# Oh, How The Tolls Toll

the 407 for 37.2 km from Baldwin to the Don Valley exit

and I can't recall why. No, this is not about my mind going to mush, an altogether different problem. Nor is it about my failure to input all appointments into my calendar, which is annoying enough.

What's significant about the trip is only partly the \$10.45 total charge (where was I going at 10:30 am?) which amounts to 28 cents/km. The portion of the 407 owned by the province, to Brock Rd before a new cha-ching kicks in, cost me \$3.06 or 23 cents/km. From Brock to the 404, the charge came to nearly 31 cents/km. Pricey, no?

This trip, however, was a testament to my will power. I'm weak about a great many things: good coffee, imported beer, potato chips, nanaimo bars...You know. The usual. I hadn't been on the 407 nor the 412 since the toll fees kicked in on Feb. 1 for the simple reason I was boycotting it; I did not want to pay. Granted,

On Friday, March 24, I drove as a retiree not needing to get to work in the morning, my situation is quite different from those who have to suffer the exorbitant charges to avoid the 401 monstrosity.

#### **Toll Connector**

I rather enjoyed the free period to Feb. 1, especially the stretch along the 412, the only connector road in the GTA where users pay. It wouldn't have bothered me to drop some coin on the 407 part if it meant the 412 was free, or, if not free, then considerably cheaper.

In January, we ran a story about local resident Adrian Piccolo who'd gathered nearly 6,000 signatures on an online petition to make the 412 portion free. He sent it to Minister of Transportation Steven Del Duca. Whitby's mayor and council had written to Del Duca in December pleading the same case, expressing the (till then) unfounded expectation that a 412 toll road would force people onto regional or town roads, causing immense traffic problems. If you've been on any

major Brooklin route during rush hour since Feb. 1, you can vouch for council's statement being both prescient and understated.

Neither the petition nor council's plea went anywhere, which shouldn't be a surprise. The double whammy of 412 tolls and one of the most expensive toll charges on the continent bites Durham region drivers who have no choices. It's common now to hear of residents who see \$200-300 per month for tolls as being a fixed expense, like electrical bills. Personally, I shudder every time I take that road, often due to poor travel planning. If I'd left 15 minutes earlier...

#### Three issues

There are really three issues at play here. First is the cost of tolls from Brock Rd. in Pickering to points west. Because the highway there is not owned by the province, we're at the whim of the conglomerate which does own it. Second is the piece east of Brock, owned by the province, with toll charges that remain prohibitive. Third is the 412 toll.

I do wonder if we'd all feel better if other GTA north south connectors had tolls. Regardless, for points two and three, consider there is in power right now a majority Liberal government. Governments and their elected officials - do not remain in power indefinitely and this one is teetering a bit as we slither to a June 7, 2018, election, just 10 months from the upcoming civic holiday.



Remember when it was free? Jacob Docherty was on the Highway 12 overpass on Family Day in June of 2016.

We here in Brooklin, and Whitby, have zero control over which party will win, let alone if with a majority or not. However, we do have a rather strong say in who we send to Queen's Park and what this person will do for us. Right now, it's Conservative MPP Lorne Coe who won a 2016 by election to get there.

So, while I still can't recall why I broke my 407 boycott that March morning, I've learned to plan westward drives or ones to the 401 much more carefully. The province is not getting my snack money without a fight.

# **Helping Kids Discover History**

My retired father has been researching our family tree. While googling and

scrolling through ancestry websites, he's been able to uncover some really interesting things about our ancestors. As we expected to learn, we have a Celtic background of Irish, British and Scottish. But we had a few surprises. We also have in our family tree a connection to the Catawba tribe in South Carolina, descendants who fled the French Revolution and even Spanish royalty.

With all this new information, I realized there is an opportunity to share our history with my daughter. But she's from the digital generation and at her age, grainy, sepia photos of people she doesn't know don't capture her attention. So I decided that perhaps I needed to make history a little more interactive.

On highway 7 in Greenwood is the Picking Museum Village. It's a hidden treasure which brings history to life. Our visit started in the gift store to pay the modest entry fee of a reasonable \$13 for my daughter and me. And yes, there is a Groupon No WiFi? coupon available to give you half price on season passes.

#### Getting a kit

The museum staff set my daughter up with a kit to enhance her adventure. There are several kits to choose from, each designed for a specific age group. Choose from I-spy, mystery, and other kits. We chose one and joined the guided tour. Suddenly, we were pioneers.

The real learning comes as the children compare and contrasthow things used to be versus how things are today. At first she thought having to sleep in a bed with four other kids would be fun, a sleepover every night. That was until our guide showed her the size of the bed. She changed her mind.

Learning that her role as a young girl in the 1800s would have been to sit in a corner and churn butter all day or stuff hay into thick mattresses made my daughter shake her head. "I wouldn't get to go to school?" she asked.

She learned that early settlers would often read books (usually the Bible) as evening entertainment. She couldn't imagine a world without WiFi.

Carrying the water buckets was a real eye-opener. She learned she would have to walk an hour each way to fetch the water. She could barely lift the buckets.

Later that night she asked to see the grainy pictures I'd shown her earlier. She now wants to know who she is. She asked about her grandparents. We googled the tribe with which we have roots. "Am I a real princess?" she wondered as we read about our speculative royal connection to a Contessa. She won't be leading any crusade to take the throne, but the story has her dreaming of her reign.

through the village and reading the commemorative plaques on buildings. You can also visit the Whitby Public Library's archives for infofromation on Whitby, Brooklin, Myrtle, and Ashburn.


