Lighting wellpositioned lighting tells the criminal you are paying attention to your property and your neighborhood!

Quick! Spot the lurker by the walking path. Badly designed lighting makes things better for criminals.

It's time to think about the lighting around your house and in your neighborhood.

This fall, a Neighborhood Watch group had a few worrisome incidents in their neighborhood. So, they decided as a group to turn on their exterior lights from dusk to dawn. This Illuminated their neighborhood and showed a unified effort with this simple. effective way to deter future criminal behavior. Criminals like to operate under the concealment of darkness.

Here are a few tips for you to consider with your Neighborhood Watch group or neighborhood.

- Position outdoor lights carefully. Aim lights at doorways, garages, shed doors and ground level windows.
- Consider motion sensor floodlights or lights that automatically turn on at dusk and off at dawn.
- Motion lights can be found at any hardware or home improvement store for around \$30. That is a small investment for peace of mind!
