

# Two calls made from Stocks home

Chief Sheriff's Deputy Woody McEuen said on Tuesday that two 911 calls had been made from the home of Joe and Barbara Stocks the evening of Jan. 17 when they and their daughter Heather were murdered.

McEuen said one call was made at 10:38 p.m. and the other at 10:40 p.m. but both were hang-up calls.

McEuen's response was in answer to inquiries by a reporter from the *Lonoke Democrat* about an apparent disparity between information provided in a press briefing and that in court documents.

Lt. John Morrow of the Arkansas State Police said in a press briefing, on Jan. 18, that the Sheriff's department had responded to a single "hang-up" 911 call at 10:40 p.m. on Jan. 17.

However, an affidavit from Mark A. Hollingsworth,

the meetings.

an investigator with the Arkansas State Police, filed with the capital murder charges against Heath Stocks, the Stockses' son, appeared to tell of a second call.

In that affidavit, Heath Stocks was said to have stated that Heather Stocks had "called 911 to report a fictitious robbery in an attempt to cover up his [Heath Stocks'] actions."

The affidavit said that Heather Stocks had found Heath Stocks ransacking his parents' home.

"There is no record of her [Heather Stocks] calling to report a "fictitious" burglary," McEuen said.
