Carolyn Cox, Family First Consulting on behalf of the Workforce Collaborative:

The Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery (DBHR) is adding Recovery to their scope to coincide with the TR Lawsuit. The new name of the Workforce Collaborative will be the " Washington State Workforce Collaborative Behavioral Health" (WSWCBH). WSWCBH is looking to troubleshoot problems with trainings, locations where the training should be located, what format should the training be in, etc. The West side of Washington is having trouble getting timely trainings, but our side is doing ok. There is a shortness of therapists and psychologists across the State. The WSWCBH is looking into incentives for college students entering the field. They are also looking into retention ideas to be able to keep therapists and psychologists in the field. They are prioritizing for the TR Lawsuit to accommodate timelines. The next meeting will look at rolling out next trainings on the agenda. Carolyn mentioned she will email a list of acronyms and the meeting notes from the WSWCBH meeting to be forwarded to FYSPT attendees. \*see attached

Report from Chris Hoag, Mental Health Ombuds:

Mental Health Ombuds, Inc. holds a contract with Greater Columbia Behavioral Health (GCBH) Regional Support Network (RSN) to advocate for Medicaid-eligible mental health consumers by protecting client rights and helping consumers navigate the Grievance and Appeal processes. MHOI also consists of the Quality Review Team, which surveys Providers, Consumers and Allied Agencies about the quality of Mental Health services throughout the GCBH service area.

Chris presented an overview of the results of the Quality Review Team Annual Report that was presented to the Regional Advisory Board (RAB) earlier this month. Chris agreed to forward the report to FYSPT members so they can review it in depth. \*see attached

Report from JJ Hiebert, Family Tri-Lead reported on State FYSPT meeting:

The State FYSPT talked about various house bills that are going through legislation that support Mental Health services. The State FYSPT talked about the diversity of the Regional FYSPTs and Region's. The State FYSPT is in the process of building back up. They are working on becoming more youth and family friendly.

Jackie Davidson recommended the Tri-Leads attending the State FYSPRT meeting write a summary of the State FYSPRT to bring back to the Regional FYSPRT, so it can be handed out for the FYSPRT attendees to read. The FYSPRT Tri-Leads agreed.

Travis Rybarski, Youth Tri-Lead:

Presented the Doodle Poll results and discussed the best day and time for a Regional FYSPRT meeting. The group voted to accept the Doodle Poll Results.

Robert Haffner, Family Tri-Lead:

Presented on the two surveys the FYSPRT conducted across the Region.

The primary need identified from the surveys was to expand participation across the region. Currently, only Benton, Franklin and Walla Walla Counties participated in the poll. In order to get a true Needs Assessment of the region, we must get participation from ALL counties. Robert stated that he personally wants to get more counties familiar with what and who the FYSPRT is.

Jackie Davidson recommended we develop a Benton/Franklin County Local FYSPRT to provide a more balanced Regional FYSPRT.

Robert Haffner offered to share his WADADs table at Health Fairs across Yakima County with the FYSPRT Convener, Amanda, in order to share the news about FYSPRTs.

The group unanimously voted to accept the results from the Surveys so the Convener (Amanda Cawmer) can move forward in writing the Needs Assessment Report for the FYSPRT deliverables.

## A. Background: TR Settlement Agreement

### Background

*TR vs. Quigley and Teeter*, a Medicaid lawsuit regarding intensive children's mental health services for youth, was filed in November 2009. The lawsuit was based on federal EPSDT (Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment) statutes, requiring states to provide any medically necessary services and treatment to youth, even if the services have not been provided in the past. After several years of negotiations, a full settlement agreement was reached with the plaintiffs. With this settlement agreement, Washington has committed to build a mental health system that will bring this law to life for all young Medicaid beneficiaries who need intensive mental health services in order to grow up healthy in their own homes, schools, and communities.

### Who is in the Class (and thus eligible for Wraparound with Intensive Services)?

All persons under the age of 21 who now or in the future:

1. Meet or would meet the State of Washington's Title XIX Medicaid financial eligibility criteria;
2. Have a mental illness or condition;
3. Have a functional impairment, which substantially interferes with or substantially limits the ability to function in the family, school or community setting; and
4. For whom intensive mental health services provided in the home and community based would address or ameliorate a mental illness or condition.

