What is the Kingdom of Heaven Like?

Matt. 13:44-46
A Hidden t – Hiding treasures in the ground was a common practice. It could be lost forever if owner died or deported by a conquering army. Someone accidently finds this lost treasure reburies it, sells everything he owns and buys the land.
A Pearl of great p – A business man who bought and solo pearls came across one that had great value. He considered this one to be worth more than all the other pearls he owned. He sold everything to get this pearl.
The emphasis of these parables is the tremendous v of the kingdom of heaven. The context here is to personally be in the kingdom through faith in God's Son and the joy and benefits that relationship brings.
There are at least six lessons from the parable of the hidden treasure and the pearl of great price.
No one gets into this kingdom by birth, family or inheritance but by p obtaining it (Heb. 11:6).
The b of being in the kingdom of God are priceless and more valuable than anything in this world (1 Pet. 1:4).
The kingdom of God is not visible to those who are seeking ethings (1Cor. 2:14).
True j comes only in the discovery and personal possession of Christ and His kingdom (Jn. 15:11).
A can enter the kingdom from wherever they may be and whatever circumstances they are in (Jn. 4:7; Ac. 17:11).
Being part of the kingdom of God involves surrender and sacrifices (Matt. 16:24).
