A COMPREHENSIVE HISTORY OF THE TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB

(compiled by Craig A. Stanfield from information including a 30 year history prepared by W. B. "Buddy" Grant, research, grant applications and information reported to newspapers prepared by Craig A. Stanfield, deeds of conveyances to and from the Tollesboro Lions Club, membership notes, photos, newspaper articles, including those compiled by Phillip Cropper (especially with regards to Obituaries of Charter Members and it was his research that provided the early Tollesboro Lions Club newspaper articles attached to this history), a scrapbook maintained by Leona Lanthorn, and items saved by Samuel M. "Mack" Wright.

LEGEND and NOTES: Items from the First 30 Years of the Tollesboro Lions Club by W. B. "Buddy" Grant. Buddy prefaced his history with a note that the information came from the memories of members as a filing cabinet had been cleaned out. It is for this reason that some of the events in the history of the club use dates provided by other sources (Ie: The ham dinner with Gov. Bert Combs was in 1961 according to Grant's history, whereas the photo of the event formerly in the possession of Mack Wright, which provided the names of those in attendance, was 1959. HOWEVER as Governor Combs took office Dec. 8, 1959 and was in office through Dec. 10, 1963, it is likely that Grant's date was the more accurate and for this reason, the photograph of the event uses a date of 1961 as is it unlikely that the Governor would have attended a ham dinner at our small club during the first days of office, particularly considering the Christmas Holiday. The date for the first Tollesboro Lions Club Fair was 1957 according to Lion Grant, but according to a newspaper account, occurred in 1958, which is consistent with the numbering system of the annual years of which the fair was conducted).

On December 12, 1953, the first organizational meeting was held to consider creation of a Lions Club in Tollesboro, Kentucky. Following several months of meetings, the TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB was chartered April 30, 1954, sponsored by the Vanceburg Lions Club. The Chartering Ceremony was held April 30, 1954, with 24 Charter Members, of which 20 members were present to sign the official Tollesboro Lions Club Charter. The CHARTER MEMBERS of the club are listed following (in the order in which their names appeared on the Official Charter): Charles M. Hughes (the First President of the Tollesboro Lions Club), Chelsea A. Merritt, Owen Cooper, Howard Frye, Ermen L. Boyd, Scott S. Corns, Newell E. Rudder, W. B. "Buddy" Grant, Henry Calvert, Martin L. "Newt" Voiers, Eugene Fox, Samuel M. "Mack" Wright, Charles A. Bane, Julian E. "Elmo" Gillespie, Harry L. Applegate, Harvey Brayfield, Lavae Secrest, Tommy Barbour, Boyd Harrison, and Orville "O. S." Highfield. NOTE: Not present to sign the Charter, but Charter Members as include at least one Charter Director and as a Lewis County Herald newspaper article from April 15th, 1954 - prior to the Charter signing ceremony - as including 24 Charter members, as identified in said article, included the following members (these members were listed on the program of the Official First Meeting Charter Ceremony, May 18, 1954 and were listed as attending the Charter First Meeting Ceremony in a Lewis County Herald newspaper article dated May 20, 1954): Russell Barbour, Charles Secrest, Bruce Barkley, and Omer Hamlin.

TOLLESBORQ LIONS

Lions International Representative, Gordon Smith, conducted a Lions' organizational meeting at Tollesboro, Monday evening.

Aften the history, activities, purpose and functions of a Lions Club had been explained by Lion Smith, it was unanimously voted by those present to charter a Lions Club at Tollesboro.

Next, officers of the new club were elected: Charles M. Hughes was elected president; Chelsea A. Merritt, first vice-president; Owen F. Cooper, second vice-president; Howard Frye, third vice-president; Ermen L. Boyd, secretary; Scott Corns, treasurer; Newell Rudder, Lion Tamer; William R. Grant, tailtwister, and Tommy Berbour. Chas. Bane Eugene Fox and Charles Secrest were sciented as the first directors.

The tentative date for the new club's charter night was set for May 18.

Tollesborg Charter Night

Tuesday, evening, commencing at 7:03 P. M., District Governor, Bertram Riggs, of Asbland, Ky., will formally present the International Charter to the new Tollesboro Lions Club. They will have twenty-four charter members.