### What the State Has Agreed to Do

- Improve Identification, Screening, Referral and Assessment
- Develop Wraparound with Intensive Services (WISe) for Statewide Implementation
- Increase Evidence and Research Based Practices statewide
- Improve Transitions and Continuity of Care
- Provide Cross System Workforce Development and Training
- Improve Due Process for Class Members
- Improve Governance Structure and Collaboration
- Improve Quality Management, Transparency and Accountability

### Goals

To have a mental health system that will:

- a) Identify, screen and link eligible youth to the WISe program.
- b) Communicate to families, youth and stakeholders about the nature and purposes of the WISe program and services, who is eligible for the program, and how to gain access to the WISe program and services regardless of the point of entry or referral source.

- c) Provide timely statewide mental health services and supports within a Medicaid structure that are sufficient in intensity and scope, based on available evidence of effectiveness, and are individualized to each youth's needs consistent with the WISe program model.
- d) Employ a system of continuous quality improvement, including measures and procedures that support the continual improvement of quality; clear understanding of outcomes and costs; and transparency and accountability to families, youths, and stakeholders.
- e) Afford due process to youth denied services.
- f) Coordinate delivery of services and supports among child-serving agencies and providers to participants in order to improve the effectiveness of services and improve outcomes for families and youth.
- g) Reduce fragmentation of services for youth, avoid duplication and redundancies, and lower costs by improving collaboration among child-serving agencies (see the MOU in Appendix E);
- h) Support workforce development and infrastructure necessary for adequate education, training, coaching and mentoring of providers, youth and families.
- i) Maintain a collaborative governance structure that includes child-serving agencies, youth and families, and other stakeholders.
- j) Minimize hospitalizations and out-of-home placements.

He stated that he will miss working with the FYSPRT but looks forward to seeing us at the State FYSPRT meetings in the future.

**Quorum:** There is a major Behavioral Health Conference today, so we are missing a large percentage of our usual FYSPRT attendees and members. These absences are excused, as they made arrangements to miss the FYSPRT meeting beforehand. The Co-Leads did consider cancelling today's meeting, but felt that would slow momentum down. We are not at quorum, so any voting matters will need to wait until the next FYSPRT meeting July 28, 2016.

**Acronym Challenge, Part 1 – Jill Mulhausen, System Partner Co-Lead**

The acronym challenge is an exercise to develop an acronym dictionary for use at the FYSPRT. This exercise will be on-going, and can be added to at any time. Please write down any acronyms you hear throughout a meeting. At the end of the meeting, we will break into groups for an acronym challenge.

**Open Forum for Area Needs – Robert Haffner, Family Partner Co-Lead**

Each FYSPRT we hold an open forum to discuss the area's needs for serving youth with mental healthcare needs.

Janet: Chelsea Armstrong from [visittricity.com](http://visittricity.com) is looking to get the "Saying it Out Loud" conference to the Tri-Cities Spring of 2017. Chelsea is looking for letters of support to bring this conference to the area. Janet brought copies of the letter that she wrote in support of this conference to today's meeting for FYSPRT attendees who feel compelled to support this cause. She encouraged us to emphasize the need to have it in South East Washington. Amanda suggested creating a FYSPRT letter of support. The group agreed to vote on this matter at the next meeting, when we have the ability to vote.

Robin: OSPI is redoing the measurements of social-emotional learning standards. They are inviting public input through July 1, 2016. Robin will email the information to the FYSPRT so we can provide input.

Jill: Her school does a healthy kids survey and mentioned that Kennewick School District does not ask youth about their sexuality at all.

Janie: Enterprise has created a safe place for LGBT youth. They have great needs. How can we as a group support those needs?

Alyssa: Alyssa has taken youth that are LGBT to two Unity churches in Yakima as a way to offer youth support and a safe place during this difficult time.

David and Susan: David and Susan introduced themselves and what their job is with Disability Rights Washington in working with the TR Lawsuit. Jeanette stated that we as a FYSPRT really do need to capitalize on the State's willingness to listen to Youth and Family Voice.

