LEUDTKE WINS A NAILBITER DOWN ON THE ZINK RANCH

Jack Zink and the Zink Foundation welcomed riders back to the site of the 1994 ISDE with a tough race. With trails the top riders in the world rode 10 years ago and 5 inches of rain the previous week, the Black Jack Enduro Circuit was treated to an extra helping of rocks and mud. In fact, only 95 of the 265 riders who started the race would even make it to mile 13!

Steve Leivan, the defending 7-time BJEC champion, was poised to begin the 2004 season in his typical winning ways aboard his SCR/Answer/Dunlop/RaceTech/Silkolene Yamaha WR250. However, the lure of racing at the Zink Ranch brought Walker Leudtke, a multi-time District 22 enduro champion, down from Nebraska to race the A-Vet class with the distinct goal of beating Leivan. With additional talented riders that included 2003 ISDE silver medalist Lars Valin, the Tulsa Trail Riders had all the makings of a great race.

The long course consisted of 3 loops with a total of 85 challenging ground miles and 15 total checkpoints deciding the day's winner. The first points taker, check 4, was a short section with a long and rocky downhill and then a very difficult uphill to ride back up. Chris Tucker, racing the A class in his first enduro, hit the check on his minute. Luedtke and Leivan each dropped 1 point, and the rest of the

riders dropped 2 or more. With an emergency check at check 8, the search was on again for the faster riders. Jon "Spud" Simons bested everyone in this section with a 3:34, while (Continued on page 4)

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It was good to see Steve VanZant back chasing points.

Tucker, Leivan, and Luedtke recorded times of 3:37, 3:45 and 4:02, respectively.

As the race wore on, numerous mud bogs were strewn along the course, and smart line decision became a necessity for survival. At the end of the second loop, Leudtke had lost his rear brake completely due to conditions described by most riders as "gnarly." "At that point, I decided I was going to rail straight through every bog in loop 3 and go for it," Leudtke said.

Loop 3 would be a 24mph pace throughout, and the next test would be check 12, where the course began to test the durability

and fitness of the riders. Luedtke stood out as the fastest in this section, dropping 3 points while Leivan dropped 4 and Tucker dropped 5. Check 13 continued the trend as a tiebreaker, and again, Leudtke bested everyone with a time of 6:48. Leivan and Tucker recorded 7:12 and 8:27, respectively. The last real test, check 14, gave Leivan the chance to gain a point back on both Leudtke and Tucker, as he dropped a 3 to their pair of 4's.

The points were tallied up and Leudtke and Leivan both dropped 19 points, Tucker dropped 21, and the rest of the field dropped 26 or more. The emergency points were figured, and Leudtke's 650 seconds edged out Leivan's 658 for an exciting finale on the Zink Ranch.

The Moose/Smith/Pirelli/Alpinestars/NVC-sponsored Walker was excited after the race, showing genuine respect for Leivan. "I've raced Steve in hare scrambles, and I've never beat him. Actually, I almost DNF'd in the last loop when I caught a big rock in some water I underestimated the depth of. This race took its toll on me and my bike, but it was worth it."

"Pretty wild to ride that many miles in conditions that tough and finish that close together," Leivan said. "He rode well. My hat's

off to him."

Oops, wrong Leivan

Trail conditions and weather were close to perfect for the 30th annual White Rock Enduro. On a day of sunshine and 60 degree temperatures, approximately 236 riders showed up to ride a great course laid out by the Razorback Riders. Three loops, totaling close to 80 miles, would lead the long course riders on rocky, twisting trails through the Boston Mountains of the Ozark National Forest. With only nine checkpoints, there would be little room for error, and more than a few riders would be there to give BJEC champion Steve Leivan a run for the

3 points, while Steve Leivan dropped aboard SCR/Scott/ DHRacing/ NGK Yamaha WR450F after slamming into tree and bending his shift lever into flywheel cover. "I rode the next seven miles stuck in 3rd gear," Leivan said.

Loop 2 ended with a 4.5 mile section at 24 mph into another tiebreaker. Steve Leivan. Chris Tucker. Matt Lane, and Lars Valin would all zero the check. while Steve Travis and Clint Carr

> While the race thus far had been a bit more wide open and fast than BJEC riders are accustomed to, the club did manage to throw in some additional challenging terrain like Work Hill for the 3rd loop. This loop would consist of 20 miles at 24 mph.

> With Steve Leivan and Lars Valin riding on the same row, they



The first loop kicked things off with an 18 mph pace and tested the riders at the first check with an emergency tie-breaker. While many of the top riders would come in on their minute, Chris Tucker, the A-class enduro newcomer, arrived 7 seconds out of his — a close call that would cost him a critical position for the finish. Steve Travis, the BJEC veteran riding AA, bested the field with a time of :34, while Steve Leivan would follow him up with a :39. The loop ended with a very tight section back into camp. However, this final check would be tossed out due to incorrect course mileage.

