



# Coming Soon To A Nearby "Theatre" Earthkraft: A Comedy

Last fall, a troupe of professional dancers and singers planned a Christmas show at our Brooklin Community Centre. But they couldn't fill one key role: Santa Claus. So the show was shelved till next year.

No such requirement is needed though for Michael Kashmanian's comedy Earthkraft

which will debut on Friday, May 3, at ning dinner theatre show Pigsville that same community centre, with six shows over a week.

Kashmanian is the driving force behind the Beech Street Theatre Company that plans to make Brooklin its home for the foreseeable future. Having done a host of shows and dinner theatre performances in Bowmanville, restaurants, museums and even Whitby's Abilities Centre, this new group wants to bring its shows to the local stage.



A Brooklin friend familiar with Kashmanian's plays suggested he look into the old building on Cassels and Church Streets. He did and says he fell in love with the place right away. The show has been in rehearsal for some time and will move to the building on April 23 for its final preparations.

Beech Street Theatre has always gone where most other such groups dared not tread: staging shows written exclusively by Canadians and mostly by locals. To that end, Kashmanian says he invites submissions which are reviewed by a selection committee.

Kashmanian began in theatre in 2003 when he auditioned for a musical being performed in a local church, and not one he belonged to. He got the part which happened to be the one non-singing role in the show, that of Scrooge's nephew Fred. He enjoyed the experience so much, he decided to couple it with his love of writing and create his

own shows. One, Dial M for Musical, sold out in ten days. He continued to perfect his playwright skills by taking courses and joining the Playwrights Guild of Canada. Churches that hosted his shows were given the proceeds as fundraisers.

#### Dinner theatre

If you've ever been to the Tuesday eve-

at Whitby's Nice Bistro on Brock and Dundas, that's a satirical Kashmanian show. "You eat at 6:30," he says, "the show's at 7:30 and it's done by 8:30. A perfect evening entertainment."

That venue and most others he and his company have performed in are hardly typical theatre locales, something that appeals to him. "I love doing shows in places that aren't theatres: art galleries, Pickering Village Museum village, restaurants. The creative use of space is fascinating to me as a director."

His shows, like Pigsville and Earth*kraft,* are largely comedies which he admits are his bent. Earthkraft, for instance, deals with themes about poverty and the homeless acting the way they believe rich people act. Chock full of lusty, satirical statements about modern life, he says it's a show that's already had some success, having been staged a few years ago. A more detailed synopsis is available at bstconstage.com

Tickets will be available at the community centre door but seating is limited to about 60 per show. He urges theatre-goers to buy them online (@\$27 apiece) by going to the company web site: bstconstage.



## **Major Projects Moving Forward**

Whole council meeting, there were a few big ticket items of interest to Brooklin residents.

Firstly, there will be a new cooling system for Vipond Memorial Arena, which will help maintain the ice. The current system can no longer be repaired to do the job. Town staff have worked hard this past winter to ensure we made it to March. The approval of the new cooling system means Vipond Arena will remain functional.

As well, Councillor Mulcahy and I made our support for the new sport complex quite clear. We also stated that we want the new building to be energy efficient and that we need to examine technologies for energy and recovery. We feel we need to lead the way with a modern building that is as efficient as possible.

Secondly, there is the mid block arterial road, a massive project we've been pushing for. I want to see this started as soon as possible. It will be an east-west road that will help to open up land around it as well as alleviate some of the traffic we deal with in Brooklin. We've been searching for anything that can speed up the start of this project. Staff have retained the services of GHD Limited to be retained as the owner's engineer. The Town has also agreed to work as a co-proponent in the Mid Arterial Roadway EA to be completed by Fieldgate Developments. The Environmental Assessment is the next step in getting this roadway

At Monday's Committee of the under construction. This will be a great thing for Brooklin and Whitby and something I feel strongly about continuing to advocate for.

> Thirdly, the Royal Canadian Legion and Cenotaph Re-location Project was discussed. The Legion has been working hard fundraising for this. I was proud to support it along with other members of council. We are looking into potential savings for the Legion and are hopeful to have it completed by this June with the Cenotaph relocated to the square in front of the Brooklin Community Centre and Library.

> Finally, Councillor Mulcahy and I have frequently discussed having regular Town Hall community meetings with the first one happening on April 13. Aside from the two of us, Regional Councillor Elizabeth Roy, Durham District School Board Trustee Niki Lundquist, and representatives from DRPS Human Trafficking Division and Safe Hope Home will be in attendance. The aim is to share information and have a discussion about Human Trafficking in our community. At the end, there will be time to meet with us individually as well.