Susan: Catholic Family Services are experiencing the same challenge of serving children who are low functioning and have extreme emotional needs. The families often cannot afford one-on-one workers. There is a push to accept Evidence-Based Practices.

Sara mentioned as a Special Education teacher, they experience the same challenge. She stated the challenge of becoming a BCBA is there is only one place in Washington that offers the BCBA program, and they are still working on becoming accredited. Penn State has an online program.

JJ mentioned that her son experienced challenges, and they didn't receive the help her son needed.

Jill mentioned that she is working with students trying to get them into a Rehab facility and is facing obstacles. Both students are willing to go to a rehabilitation facility, but we don't have a youth facility in our area (Tri-Cities) and NO detox facilities in our county. In April 30, 2016, a rule was passed that if you are state funded, you have to go to a Detox and Rehabilitation facility in our own region/county. The lack of providers leads to lack of services, which takes away the precious momentum that youth have in trying to become sober.

Jeanette added that wraparound is meant to meet ALL needs no matter the severity. Persistence and an unconditional commitment to get there is what the need. We can education and support those around the individual in need, so that when the window opens, we have something to offer.

Resource Drive – Travis Rybarski, Youth Co-Lead

During the last meeting we discussed holding a Resource Drive in the following areas:

- 1) Services that support LGBT Youth in the Community
- 2) Suicide Prevention Services
- 3) Substance Use Services for youth
- 4) Private Pay Mental Healthcare options for youth

Travis and Jill led the group in announcing the number of resources they brought for each subject. We met our goal and exceeded it! Amanda (the convener) is going to put together the information and bring it to the next FYSPRT meeting in July. At that time we as a FYSPRT will decide if we need to gather more resources or if we have gathered all the data needed.

#### Community Partner Presentation – Sara Rodgers, PFLAG Benton-Franklin

PFLAG has monthly support meetings each month. PFLAG is for Parents, Families, Friends and Allies United with LGBTQ People to Move equality forward. PFLAG is not religiously or politically affiliated. PFLAG has done community activities such as family bowling night, put on a skating night, presented a Trans 101 class, Training on “Is Your Business LGBT friendly?” and much more. They will be participating in Convoy of Hope and future LGBT outreach opportunities. They also to submit opinions to the Tri-City Herald in the Editorial section in order to spread awareness. PFLAG has offered free trainings at the Court Club, ESD 1-2-3, Lifequest, etc. PFLAG has tried to partner with ALL schools in the areas, and has a successful partnership with Enterprise Middle School. They have also contacted the local police departments in the areas as well as Allied Training for WSU-Tri-Cities. They work to lower the prevalence of youth suicide in LGBT youth. PFLAG is specifically for Benton-Franklin counties but they are looking to broaden their support to nearby areas, such as Walla Walla. PFLAG has teamed up with many difference agencies in the area to host a candle light vigil after the attacks in Orlando. They also hosted a night of honoring the victims that were lost in Orlando. PFLAG is looking to create a more-visible community within the area so that the LGBTQ Community has a support system in place and don't feel alone.

Ronnie mentioned that youth need a place to go, a door to open, to talk to someone for advice, hope, etc. Out on the Street does offer peer support, but there isn't one place to go for youth support. Quest is now functioning as an organization without walls, trying to support existing services in the area. Peer and youth mention that they need peer -mentoring services. The LGBTQ community is very limited in resources and leadership. The PRIDE foundation is a support organization for the services and organizations that are already in existence. Their grants requests are due July 1, 2016.

