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

> From a practical standpoint, if you drive a half kilometre at the posted 40, it will take about 45 seconds. That's a long and wasteful time. If you go 70, however, you can make the trip in just 26 seconds. Given the dearth of annoying stop signs and crosswalks in the lower east side, why should drivers be further hindered?

What to do with those saved 19 seconds behind the wheel? You could send a few texts or at the very least, a nicely posed selfie. You could even eat a hot dog. If you choke on a chunk, you're still close enough to get to the EMS folks at Anderson and Taunton before expiring.

Now you might ask, what about driving fast through residential areas where there are lots of - um - residents? Frankly, we put too much of a burden on drivers. Children, old folks, moms with strollers, and even the cute little bunnies should learn to judge speeds and when to dart across streets. These are life - and, as I've illustrated, math - lessons. How better to prepare today's seven year old for a future in a big city like Markham where no one cares?

Let's go a step further. Post signs around the neighbourhood. They'd say, "Please speed up! We want the challenge."

# Changes Coming to Winchester/Chelmsford Intersection

The Regional Municipality of Durham, Works Department advises residents of changes to the intersection of Winchester Road (Regional Road 3) and Chelmsford Drive/Durham Street in Brooklin.

Lane restrictions will take place from Sept. 19 to Oct. 3 to construct new raised islands, patch asphalt and revise line markings.

Once work is complete, drivers travelling north on Chelmsford Drive will no longer be able to drive straight through the Winchester Road intersection, nor turn left on Winchester Road; drivers will only be able to turn right onto Winchester Road from Chelmsford Drive. Northbound traffic on Chelmsford Drive wishing to access westbound Winchester Road can use Roybrook Avenue and Baldwin Street as an alternate route.

The change is a result of a safety analysis which identified the need to reduce collisions and improve overall safety at this intersection.

# **New Rules Govern Pedestrian Crossovers and School Crossings**

Durham's Traffic Operations Division is reminding drivers that they must stop and yield the whole roadway at pedestrian crossovers and crosswalks with a crossing guard present.

This new law, part of the Ministry of Transportation's Making Ontario's Roads Safer Act, was implemented on Jan. 1, 2016.

"It is up to everyone-drivers, pedestrians and cyclists—to stay safe on the road. We're reminding residents of this new law to ensure Durham's roads are safe for school children, school crossing guards and all pedestrians," says Susan Siopis, Director of Transportation Services. "Under this new law, drivers and cyclists must stay stopped until pedestrians and school crossing guards have completely crossed the road and are safely on the sidewalk."

To understand when this new law ap-

plies, consider the following parameters:


 The law applies to crossovers, not crosswalks (unless a school crossing guard is present).

· Pedestrian crossovers are identified by lights, specific signs (that are yellow with an X on them) and pavement markings.

 Crosswalks are found at intersections with traffic lights or stop signs. The rule only applies to crosswalks if a school crossing guard is present, displaying a school crossing stop sign.

Drivers could be fined \$150 to \$500 and three demerit points for offences at pedestrian crossovers or any intersection with a school crossing guard present.

# **Looking For Citizen Scientists To Help Baby Turtles**

Central Lake Ontario Conservation (CLOCA) is looking for dedicated citizen scientists of all ages to help monitor turtle hatchings, remove turtle nest protection structures and report on findings in their communities.

In May through July of this year, Central Lake Ontario Conservation actively placed more than 20 turtle nest protection structures across their jurisdiction. These structures

were intended to protect the nests established by female turtles, with as many as 40 eggs in each, ready to hatch in September.

"We have nesting structures in Whitby, Oshawa and Clarington, so you do not have to stray far from home to help local turtles," says Patricia Lowe, Director of Community Engagement with CLOCA. "Once turtles have hatched, they will dig their way out to the wild and start

their adventure. We encourage all residents to keep an eye for the baby turtles and help them by reporting activity, carefully transporting baby turtles to their home wetland and removing the nest protection structures."

The nest protection structures were assembled by high school students with funding from Ducks Unlimited Canada as part of the Wetland Centre for Excellence Mentorship Program. Grade 6 students of Ms. Lucyk's and Ms. Parker's classes at Lakewoods Public School played an important role in this program, placing two decorated protection structures on turtle nests at Pumphouse Marsh in Oshawa.

Turtles face a number of challenges throughout their lifecycle, the least of which is their ability to reproduce. Females do not start to lay eggs until 17 to 19 years of age depending on the species. A female turtle would have to lay 1,400 eggs in her lifetime in order for one of her offspring to replace her. If she lays 34 eggs per year, she would have to survive 58 to 60 years to replace herself in the population with anoth-

er female turtle. By comparison, a female white-tailed deer can mature at 2 years of age and can replace herself in only 4 years. If that was not challenging enough, the female turtle leaves her scent on the nests, making them vulnerable to predation. The eggs in a newly laid nest and the baby turtles when they hatch, make a delicious snack for raccoons, skunks and gulls. Add to the mix, fragmented habitat, roads and consumption of turtle eggs and turtles by some individuals, it is no wonder Ontario's seven out of the eight turtle species are considered Species At Risk (SAR).