The Charter banquet and program will be held at the Tollesboro High School Gymn and the dinner will be prepared and served by Mrs. Chelsea Merritt and her Home Economics Class.

The Vanceburg Lions Club is acting as the sponsoring club and their president-elect, Lion H. M. Bertram, Jr., will act as toastmaster.

A good attendance is expected, with large delegations coming from the Maysville, Flemingsburg and Vanceburg Clubs. Other Lions Clubs throughout Eastern Kentucky, and Ohio will, also be represented.

Following is an article from the Lewis County Herald dated May 20, 1954 which describes the May 18^{th,} 1954 Charter Meeting and those in attendance. It indicates that all 24 Charter Members of the Tollesboro Club were present, that 20 members of the Maysville Lions Club attended as did a delegation of members of the Vanceburg Lions Club, with members of the the Mt. Olivet Lions Club, the Flemingsburg Lions Club and Germantown Lions Club represented, in all 180 members and guests in attendance.

Tollesboro Receiv Lions Charter 20, 1954

In a solemn ceremony, Charles Hughes, president of the newly organized Tollesboro Lions club, last night accepted the charter from Bertram K. Riggs, district 43N Governor, of Russell.

It was charge night for the Tollesboro service club and 180 members, guests and visiting delegations attended the meeting.

Ralph Wallingford, president of the Maysville Lions, headed a delegation of 20 from here and Jack R. Kibby headed a delegation from Vanceburg.

Other clubs represented included Flemingsburg, Mt. Olivet, and Germantown.

The ladies of the Tollesboro P.-T. A. served the banquet in the high school gym and Dr. H. M. Bertram, Jr., to Vanceburg, served as master of ceremonies.

Twenty-four charter members looked on as the charter was presented during the highlight of the ceremony.

Officers of the new club include Chelsea Merritt, first vice-president; Cwen F. Cooper, second vice-president; Howard Frye, third vice-president; Ermen Boyd, secretary; Scott Corns, treasurer; W. B. Grant, tail-twister; Newell Rudder, Lion tamer; and Charles Bane, Tommy Barbour, Charles Secrest, and Eugene Fox, directors.

Other charter members are Russell Barbour, Boyd Harrison, Harry L. Applegate, Bruce Barkley, Mack Wright, Henry Calvert, H. Brayfield, Omar Hamlin, Orville Highfield, L. Secrest, Julian Gillespie, Martin Voiers. According to a History of the First 30 Years of the Tollesboro Lions Club by W. B. Grant, the Tollesboro Lions Club immediately began to make community service a priority, as in 1954, the Club sold light bulbs and raffled a calf in order to support street lights in the community. This fact is backed up by a Lewis County Herald newspaper article dated Oct. 7, 1954:

Tollesboro Installs New Street Lights

Tollesboro has recently installed a new system of street lights that adds immeasurably to the looks and convenience of our neighbor to the west. We understand that the light, known as the 'luminous' type, cost \$100 each and the bulbs \$17.00. They were the results of efforts of the Tollesboro Lions Club, and the maintenance will be borne by the club and the merchants of the city.

They are indeed beauthful and will add much to the convenience and safety of the inhabitants.

On the bottom of this page and the top of the following page, the 1955 Tollesboro Lions Club Ladies Night Celebration, a meeting of members and their spouses, said meeting featuring a dinner at the New Central Hotel in Maysville, KY.

The photograph below is of the head table, and includes 3 of our Club's Charter Members, all seated. On the far left is Treasurer Scott S. Corns, next to him his wife Dorothy. In the middle of the photograph is Lucille Hughes, her husband President Charles M. Hughes next to her (this was likely the last meeting in which he resided as the first President and likely the first "Ladies Night" of the organization, this being a meeting in 1955, the second year of our Club's existence. Note that it was probably relatively early in the year, as several of the ladies have sleeveless or short-sleeve dresses (more evident in Photo # 2, however Mr. Hughes' shirt is short-sleeved and the collar is open), thus this event was likely held in the summer, probably the event where the gavel was passed from Mr. Hughes to our Club's second President, Chelsea Merritt). In the right corner of the photograph, also at the head table, is Lois Wright, with her husband Samuel M. "Mack" Wright seated next to her.