# **Local Dancer In CNE Rising Star Competition**

When 12 year old Keira Doran takes to the stage on Aug. 18 at the CNE's Rising Star competition, it will be one more step towards her goal of becoming a professional dancer. The St. Leo's grade student has dreamed of it since age 3 when she began dance lessons in Brooklin.

The CNE Rising Star, now in its 31st year, showcases young artists between ages 6 and 21 in a variety of

disciplines, all vying against each other in a sort of open talent competition for anyone in Ontario. There are two age brackets: junior for ages 6-12 (where Keira will be) and youth for those 13-21. Contestants are judged on their natural ability, audience appeal, stage presence and the quality of their performance. The Grand Champion of the junior competition will receive \$1,000 with the youth competition winner receiving \$2,500.

From the outset, Keira seemed destined for a life in the music arts. Her mother Barb, father and older brother are all involved in music as singers or songwriters, or both. In fact Keira's older brother Matt, now 15, himself competed in the CNE competition in 2014.



#### **Copied steps**

"Even when she was tiny, age 3," Barb Doran recalls, "Keira was trying to copy the dance steps of whoever she saw, Rihanna, anyone. She's always had a natural stage presence and a great feel for music, probably because of the musicality of the family."

By the age of eight and taking lessons at Oshawa's Step With Style dance studio, Keira had already decided this was to be her future. To that end, she practices about 20-25 hours per week in variety of dance types, from ballet to lyrical dance, a form of storytelling but with less emphasis on positions. When she takes to the CNE stage for her performance, she'll dance a contemporary solo to music written by her mother.

"Yes, I'll get teary-eyed," Barb adlaid out. She and her mother remits.

It's not the first time though that Keira is in the CNE show. Three years ago, she and two fellow dancers formed a trio and had been accepted into the competition. However, she broke her ankle the day before the event and was off the dance floor for four months.

#### **Controlling nerves**

For this event, Barb Doran says Keira has matured greatly from the days when her nerves would get the better of her. "Sure, she's excited and a bit nervous which used to be one of her big stumbling blocks," she says. "She'd be okay in a group but alone was a problem. Now though she's learned to cope with it and feeling better."

As to the future, Keira has that plan 28-29 and the finals on Sept. 2

laid out. She and her mother recently returned from a five day long dance convention in New York which featured some of the best choreographers and dance teachers in the world. On some days, Keira danced for eight hours. The exhausting hours and training though have not deterred her from a dream of joining a professional dance troupe some day and then perhaps becoming a choreographer or teacher herself.

"She'll come home after hours of dance, flop on the couch for a bit, then jump up and get going again," says Barb. "She can't sit still. She needs to be moving."

The Rising Star event is free with all shows starting at 6:30 p.m. at the International Stage in the Enercare Centre. The preliminaries run from Aug. 18-21 with the semi-finals Aug. 28-29 and the finals on Sept. 2

## **Brooklin's Gilbey Aiming To Be Ambassador of the Fairs**

the upcoming 2017 Canadian National Exhibition (CNE) Ambassador of the Fairs Competition from August 18 - 20. Entering its 46th year, the competition, a longstanding tradition at the CNE, aims to promote, educate and celebrate Ontario's rich history and heritage in agriculture.

Kennedy Gilbey will compete in The 19 year old, who will attend Toronto's Randolph Academy for the Performing Arts in the fall, has been studying up on all things agriculture of late, a process she says has been exciting.

> "I wasn't really aware of too much about agriculture till I became ambassador to the Brooklin Spring

Fair (in 2016)," she says. "The subject is new to me but I've found it so interesting. I saw how much work goes into our food process. I was a vegetarian for years but now after learning about it, I eat chicken. I suppose that's a first step."

As part of her research, she's spoken with past ambassadors and watched last year's competition. What judges look for, she says, is one's knowledge of agriculture and the poise contestants have to discuss the topic. While she claims to have a few nerves about it all, being in front of an audience isn't likely to faze her. She's performed in musical theatre productions and the Randolph program, 24 months of instruction, focuses on the "triple threat" of vocal, acting, and dance.

To be eligible to compete, individuals must be 18 years old and have first won the Ambassador competition at their local fair. On August 18 and 19, participants are interviewed by a panel of three judges and take

part in various CNE activities and

workshops related to agriculture. The interview will include a discussion of the contestant's interests, work, and community involvement followed by several questions about current events, agricultural concerns, etc. Those selected to compete in the semi-finals will have to present a speech on agriculture on the morning of August 20, and





# Toronto housing market downturn will be short-lived, CMHC says

The federal housing agency says the current downturn in Toronto's housing market is expected to be short-lived. Canada Mortgage and Housing Corp. (CMHC) says Toronto property prices, which have fallen over the last couple of months, should pick up again as demand bounces back.

The Ontario government introduced measures in the spring, including a 15 per cent tax on foreign buyers, to cool down a market that many regarded was overheating. CMHC says similar policy changes introduced in Vancouver last year reduced the number of foreign buyers in that city, but Greater Vancouver's housing market has since pushed back up.

In its latest housing market assessment released today, CMHC kept its overall risk rating for the national housing market at strong. The report, which is based on data from the first three months of this year, precedes the Ontario govern-ment housing rules introduced in the spring.
