MARCH 15 & 16, 2025 SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT



Today's Gospel... brings out the close connection between the Transfiguration and the Passion of Jesus. Moses and Elias appeared on Thabor on either side of the Savior. They conversed with Him, and as St. Luke explains, talked specifically about His coming Passion: "They spoke of His death, that He should accomplish in Jerusalem" (Luke 9:31).

The divine Master wished to teach His disciples in this way that it was impossible—for Him as well as for them—to reach the glory of the Transfiguration without passing through suffering. It was the same lesson that He would give later to the two disciples at Emmaus: "Ought not Christ to have suffered these things and so to enter into His glory?" (Luke 24:26). What has been disfigured by sin cannot regain its original supernatural beauty except by way of purifying suffering.

COLLOQUY

"You only do I love, my God. You only do I wish to seek and to follow; I am ready to follow You alone. I wish to be entirely at Your disposal. I beg You to order and command whatever You will, but cure me, open my eyes, that I may see Your slightest gesture. Cure me completely, that I may recognize You. STATIONS OF THE CROSS EVERY FRIDAY DURING LENT

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Parishioners,

Last Friday, we were privileged to welcome the newly restored Stations of the Cross back to their rightful place on the side walls of our church, just in time for us to make the Way of the Cross together for the first time this Lent. The original paint within the medallions was remarkably well-preserved, requiring only minor touch-ups. However, the decorative moulding, which had been repainted at some point in a dull beige, had become worn and chipped over time. The artist has now restored the moulding using what is formally known by the French term *Faux Bois*, a technique that imitates wood and woodgrain, and has accented it with gold to highlight the foliage and crosses.

These Stations are an important part of our parish history, having come from the original church built in 1890 on the corner of Main and Oak Streets (which was later relocated and now serves as the Portuguese Hall). As such, they are a precious link to our past and a treasure for our community. Consider the countless souls who have meditated on the Passion of Our Lord and followed the Way of the Cross before these works of art over the years!

In light of this restoration, I would like to offer a brief history of the Stations of the Cross devotion.

Upon entering a Catholic church, one typically finds 14 depictions along the walls of the nave (the main body of the church), each representing a significant event from Christ's Passion. These "stations," whether painted, carved, or engraved, are invariably marked with a wooden Cross.

As early as the 4th century, Christian pilgrims in the Holy Land would walk the very path Our Lord took on His way to Golgotha, a journey that marked the culmination of His Passion for our salvation. When, in the year 1187, Jerusalem fell under Muslim rule and pilgrimage became perilous, Christians began to replicate these sacred sites in Europe, giving rise to the devotion known as the "Stations of the Cross" (also referred to as the "Way of the Cross," or by the Latin terms *Via Dolorosa* or *Via Crucis*).

This devotion involves meditating on 14 pivotal events in the Passion of Christ, from His condemnation to His burial, a number formally fixed in 1731 by Pope Clement XII. The Franciscans were instrumental in spreading this devotion, which was originally observed outdoors, often along roads leading to churches and shrines. Today, the Way of the Cross may still be prayed outdoors or privately at home, with or without visual aids, but is most commonly prayed in a church before the blessed images. Though it can be prayed at any time, the devotion is especially significant on Fridays, particularly during the season of Lent.

I would like to reiterate the expression of my gratitude to the generous parishioner whose contribution made this restoration possible, as well as to all those who assisted with the removal and rehanging of the Stations. May these beautifully restored works of art guide us into a deeper appreciation of the saving Passion and Death of Our Lord.

We adore Thee, O Christ, and we bless Thee, because by Thy holy Cross Thou hast redeemed the world.
