- You are required by Florida law to be registered. Register on-line at Fresh From Florida https://www.freshfromflorida.com/Business-Services/Bees-Apiary/Beekeeper-Registration
- Florida is a 'right to farm' state. You can't be told you can't keep bees. The exception being in an HOA community that prohibits it.
- General
 - You're going to get stung
 - o It's hot
 - o It can be expensive
- Increasing Honey Production

- O The main factor in producing lots of honey is to have a strong hive. If you have 2 hives with 30,000 bees in each -- you'll produce 40 lbs. If you have 1 hive with 60,000 bees -- you'll produce 120 lbs. Why? More foragers.
- How to keep a strong hive
 - o control pests and diseases
 - o have a vigorous queen
 - o insure proper nutrition, especially in winter
 - o attempt to manage pesticide exposure
 - prevent swarming
- Swarming is the way a colony reproduces. "If an organism can reproduce, it really, really, really wants to." Dr. J. Ellis, UF/IFAS
- Three types of swarms
 - o Reproductive
 - o Congestive Too crowded/no space to lay
 - o Absconding infected; disease; you disturb them too many times
- Causes
 - Dilution of queen pheromone
 - Lack of space to lay
 - o Abundance of resources
 - o Genetics some species are more prone to swarming
 - o Environmental conditions
 - o Age of queen
 - o Diseases/pests
- How many times will a colony swarm? Hopefully just once.
- Swarms are most common in the spring.
- If you see lots of drones it usually indicates swarm potential.
- A swarm will go somewhere and stay until scouts find a new location and swarm agrees on location. Can be anywhere from 2 hours to 2 days. For more detailed information on the decision making process, check out <u>Honeybee Democracy</u> by Thomas d. Seeley.
- Tropical swarms are Africanized bees and so far are not in our area.
- Preventing Swarming
 - o reversing hive bodies
 - o introduce young queen in late summer or fall
 - o make splits
 - o adding supers
 - checkerboarding two boxes where the brood is alternated with empty frames in each box and reversed top to bottom
 - o equalizing
 - o cutting out queen cells

- o artificial swarm (Demaree method) https://youtu.be/mQ6CE8nCbHQ
- Know your cells
 - Worker cells are small and flat
 - o Drone cells are larger
 - Queen cells are vertical
- Before you remove queen cells investigate! Make sure you actually have a queen present.
- Queen cells located on bottom of frames indicate swarm cells
- Queen cells clustered in middle are supercedure/emergency queen cells
- Did my hive swarm? Mark your queen.
- How long ago did the hive swarm?
 - Open brood 0-4 days
 - o Sealed with no open brood 4-20 days
 - o No brood 21 days
 - o Multiple eggs in cells over 28 days and you have a laying worker
- Capturing swarms
 - o Swarms are generally calm and not aggressive
 - Questions to ask before you head out
 - Are they honeybees?
 - Where are they located?
 - How big is the swarm?
 - How long have they been there?
 - Have they been disturbed or sprayed?
 - O Use bait hives that are 40 liters in size with a 1-2 inch opening and 12 to 15 feet in the air.

Item #1 Notification to members

Item #2 General

With the lack of rain nectar is difficult to find right now. You'll see bees on hummingbird feeders. Bees may be aggressive at this time. Alternate your entrances to avoid robbing. Around 3 p.m. you'll probably see a lot of bees around the entrance--this is new bees orienting on the hive. You'll also see bearding due to lack of room and temperature control. Screened bottom boards and venting along the top will help the bees keep the hive cool.

Greg mentioned that there have been some instances of hives suddenly having no brood, no larva and no queens. There are bees present and honey. Unknown what could be the cause but it could be chemical or CCD.

Joel mentioned that some hives aren't capping off. This could be due to the weather.

Regarding mosquito spraying. You can call and be added to the do not spray list. This is another reason that you MUST register! Registered bee keepers are contacted regarding mosquito spraying. The contact information for Okaloosa County is:

 https://honeybeehealthcoalition.org/varroa/ and download a helpful pdf guide for dealing with varroa mites.

- Remember that not treating for mites is not an option. Your hives will infect others if you have mites and you don't treat.
- The least toxic treatments are apistan, apivar, apiguard and checkmite ½. You must alternate treatment types to avoid producing an immune colony of mites.
- You can also treat with oxylic acid (fuming).
- Do your research as to the methods that work best for you. If you have bees you're going to have to treat for mites.

Approval of Minutes

There were no corrections or additions to the previous month's minutes. The minutes were entered into the record as written.

Treasurer's report

Ed Crosby reported that the bank balance is \$3,407.22. We have 72 paid members and added 2 new members.

Item #1 Potential Bee Hive Installation

Ed Crosby is working on a proposal to install a permanent hive in a screened room at the garden located in Valparaiso. The decision still has to be made by the Valparaiso board. Ed would provide the equipment. The matter is tabled until Ed gets back with us with a full proposal, including costs, to have the group sponsor this hive.

Item #2 Elections

All current board members have agreed to be placed on the upcoming ballot. If anyone is interested in running for any of the board positions please contact Steve Baldock. Nominations may also be made from the floor. Elections will be held at the October meeting.

Item #3 Insurance

A question was posed as to the cost of liability insurance for an individual (specifically when one has bee hives.) The example put forth runs less than \$400 a year.

Item #4 Presentation

Bill presented on wax moths. The following are highlights from the presentation.

- In nature, wax moths clean up the remains of a hive when the bees vacate.
- Wax moths arrive about 1894 with the arrival of Langstroth hives.
- There are two types of wax moths: lesser and greater
- An adult female will lay between 250 to 350 eggs.
- Adults don't eat.
- Females lives for 5 days and males for 25 days (males die after mating)
- Eggs are extremely small and can only be seen through magnification.
- The pupal stage is anywhere from 2 weeks to 5 months
- Bats are their biggest predator
- Use entrance reducers and change out old wax.
- Freeze your frames for 48 hours to kill larvae.
- Use ONLY moth crystals (paradicholorbenzene) and NOT mothballs (naphthalene)

Item #4 Presentation

- Baker Block November 2nd. Set up will be between 6:30am and 7:00am. Remember to get there early because parking can be an issue. This is the event where we make 90% of our operating funds. Bottling will be at the October meeting so bring any honey that you wish to donate.
- Pioneer Day @ Rocky Bayou State Park is November 9th from 8:00am to 3:00pm. It would help if there were several 'teams' so that people can be spelled during their time at our table. Please contact Bill Hagan if you are interested in helping out at that event.

Item #5 Reminder

With the lack of rainfall it is important to keep track of your bees. They may need supplemental feeding due to the lack of nectar. Feeding at this time is 2:1 sugar to water (by volume)

Item #6 Peanut Butter

The UF/IFAS Extension is holding their peanut butter drive. These donations are matched by the Peanut Growers Association and all will be donated to local food banks.

Members are encouraged to bring a jar (or two) to the October meeting to help support the Extension program.
