#### PREVENTING CRIME IN OUR COMMUNITY

As most of you are aware we have many cameras throughout our neighborhood that help us to deter crime. With the help of our law enforcement and our cameras, we have been very effective in apprehending criminals on our streets, but we need everyone's assistance to continue this. If you see something, say **something!** It seems like a simple concept, but many people do not. Help is mostly a phone call away and that is what our 911 alert is for. If you see suspicious activity or hear something out of the ordinary, please call 911. Many incidences where neighbors have called 911, the operators have alerted our officers who may already be on our streets or close by to respond quickly. Most people hesitate to call because they are not sure how serious the situation might be but that is for them and the officers to decide. Imagine if you did not call and something happened to a loved one or a neighbor that you might have been able to help and or prevent.

We have talked about this many times before, but it bears repeating, take all valuables out of your car and **LOCK THE DOORS**. Most car thefts are from criminals simply opening an unlocked door and not smashing a window for entry. Also, if you have ever driven through at night, you see many houses that are pitch black. Having outdoor lights on a motion detector to come

on with movement is a great crime prevention. For inside your house, it can be as simple as having lamps set on timers to go on and off at random times if you are away from home. Most criminals avoid breaking into a home if they think that someone is inside. Burglars are also looking for places to hide so keeping shrubs trimmed and away from windows is always a good prevention tip. If you are coming home late at night, keep an eye out for someone who could be following you. If you suspect you are being followed, call 911 and avoid pulling into your driveway, its best to drive around some to see if they continue to follow. Keep windows in your house locked at all times and if you don't have security pins on your windows, you can easily install those yourself or ask a handyman to do it for you. Depending on your type of windows, additional security pins help from the window being forced open from the outside. Our neighborhood police officers have volunteered to meet with each individual homeowner at their home to go over tips and prevention to keep you and your home safe. Also, if you need to report something that might have been caught on one of our cameras, please do it immediately! Try to remember timing and dates are very helpful. Our camera footage is saved for 2 weeks and then it records over.

Our speed limit in the neighborhood is 25 MPH and many people, both visitors and residents are going WAY OVER THAT! We all need to realize how dangerous this is with people out walking with kids and pets and children playing, especially during the summer months. If you are someone who speeds, please note the police officers and neighborhood cameras are noticing. The police security officers who work our neighborhood have been talking to those violators as a warning but will now be issuing tickets. If you have guests who regularly come for a visit, please speak to them about this issue and ask them to slow down and obey the law. Speeding signs are clearly posted around the neighborhood. Also please note that we have stop signs neighbors are running as well. The signs say STOP, not slow down.