The above photograph is a group shot showing the members in attendance of the 1955 Ladies Night at the New Central Hotel in Maysville, KY and includes members and their wives. This view of the membership in attendance was taken from behind the head table (the back of Mr. Hughes' head and the back of Mack Wright can be seen, with Lois Wright at the head table next to Mack looking directly at the camera; Elmo Gillespie is in the front seat left of the table to the right). The meeting was obviously well attended. While the names of the persons in this photograph or in attendance were not recorded, the photograph likely includes a significant number of our club's charter members and their spouses.

In 1955, with Chelsea Merritt serving as President, a Minstrel Show was organized as a fund-raising events, with the funds raised to provide for eyeglasses for needy children and to maintain the street-lights installed (NOTE: Grant's history indicated that these funds were used to place posts around the Tollesboro High School property so as to define parking areas). Later in the year, a Ham Dinner was planned and the members listened to a presentation about Civil Defense.

Tollesboro Lions

A large and appreciative audience filled the Tollesboro High School Gym to capacity to see and hear the "Plantation" Minstrel staged by the Tollesboro Lions Club Friday evening, January 14.

Many expressed surprise at the smoothness with which the show was presented. This reflects the care, patience and work that was exercised by the cast and much praise is deserved by Director W. E. "Buddy" Grant, the Interlocutor, Julian E. Gillespie, End Men Charles "Spid" Hughes, Harry "Cinders" Applegate, Tommy "Bones" Barbour, Newell "Candy" Rudder, Chelsea "Tarbaby" Merritt, Newt "Gumshoe" Volera, Scott "Cyclone" Corns and Lavae "Tambo" Secrest and the pnanist, Mrs. Ruth Dixon.

The skit of Mack Wright and Eugene Fox "Two Coons" was one of the highlights.

The audience, which despite the inclement weather included many from Vanceburg, Maysville and surrounding points, was especially thrilled by an "out of this world" dance by "Gluefoot" Gravit, the singing of Charles Frame, Jesse Truesdell, Tommy Barbour and the Teenage Quartet (Linda Dixon, Raetta Craycraft, Ellen Truesdell and Judy Farye), the music of Alvin Brown and family and the drummer Wyman Wyatt, the jokes and pranks of the end men and the Style Show, featuring "Models" Henry "Agnes" Calvert, Owen "Mabel" Cooper, Howard "Beckie" Frye, Charles "Fifi" Bane, Charles "Miss Brown" Hughes, Lavae "Miss Green" Secrest, Newt "Miss Blue" Voiers and Scott "Miss White" Corns.

The entire club is to be complimented for their efforts. It was a swell show with the proceeds, which exceeded two hundred dollars, going to good causes — namely, Street lights, in which the village can take great pride, and providing eye glasses for needy children. Congratulations to a live civic club for a good job well done!

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Tollesboro Lions Plan Ham Dinner

Tollesboro Lions have made plans for a country ham dinner to be served Thursday night at 7 o'clock at the school. Tickets will be \$1.75 and may be purchased from any member.

These plans were talked Monday night when 25 Lions had their semi-monthly dinner meeting in the high school cafeteria. The dinner was served by the Home Economics class under the direction of Mrs. Edith Merritt.

After seeing a Civil Defense film shown by S./Sgt. Statz, of the U.S. Air Force, the club voted to cooperate with the Lexington Defense Center by maintaining and manning a plane-spotting station on days to be specified by the Center. In 1956, the Tollesboro Lions Club was addressed by Dr. A. D. Odom, the minister of Mays Lick Baptist Church, with members of other clubs in attendance. Awards were presented to Seniors of Tollesboro High School. In July, Lion Buddy Grant was elected President of the Tollesboro Lions Club. Lion Grant later suffered a back injury that kept him from presiding over the March meeting (at which the Club witnessed a demonstration of Fire-Fighting Equipment).

Dr. Odom Addresses Tollesboro Lions June 28 1956

Tollesboro's Lions assembled Monlay evening at O'Nan's Restaurant or their final 1955-56 fiscal year neeting.

Twenty-one Lions and their guests injoyed an excellent dinner after which leaders in school activities for the past school year were presented with trophies in recognition of their iscellent work. Recipients of these ropries and the fields in which they iscelled were: Connie Craycraft, 4-H Benior Award; Terry Lee, 4-H Junor Award; Barbara Hamlin, School Band; Evelyn Hartley, F. H. A. Award, and Raymond Hackworth, F. F. A. Award.

