StoneGate Selects Board

he StoneGate Arts & **Education Center Board of Directors** conducted its initial meeting Jan. 13, in the StoneGate Center Board Room.

Board members attending included Brian Blackwell, Jamie Blackwell, Gary Conner, Julie Hewetson and Everett Southern. Board member Nathan Nikirk was unable to attend.

Guests included Debbie Deckard of Turpin & Deckard, Bedford Mayor Shawna Girgis, Bedford Business and Community Development Director Marla Jones and StoneGate employees **Executive Director Gene** McCracken and Program Manager Susan Hayes.

Members elected a slate of officers for 2016. They are: Jamie Blackwell, president; Julie Hewetson, vice president; Gary Conner, secretary; and Nathan Nikirk, treasurer.

StoneGate Center, which is now a 501(c)(3), was incorporated Jan. 1. Gene McCracken, with help from Debbie Deckard, explained



the documentation of StoneGate's Certificate and Articles of Incorporation and the way in which it came about.

Susan Hayes outlined the history of StoneGate and offered a brief rundown of its current activities, including Ivy Tech and Oakland City University personnel, offices and classes, the Land of Limestone Exhibition, the business incubator businesses, eight 4-H Limestone Robotics teams, SOAR Adult Literacy office and tutoring spaces, Orbits Futbol soccer program offices, and the Northwest

Assembly Hall and other meeting room and classroom availability.

Marla Jones and Mayor Shawna Girgis reported on the history, development and current status of StoneGate Downtown, and discussed the importance of education to the Lawrence County community.

Jones explained the project came about as the result of the success of Bedford's third Stellar grant application. She and Mayor Girgis shared the Stellar application budget, Architect Christine Matheu's budget and Tri-County Builders' budget, as well as architectural renderings and cost estimates, including costs of the alternate additions

Current expected costs are over budget without the five alternates. However, the project could move forward without those alternate additions, which are not structurally necessary but are highly desirable, Mayor Girgis said.

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StoneGate Arts & Education Center welcomes fledgling business entrepreneurs

Currently, the StoneGate facility is home to five business incubator start-ups:

- 5D Analytics, a software service company licensing and commercializing government technologies to optimize planning, scheduling and milestone management;
- Common\$en\$e Bookkeeping, LLC, a bookkeeping company specializing in small
- Bolton Custom Woodworking, featuring hand-

crafted and designed wooden items;

- CPI Bridge, a company offering drainage solution products for municipal highway departments and contractors in Indiana;
- Robert Williams & Co., a design firm specializing in historic restoration.

At present, these incubator spaces are available free of charge. Ideally, as the businesses begin to flourish, rental costs will adjust on a sliding scale until the individual enterprises are solvent enough to strike out on their own.

Interested business owners must provide a business plan, offer an estimation of how long the business will remain at StoneGate, convey the specific accommodations they will require, and be willing to discuss costs related to internet and electrical usage. Approximately six possible incubator spaces are available at StoneGate Center.

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Those alternate additions include items such as an east entrance for the ease of access to the building from the back parking lot, and adding "green" elements to the project, such as solar panels and skylights. Board members discussed additional possible funding sources.

Brian Blackwell asked about the numbers of students currently enrolled in Ivy Tech Community College and Oakland City University. Susan Hayes estimated Ivy Tech enrollment at about 100 students, and Oakland City University student enrollment at approximately 50 students.

Following the meeting, several board members toured the StoneGate Center facility and Land of Limestone Museum.
