# The Lady Who Saved Local History

It was, she once said proudly, a labour of love.

Years before organizations such as the Ontario Genealogical Society in Oshawa existed, Chrissie Simpson collected information about the history of local pioneer families. Their graves were the only reminders that these people



had once forged a living in the Village of Brooklin and surrounding areas.

"There was a long time when those old cemeteries were forgotten," Simpson stated, "but the people in them were the ones who opened up this part of the country and we have a duty to remember them."

It explains why the headline for an article in the Whitby Free Press



on February 2, 1983, shouted, "Brooklin Woman Saves Local History from Slipping Away".

## **Cemetery Board**

In 1946, she took the position as secretary with the Groveside Cemetery Board where she proved to be so capable that she was eventually given a management and research position. When the Township of Whitby took ownership of the once privately owned cemetery, the office was in disarray. Records were misplaced or incomplete and it was not known where a particular person or family was buried.

In some cases it wasn't known if anyone was buried in some areas of the cemetery. A few stones were engraved with Mother or Father, without names, birth or death dates (as is the case of my Bailey great-grandparents) making it difficult to match with any records. In many cases all Simpson had to go by was a name.

During her time with the Board she created reliable records out of the disorder, sometimes just from the memories of Brooklin seniors. Many old flagstones were saved from fields and a few were recovered from Brooklin's first cemetery on Albert at Church Street. The stones are now in an area at Groveside marked "Pioneers of

the Township of Whitby."

## **Married later**

She served on the Groveside Cemetery board for 37 years, her last five as the wife of. Dr. John McKinney, whom she married on April 21, 1978.

Christian Katherine (Chrissie) Simpson was born on April 15, 1902 near Peace River, Alberta. In 1922, her family moved to live in Brooklin's oldest house, the Hunter Darlington place on Cassels Road. Her father was minister at the Burns Presbyterian Church in Ashburn from 1937 to 1940, where she eventually became an Elder.

In Helen Alve's book, "One Hundred Years of Brooklin Schools," there is a record of Chrissie teaching grades 1–3 at the Brooklin Continuation school from 1934 until 1948. She then taught grade 1 at Meadowcrest School until she retired in 1971.

When she left her job with the Cemetery Board in 1983, a retirement dinner was held in her honour. The Town of Whitby presented her with a gold pin in appreciation of the many years she dedicated to providing a lifeline to the past for local families. She passed away on August 16, 1995 and is resting, naturally, at Groveside.

The Town of Whitby and its consultant SGL Planning & Design Inc. are undertaking a Comprehensive Zoning By-law Review. Phase 1 of the project is complete, and comments regarding the Comprehensive Zoning By-law Study and Background Reports have been received and reviewed by the project team.

Phase Two of the project has focused on the development of a Strategic Direction and Issue Identification reports to support the development of a new Town-wide Zoning By-law. These are now available for public review and feedback.

The goal is to create a new Town-wide Zoning Bylaw to manage land use and future development for all types of uses including residential, commercial, industrial and agricultural. Zoning for residential properties controls things like where accessory apartments are permitted, where you can build a shed or detached garage and how wide your driveway can be. Specifically we want to create a by-law that:

- · reflects current zoning practices
- · implements Provincial and Regional policy
- · aligns with the Town's updated Official Plan, and
- · is easy to read and understand

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


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The pellet and/or briquette formulation of the larvicide methoprene (Altosid - Registration No. 21809 and No. 27694 under the Pest Control Products Act, Canada), or the water soluble pouch formulation of the larvicide Bacillus sphaericus (VectoLex WSP - Registration No. 28009 under the Pest Control Products Act, Canada), will be placed into catch basins of storm drains in areas across the Regional Municipality of Durham.

The granular formulation of the larvicide Bacillus thuringiensis subspecies israelensis (VectoBac 200G - Registration No.18158 under the Pest Control Products Act, Canada) will be placed in temporary pools of standing water, ditches, and storm water retention ponds in areas throughout the Regional Municipality of Durham.

The granular formulation of the larvicide VectoBac 200G and/or the granular formulation of the larvicide Bacillus sphaericus (VectoLex CG Registration No. 28008 under the Pest Control Products Act, Canada) might also be placed in sewage lagoons in areas across the Regional Municipality of Durham.

All larvicides will be applied by Ontario Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks licensed applicators or trained technicians.














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# **Brooklin Catalyst Takes Off**
















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# **Durham remains most affordable region in GTA**

There are some signs the real estate market is starting to ease, but it remains in seller's territory this spring, despite rising prices and interest rate hikes.

One real estate company is forecasting a 15 per cent increase in Canada's aggregate home price and a 16.5 per increase in the aggregate price of a home in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA) in the fourth quarter of 2022 compared to the same quarter last year because demand continues to outpace supply.

Royal LePage issued its forecast with the April 19 release of its House Price Survey, which found the aggregate price of a home in Canada increased 25.1 per cent year-over-year to \$856,900 and the aggregate price of a home in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA) increased 27.7 per cent year-over-year to almost \$1.27 million in the first quarter of 2022.

Still, there was a definite slowdown in both activity and price growth in March compared to February, led by declines in the GTA and Calgary, the Canadian Real Estate Association (CREA) reports. Many are welcoming these first signs of moderation.

## Durham affordable, welcoming

Here in Durham Region, the average price dipped 6.5 per cent to nearly \$1.15 million in that time and remains the most affordable region in the GTA\*. "There is a shift happening and we expect to see further corrections still but nothing overly substantial," says Durham Region Association of Realtors (DRAR) President Meredith Kennedy. "Listings are up and so are the amount of sales which is great to see for so many buyers."

Could this be the beginning of the long-awaited cooling of the red-hot market? Only time will tell but if you're thinking of buying and/or selling, it's more important

## End of blind bidding?

On April 6, CREA announced plans to introduce a pilot project this summer in select markets across Canada to display realtime tracking of offers on REALTOR.ca listings.

And beginning next year, home sellers in Ontario will have the option of allowing their real estate agents share the contents of competing offers with the buyers bidding on their property.

Under the current system of blind offers, real estate brokerages that represent clients must disclose the number of written bids but not the substance of those bids. Some believe blind bidding has contributed to soaring prices in the GTA because buyers don't know how much more they need to beat the next highest offer and say changes will usher in welcome transparency.
