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

Our Prayer Shawl - The Tallis

The tallis that we see worn during the weekday morning service, on Shabbos, and all holidays is really a larger form of the "TZITZIS" that boys and men wear under their shirts. This smaller garment is called "ARBA KANFOS" which means four corners.

The Tallis has four Tzitzis and is worn around the shoulders. "tallisos" come in silk and wool, They may differ in size from a small scarf-like to a large one that reaches the floor.

<u>"Tallis" Prayer</u> Blessed art Thou O Lord our G-d, king of the universe, who has made us holy by Thy commandments and hast commanded us to enwrap ourselves in the "Tzitzis". There is also a good reason why some people cover their heads with the "Tallis". It is easy to be distracted in the middle of a prayer by someone or something in the synagogue. By covering ones head with the Tallis, one can concentrate better on what they are praying. The tallis is only worn by males. It is customary among many Jews not to wear a "Tallis" until they are married. A person serving as Cantor wears a "Tallis" in the morning on weekdays and all the services on the Sabbath and holidays whether he is married or not. Although all through the years the "Tallis" is worn by the congregation only in the morning, on YOM KIPPUR EVE, at the KOL NIDRE service, due to holiness of the occasion, all males wear "tallisos"

<u>Holiness</u> We should never forget that the "Tzitzis" on our "Tallis" and "Arba Kanfos" exist for a holy purpose. Even when they are too old to be used or by accident they fall off a "Tallis", they must not be thrown away. They must be brought to the synagogue and placed in the Rabbi's care. Each of the "Tzitzis" must have eight strands. If one is missing, or there are too many, it shall be fixed, until then another "Tallis" should be used. The "Tallis" and all religious articles should be handled with respect. They should be used with honor and with clean hands.
