He said: "Who cares to admit complete defeat? Practically no one, of course." The

first few sentences of the "Twelve and Twelve" have always struck a chord with me, both as a hell of a way to open a book and as a revolutionary idea. I've heard a hundred different excellent ideas on grasping the first step. There are a number of ways to look at the ideas of powerlessness and unmanageability. But I've always gravitated towards that idea of defeat.

When I was drinking, defeat was just something I would not willingly do. I was a sore loser, even at pick-up games. I was fiercely competitive and stubborn. So, when I first read the idea of "complete defeat," I was turned off. Sure, I could grasp the idea that alcohol had beaten me up. I knew that my life was unmanageable. I was living with my parents again. But accept defeat? Be forced to change? No, that was something I could not do.

I was afraid and did not have the humility that it takes to change. I had a case of what they called the "if only's" and the "yeah, but's." I often said that "if only I had the right girl, or job, or place to live," my problems would go away and I would be able to drink normally. Asked whether I was an alcoholic, I would answer, "Yeah, but I'm too young." Asked whether my life was better not drinking, it was another "Yeah, but I still don't have this or that."

I had a sponsor who lovingly smashed my delusions, and friends who laughed at the ideas in my head. When I pointed out how I had no idea how I could stay sober through my bachelor party, they pointed out that I was single, and had been for a while. When I told my sponsor that there was no way I was making coffee because I didn't drink it, he signed me up to speak at the state convention on 'Why I Wouldn't Make Coffee'.

She said: If only I had understood earlier in life that I was powerless over alcohol, how many embarrassing moments I might have avoided. The experience of pitiful and incomprehensible demoralization came with my very first high on alcohol. It led me directly into that baffling alternate reality known as 'a black out'. For someone with my level of pride and self confidence the experience was

It never occurred to me that I might be an alcoholic, even though I knew that my grandmother was one. I didn't drink much for awhile after that first time, but when I did, blacking out was a part of it. Eventually I made a real effort to raise my tolerance for alcohol, so that I could 'keep up with the boys', and for a long time alcohol helped me to relax, be more sociable. But the blackouts eventually came back again, and in spite of that my drinking increased.

My story is so typical; I quit many times, only to begin again. I tried to regulate my drinking in a variety of ways but in the end I realized that I was a hopeless drunk. So yes, I had admitted I was powerless over alcohol but I still needed to manage my own life. You see I couldn't imagine living without my best friend, "the bottle".

Though I had finally admitted that I was an alcoholic I decided that I would live out the rest of my life that way. 'I'm going to die eventually' I thought, 'I might as well die of alcoholism. What's the difference?' But I was kidding myself. The pride and confidence I once had disappeared, which of course made me want to drink even more.

I was loath to admit defeat. I was born and raised to be a winner, or so I thought. If God had not arranged

He Said: (cont.) Thanks to them, and the vast experience in the rooms, I ran out of excuses for why I could drink again. I ran out of excuses on why I couldn't do the steps, or why AA was not for me. It was then that I accepted that complete defeat. Alcohol had completely destroyed me, and there was nothing that booze could do except make my life worse. I accepted the fact that, even though I was a young man unable to drink legally, I could never safely drink again. I had a disease that wanted two things: It wanted me alone, And it wanted me dead.

The only way out of this disease was through a spiritual way of life, and the easiest way to this life was working the remaining eleven steps. In return for this work, I've been given a life that constantly amazes me and I get to learn and change every day.

She Said: (cont.) to have witnesses present when I discovered I had wrecked my new car in a black out, I still would not have surrendered to the notion of life without alcohol. It was certainly my pride that goaded me into answering "I guess I'm going to quit drinking' when they asked "What are you going to do now?"

I walked into the rooms of AA finally willing to let someone or something else manage my life. What I found out was that my life did matter to me after all. The difference now is that I can remember what I did

The difference now is that I can remember what I did the night before. None of the mistakes I make as a sober person hold a candle to the catastrophes I engaged in as a drunk. I have real hope, the joy of living, and I am not alone. I have found a tribe of others who understand me and pursue dedication to a spiritual way of life as though their very lives depended upon it. For, in truth, they do.

January in Our History:

January, 1920: The 18th Amendment has been ratified and prohibition begins. From the beginning Prohibition was an ill-fated social experiment of drinking control that illustrated the consequences of viewing alcohol related problems as moral and religious concerns. The reluctance of health professionals to accept alcoholism as medical cases invited the intervention of the social reformers which divided and tore this country apart for years.

January 1938: The first sale of "Works Publishing Company" stock is reordered.

January 1940: The first A.A. meeting not in a home begins at "King School". This will become Dr. Bob's Home Group and we can still visit it when we're in Akron.

January 4th, 1941: Bill and Lois saw their future home which they will name "Stepping Stones" for the first time, on a drive-by while spending the week-end with Ruth and Burt S. They will purchase it and spend the rest of their lives there.

January 24th, 1971: On this date, at 11:30 pm, our co-founder Bill W. moved on up to the 'Big Meeting'. Memorial services were held all over the world in the next few weeks. Ten days after his death, on page one, the New York Times printed Bill's obit. In newspaper history, which can be traced back to before the Civil War, an obituary had never before been printed on the front page!