# **Audit Firm Makes Key Recommendations to Whitby**

At a special council meeting of the Top 6 Internal/External Oppor-Town of Whitby this past Tuesday, Sept. 6, the auditing firm KPMG filed its final report. The presentation, live streamed from the whitby.ca web site, was presented by Bruce Peever, KPMG's Management Consulting Senior Manager.

The report objectives were:

- Investigate and understand the Town's current services and service delivery models;
- Assess alternative service delivery methods, possible changes to the level of service, and organizational structure; and,
- · Determine opportunities to be more efficient and effective in the sustainable delivery of municipal services

There were 18 "recommended opportunities" for the town to consider, divided into three categories:

#### **Top 6 Internal Opportunities:**

- 1. Implement lean process re-engineering
- 2. Develop strategic workforce plan 3. Conduct an organizational design review
- 4. Review and update Human Resource Policies
- 5. Develop IT strategy
- 6. Implement an ERP system and begin process with education session on leading practice considerations

#### **Top 6 External Opportunities**

- 7. Review future implications of solid waste collection
- 8. Update and create comprehensive zoning bylaw
- 9. Establish policy/MOU with alternate providers and strengthen partnerships
- 10. Implement 311 centralized customer service and begin process with education session on leading practice considerations
- 11. Develop corporate branding
- 12. Review tiered response protocols for fire services

- 13. Develop a corporate strategic plan
- 14. Develop communications strategy addressing both internal and external parties
- 15. Streamline development application review and approval process 16. Establish and formalize service levels
- 17. Develop digital strategy to improve and expand online services
- 18. Move forward with a new or expanded Town Hall and begin process with education session on leading practice considerations in developing a long term accommodation strategy

KPMG further stated, "In today's municipal environment, elected officials are faced with the challenge of attempting to minimize taxation increases while ensuring sufficient funds are available to maintain and support existing operations as well as finance residents' demands for enhanced services. The identification of 18 top opportunities and over 75 other opportunities provides the Town of Whitby with the means to meet this challenge.

"These 18 top opportunities offer the Town the prospect of improving its productivity; they are not opportunities that will produce immediate cash savings. This is a reflection of Whitby's current lean and costcompetitive operations relative to its municipal comparators. Given the significant growth facing the Town in the short and medium term, the opportunities identified in this report should be seen as required investments to avoid greater costs and risk associated with an under resourced organization."

The work plan had five phases with the report being the fourth phase. Next is for KPMG to conduct focus groups with staff and the community.





# Durham Doctors House Call Service

Have you ever needed to see a doctor but can't get an appointment or aren't able to get out?

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


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
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# Durham Film Festival to Feature Family Day

On August 25th, Central Lake Ontario hosted a photo event with the Diamond Sponsors of the 19th Annual Durham Children's Groundwater Festival.

The goal of the Festival is to motivate students to be good water stewards in their home, classroom and community. The Diamond Sponsors combined donation will support more than 4,500 grade 4 students at this year's event and will help to reduce the student admission fee from \$28/student actual cost to \$9.50, including busing.

The Durham Children's Groundwater Festival is a giant outdoor science centre consisting of 37 interactive learning stations, all focused on water. can be unsettling, even for adults. However, unlike trauma events, elective surgery is something for which you can prepare.

It's normal for children to feel anxious. They require more emotional preparation for surgery than most adults and are much more easily confused by the event. But a child who has been given age-appropriate information and a realistic expectation of what will happen feels empowered and less stressed.

#### Learn what you can

Fear and anxiety come from the unknown. So one of the first things my daughter and I discussed was that we would be able to go to a preoperative visit where she could ask questions. Being at this appoint-

> Children may fear anesthesia, pain and even death. Explain to your child she will not feel, hear, or see anything during the operation because of a special "sleep medicine" called anaesthetic. She will not wake up during the operation, but will when it's over. Use non-scary words. Don't say, "You'll be given gas" or "You'll be put to sleep." Kids may confuse "gas" with the fuel and "put to sleep" with what happens to pets.

#### **Use hospital resources**

My family took the tour offered by the hospital for children about to undergo surgery. The interactive experience was hosted by our Child

Life Specialist who showed us the pre-op procedures like taking blood pressure and choosing special pajamas. My daughter tried out the heart monitor, the "sleep" mask and learned all about the IV (intravenous) they would use for her operation, making the hospital feel familiar, friendly and predictable.

#### Remain calm and brave

It's important address your own fears first. This is not always easy. Talk with someone you trust before talking with your child so that you can be the pillar of support that they need.


#### At the hospital

Remind your child how proud you are of them for being brave even if they're crying. Let your child know when you will be able to stay with her and where you will be when you can't. Usually you can be with your child for the onset of anesthesia and will able to be there after they awaken.

#### Final preparations

My daughter has packed her hospital bag with her favourite comfort items and we've picked up a jumbo box of popsicles for after the surgery. While she is still scared, she has come to understand that this procedure is simply the way to "fix" the problem and to keep her healthy.

She's also reminding us that people get presents when they're in the hospital.
