

BY LAWS OF THE APOSTOLIC FAITH BIBLE COLLEGE, INC.

Article VII

Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

- * Triune God; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit
- * Creation and Formation
- * Man is basically sinful and in need of salvation
- * Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life
- Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul, and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ
- Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the speaking in other languages
- * Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit
- Sacrament of the Lord's Supper
- * Washing of feet
- * Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers
- * Do not condone divorce and remarriage
- * Destruction of the wicked
- * Conditional Immortality
- * Rapture of the Man Child Class
- * Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly
- * A ministry supported by tithes and offerings

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not inconsistent with the above listed basic doctrines.

The school year is off to a great start. This year we have 21 students: nine first-year students, ten second-year students, and two third-year interns. We also have a couple of new staff members: Ryan and Lea Ferguson are learning the ropes and settling into their new roles as Missions Directors. We are excited about our potential for the upcoming year. We believe God is going to do some amazing things!

This year looks much different than those of the recent past. Due to a serious plumbing issue in the Women's Dorm at the end of last year, we moved the female students into what was previously the Men's Dorm. Our male enrollment is drastically low this year, which has allowed us to relocate the guys to the basement of the Chapel. This is a temporary fix while we assess our construction needs and formulate a plan for the future.

We are currently preparing to demolish two houses on our property, which we use for storage. The plan is to use the former Women's Dorm as a temporary storage unit while we demo these houses and construct a new storage building on the southeast corner of our property. During this time, we, with the board, will discuss our dorm building requirements with an architect, and he will draw up a master plan. We hope to have a more concrete plan for the dorms by the end of this school year.

God is faithful, and He provides a way where there seems to be none. We are in the process of receiving an estate bequeathed to us. At this time, we don't know exact amounts, but we do know that this estate has the potential to drastically help us with the cost of a new dorm building.

AFBC has rarely been in situations like this, and we are extremely excited about the possibility of expansion and construction. Please continue to pray for us. We need wisdom, vision, clarity, and direction. We are trusting God to lead us down the paths He directs. We trust Him to provide the vision, the professionals, and the means to accomplish His plans for AFBC. As always, He provides through people just like you. Would you like to improve your memory? The Lord has a plan for that!

Deuteronomy 4:9 "only take heed to yourself and DILIGENTLY KEEP YOURSELF, LEST YOU FORGET the things your eyes have seen, and lest they depart from your heart all the days of your life,. And TEACH THEM TO YOUR CHILDREN AND GRANDCHILDREN.

The passage in Deuteronomy 4:9 is a revelation of God's key to "Fine tuning" our memory. God's plan is for each of us to "diligently keep ourselves,

lest we forget. "Fine tuning" our memory is a three step process. These are the three steps

Receive—Recall—Relay

Step 1: RECEIVE the information. Obviously, nothing can be remembered until it has first been received and stored in our memory,

Step 2: RECALL the information. The definition "recall" is to bring something you received previously back to your mind. Each time we "recall" a memory, it is reinforced in our brain. By the same token, a memory that is seldom or never recalled will soon be forgotten.

Step 3: RELAY the information. The Biblical method requires us to speak or RELAY information to our children and our grandchildren. Or to someone else. The process of relaying information requires the speaker to first recall it. The process of recalling and relaying the information over and over again fixes it firmly in the memory of the speaker.

God's plan for :fine tuning" our memory is for each new generation to become the "speakers" for both their children and grandchildren, When this process is faithfully followed, the information is passed intact from one generation to the next, by being constantly recalled and relayed.

Regarding each generation to speak both to their children and grandchildren is a sort of "fail safe" to ensure that the information is not lost. If a parent fails to "speak" to their children, those children may still receive the information from their grandparents. If both the parents and grandparents fail, the chain will be broken and the information will be lost. The only recourse then is for those who have not received the information to get it directly from the written copies of the information or from someone outside of the family.

