Blue Christmas

The season of Advent is that time of waiting and anticipating the arrival — that is what Advent means, "arrival" or "visit" — of Emmanuel, God with us. The incarnation, where divine love takes on human form, is both a joyous and deeply meaningful event. Yet, like the incarnation itself, this season is filled with complex emotions. Alongside the promise of new life and our awe over the King of Kings, we also acknowledge the frailty and struggles of being human, including grief and loss. The image of God coming to us as a vulnerable infant reminds us that our relationships with God and with each other are

woven together with joy and sorrow, and God's love and divine grace.

Even as we celebrate the birth of Christ, we are called to recognize and honor the grief carried by our brothers and sisters whose relationships have been lost through death or altered by other forms of loss or separation. For many of us, the holiday season can be a bittersweet time, where moments of joy are shadowed by feelings of grief, loneliness, or distress. These emotions may emerge suddenly or build as the holidays approach. In a culture that often pressures us to "put on a happy face," this can make the holidays a difficult time.

For this reason, many churches hold what is called a Blue Christmas or Longest Night service, some time in December. This service can be a beautiful, communal experience, where the full range of human emotions, including sorrow, are welcome. By acknowledging grief in worship, we defy the isolation that pain and loneliness can foster.

Throughout Scripture, especially in the Psalms and Lamentations, we find examples of God's people openly expressing their grief and lament in community. Psalm 130, for example, uses deeply personal "I" language but is also meant to be sung by groups of believers, reflecting both individual and communal sorrow. Similarly, the book of Lamentations blends individual pain with a collective voice, showing that our personal grief is intertwined with the experiences of the broader community. In sharing our sorrows within the safety of the worshiping community, we find strength and solidarity. Blue Christmas services offer an opportunity to lean on God's love, trusting that grace meets us in our vulnerability, guiding us toward healing and wholeness with God, ourselves, our neighbors, and creation. And hopefully, in the process of acknowledging our laments, we find solace and experience God's comforting presence.

If any of this speaks to your heart, or if you know someone you feel would benefit from being in worship with others who are there to care for them, the Rinn Blue Christmas Service is Tuesday night, 12/17 at 7:00pm. We will explore Biblical Lament and healthy ways of expressing our grief without losing our faith. Even if you are not experiencing grief this year, you might consider coming to the service to pray with and support others who are.

May God bless our caring community!

A Very Special Sunday Service December 15

This holiday season, we will be blessed to experience a musical gem from the past with the choir's presentation of the rare and unique Christmas cantata, *The Prince of Peace*. Composed in 1895 by the esteemed composer Emma Louise Ashford, this timeless piece is set to enchant audiences with its rich history and beautiful harmonies.

Despite its historical significance and past acclaim, *The Prince of Peace* has no existing recordings today, making this performance a rare treat for music lovers and history enthusiasts alike. Anneke discovered the music for it tucked away on a back shelf in a closet in the church's choral library. She says, "When I played through the score I couldn't help but be charmed by it," describing it as a "lovely little sacred operetta in a classical European style, but some elements are distinctly American."

E. L. Ashford, a child prodigy who became an internationally known classical composer of the late Romantic era, wrote between 600 and 700 works including hymns, anthems, song cycles, and hundreds of organ pieces. The Prince of Peace was among her early works, written in 1895 at the encouragement of Edmund S. Lorenz, who had recently founded Lorenz Publishing Company (now Lorenz Corporation). Ashford's contributions as an editor, arranger and composer played a key role in the company's success over the next 36 years. This, her first cantata, was evidently popular, as its copyright was renewed in 1923, and it was later published in a version for three parts in 1940.

This cantata has a history at Rinn, though it hasn't been performed here since 1948. When the music was handed out to the choir, several singers discovered printed bulletins inside their folios, left there from the 1948 performance—and it turns out that Helen Anderson, Scott and Shelly's grandmother, was the soprano soloist back then! Scott and Shelly will be doing homage to their grandmother when they sing their own solos this year.

Mark your calendars and be sure to make it to church on Sunday, December 15, 2024, at 9:30 a.m. Don't miss this opportunity to be part of a living history experience and to enjoy the beautiful music of an era gone by!

PLEASE DON'T LET DOWN YOUR GUARD AGAINST THE SCAMMERS

Unfortunately, even in the Christmas season, scammers are trying to target churches and church members specifically. As we prepare for the coming of the Prince of Peace, we also

need to be aware of the danger.

Jesus said, "I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of wolves, so be wise as serpents and innocent as doves." Let's follow those teachings and watch out for the online scammers. Here are some things you can do that take time and attention, but are good habits to develop to thwart the baddies:

- 1. Check the email addresses you are responding to. Make sure it is the one you know is correct. This might require looking it up in the directory, but might save you some headaches down the road.
 - 2. Don't click on links in emails unless you are 100% sure the links are legitimate.
- 3. Don't send any information to ANYONE without first checking the email address and verifying that it is one you know is safe.
- 4. Make sure your own online information is password protected!!!! If you have trouble remembering your passwords, write them down and keep them in a safe place. Don't use passwords like 1234 or 1111 they are too easy to crack!
- 5. Don't call phone numbers sent in emails unless you know they are legitimate. Please check the directory to make sure you are not calling one of the scammers. If you didn't get a directory, call the office and one will be printed out for you. Sorry, but we do not send out digital copies of the directory.
- 6. Remember, no one from the church will send you an email asking for gift cards. That is not how we get our gift cards, so please don't respond to those email scams!
- 7. Pray for the scammers and pray also that we recognize the scams when we see them.

 Our God is bigger than the biggest scam!!


