Course Description:

Selected current issues of importance to the human service field. Emphasis on issues impacting Alaskan communities. Repeatable for credit by Human Services majors to a maximum of 9 credits.

This course will provide a basic overview and understanding of domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, child abuse & neglect, crisis intervention, advocacy, and resources available to victims of intimate partner violence and other, related abuse in rural Alaska. The course will include responsibilities of identifying and reporting of abuse and neglect of vulnerable adults and children as well an overview of the dynamics of family violence.

Instructional Methods:

Lecture, multi-media presentation (audio, Power Point & video), group interactive and role playing, case studies.

Goals & Objectives:

Participants will gain a working knowledge of the scope and impact of physical and sexual interpersonal/intimate partner violence the Bristol Bay region including:

- Root causes and aggravating factors that contribute to violence
- Identification of helping resources and responding agencies
- How to access and work with existing helping resources
- Mandatory reporting requirements
- Working with families and care-givers of children who have been abused
- Integration of multiple systems in providing comprehensive services
- Impact of domestic violence on child victim/witnesses
- Prevention and intervention strategies specific to rural Alaska and the Bristol Bay region

- Trauma informed services and positive behavior supports
- Relationship building, communication and conflict resolution.
- Self-care, working through grief and resilience.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course students will increase their ability and skills to:

- Increase knowledge and awareness about the issues facing victim witnesses of abuse or neglect.
- Respond better to children and others affected by fetal alcohol exposure, abuse and/or neglect.
- Crisis intervention Assisting and responding to people in crisis.
- Trauma informed approach to healing and thriving.
- Knowledge of available resources and how to access them.
- How the criminal/civil justice systems work.
- Indigenous justice systems in Bristol Bay
- Work through our grief and trauma.
- Effectively advocate for adult male victims of sexual/physical violence
- Crisis intervention Assisting and responding to people in crisis.
- Understand the impact of violence on gay, lesbian, transgender/transsexual.
- Impact of faith community/beliefs on interpersonal violence
- Understand the importance of self-care as responders, advocates, providers.
- Systems advocacy getting responders to do right by victims of violence.

Testing: Pre Test/Post Test will be given to each student to gauge their knowledge of these issues prior to class and again at the end of the class to see whether their knowledge and skill have increased.

Each session will have an online test, surveys and polls of the participants. There will be videos and a manual for this training that students will be expected to view and read over the course of this training.

Evaluation: There will be online evaluations for each session comprised of multiple choice and brief essay questions. Students will also be evaluated on the basis of their participation in the group/interactive work.

Total Hours: Sessions 30+ hours, Testing/Homework 15-20 hours = 45 - 50 hrs.