We have all noticed that the songs we sang over and over as children and young adults remain firmly fixed in our memory for the rest of our lives. But, when we hear a song only once or twice we will soon forget all about it.

The same is true of something as important as the Word of God, and for something as relatively unimportant as the stories from our family's past. By repeatedly recalling them and relaying those memories those memories become deeply imbedded in our minds. Not only will we forget them, but they may also be lost to the next generation. Sadly. The history of many families disappears because it has not been passed down.

People sometimes ask me how I can remember the songs I have written. The stories from my family's past that I tell or the many scriptures I have committed to memory. The answer is the same in each case. Once I sing a song from memory 200 or 300 times . it is firmly imbedded in my brain. When I relay a family story over and over to my family or friends, the same thing happens

The Word of God is a special case when it comes to memory. The difference is that the Holy Spirit comes alongside the believer to help us to recall God's Word. But the principle is the same.

Once God's Word has been received, recalled, and relayed over and over, it becomes deeply imprinted in our minds. Praise God that the Holy Spirit acts as our "prompter" to help us recall God's Word. But even the Holy Spirit is hard pressed to bring a scripture to our mind which we have never received. That is why I emphasize reading the entire Bible every year. Even scriptures that I have not committed to memory can be brought to my mind by the Holy Spirit, because I have "received: them by reading them in the Bible repeatedly.

If the knowledge of God's Word is not passed on to a generation by their parents or their grandparents their only hope is to receive it directly from the written Word of God or from someone outside of their family. God himself has carefully preserved His written Word throughout the centuries for the very reason that we need a solid "backup". Several times, both in the Bible and throughout history, God has raised up a new generation that received His Word directly from the written Word of God.

I once heard of a Chinese Communist who was ordered to read the Bible by his atheistic government hoping that he could then help stop the rise of the underground Christian Church un China. That man was saved, without ever having met a Christian, simply by reading the Bible. He is now a Christian missionary to his own nation.

Receive the truth of Gods Word, then recall it and relay it over and over to those you love. This is more than a way to simply "fine tune" your memory. It is God's plan for the preservation of our lives, for our immediate future and for all eternity.

A Trip To Remember – by Ron Noble

For a Christmas present in 2024, my daughter Ivy took Evelyn (I went along for the ride) to Kansas City, MO for an event that was happening. Well, I thought to myself, "Self. We maybe not too far from Topeka, KS., why don't we just stop over there. "So I looked on the map and we were only about an hour or so away." I mentioned it to Evelyn but we already had enough fun for the weekend and had a long drive ahead of us, so we dismissed the idea.

As we started for home, I sat in the back seat while Evelyn drove and Ivy sat in the front seat. I wasn't paying attention, (actually I think I had become drowsy and was (resting my eyes) but I felt us slow down. I opened my eyes and Ivy turned and asked, "Do you know where you are at?" For a second I thought it did look familiar but we had decided not to come. We pulled in the parking lot and all of a sudden I became briefly, unexpectedly weepy. We were at 4th and Jackson, at the building that housed the Bethel Healing Home that Charles Parham opened in 1898-June of 1900. As we got out of the vehicle, a man opened the door for us welcoming us inside. Since it was Sunday, Ivy explained that we were, in addition to seeing the building, we were going to attend service! It turned out they weren't going to have preaching that day, but only a time of worship as they had planned a church dinner for the congregation and people from the town. So my family and I got to attend Sunday morning service in the sanctuary in what used to be the Bethel Healing Home! My daughter... my wife.... So thoughtful!

