During Amana's communal history starting when the Inspirationists arrived in the United States in 1843 and lasting until 1932, marriages were ap

FEATHERS IN THE WIND

Remember those cold days that we had a few weeks ago? Such cold weather always happens around our son's birthday, and I am reminded that, on the day of his birth, it was 20 degrees below zero. Luckily, the car started and we got to the hospital in plenty of time. Before we left, Charlemagne had to call my parents to say that I (in his words) "thought" I might be in labor, then he had to check his plants, looks for his billfold and etc. before we were finally off. Now you understand why there is eight years between our sons.

As I have mentioned before, the ice storm this winter did a number on our big maple tree. This tree has been around since before we were married. Charlemagne and his sons made a rather elaborate tree house in its branches. During an Easter egg hunt, several of the children had to climb up and explore the tree house. Once there curiosity was satisfied, a

few had problems getting down, so Diane Baumgartel went part way up and handed them down to me, one by one. The children then checked to make sure that no one had removed anything from their Easter baskets while they had been up.

About ten years ago there was a lightning strike to the tree which, somehow, managed to put both of our stoves, upstairs and down, out of order. During the big windstorm of June 29, 1998 (I remember the date) about 30 truckloads of branches came out of the tree and littered out back yard. Twenty years ago, I wind storm took a large branch out of the tree. This time, ice formed on a large, but rotten, branch, and about a third of three broke off. So the saga of the big maple has entered yet another chapter, possibly the last one.

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proposed seemed unsuitable it could be put off. Though it was very rare, a couple couple be denied permission to marry. When this happened the couple could chose to stay and not marry or leave and marry outside of the community. Should they choose the second course of action, they could ask permission to be readmitted (as more than one couple did) and most often such permission was granted. The Amish practice of "shunning" was unheard of in Amana.

Even after a marriage was approved it was common practice for the Elders to say the couple must wait one year and then the young man was sent to another village (or from Eben-ezer to Amana) while the year passed.

While these rules sound restrictive to us, keep in mind in the wider world of 19th century America the barriers to a wedding were substantial. A family could deny the bride or groom a chance to marry for any reason at all or on economic grounds. Here there was no class structure and everyone was "good enough" for one another. No one in the colonies worried about affording to set up house, buying a farm or setting out on their own. There was no "out on your own," as you had your community job, housing and the support of the village which supplied everything from cord wood to furniture.

In communal Amana a young woman who wanted to marry had a closed pool of young men to choose from, but she did not have to rule out anyone based upon their ability to provide, nor did a groom have to think about a bride's dowry. Indeed if a young man or young woman was not inclined to marry, that was fine too. That general policy meant life was a great deal easier for unmarried women in Amana as they had housing, food, a respected role in family and community life, regardless of whether they married or not.

Courting in Amana had its foibles. First there were no pubs or restaurants to go to; there were no dances or parties to speak of, though occasionally young people met in some public space like the depot yard or the Middle Park to do what Helen Rind told me they called, round dancing (like square dancing). Occasionally friends met in a kitchen dining room to play zither and sing. Card games were thought to be worldly, though parcheesi, dominoes and checkers were fine.

Boys asked girls, never ever the reverse and parents didn't seem to have much to say about it one way or another, a point that differs completely from typical American courting rituals of the day. Dating meant taking a walk or hanging out on the porch or on a garden swing. Perhaps that's why Amana porch swings and Gartelaube (little trellised seating areas sometimes with a swing set in the yard) were so popular. Refreshments could be served though were not expected. Procuring refreshments meant

involving ones Mom or the kitchen ladies so that was another hurdle to leap.

It was not quite proper to invite a young man inside one's home until after a suitable period of courting had been completed. My grandmother told me her beloved did not come into her Mother's Gutezimmer (good room) until after they had been seeing each other for nearly six months. Before that he rode his bike to Middle Amana and they visited on her porch or went for a walk. Love grew out of doors like honeysuckle or apple trees in old Amana.

Walking in the woods in nice weather or on very rare occasion asking the farm boss to borrow a horse and buggy or horse and sleigh from the village livery were the only other options.

Baseball games (illicit or licit) meant that teens and young adults from other villages could mingle, perhaps that was one big incentive for the games which raised so much ire among the stricter Elders until baseball was allowed in the late 1920s. (Read Monys Hagen's entertaining book, "The Worldly Game – The Story of Baseball in the Amana Colonies" for more on baseball in Amana.)

Valentines were exchanged with heartfelt vigor between courting couples and between friends. Valentine postcards could be purchased for pennies at the General Store and addressed to one's sweetheart and sent to him or her via the village "Post" which was an informal mail system between the villages which depended upon the "Rumpost" (Goes around post) delivery system that operated carrying intra-village letters, ledgers, prescriptions and medicines between the general stores, farm offices, pharmacies and doctors offices.

Deliveries were made daily or twice daily during mid-summer, but on a slow winter day, say February 14 an anxious young lady might have to wait until late afternoon before calling at the General Store to see if she had received a Valentine from her sweetheart. And so love ran its course in the villages of Amana.