  - a. Chaney Mobley and Tacie Fitch shared their families experience in trying to receive CLIP placement for their children. Both of their children are diagnosed with Reactive Attachment Disorder (RAD) and are struggle with violent/aggressive behaviors towards themselves and others. Both Chaney and Tacie stated their children were denied the services needed, so they had to find services in Montana to serve their children. They both stated that they feel the process for applying for CLIP placement needs to be reviewed by the FYSPRT and changed.
  - b. Tacie reiterated that schools need to offer serious mental health services for youth.
  - c. Chaney stated that we need crisis beds available to South East Washington.
  - d. Ronni Batchelor stated that the lack of mental health services/crisis services is a path that leads to the penal system.
  - e. Cindy Adams asked the group if Adoption Support offers any services. Tacie and Chaney stated that Adoption Support “depends on the State.”
  - f. Carolyn Cox recommended we invite Coordinated Care to FYSPRT.
  - g. Carolyn spoke on behalf of a family who could not attend the FYSPRT today. Her message was “There is a challenge with private therapists who advertise on the websites that they offer “trauma” treatment, but who won’t actually see youth because they are “too traumatized.” Carolyn stated that our therapists in town need access to higher levels of therapy training for Crisis situations.
    - i. Amanda Crawmer reminded the group that WISE therapists work with youth regardless of age, crisis situations, etc.
    - ii. Jeanette Barnes recommended that the FYSPRT craft a letter to request more Crisis Training for therapists in our Region.

    - i. State FYSVRT Business: The State FYSVRT asked the Regional FYSVRT to respond to the following six questions:
      1. What is working well in the Regional FYSVRT?  
It was agreed that we have a small group of dedicated attendees at the FYSVRT, and we have excellent Family Voice represented at the table.
      2. What challenges are being addressed regionally?  
We just finished a Resource Drive to evaluate the resources available in our Region. We as a FYSVRT are looking to continue expanding the resource drive results so we can fully understand the resources in our region. We are also looking to boost youth engagement with the Regional FYSVRT by looking into incentives that could be offered to youth for participation.
      3. What challenges would you like to discuss further at the Statewide FYSVRT?  
We have heard the concern from the community around the need to offer more crisis training for therapists and counselors in the region. We see this as a huge need.
      4. Are the WISE Information Sheets and the WISE Overview Video being used? What, if anything, can be improved on to make them more helpful?  
As a FYSVRT, we have not seen the WISE video or sheets. It was recommended that we add the reviewing of these to the agenda for our August FYSVRT.
      5. If your region is using information, techniques and materials on the WISE (created by your region) to educate youth and families (either about what WISE is or what youth and families can expect from the

WISe process), please share the materials with us and specify how the information is being shared or distributed.

To our knowledge, there are no additional materials being used to inform families and youth about the WISe program in our region.

Amanda Crawmer stated that she would investigate this topic by reaching out to the area directors in the region.

6. Do Regional FYSPRT members feel *they* have adequate information and understanding of WISe? Are there specific gaps in information that you need assistance with?

We do not feel like we have adequate information about the WISe. We will request a more thorough presentation about WISe from the WISe FYSPRT representative. Carolyn Cox requested if we could receive data on any WISe satisfaction surveys that have come in from the Region.

- b. Carolyn Cox, Family First Consulting and Workforce Collaborative shared that they are looking to find reimbursement options for families who participate in the Workforce Collaborative.
  - c. Chris Hoag, Ombuds: Chris announced that he works for Ombuds for Mental Health services. Since April 1, 2016, Ombuds can now service concerns regarding mental healthcare services AND substance use services. Please contact Chris at (509) 783-7333 if you have a complaint. Ombuds is open Monday through Friday from 8am to 5pm.
  - d. WISe Report: Amanda shared the Community Collaborative plan for the WISe reporting. She will attend meetings held at Greater Columbia Behavioral Health Organization (GCBHO) and communicate the results back to the Regional FYSPRT.

