

Sunday Reflection: Third Sunday of Lent

What is the point of Jesus' exchange with the Samaritan woman about water (John 4:5-42)? Water in the arid land was scarce. Jacob's well was located in a strategic fork of the road between Samaria and Galilee. One can live without food for several days, but not without water. Water is a source of life and growth for all living things. When rain came to the desert, the water transformed the wasteland into a fertile field. The kind of water which Jesus spoke about was living, running, fresh, pure water. Fresh water from a cool running

stream was always preferred to the still water one might find in a pool or reservoir. When the Israelites complained about lack of water in the wilderness, God instructed Moses to strike the rock and a stream of fresh living water gushed out (Exodus 17:6).

The image of "living water" is used throughout the scriptures as a symbol of God's wisdom, a wisdom that imparts life and blessing to all who receive it. "The teaching of the wise is a fountain of life" (Proverbs 13:14). "Living water" was also a symbol for the Jews of thirst of the soul for God. The water which Jesus spoke of symbolized the Holy Spirit and his work of recreating us in God's image and sustaining in us the new life which comes from God. The life which the Holy Spirit produces in us makes us a "new creation" in Jesus Christ (2 Corinthians 5:17). Do we thirst for God and for the life of the Holy Spirit within us?

Saint of the Week ... St. Turibius of Mogrovejo

Imagine how your life would change if you had to move to an unknown land more than 6,000 miles away! That's what happened to Turibius of Mogrovejo. Born in 1538, he was a respected judge and law professor in Spain. One day, King Philip II, who was head of the Church in Spain, appointed him Archbishop of Lima, Peru. Turibius told the king and the pope that he had never been to South America and that he was not even a priest...but the decision had been made. The Church in Peru needed a holy man to lead the people closer to Christ. Turibius was ordained a priest and a bishop, and he soon set sail for his new land.

When he arrived he was shocked at what he found. Priests were not caring for their people. The poor were being neglected. Rich Spanish landowners had enslaved many of the native people of Peru and treated them cruelly. He saw that there was much work to be done. Turibius decided to visit every parish in his new land. Sometimes he rode a mule from place to place, but mostly he traveled on foot. His journey through the diocese took him seven long years.

Turibius responded to the needs he saw. He supervised the building of many churches, schools, and hospitals. A catechism was written in different Peruvian languages so that adults and children could grow in their faith and also learn how to read and write. Everywhere he went, Turibius spoke out against the unjust treatment of the poor. The people in power listened to Turibius because he always spoke with love and he encouraged everyone to act with love.

Turibius died in 1606 while visiting one of his parishes in a small mountain village. He was canonized in 1726. Like Jesus, he was a good shepherd for his people. He is the patron saint of Peru, scouts, and native peoples' rights.

The Scrutinies

Today we begin the first of the Scrutinies. These are three special rites of self-examination and repentance celebrated on the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent, specifically for the "Elect" (those preparing for Baptism at Easter). The Scrutinies are celebrated to deliver the Elect from the power of sin and Satan, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ.

The Gospel readings for these three Sundays are from the Gospel of John and are thematically linked to the rites, emphasizing repentance and conversion:

- The First Scrutiny (the Samaritan woman at the well, John 4:5-42) tells us that Christ is the Living Water
- The Second Scrutiny (healing of the blind man, John 9:1-41) tells us that Christ is the Light of the World
- The Third Scrutiny (raising of Lazarus from the dead, John 11:1-45) tells us that Christ is the Resurrection and the Life.

At one of the Masses on each of the three weekends, our Catechumens will be presented to the congregation following the Homily, and we will pray for them with special intercessions.