## **Give One-metre Clearance To Cyclists**

The Region of Durham reminds safety and, at the same time, help least one-metre away from cyclists when driving. Additionally, drivers are not to pass a cyclist travelling in the same direction unless there is sufficient space to do so safely, while staying at least one-metre away from the cyclist.

"Motorists and cyclists have to work together to keep each other safe. They have the same rights and responsibilities and must follow the same rules of the road," says Brian Bridgeman, Commissioner of Planning and Economic Development. "By understanding and practising the three Rs of safe cycling-- same roads, same rights and same rules--cyclists can help ensure their own

drivers they are required to keep at motorists understand their intentions."

> Drivers and cyclists need to remember to share the road with enough space to keep everyone safe. The Making Ontario's Roads Safer Act outlines requirements for cyclists to improve visibility and safety, such as turning on headlamps and taillights at least 30 minutes before sunset. There is a penalty of \$110 for not leaving a minimum of one-metre of open space between a vehicle and a cyclist.

#### Blooming in Brooklin By Ken Brown

## The garden is waking up

den on March 26 when I was finally able to pho-

tograph the witch hazel in bloom. Now its lovely dark red blooms are starting to fade while the rest of the garden is waking up.

I'd like to rake the lawn but walking on it too soon can do more damage than good. When it's dry enough to walk on without leaving a footprint then it will get a good stiff raking to clean out as much of the dead thatch as possible. I might even rent a dethatching machine for the oldest portions. We remove it so that fertilizer and water can more easily reach the soil without having to fight through dead grass.

#### Fast growing plants

When it's too unpleasant to work outside, I head to the basement to start the fast growing annual flowers such as zinnias and cosmos. It's almost too late to sow tomato seed. However, for fast growing vegetables, do it now. Cucumbers, zucchini, melons and other squash are in the vining squash family, another group of fast growing vegetables that can be sown by the end of the month to be ready for the end of May. They really only need 3-4 weeks so starting them too early gets you a twisted mess to untangle at planting time.

Near the end of the month I also start one of my favourite flowers. The

Spring arrived in my gar- vining heavenly blue morning glory needs about four weeks ahead of its late May planting. You can start earlier if you're prepared to spend time untangling them when it's time to move outside. They scramble up the trellis they share with the pole beans which I usually direct seed to putting in the morning glory plants. In the last few years I've had to put a little fence around the base of those trellis as the bunnies like young bean plants.

#### Pruning the crab apple

On another sunny warm day, the crab apple will get its annual pruning along with the other fruit trees in the backyard. Fruit tree pruning is an art form that can't be explained here. But there are lots of videos to show exactly how to do it. Most crab apples don't need pruning except for shape, but I have this old one in the backyard I started to prune years ago to keep it a certain size and shape over the ponds. It's become sort of a giant bonsai that now keeps me pruning every year. I don't know its variety but it reliably blooms and fruits every other year. I miss the blossoms on the alternate years though not the buckets of apples that need to be raked.

As the weather warms, I do a daily walk around the garden hoping for that wonderful first taste of fresh veggies. The asparagus will soon pop up, truly the start of the gardening season.

### Ups, Downs and Steady as We Go.

The first quarter of 2019, sales in the GTA were down by one percent and the average selling price was up by 1.1 percent year-over-year.

"Market conditions have remained tight enough to support a moderate pace of price growth. Despite sales being markedly lower than the record levels of 2016 and early 2017, the supply of listings has also receded. This means that in many neighbourhoods throughout the GTA, we continue to see competition between buyers for available listings, which provides a level of support for home prices," said Jason Mercer, Toronto Real Estate Board's Chief Market Analyst.

The Canadian Real Estate Association (CREA) sees home sales rebounding a little (2.1 percent) next year, with home prices roughly keeping up with inflation (2.7 percent). In Ontario, prices will likely climb a little faster (3.3 percent).

The big banks expect interest rates to continue to rise to between 2.25 percent and 2.75 percent by the end of 2019. And that will keep turning the screws on Canadians' budgets, with more money going toward mortgage and other debt payments and less left as disposable income. Climbing rates will also continue to raise the bar for wannabe home owners who have to pass the federal mortgage stress test in order to qualify for a new mortgage.
