs from the smallest – a longhaired Chihuahua, to the largest – an Irish Wolfhound, and everything in between. It was striking to me that although there were dogs who were nervous and definitely did not want to be there, there were so many that were quite content and happy. I think that says a lot about the hospital and how the animals are treated there.

I have been informed of some new cats roaming our community and will begin trapping soon. Thank you to all the residents who have let me know about the ailing orange tabby. He is first on the list. As always, please reach out to me with any new cat sightings.

- Marten Van Buren, the eighth president of the United States, was the first president born a US citizen. Jimmy Carter, the 39<sup>th</sup> president, was the first US president born in a hospital.
- The strongest muscle in the human body is the masseter, also known as the jaw muscle. Working in coordination with other muscles located in the jaw, the masseter can deliver up to 200 pounds of force on the molars. While the gluteus maximus (aka your butt) is the largest muscle and the heart is by far the hardest working, no muscle singlehandedly delivers as much power as the masseter.

I want to share some experiences we had on our recent trips to the Jamaica Plain neighborhood in Boston. HOME BOSTON were there at Ula Cafe, Noodle Barn and J.P. *Licks*. Ula Cafe is a funky place that serves breakfast and lunch along with a long list of coffee and tea options. There is something for everyone, meat eaters and vegetarians alike, along with people with food sensitivities and allergies. Noodle Barn has a huge menu of Asian food representing many countries. Between the three of us, we had curry, dumplings, egg rolls, seaweed salad, and tofu with sweet chili sauce and peanuts. It was all delicious! J.P Licks is an ice cream shop with real. oldfashioned, homemade ice cream. What a treat!! In addition to their regular offerings, they often have

specials. They day that we went, in honor of a play that is being performed in Boston called "Shucks!" the menu included sweet corn ice cream. It was really good! A little sweet, a tad salty, complete with corn kernels!

As we ventured from Jamaica Plain into the Fenway-Kenmore neighborhood, another treat awaited us in a tour of *Fenway Park*. I think that it is a must-see for baseball fans, and I recommend it for your friends not-so-interested in baseball as well. I am one of the latter, and I really enjoyed it! We learned about the history of the park and some of the notable Red Sox, heard some great stories about the park, baseball and players, and got to

experience various parts of the park. We got to sit in some of the original seats, which are over 100 years old, then went up to check out the seats and take in the view from above The Green Monster! A couple of other highlights of the 60minute tour included sitting in the press box and visiting the Royal Rooters Club, which is a combination eating establishment and museum. The memorabilia and photos alone were worth the trip. Many players and their families have generously donated to the collection,

allowing us to see gloves, bats, uniforms, awards and such from as far back as the early 1940s that belonged to greats like Ted Williams, Babe Ruth, Jim Rice, and Carl Yastrzemski. One case held a baseball from almost every World Series game, signed by the winning team members. There was even a letter from then senator John F. Kennedy to Jackie Robinson about their mutual desire for civil rights!
