Bates to be Rappahannock River DS

God continues to guide us in doing great things in our community for the advancement of His kingdom. In January, 2019, the Ebenezer United Methodist Church, Oldhams, Church Council began a study called "Membership to Discipleship: Growing Mature Disciples Who Make Disciples." As part of a denomination-wide effort, Ebenezer is developing a plan of "intentional discipleship," which will help our members become (or continue to become) disciples of Christ.

Membership drives focus on growing *attendance* at church events; intentional discipleship, on the other hand, focuses on growing *people* in their walk with Christ. See Pastor Rebecca's column on page 2 for more information about this initiative.

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Bishop Sharma D. Lewis has announced that the Rev. Charles F. Bates will be our new District Superintendent, effective July 1, 2019. Rev. Bates is



currently serving as lead pastor at Fishersville UMC on the Staunton District.


Rev. Bates began his service at Fishersville UMC in 2015. He is a native of Liberia and is the 15th of sixteen children. He is happily

married to Weade V. Bates (Vickie), his wife of 23 years; they have three children and two grandchildren.

Rev. Bates has served as a pastor in the Virginia Annual Conference of the UMC for almost 15 years. He first served the Leemont Charge on the Virginia Eastern Shore and then Galilee UMC on the Fredericksburg District.

Rev. Bates has an undergraduate degree in accounting, a Bachelor of Arts in Religious Studies/Judaic Studies; a Master of Divinity in Theology and Congregational Pastoral Care; and a Master of Science in Clinical Professional Counseling. He is currently a Ph.D. candidate in Psychology.

Rev. Bates will replace the Rev. Dr. Ted Smith, who has served as the Rappahannock River DS since 2011. We hope to be able to host Rev. Bates here at Ebenezer soon after he assumes his new position.



Ebenezer is embarking on an exciting effort in response to Bishop Sharma Lewis' 4-year vision to develop "Disciples of Jesus Christ who are lifelong learners who influence others to serve." By 2020, all Virginia United Methodist churches should have a process of intentionally forming disciples. Each church will individually choose what this process will look like for them.

The Church Council has started studying one of Bishop Lewis' recommended texts: From Membership to Discipleship: Growing Mature Disciples Who Make Disciples, by Philip Maynard. Dr. Maynard states, "We need to make a shift from making members to making disciples." He defines a disciple as a follower of Jesus Christ who is committed to being part of the Body of Christ; becoming more like Jesus; and joining Jesus in ministry.

While membership development focuses on statistics – weekly attendance, participation in church projects, number of baptisms, etc., -- discipleship is a life-long journey into the abundant life for which we were created. Discipleship in the biblical tradition is not just learning about Jesus, but becoming *like* Jesus.

I hope that every member of Ebenezer will join us in prayer for this effort and contribute to the conversation about our potential mission fields to form disciples of Jesus Christ for the Transformation of the World. Several copies of Dr. Maynard's book are available in the vestibule, and more can be ordered if (when!) needed. May our intentional disciple-making bear much fruit!

Special General Conference Session to Vote on A Way Forward

On February 23-26, 2019, United Methodists will gather in St. Louis, MO, for a Special Called Session of General Conference to vote on the various plans for the church to move forward on matters surrounding human sexuality. While a number of plans were considered by the Commission on a Way Forward (see http://www.umc.org/who-we-are/the-commission-on-a-way-forward-report-what-you-should-know), in May 2018 an overwhelming majority of the bishops of The United Methodist Church endorsed the option known as the One Church Plan.

A message from bishops supporting the One Church Plan states, in part:

"We believe ... the One Church Plan offers the best way forward for those holding diverse opinions on human sexuality without compromising the mission of The United Methodist Church. We acknowledge there may be some who cannot move forward with The United Methodist Church. We urge you to reconnect with our true Wesleyan roots; we renew the call for you to be in relationship with The United Methodist Church and live into our baptism of unity in the Body of Christ."

Three meetings will be held at various local churches after the Conference to update us on the results. The meeting closest to us will be held at Warsaw UMC, 287 Main Street, Warsaw VA on Saturday, March 2, 2019, at 4:00 p.m.

Fellowship Hall Renovation Completed

A months-long project to repair and replace the floor of the Fellowship Hall was completed in early February 2019, and the new floor is beautiful! The project started in response to damage to the old floor caused by water seeking up through the concrete in the part of the basement built in the 1905s. A contractor removed the old concrete, installed a French drain and put in a sump pump to prevent the problem in the future.

Once the corrective work was finished, a second contractor installed a seamless epoxy floor on top of the concrete. Installation of the new flooring required that *everything* on the floor be removed, including refrigerators, freezers and even bathroom toilets. Many thanks to those who worked so hard to prepare the Hall for the flooring install.

The total cost for the Fellowship Hall renovation was more than \$40,000, but ensures that EUMC will be well-situated for a future of continuing service to God and our community.

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Praise Band on the Road Again!

Our wonderful Praise Band is once more in demand. The music that the Praise Band presented at the District Celebration in November was so well received that they have been asked to play at the Afton UMC Homecoming on June 2nd. Choir Prepares for Eastertide

Our EUMC choir, Abundant Joy, has started preparing for our Easter cantata, which this year (for logistical reasons) will be presented on April 28th, the first Sunday *after* Easter, during the morning service. The cantata is entitled, "The Body of Christ: Glorified, Anointed, and Sacrificed," and was written by one of the choir's favorite composers, Pepper Choplin.