Additional guests of the club were Mr. Clinton Hicks of the Maysville Lions Club and Dr. A. D. Odom, Mayslick Baptist minister, formerl of Maysville. Dr. Odom, as the speaker of the evening, made a very enpoyable talk, prefacing it with several witicisms and leveling off with an instructive and timely liscourse on the true meaning of Lionism, stressing cooperation, pullng together for common civic good, inselfishness and far sightednessdeals well known to all Lions but cometimes, under prdessure of modern business and social conditions, sight of which has been lost.

Perfect attendance pins for 1955-56 were awarded to the following Lions: W. B. Grant, Howard McNutt, Lavae Secrest, Martin L. Voiera, tay Trumbo, Harry Applegate and Owen Cooper.

At the business session after the linner, it was decided not to have a Fail Festival in deference to the sesqui-centennial celebration of Lewis County now being planned by the Vanceburg Lions Club and other County Civic Clubs.

The club was impressed with the order and decorum with which the meeting was conducted by W. B. Grant in the absence of President Chelsea Merritt. Consensus of opinion indicted that the officers and directors agreed that better order and more parliamentary procedure would achieve better results if followed in the coming year.

Install Officers UNIV 12 1956

W. B. Grant was installed as president of the Tollesboro Lions club Monday night when members met at the Tollesboro High school for a chicken dinner served by the ladies of the Christian church.

Other officers installed included Owen Cooper, first vice-president; Julian E. Gillespie, second vicepresident, and Scott Corns, vicepresident. Thomas Barbour was installed as secretary and John J. Gallenstein as treasurer.

Tail twister is Samuel Wright; Lion tamer is Ted Earhart and the new directors are Lavae Secrest, Martin Lewis Voiers, Archie Breeze and Harry L. Applegate.

Future procedures were discussed and committee reports received. A film on glass production and its use was shown by Messrs. Beal and Case of the Pittsburgh Plate Glass of Portsmouth. They expressed pleasure and surprise at the spirit and fellowship that prevailed at the meeting and predicted a bright, progressive future for the club. Local guests were Omer Hamlin, Jr., and Kenneth Carr.

Tollesboro Lions Club Meeting

Assembling in regular meeting at the High School Monday evening, seventeen members of the Tollesboro Lions Club witnessed a demonstration of fire fighting equipment presented by Mr. Dick Shumaker, representing American-Marsh Pumps, Inc., enjoyed a delicious dinner prepared by the F. H. A. girls, under the supervision of Mrs. Edith Merritt and participated in a discussion of the need of adequate fire protection for the village and surrounding area.

Ray Trumbo, chairman of the committee appointed to study the fire prevention conditions, pointed out that present equipment was entirely inadequate and that delay in obtaining new equipment might be dangerous. The club then decided to sponsor the purchase of the portable pump that they had seen demonstrated at a cost of \$634.00. This equipment is now on display at Cooper Chevrolet in Tollesboro and the public is cordially invited to inspect It can be used today-if needit. A public meeting on fire pre-Bd. vention and fire fighting will be held at 7:00 p. m. Tuesday, April 2nd, at the high school where the new unit will again be demonstrated.

After the meeting the club probeeded en masse to the home of W. B. "Buddy" Grant where he was presented with a small gift and, nore importantly, the sincere wishes of the club for his quick and comblete recovery from the back injury which has laid him low.

LEWIS COUNTY HERALD MARCH 29, 1957 ALSO in early 1957, the Tollesboro Lions Club had raised \$810 of a \$1,000 commitment made by the Club in the winter in order to support the Tollesboro Volunteer Fire Department so as to provide for improved equipment.

