Jimmy Buffett exhibition drives excitement for Maritime Museum, Mobile waterfront

Mobile officials showed off a glimpse Thursday of a new Jimmy Buffett exhibition – and, with it, a look at a bright future for a museum that has struggled over its first decade.

When "Son of a Son of a Sailor: The Jimmy Buffett Experience" opens in September 2026 at the National Maritime Museum of the Gulf, it'll feature 6,000 square feet of space dedicated to Buffett's legacy. According to Karen Poth, the museum's director, and others, that space will be filled not just with artifacts from Buffett's career, but with concert footage that fans might not be able to see anywhere else.

"So far we have more than 130 artifacts collected," Poth told a small group of media representatives and other parties on Thursday. "Really great things. Family photos, handwritten lyrics, we have several guitars, we have a statue from the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. Just great, great stuff that people are going to want to see.

"We also are partnering with his longtime videographer," she said. "So there'll be a lot of never-before-seen footage, a lot of never-even-edited-together footage will be part of this exhibit, and also interviews and phone audio and things that people have never heard."

his parents to take him to Ladd Stadium for a ball game and promising that "We will have lots of fun;" a slip from Mobile Yacht Club showing that Buffett had been signed up for sailing lessons at 15 years old; and a 1990 proclamation from then-mayor Sam Jones proclaiming that for most of that July Mobile was officially Margaritaville. (Buffett headlined a concert that month at the same stadium he'd been so eager to visit as a kid.)

Poth said the museum envisions the permanent Buffett exhibition as a living display, "because as we continue to learn more about Jimmy and his life and all the great things that he did... We are going to continue to update going forward."

"It's part of a bigger story, Poth said: The museum's numbers are up, and the Buffett exhibition is only a part of what's coming.

"In September of 2023, we kind of started setting a new course," she said. "We worked hard on education programs, we worked hard on different marketing strategies, getting out into the community, letting people know we're open, but also just inviting people in. We've had thousands of people come in and we are thrilled to share our results with you. Museum attendance is up by 54%. Event space rentals are up by 120%. Field trip booking is up by 59%. Group admissions up by 76%. And our revenue is up by 56%. We really are thrilled to say the ship is heading in the right direction, so to speak."

"We are, in the next two years, going to be opening two really groundbreaking exhibits here," she said. "So almost half of the exhibit space is going to be done in the next few years. Both projects combined require about \$5.5 million investment. So far we have raised \$3.65 million, and we're working to finish this."

The second big exhibition, due to open in April 2027, is "Delta Mosaic: A Confluence of Life." It'll be about 3,000 square feet, presenting an immersive look at the ecological richness of the Mobile-Tensaw Delta. The majority of its \$2.5 million cost is funded by a federal GOMESA grant.

Beyond that, Poth said, there are developing plans to add an exhibition in 2028 that focuses on workforce development and the employment opportunities available to young people in the area.