  - d. A vote was taken and the Regional FYSPRT unanimously accepted the meeting minutes.
2. Open Forum to Discuss Area Needs by Family Co-Lead Robert Haffner: Open forum is an opportunity for FYSPRT attendees to share their experiences and challenges around the mental healthcare offered to youth in South East Washington. Robert requested that we share our experiences in a way that is appropriate for all ages and stages of recovery, so we don't accidentally trigger someone else's trauma.
  - a. Janie: There is a gap in services for youth in the LGBTQ community whose family's income is "too high" for Medicaid. These youth need access to counselors, services and medications, but are the families cannot afford to pursue these treatments. Some treatments are Medicaid only.
    - i. Ruvine mentioned that children are allowed to have an income at 300% of the poverty level.
  - b. Ruvine: When we treat women/young ladies, we need to do a hormone level panel before medicating, as some medications may not be necessary.
  - c. Tacie: Updated the group on her son's progress since the last meeting. Her son is home from the facility in Montana, and they are experiencing a gap in service. Her some has dual insurances. They had medication management in place before he left treatment, but they are struggling to access medication management here in town because the wait time is so long. They have been connected to the WISE program, but are being told they cannot use their private insurance to pay for the WISE program, and Medicaid won't pay for the WISE program because they have a primary insurance. They are also being told that they must use a WISE therapist to be enrolled in the program, and are reluctant to leave their therapist who has a long successful history of working with her son. Tacie is working with Disability Rights Washington to try and resolve these challenges.
    - i. Andrea: Offered to visit with Tacie re: the WISE program to help their family access services.
  - d. Amanda: Offered follow-up from last meeting's discussion regarding access to CLIP facilities. Jackie Davidson will be attending our October FYSPRT and will present on the process applying/getting accepted into a CLIP facility. We can respectfully bring our questions to her at this meeting.

- e. Cindy: Psychiatrists are focused on psychiatric medications and not general care, which is why Care Coordination is so important.
  - f. Sally: Remember to build a good relationship with your pharmacist, because when multiple physicians are working to prescribe medications, it can be difficult to track medication interactions. The pharmacist can help you avoid a medication mishap.
  - g. Liz: In Juvenile Justice, they are experiencing barriers in that youth who do not have Medicaid are not receiving the Mental Healthcare they need.
  - h. Robert: We need to offer Trauma Services for youth.
  - i. Tacie: We need better Crisis Response services for youth. We need crisis beds for youth. We need therapists who will work with youth that are traumatized.
  - j. Ruvine: Trauma and Crisis workers need education around mental health symptoms.
  - k. Tacie: Schools need to fully meet the needs of youth.
  - l. Sally: Sally's Granddaughter experienced "the school trying to do everything they could to chase her out of the school district rather than addressing her needs."
  - m. Joel: These stories really resonate with our families experiences. As families who navigate very complex systems and resources, it would be nice if there was something that everyone could go to as a resource to help navigate everything.
    - i. Robert: That's here! That's what a FYSPRT is!
3. Resource Drive presented by Family Co-Lead Robert Haffner
- a. Last meeting we asked the Regional FYSPRT to submit any additional resources to the Resource Guide. Do we want to continue to work on this resource guide? Or do we want to wrap up this project and review it periodically as we discover new resources?
  - b. Are we happy with the amount of resources we discovered for youth who are LGBTQ? Do we want to create a workgroup to continue to serve LGBTQ youth who receive mental healthcare services in South East Washington?

- d. Family First Consulting, Brandy Moreno: Carolyn Cox has received the Executive Director position for Washington State Community Connectors (WSCC). Her position on the FYSPRT will transition from Family First to representing WSCC. Brandy will be attending the Regional FYSPRT on behalf of Family First Consulting.
- e. WISE Collaborative Update, Amanda Crawmer: In our region we have 250 clients enrolled in WISE. Our January 2017 Benchmark is 300, and we are on track to reach that goal.     - 1. Sally stated that the WISE Information Video needs to have a descriptive audio option for those who have a visual impairment.

    - 1. Andrea stated that the WISE information fliers are being used at Lutheran Community Services (LCS) and Juvenile Justice but they could be used more frequently.
  - iii. Question and Answer time with Andrea Peyton, WISE Support Coordinator
    - 1. Question: Is WISE only for intensive clients? Isn't that just 2% of the mental health clients? Answer: WISE is the most intensive program, but it is available to many clients in Washington. All they need to do is

screen in eligible via the Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths (CANS). The least restrictive mental health services are outpatient services – such as Lourdes therapy/medication management. The next step is 3 Rivers Wraparound and the last step before CLIP is the WISE Program. It is specifically created to keep youth in their home and out of CLIP placement.