In 1957, at the regular club meeting, the Club had a little fun with one of the newer members:

Evening Of Fun For Tollesboro Lions Club It was an evening of fun for Tollesboro Lions Monday night as they voted Archie Breeze, Maysville barber, the most popular member for 1957. As a token of their thoughfulness, the club pressented Mr. Breeze with a cake, elaborately denoting decorated. and the group's third anniversary of organization. However when Mr. Breeze tried to cut the cake and distribute pieces for sampling he found that it was made of plaster of paris. But it was all in fun because the Lions were entertaining their hdies. They enjoyed a dinner served at the Tollesboro school by the Future Homemakers of America under the direction of their sponsor, Mrs. Edith Merritt. A sulogy, half humor and half serious was presented W. Grant, president of the group, by Clayfaits Nickell. Ray Trumbo, who sponsored two new members, received 8. handsome cigerett lighter with the Lions emblem. Henry Calvert and Charles Frame, who sponsored one new member each, were awarded a desk pen and wrench ' set respectively. President Grant was presented a gold plaque. A film depicting the basic prin-. ciples of the dial telephone operations scheduled to go into effect in Tollesboro was shown by a re-Presentative of the General Telephone company. A directors meeting followed the program. 10.00

In August of 1957, the Club lost it's first Charter Member upon the sudden passing of young 44 year old Henry Calvert due to a heart attack.

Henry Calvert, 44, Dead On Arrival At Hospital Here

Henry G. Calvert, Tollesborc carpentering contractor and builder, was dead on arrival at Hayswood Hospital at 12:10 p.m. Monday after a heart attack. He was 44.

Mr. Calvert, who lived a mile south of Tollesboro on Route 57, was being rushed to the hospital by his wife when he expired.

Member of a widely known Lewis county family, Mr. Calvert had been remodeling a house for Frank Browning during the morning. It was not until he returned home at noon that he complained of being ill.

The coronary victim, whose 80year-old father, Marshall J. Calvert, lives alone at Tollesboro, was one of his community's most popular men. In consequence his death, coming with such merciless swiftness, has cast a pall of sadness in many circles.

Mr. Calvert will be especially missed by the membership of the Tollesboro Lions club. He was a charter member of this service group, organized April 13, 1954, and last May was elected to the office of Tail Twister. An active participant in his club's varied philanthropies and public welfare projects, his community service was outstanding. He was also a member of the Tollesboro Methodist church and the Lewis County Farm Bureau. When "Modern Homes of Vance-

burg" was incorporated last October to construct houses for the influx of personnel connected with the US Shoe Corporation, Mr. Calvert was one of the incorporators. Another of the original incorporators, J. F. Bertram, Jr., of Vanceburg, was killed in an auto crash last spring.

Mr. Calvert, who enjoyed life to the fullest and made a friend of each person whom he met, had a convivial nature and outgoing personality. Standing high in public esteem, his death will be felt by countless numbers as an individual loss.

Born on March 27, 1913, Henry Gordon Calvert was the youngest of the eight 'children of 'M. J. Calvert and the inte Elizabeth Deatley Calvert.

On September 18, 1935, he married Miss Ruth Polly, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Polly, of Tollesboro, and also a Lewis countian by birth. Two children were born of the union and they are Mrs. Sue Calvert Hull, wife of Lt. Wendell R. Hull, stationed with the U. S. Air Force at Phoenix, Ariz., and Tommy Calvert, 14, to be a freshman at Tollesboro High School this fall, who was expecting to Wednesday for a visit with

his brother-in-law and sister;

In addition to his widow, his children and his father, Mr. Calvert leaves four brothers and three sisters. They are George Will Calvert, Tollesboro: Fred Calvert, of the Mason-Lewis road; Charles Calvert, San Diego, Calif.; Isaac Calvert, Bellevue, O.; Mrs. Myrtle Helton, El Monte, Calif.; Mrs. Roy Meeks (Goldie), of Tucson, Ariz., and Mrs. Wesley Luckey (Alice) of Maysville, Also surviving is one grandchild, Wendy Sne Hull.

The Barbour, Merritt and Hamlin funeral home, at Tullesboro has charge of arrangements. At the August meeting following the passing of Lion Henry Calvert, the Club testified to the late Mr. Calvert's contributions and dedication to the community. They also heard a presentation regarding the steps to obtain a public water service to serve the community:

Tollesboro Lions For Water System Told Steps Needed

Tollesboro Lions last night heard the fundamental steps necessary to establishing a water system in the community and were advised by Tom Underwood, Jr., of Lexington, to name a consulting committee to accelerate work on the project.

Mr. Underwood spoke to the Lions at O'Nan's restaurant as a representative of Kennoy Consulting Engineers.