While presenting the "Easter" cantata after Easter is a bit unusual, remember that Easter is just the beginning of Eastertide, the time in the church calendar between Easter Sunday and Pentecost Sunday, 50 days later. On Easter itself, the choir will present one of the songs from the cantata. Please plan to be with us all through this holy season!

Now that the Fellowship Hall renovation is done, we are tackling the reorganization of the Pastor's Office. The Church Council approved the purchase of new office furniture that will work better in the small office. Lent Begins on March 6th

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent and occurs 46 days before Easter. It is a moveable feast, falling on a different date each year because it is dependent on the date of Easter. (Easter itself is celebrated on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring equinox; in 2019, Easter is on April 21.) Ash Wednesday can occur as early as February 4 or as late as March 10. This year Ash Wednesday is March 6th.

Ash Wednesday derives its name from the practice of placing ashes on the foreheads of adherents as a sign of mourning and repentance to God. The ashes used are typically gathered after the palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday are burned. Plan to join in EUMC's Ash Wednesday service on March 6th (time will be announced in the church bulletin).

Ebenezer Partners with Westmoreland Social Services

The Westmoreland County Department of Social Services provides a wide variety of services and benefits to county residents in need. Examples include assistance with rent, food, clothing, medicine, and essential non-food items.

Department employees investigate, treat, and help prevent the abuse, neglect and exploitation of children, elders, and adults with disabilities. They provide home-based services to help individuals remain in their homes rather than move to institutions. They also arrange for temporary foster care, assist with adoptions and perform court ordered services. In addition, they provide services to help able-bodied parents qualify for and find work. While carrying out their mission, they continually nurture human dignity, promote human worth, and take steps to strengthen and preserve families.

As a part of our outreach, Ebenezer maintains a partnership with the Department of Social Services to assist them in helping those in need. We have donated funds to help purchase services for the needy. We have contributed discretionary funds for the purchase of prescription medicine, utilities, rent, and short stays at motels while individuals were searching for more permanent housing. We have also provided food, funds and supplies for elder care; new winter coats for children; and toys.

Our Church Council (through "Second Mile Giving"), UMW and UMM have all participated in providing this much needed assistance for the less fortunate of our community. In October 2018, Ebenezer contributed fifty new winter coats for distribution to needy children in our local community.

Our partnership with Westmoreland County is only one way Ebenezer shares the blessings we have rereceived. We *can* make a difference in the lives of our neighbors, even if we don't know who they are.

The History Corner

Ebenezer, the Oldest Methodist Church in Westmoreland County

What is now known as Ebenezer United Methodist Church has a rich history of service to God and to our community. Our church began in 1838 when 7/8 of an acre was purchased for five dollars from William and Martha Jackson for the purpose of erecting a house of worship. The deed was signed on June 21, 1838, and witnessed by William Middleton, William Wright and Benedict Walker, whose families were among the first members of the church.

Little is known of the earliest building called Ebenezer where members held services during the first twenty years. The sanctuary in which we worship today was built in 1859 with bricks made in a kiln on the church grounds. The tower was built in 1900, and in 1955 ground was broken for the Educational Building, which was dedicated in 1966.

The newest addition to church, which includes additional Sunday School rooms, a nursery and a choir room, plus a large kitchen in the Fellowship Hall downstairs, was built in 2005 and dedicated in 2011.

The original pulpit and pews are still being used today. In 1861, the first communion table was bequeathed to the church by Benedict Walker in his will which had been written in 1839.

Henry L. Thrift gave a plot of ground for the cemetery in 1882. The first marked grave was that of Pelham Chandler Delano who was buried in October 1887. Additional land for the cemetery was acquired in 1904, 1960 and 1988 through gifts from church members. An adjacent 18 acres of land was purchased in June 2010 and placed in the Ebenezer United Methodist Church Cemetery Trust.

The history of Ebenezer Church mirrors much of the history of Methodism. When organized, Ebenezer was a Methodist Protestant Church. The Methodist Protestant Church was formed in 1828 by former members of the Methodist Episcopal Church (MEC),

remaining Wesleyan in doctrine and worship, but adopting congregational governance.

Soon after the Civil War, the church became Ebenezer Methodist Episcopal Church, South. The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was the denomination resulting from the 19th-century split in the MEC over the issue of slavery, with churches in the South breaking off to form the separate denomination. The plaque embedded in the wall outside Ebenezer's west entrance to the sanctuary shows "South" as part of Ebenezer's name.

In 1965 Ebenezer became a station church, and in 1968 it became Ebenezer United Methodist Church when the Evangelical United Brethren Church and The Methodist Church joined to become the United Methodist Church.

The current congregation carries on a long tradition of men and women who have blessed and have been blessed by the community surrounding us. We pray that God will continue to work His will through this fellowship of believers.

A Bit More History: The Cross and Flame

The Cross and Flame has been the official symbol of the United Methodist Church since 1968. Adopted shortly after the merger of the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church, it relates the United Methodist Church to God through Christ (cross) and the Holy Spirit (flame).

The flame is a reminder of Pentecost when witnesses were unified by the power of the Holy Spirit and saw "tongues, as of fire" (Acts 2:3). The two separate tongues of a single flame represent the Evangelical United Brethren Church and the Methodist Church coming together to form the United Methodist Church.

The Cross and Flame is a registered trademark and its use is supervised by the General Council on Finance and Administration of the United Methodist Church. When we use the image, even in this newsletter, we include the registered trademark sign, [®] .