2. Question: How is the WISE program different from Wraparound?  
Answer: It has the therapy element and it is more intense. They are both fidelity Wraparound.
  3. Question: Is respite available through WISE? Answer: No.
  4. Question: Who can refer to the WISE Program? Answer: Anyone can.
  5. Question: Where do we call for a referral? Answer: You can call the agency that will be providing it (LCS, for example) or the Behavior Health Organization (Greater Columbia Behavioral Health Organization).
  6. Question: Can a Court order WISE? Answer: No. It is 100% a voluntary program.
  7. Question: How are schools being informed of the WISE program?  
Answer: Internal outreach from agencies, presentations, staff presentations and Communities in Schools Programs. Teachers and staff are also learning about the program as they participate in WISE Wraparound meetings with their students.
  8. Question: Do WISE providers across the region get together to connect and help each other during the WISE Implementation? Answer: The Family Organizations have in the past participated in conference calls to address concerns/challenges and share successes. Additionally, the WISE Clinical Directors have conference calls twice a month.

  - a. Housing for teen parents/pregnant teens is a major crisis in our area. Young Hispanic teen moms are especially impacted by this shortage.
  - b. Documentation for rent can be a challenge. Behavioral health and "big behaviors" in youth is also a challenge for families in getting/keeping their housing. Some landlords are reluctant to rent to single mothers, families with mental healthcare needs.
  - c. WISE Surveys and WISE reports: The FYSPRT is supposed to be evaluating the WISE Surveys and WISE reports at each meeting, yet we haven't received anything to review. How do we get these reports/surveys?
  - d. Schools: teachers don't know how to help students who have mental health challenges. Some teachers add to the meltdown, because they don't know how to deescalate. Should we advocate for a "For Youth, By Youth" training by students to help teach the teachers? The Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction has a program called Compassion at Schools, by Ron Curtell. Are we using this program here in our region?
  - e. Millennials in Action offers a peer training on Trauma-Informed Care. New Horizons is working on the Millennials in Action program.

2. FYSPRT Work Group Updates:
  - a. LGBTQ+ Catalyst Work Group: LGBTQ Workgroup Update: We discussed the huge mental health needs that are present in our community and throughout Washington in regards to the LGBTQ+ Community. Primarily we talked about “if the youth aren’t getting mental health support at home, where can they turn?” Our main answer was at their schools, following by in the community. We then discussed how to build supports at schools ad at communities. Some of these resources included PFLAG, Pride Foundation, Mid-Columbia Pride, our agency, other affirming mental health professionals, Jordan Chaney, and local affirming businesses (Confluent, Fuse, &Yet, etc.)

Our main solution for making schools more helpful and useful in regards to mental health needs for LGBTQ+ youth was to educate them and build support groups (“Equality Clubs.”) For our first steps, Ronnie will be speaking with Amanda Crawmer about engaging Jordan Chaney to garner his support and to help us reach out to schools and Janie will seek out what schools we can start to educate and help to build “Equality Clubs,” specifically local middle schools and then building to high schools. I have also offered my services for LGBTQ+ education presentations for staff and PTO/PTA groups.

Please let us know if you are interested in joining our LBGTQ+ workgroup.

- b. State FYSPRT Conversation: WISe Referral Process

- i. Are there obstacles to helping families get through the WISE referral process? If yes, please summarize some of the obstacles encountered.
  - ii. What is (or could be) done to help youth and families get through the process most easily?
- c. Feedback from LCSNW:

Please welcome, Tiffany Moss, who is the WISE Support Coordinator at LCSNW. Thank you for coming to share about the WISE referral process at LCSNW. She helps oversee WISE Referrals and Intake at LCSNW.

Obstacles from LCSNW Management: The System we use to provide the CANS Assessment (BHAS) is malfunctions and can cause obstacles. Another obstacle is Medicaid eligibility: a youth cannot access services until Medicaid is active. Access to phones/transportations/translation services can slow down the referral and intake process. We would like to see clients getting referred to WISE earlier before crisis gets big.

Ideas that LCSNW has thought of to help with these challenges: Create a walk-in referral day where families can walk-in for referral. Build an assessment and referral position: someone who's sole job is referral and assessments. Ensuring all agencies in the community know about WISE and how to refer to WISE.

