FROM THE PRESIDENT

The first time I volunteered was at Strongsville High School in 1966 when I was sixteen years old. My best friend asked me to help her in the teacher lunch area located in the middle of our one-year old high school. It wasn't a separate room, but rather a small, multi-purpose corner off the main hallway with tables, chairs, and a stiff accordion style curtain that you could close to give the teachers privacy while they ate their food. Our job was to wipe off the tables and return the trays to the lunchroom. It was fun and it broke up our academic day, plus it helped me climb out of my teenage introverted shyness.

During roughly the same period of time, a core group of dedicated volunteers, led by Howard and Velda Chapman, were busy moving forward with the Strongsville Historical Society. Their first meeting was in the Chapman living room in 1962, but it would only be the humble beginnings of many years of work establishing a mission statement, By-laws, Articles of Incorporation, our 501 (c) (3) tax exempt status, creating a vision for a Village, cataloguing our early collections, eventually moving structures to the two-acre Chapman property, and planning renovation of those structures- all by community volunteers.

I am humbled today when I walk the Village grounds and absorb the tremendous amount of time, effort and expertise that brought us to where we are today with the Strongsville Historical Society.

A current example of the stellar efforts by our volunteers would be the wonderful people who

gave up most of their Saturday a couple of months ago to unload and sort through the treasures in the Roe-Chapman barn so the Pro-Built Construction workers could get started with the renovation.

The barn passed the final building inspection and we were given the keys to the structure on August 11, 2014. That following Saturday, twenty -two volunteers showed up to unload the storage pods, sort through the items, identify, and number each of the old tools and farm equipment items amassed over the past fifty-two years. A huge thank you to everyone who helped in this effort.

The beating heart of the Strongsville Historical Society and Village is the strong volunteers who are passionate about our mission to: "discover, collect, preserve, record and interpret the history of the Strongsville area through programs that inspire, stimulate, and educate the community." UNION VICTORIOUS

The fourth and final Civil War Camp was held on the Village grounds during the week of July 28th through August 1, 2014. Four squads were mustered in the Army of the West for a week of experiencing the life of a Union soldier during the fourth year of the American Civil War. During the week, the recruits held authentic Civil War weaponry, marched with the Ohio 29th OVI to Atlanta under the command of Sherman, dug Civil War artifacts used at Gettysburg, visited the hiding place of the slaves escaping to Canada, and even had a mock battle trying to capture the South's battle flag. The week ended with a program for the soldiers' families showcasing what was learned during the week. Troops were dismissed to civilian life after receiving their proper discharge papers. To honor the Union victory, its battle flag still flies near Pearl Road.