On page 39, chapter 6 in the book, The Life of Charles Parham' written by his wife Sarah Parham, one can read about the Healing home. Also there is a short history of it at Apostolicarchives.com. The group that owns this building (as of this writing) is the Tree of Life Fellowship (treeoflifeks.org) The pastor there at the time was very nice, saying that he had been to AFBC and that he had been treated very well and invited us to eat with them. After we had eaten, the pastor wanted to know if we wanted to go upstairs. He opened the door and I saw an old staircase (how many people from 'back then' had used these steps?) that led to the 'healing rooms.' I'll say this only once, 'If walls could talk' what would they say? What had they seen? What took place in these rooms? What were the services like? Which of these rooms was for the publishing of the Apostolic Faith Report? As I climbed the stairs and my hand slid up the smooth railing, of course questions came to mind. What were the stories of the people who had been here? Did they find victory?

We went to the second floor that had been remodeled into a classroom/fellowship hall. Then we continued to the third floor. It was like stepping back in time. Of course there was no furniture, but every thing else looked like it had not been touched for a long, long time. The records say there were 14 rooms in all and as we walked through them. I was having a hard time thinking of where I really was. It was almost the same as when I went to Israel in that I couldn't take it all in at one time. One of the rooms, they say it was Parham's office (so of course I had my picture in there.) It was corner room that looked out on the front and side street where he could see the goings on. Oh, the shouts of praise that must have reverberated off these walls must have something else to hear. To see the miracles must have been a sight to behold! Then we visited the attic. Sarah Parham writes, ... "we used it for sleeping purposes when our bedrooms were all occupied," We finished the tour, thanked the pastor and I got ready for a long drive home but my family said they still had one more surprise for me!

After we left there, we drove to 1800 SW Stone where Parham started a Bible School after the Bethel healing home had been stolen from him he writes. As of this writing, there is a church located there called Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church (their website has some information about what happened there.) Again, one can read about this in Parham's book or look it up online. I did however get to see the foundation of where Stone's Folly was. Can you imagine what it must have been like to have been there?

Great memories that won't soon be forgotten. Thank you Wife and Daughter. Now as a personal note, I want it to be understood that there is nothing supernatural or holy about a place or building itself. I understand that. We should never make more out of things than they are. Yet I know there are places... and things,,,and people that God has used to further His purposes. (next page)

I myself will always consider the Apostolic Faith Bible College a 'special' place because that is where God did so much for me. There and a dozen other places, and many people, that God used to further me along in my spiritual journey. Hasn't He you? Aren't there places and times in which God did something 'special' for you and you've made the remark "I'll never forget this as long as I live, " or something to that affect. L.J. Ehrlich - 1935-2025

Laubhan J. Ehrlich (L.J) went to heaven on May 21, 2025. He was born on Flag Day, June 14, 1935 to Asaph and Tillie (Laubhan) Ehrlich. He was one of seven children; Gene Ehrlich, Jo Gillispie, Bernice Anderson, Joyce Ehrlich, Maurice Ehrlich and Tracy Ehrlich. The world lost a friend to all and is a better place for having had him in it.

Early in life L.J. developed a love for music and at age 5, played the piano; one of the musical instruments he used to glorify God throughout his entire life. L.J. grew up in Follett, TX and had lots of stories of his childhood adventures



that only got better with time. He was a good athlete, but was remembered most for his extraordinary musical talent, playing mostly by ear. After graduating from Follett High School in 1953, L.J. accepted Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior at a tent revival on Main Street in Follett. It was there he surrendered his life to ministry. That same year, in August 1953, L.J. lost his devoted father, Asaph Ehrlich, to cancer. One year later, in August 1954, he married his high school sweetheart, Kay Nellon Roach.

L.J. had a deep love for the Lord and wanted to share Jesus with everyone .During his lifetime, he built and helped direct a Church Youth camp in Mississippi, pastored several churches, turned an old filling station into a Youth Center in Follett, TX, helped build and sponsored an orphanage in Africa and was instrumental in creating a successful on-line Bible College that has educated well over 10,000 students around the globe.

L.J. always had a place in his heart for the elderly, He would regularly take his young family to visit nursing homes, ministering and playing songs he wrote about Jesus. Or would you hope they'd stay away until His visit ends?


Would you be glad to have Him stay forever on and on?