The next test would take place in a 24 mph section on the 2nd loop. Check 4 saw 4 of the eventual top 5 finishers drop

treated loop 3 like a hare scramblesand turned in times of 3:04 and 3:11 at the final check, respectively. However, the best time in this test came from fast Oklahoma rider Chris Tucker on his KTM 520 with a very impressive 2:18. Matt Lane scored a 3:12 on his Dick Lane's of Grand Lake KTM 300EXC, while Steve Travis again demonstrated his experience level with a 3:45.

The points were tallied up and first place went to Steve Leivan with a score of 5, thus giving him his first victory of the season. Chris Tucker, Matt Lane, and Lars Valin all dropped 6's, with their tiebreaker points adding up to 157, 206, and 211, respectively. Steve Travis rode impressive and dropped 7, rounding out the top 5.

An Ozark Dream Come True

Vacationing in the Ozarks as a teenager possessed by the obsession of every off-road rider, I was consumed with the desire to know what it would be like to ride single track through the remote, rocky, tight tree terrain surrounding the area. With my father's family from Kissee Mills, Mo, and 10 siblings living in the Forsyth area, I have spent more than my share of time at family BBQ's, drinking, and fishing in the Ozarks. But through it all I could not help but wonder how blasting through the Ozarks would compare to the trails I frequent in Northern California. Well, thanks to both good fortune and great people, this lifelong fantasy became a reality at the Ozark Mountain Trailriders' March Poker Run!

The good fortune involved an unlikely encounter with a guy wearing a "Missouri Enduro" shirt. It happened in a Baltimore hotel gym where I was trying to get my "Senior" (by racing standards only) body in shape and Shawn Hall was beginning to rehab his severe leg break. As you might expect, the bench racing began immediately as we contrasted our Ozark and California riding experiences. Meanwhile, my dad waiting in the upstairs hotel room was growing impressed with my conditioning as the minutes rolled on. He was even more impressed (albeit only momentarily) to see that I had hardly broken a sweat from such an extended "workout." I came clean with him and shared my acquaintance with Shawn, the hour of moto-rap, and my now more heightened interest in getting my bike back to an OMTRA event.

The great people come from the fact that concerns for my father's health changed my planned May 4 motorhome/KTM Ozark vacation to a last minute plane trip in March. This meant no bike, no Ozark ride again...that is until the good-hearted and generous nature that seems so rampant in that part of the country created the opportunity of a lifetime. Between Bob Fuerst, Shawn and Aaron Roberts, it seemed as though it was raining bikes and riding opportunities. I adjusted my schedule to make the Poker Run weekend and came with great excitement to ride the fresh-cut trail the club had created for the event.

Arriving Saturday morning, I found that both Bob and Shawn had brought bikes prepared for the event and available to me. Electing to ride Shawn's EXC 300, I felt right at home on another KTM. Anxiously awaiting the 11:00 start, I tried on my borrowed boots and all the gear I could fit in my carry-on bag. (I wouldn't risk checking my gear!) I hit loop one with great enthusiasm to "blast" through the long-awaited Ozark single-track. While the enthusiasm never waned, I quickly realized that the concept of "blasting" was maybe best left in California. The Ozark way appeared to be more of "negotiating" than "blasting." Within the first couple miles I encountered mud ruts, rock steps, off-camber, tight trees on a near virgin trail. It was obvious that the approach to riding these trails was going to have to be different than the faster more established trails I frequent in California. I got my mind off of speed (at least for the time being), prepared for obstacles, and began looking for arrows, not the well-worn paths I am accustomed to.

By the end of loop one I was growing more comfortable with the bike, lightened up my death-grip and began to appreciate the unique terrain the Ozarks had to offer. The anticipation of what I would find around the next turn put a smile on my face. The loop ended

and if not for fear of validating suspicions of Californians, I would have jumped off the bike and given Shawn a hoot, holler and hug. Instead it was a big smile, thumbs up and out for another loop.

For loop two I was bound and determined to re-introduce speed into the mix. It was then that I began to understand why they call the western enduros "wide-open." With the recall of Spud labeling the trail as "moderate" and my lack of need for anything higher than second gear, I then realized that "tight sections" in California were few and far between. The idea of an entire event filled with this "moderate" or even more technical terrain made me laugh at my naivety.

A flat tire half-way through the loop also taught me that the sharp, well-grounded Ozark rock was something you had better respect. Disappointed in the thought that my ride had ended short, the Ozark hospitality had yet another surprise, this time in the form of an inner tube, thick enough to raft on, and the mechanical talents of club member Elston. Elston provided me with a tire change set-up and I began to fumble my way through the tire change. Elston would provide occasional direction to improve my obvious lack of technique and progress, until finally deciding that if he was ever going to get me out of his pit he best just change it himself...needless to say, within a couple minutes of Elston taking over, I was on my way for my third and most enjoyable loop.

The third and final loop was everything I had ever imagined it to be. I was able to hook up with Elston and others, maintain a reasonable pace, and truly enjoy the opportunity that Shawn, Bob, Elston and the Ozarks had given me.

My father is losing his battle with cancer and the likelihood of that family/moto vacation to the Ozarks will grow even more unlikely. But thanks to the OMTRA I will have a memory of riding those hills as long as I live. I sincerely hope that I get a call someday asking me to pull my spare bike out and show one of you Ozark riders around in the Sierras!

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
