This had been a significant part of our first Pastor, Henry Melchior Muhlenberg's, ministry. Muhlenberg desired to preach and teach both the mind and the heart. For Muhlenberg, and for us, the Christian faith is a living relationship with God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. To have a healthy relationship with anyone, we need to know that person. That is why we have seminary-trained individuals leading Sunday School and teaching the First Holy Communion and Confirmation Classes as well as the Adult Bible Study. At Augustus we have a chance to get to know God better.

And as we get to know God better, our life is changed and so is our relationship with other people. We seek ways to help others who could not possibly return our kindness. We help our neighbors in need through the Daily Bread Food Pantry by collecting food each Sunday and providing Easter baskets. We host a Turkey Dinner to benefit our missionaries in Tanzania who have helped the Neo-Natal Intensive Care Unit of the Arusha Lutheran Medical Center save so many lives. Each month volunteers from Augustus provide a full, nutritious dinner for our hungry neighbors at the Norristown Soup Kitchen at St. John's Episcopal Church. Indeed, this program was started by the people of Trinity Lutheran Church when it was on DeKalb Street. The program was so needed that within a year it has outgrown the facilities at Trinity and moved to St. John's. (Trinity still participates there after decades of service!)

Getting to know God better and growing in a relationship with him is a true blessing. Keep up the good work.

WHAT'S THE WORRY?

Jesus knows our nature. He knows we're prone to worry. Perhaps that's why he warned:

"Therefore, I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more important than food, and the body more important than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your Heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life?" (Matthew 6:25-27)

In spite of these words of both admonition and assurance, Christians still tend to worry. Sometimes worry about the ability to provide for our families takes over our lives to such an extent that it guides our thoughts and actions. We put off giving to the Lord through our church – "temporarily," we say – until we feel secure in our financial situations. Life, as you know, seems to throw one crisis after another at us, and, often, that financial security never comes.

We have the same worry when it comes to serving. We complain that we just don't have time. We work long hours, and then we have commitments to our families. How can we go to meetings or make meals for a family whose mom is sick?

Later, we tell God and even ourselves. Later, when the college tuitions are paid and the kids are out of the house. Then we'll have time and money. But then, after all that hard work, don't I deserve to get away and take a nice, long cruise?

We reap what we sow, we read in 2 Corinthians 9:6. What are you sowing? Proverbs 11:18 reads,

"He who sows righteousness reaps a sure reward." Matthew 6:19-21 records Jesus' words, "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on Earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in Heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where you treasure is, there your heart will be also."

Is it forgetfulness of God's promises or lack of faith that keeps us stuck in this pattern of giving all for our physical, temporal lives instead of storing up treasures in Heaven. Take God at his Word: give generously, serve without reward, take time to help others, and watch him satisfy your every need.

Giving God our First Priority

Have you ever worked and worked to see very little result from your big efforts? In the Old Testament book of Haggai, the work of God's people was producing no fruit. They toiled in the fields, but there was no harvest. God was upset with them so he made their efforts fruitless. Because their priorities were focused only on themselves rather than God, God "called for a drought on the fields and the mountains" (Haggai 1:11). He even "blew away" (verse 9) what they had brought home.



The reason for God's wrath was expressed in verse 4: "Is it a time for you yourselves to be living in your paneled houses, while this house remains a ruin?"

God had finally had enough of their selfcenteredness. God's priorities were not his people's priorities. He got their attention by making life difficult for them.

God's people responded. They "obeyed the voice of the Lord their God and the message of the prophet Haggai" (vs. 12). God's priorities became the priorities of the people. In the same way as the people in the time of Haggai examined and changed their priorities, we need to make sure that we are putting God's priorities for our lives first. Our focus can't be on building bigger and better homes or larger retirement accounts for ourselves. God is calling us to make a difference in people's lives. We need to ask God what he wants to accomplish through us.

Choosing Our Path

God wants us to follow him, but he gives us the freedom to choose what path we will take and whom we will serve. As we stand at the crossroads of life, God continually reaches out to us through his Word. In Jeremiah 6:16 we read, "This is what the Lord says: 'Stand at the crossroads and look; ask for the ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls.' "Daily we are at the crossroads of life. The choice we make is our own. As Yogi Berra said, When you get to a fork in the road, take it." The road we take will have eternal consequences. Will we choose God's way or the ways of the world? With God's help, our answer can be like Joshua's:

THE OLD TRAPPE CHURCH DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR

After the Battle of Brandywine, the Continental Army crossed the Schuylkill River at a place called Parker's Ford (northwest of current day Royersford) on September 19, 1777. They marched down the Trappe Linfield Road to the Great Road (today Main Street). They then established their campsites along the Great Road. Brigadier General John Armstrong commanded the Pennsylvania Militia army. A division this army was under the command of Col. James Dunlop of the Cumberland County Militia. He and his men camped on the front lawn of Augustus Lutheran Church and commandeered the second schoolhouse and the Old Church for shelter.

On Sunday September 21,1777, Henry Muhlenberg wrote that he was aware that the British Army was on the west side of the Schuylkill River. He feared that they would cross the river and attack the Colonial Army. He was advised to flee the area because a battle in this area would potentially result in the destruction of his third home and the Church. While some members of his family fled to New Hanover for safety, Henry and his wife remained in his home.

On September 27, Henry Muhlenberg went to the church in preparation for the funeral of a deacon's child. When he arrived, he discovered soldiers everywhere. In the Church, he was horrified when he found a soldier playing the organ, guns, and armaments everywhere. He also found straw, manure and animals on the ground floor and gluttonous material on the altar. In short, his temple to God had been desecrated. With great trepidation, he voiced his concerns about these conditions to Col. Dunlop asking him if this was the protection of religious liberty which they had been promised.

On October 2nd, Dunlop's troops left Augustus and marched towards Germantown in preparation for the battle on the morning of October 4th. On October 5th, the men returned to Augustus. The Church (along with New Hanover and St. James) was converted into a field hospital to tend to the wounded. The intent of the Medical Officers was to triage the wounded and then send them as quickly as they could to hospitals in western Pennsylvania. General George Washington stopped at the Church on October 5th to wish his men well. We know that 15 soldiers died in the Church and are buried in a mass grave outside the West Portico. Today, there is a marker that commemorates their sacrifice. Unfortunately, the names of the fallen soldiers were not recorded.

Col. Dunlop and his men broke camp at Augustus on December 12, 1777 and marched to Valley Forge for the winter encampment.



It was a common practice of the British Army to destroy any building that gave shelter to the Colonial Army. It was most fortunate that the Old Church was spared from damage during the war. Other Churches were less fortunate.
