Infant Care Center

These last three weeks have shown us that our community does indeed need an Infant Care Center. At a recent advisory board meeting with Nurse Family Partnerships and La Plata Family Center the word came again, *there are not spaces for infants.* Tri-County Head Start has even had to close its infant care sites.

We are not looking at simply babysitting. The Infant Care Center would be a full and comprehensive program that a mom would agree to as trained individuals would come alongside her to assist her in meeting the goals she has established. It would be an opportunity for sponsors to connect with a mom who desires to have a sustainable life for herself and her baby.

We have, however, overcome one significant hurdle! Any licensed childcare center requires that the director of such a center has an advanced degree in Early Childhood Education. Jennifer Odom has a Masters in exactly that discipline and is excited about the possibility of heading up an infant care center.

What do we need?

- 1. Prayers for discernment.
- 2. A location: property that can be built or a space that already exists within the proper zoning area. State mandates require that a new infant care center facility have a sprinkler system in place this creates a challenge in a town that has very few new buildings much less with a sprinkler system.
- 3. Sponsors willing to financially support the care of an infant at the center for six months as the mother makes strides towards the goals, she has established for herself.
- 4. Trained volunteers and certified attendants to nurture the babies under our care during the day.
- 5. Trained volunteers who come alongside a mother to love, support, encourage, and befriend her through the process of seeking employment, completing education, getting back to an existing job.

There are a multitude of steps in-between! Again, this is not babysitting and would be a comprehensive program where a mother applies and meets the established criteria.
