August and September have been busy months, so this newsletter contains summaries of two monthly meetings. Thanks, as always, to **Karen Green** for her detailed meeting notes that make these summaries possible.

AUGUST MONTHLY MEETING

On August 18, fourteen Broomfield Spellbinders members and two candidates who will be in the September training class gathered at Brunner Farm House for our first monthly meeting of the 2023-24 school year. **Julie Toepper** introduced the opening topic (*Do you have a favorite first story of the new school year? What is it?"*) Only a few indicated regular first stories—"Skat, the Cat"; "The Three Dolls": and "Annie's Backpack"—but several indicated that they like trickster tales, especially Anansi. Julie then reminded everyone to contact "their" teachers and listed a number of possible one-time opportunities. Julie also alerted all that she has sent out a survey which we need to complete and return to her. **Sheila Brush** then entertained us with her version of "Borrowed Feathers" (an Aesop fable), which she ended by balancing a large peacock feather on her hand, finger, elbow, and nose. **Julie** then shared a folk tale, from Thailand ("A Drop of Honey") showing what could happen if a small issue went unresolved. It was a fun story with a great lesson at the end.

After a break for socializing over snacks provided by **Sheila Brush** and **Julie Toepper**, **Kay Landers** gave a presentation on "Cut and Tell Stories," demonstrating that technique while telling three tales-(1) a Halloween story about a witch's house that became a jack-o-lantern; (2) a story about a boy's dirty bedroom that housed a "Mess Monster"; and (3) a chief's teepee that became a snowflake. **Kathy Daniels** then showed four books from the library: 1) Aunt Nancy stories; 2) "The Art of the Story Teller"; 3) "Kentucky Folktales"; 4) "Bruh Rabbit and the Tar Baby Girl." **Julie** reminded all of the BCAH Gala on September 8th and **Denny Thompson** invited all to listen to another Old-Time Radio show in which he will be The Lone Ranger. **Scott Carrrico** reported that he just finished recording a new book and now has 33 books on Audible.com. If you want to listen to any of his books, you can contact him for details. **Julie** then adjourned the meeting.