Tiffany: "At LCSNW we are constantly changing our process to make it more fluid and family friendly. The youth must be on Medicaid and qualify for a mental healthcare diagnosis. Anyone can fill out a referral for the youth, a friend, provider, youth, family, etc. The form is filled out, it goes to the referral and intake specialist at LCSNW and then the family is called. Then we meet with the family and discuss what WISE is and evaluate whether they meet the criteria for WISE. Then a CANS screen is done which tells us whether the youth is appropriate for WISE Services. At that point, if it is evident that they will qualify for WISE, we can go directly into the assessment and enrollment. Once enrollment is complete, the following Friday they are assigned to a Care Coordinator which is when the program support begins. Once a Care Coordinator is assigned, they are contacted within a day to setup their first meeting."

Questions, Answer and Comment time for FYSPRT members to Tiffany Moss re: intake and referrals:

Comments:

- Making business cards with QR Code linked to the WISE video.
- Phoenix High School could do an official project about WISE to help spread the word.
- As a FYSPRT, we can help spread the word about WISE. WISE is still in the roll-out stage, it is changing and adapting to the needs.

- WISE has been around for two years—We are working on getting the word out about WISE, but it takes time.
- The process of connecting to counseling/WISE etc. should be sped up. Not everyone may be able to persevere through the process of referral.
- The crisis people that meet with people when they attempt suicide – they need to recommend services like WISE
- Hospitals need to refer suicidal youth to counselors IMMEDIATELY. That isn't happening. There is a 6 month wait list to get into Lourdes, even for youth who are suicidal.
- Two youth feel that there needs to be emergency access to this program.
- We discussed the Youth In Crisis Medicaid Act dream, and the need to make something like this happen.
- Peer support in the hospitals would be useful!!!
- Fliers aren't useful. The personal conversation is most useful.
- Add WISE information into the health education classes? In JJC, Ansil Hall, Group homes, etc. before the Crisis.
- A majority of hospitals do have special floors that specialist in helping those who have attempted suicide. If organizations such as WISE went and shared about what they do, it would help more people. Schools: If they are able to get teens/young or adults, it may get the word to other young adults to help address the issue.
- The best testimony is when you have both sides: someone who went through WISE successfully and someone who needed WISE but didn't receive it/it wasn't around.
- There needs to be follow up after suicide attempts.

#### Questions:

- Referring to the hospital and the Phoenix High School: Could we advocate to the hospitals about the WISE program?
  - What ages are eligible for WISE? Answer: Up to 21.
  - Homeless youth: I heard a lot of stuff about family support. How does the family work when they don't have family support?
  - How can we lessen Case Loads? People in the hospitals have large workloads, so they don't know about WISE and are overworked. No answer given.
  - If you don't have access to Medicaid, you can't access the program? Answer: You must have Medicaid to get the program. If you would qualify for Medicaid and don't have it yet, we can help support you in getting the Medicaid.
3. Open Forum to Discuss Area Needs: Open forum is an opportunity for FYSPRT attendees to share their experiences and challenges around the mental healthcare offered to youth in South East Washington. Due to extensive discussion around area needs during our previous topic of the WISE referral and intake process, we are bypassing this part of the agenda.
  4. Community Partner Presentation: Jackie Davidson, Greater Columbia Behavior Health Organization (GCBHO) on Child Long-term Inpatient Programs (CLIP)

CLIP is a long term hospitalization program for youth needing extended inpatient care. There are four CLIP facilities in the State of Washington. None exist in our region, although that could change.

When someone goes to a CLIP facility, it is usually for 3-9 months. Work is happening to shorten the CLIP stays, which is why the stays are down to 3-9 months from stays that were previously more than a year long. Youth at CLIP are away from their homes, families, schools and communities. This is challenging – while it is needed for some. CLIP is treatment, not placement. CLIP is a comprehensive treatment that includes Medicine management, family participation, therapy, etc. CLIP facilities have school inside the program.

Keeping families intact is so important. Our goal as a community should be to develop these resources within our community.

The Children's Committee has been discussing the confusion around CRU. What can they do? What will they do? The Children's Committee will be bringing in the various crisis units in the area to discuss what their purposes and functions. The FYSVRT would like to see a policy change that any child with a Behavioral Health need be automatically be eligible for Medicaid.
