A message from Governor Kris Armstrong



Welcome to the new biennium!

Challenge yourself to make a difference. Be intentional, be strong, be bold - be a Soroptimist. Those are the words with which I ended my installation

speech. I hope that you've accepted that challenge. I also spoke about transformational growth, so let's explore what that means.

As your club starts planning for the next two years, please pause, self-scout and level set. This means getting all of your members on the same page so that you all have the same basic understanding of your club's current status. Review your by-laws, strategic plan and budget. What works and what doesn't? In other words, get your ducks in a row. Do you have a strategic plan? Yes, you should have one. Check out the region's new 2018-2022 strategic plan at <u>www.simwr.org</u> for inspiration.

Do the projects/awards you fund or the hands-on projects you work on, fit our mission of improving the lives of women and girls? If they do not, then you need to make the decision to stop supporting them. Or in the alternative, is there a way to tweak it so that it fits the mission? It's hard, I know it's hard. My own club has been through that process and it's not easy, but it must be done.

What about fundraising? Does your club make enough money to fund your projects and educational awards? If so, great! If not, do you have any ideas on how to achieve funding requirements? Ask for help if you need it.

How do you recruit members? Does your club hold a formal membership event? Does it work? If not, can it be tweaked? Or maybe you should just stop doing it. If you don't have one, maybe consider trying it. I can't tell you what should work or not work for your club - put your heads together and do what makes sense. Engage your District Director and Secretary for help. There are many good ideas to be found in the membership section of <u>www.soroptimist.org</u> - so please avail yourself of this information.

Be creative, innovative and unleash disruption! Disruption is a buzzword that's been around the business world for a number of years. Webster's defines disrupt as: to interrupt the normal course or unity of... Don't be afraid of making changes. If a change doesn't work it doesn't mean that you've failed, it just means that it didn't work. Move along and try something else.

In all things, the region board and committees are here to help you. If you have a question, ask. If you want to share a best practice - share it! If you want to talk about your ideas, we are here to listen. Team up with other clubs to bounce ideas. Communication will be the key to our success.

On that note, I want to share with you some thoughts on the culture of our region - our team. I shared the following (see page 2)with the incoming board and want to share with all of you as well. This documents what values mean to us, the behaviors we expect all members to demonstrate, as well as the kinds of behaviors we will not support. <u>Treating our team as family.</u> What does "treating our team as family" mean? We are nice to one another, respect each other, have fun together, embrace our differences, seek and appreciate each other's opinion, and are honest with each other in an effort to help us improve. Every member is entitled to their opinion, but nobody should have an entitled opinion – no exceptions. A good team/family gets a lot done while enjoying working together towards a common goal. We want everyone to succeed.

- Listen to one another (don't just hear)
- · Get to know others
- Appreciate and value others' opinion
- Be candid with courtesy
- Make decisions based on what's best for the team

What we won't support

- Being defensive
- Hurtful words or tone
- Making others feel isolated
- Punishing failure

Valuing collaboration over consensus. What does "valuing collaboration over consensus" mean? Collaboration often leads to more ideas and, ultimately, a better solution. On our board, collaboration is a means to gather ideas and make a decision to take action. Our time is better spent working on and delivering results, not vetting options and decisions past everyone. In the time it would take to get consensus on a decision, we can implement the decision and validate whether or not it will work. We strive to prevent swirl, and we support decisions as a team.

What we expect:

- · Actively listen and provide feedback
- Be open to and build upon others' ideas
- Gather input from others...but not from everyone
- · Look past others' positions when making a decision
- Be empowered (and comfortable) making a decision with out 100% agreement
- Consensus doesn't always work in a crisis, you must have the courage to move forward
- Present a unified front as a team

What we won't support:

- Not listening to others' ideas and/or feedback
- Trying to get unanimous agreement before taking action
- Always conceding/never conceding
- Pouting or complaining if you don't get your way

We will embrace agility with constant improvement. What does Agility with constant improvement mean? We will respond quickly to meet changing needs. This allows us to react to changes in priority and continually improve.

What we expect:

- · Be flexible
- · Re-prioritize when appropriate
- · Learn from our failures
- Make improvements that provide value
- Ask "Why" questions with the intent to improve

What we won't support

- Being so set in the idea that you can't improve/change
- Settling or accepting things the way they are
- Limit yourself by existing boundaries

Starting simple, always learning then adjusting. What does

"starting simple, always learning, and then adjusting" mean? We begin working on solutions early, learn from the initial results, and build iteratively upon that foundation. We are not afraid to try because we can learn from our failures. This value also allows and encourages us to be responsive to members' needs. We will lead through service.

What we won't support


- · Allowing "scope creep" without adjustment

What is the Laurel Society? It is SIA's prestigious recognition program for \$1,000 and above donors. What is the change in the Laurel Society? The 2015 change is that a donation to any of these awards are credited to the overall Laurel Society which will help fund all SIA programs including Soroptimist Club Grants, the Workplace Campaign to End Domestic Violence, and others.

Result for SIA Members Donors may contribute gifts to any of the three funds (Live Your Dream Awards, Dream it Be it Award, Unrestricted Support or Domestic Recovery Fund, etc.) and will be able to say, "I made a donation to fund the Live Your Dream Awards and am recognized in the Laurel Society for my gift." A monthly gift can still be designated for a specific fund which can be selected from a drop down menu on the SIA website.

SOAP is being recognized by Polaris!!!

I wanted to let you know that beyond the photo, the SOAP campaign will be featured in the report as an innovative victim support and identification initiative targeted to the hotel industry. Below is the excerpt from the report. The full report is launching on July 12th. In addition to training staff, many hotels are making efforts to post the National Hotline number on their property, both so victims are aware of the option to seek help and guests know there is an avenue to report suspicious behavior. Some cities have enacted legislation mandating the posting of the National Hotline number at all hotel properties. Other hotel-centered identification efforts are being spearheaded by antitrafficking organizations on local and national scales. Save Our Adolescents from Prostitution (S.O.A.P.) is a survivor-led organization that, via volunteers, distributes bars of soap clad with the National Hotline number on the wrapping to high-risk hotels and motels. To date, S.O.A.P has distributed nearly one million bars of soap nationwide, and the Hotline has received many trafficking-related calls from survivors and hotel staff as a result of the innovative campaign to help inform trafficking victims of their options to seek help in a way that won't tip of their traffickers.