A testimonial in tribute to the contribution made by Henry G. Calvert, charter member of the Lions club who died last week of a heart attack at the age of 41, was made by W. B. Grant, of Tollesboro. Also C. W. Nickels, brother-in-law of Mr. Calvert, delivered a fine eulogy to honor his memory.

Mr. Grant paid tribute to Mr. Calvert in that he found no task "too big and nothing impossible." Mr. Nickels observed, "Henry Calvert had his convictions and neither censure nor criticism him when he could change thought he was right. He was outspoken but always very considerate of others. To him, his family came first; he wanted them to have the best of everything and by his tireless work and perseverance he provided it." Mr. Nickels said too that Mr. Calvert loved the Lions club and was one of its hardest workers.

1958 – In 1958, the Tollesboro Lions Club protested an increase in telephone rates, named Julian E. "Elmo" Gillespie as it's new President, and had Tollesboro Lions Club member W. B. "Buddy" Grant elected as District Governor of District 43-N at the annual State Convention.

Lions Protest Phone Increase At Tollesboro

The Tollesboro Lions last Monday voted to send a letter to the Public Service Commission protesting the 25 per cent raise in the rate sought by the General Telephone Company.

This was done as Lions company. families in the number of 75 enjoyed a covered dish supper at Bechwood Park pavilion, Maysville, and heard Senator Ed J. Kelly of Flemingsburg discuss the workings of the past General Assembly.

Julian Gillespie was installed as president replacing Owen Cooper. 1960 - Grant's History indicates that we started a Scholarship Fund to aid students intending to further their education.

Purchase Tract 1960

The Tollesboro Lions Club this past Monday night purchased an eight acre tract of land for \$5,000 for a community park. The land lies in the west end of Tollesboro and was purchased from Coogan Barbour.

Tollesboro Grocer Passes In Hospital

Harvey (H) Brayfield, one of ; the best known and most highly respected residents of the Tolleshoro community, died last Thursday at 5:30 p.m. in Hayswood hospital. He was a victim of Hodgkin's disease.

Mr. Brayfield was 52 years old and had spent most of his lifetime in the operation of a general store.

His first business operation in Tollesboro was started in 1939, when he moved there from Mt. Olivet and opened a small grocery.

He kept this store until 1942 when he entered the United States Army to serve during World War II. He was discharged in 1945 and returned to Tollesboro the following year and purchased another store.

This year his condition became so serious he was forced to sell the business and retire. He had been admitted to the hospital just a week ago.

Mr. Brayfield was born in Nicholas county, September 15, 1910, a son of the late Harvey and Cora Dray Brayfield. He was married to Lyda White, May 30, 1936. and she survives as does a daughter. Kathy. 16, who is a student at Tollesboro High school.

The deceased was known by both young and old alike and held the admiration of the entire community. He was noted for his honesty and integrity in business and as a man whose kindness radiated as a part of his every day life.

Surviving in addition to his wife and daughter is a nephew, Billy Brayfield, of Tollesboro, whom he had reared.

Burnal was in Mt. Olivet cemstery, following services at Tollesboro last Sunday. The fair continued and has been an annual event since it's inception as a one-day event in 1958 through present day.

Grant's History indicates that in 1964 the Clubhouse was constructed, at a cost of \$10,500 of which \$9,000 was financed.

1965

The Club held a Pancake Breakfast for a new fund-raiser. Lion W. B. "Buddy" Grant was elected as a 2 Year Trustee to the Lions Club Eye Foundation in Louisville. The Club began to select a Citizen of the Year (see listing of all Citizen of the Year Recipients later in this historical compilation).

1966

The club built a ballfield on the Clubhouse Grounds. Promoted water and natural gas services for the community. Lion Ray Trumbo appointed Zone Chairman.

1967

<u>Lions Club International celebrated it's 50th Year of Service.</u> The Tollesboro Lions Club lit up the newly constructed (prior year, 1966) ballfield on the grounds. Held a Junior High Basketball Tournament. Lion Ray Trumbo was elevated to Deputy District Governor.

It was in 1967 that the Tollesboro Lions Club first expanded it's annual fair and horse-show to be a minimum of four days, and it was in 1967 that the Tollesboro Lions Club first conducted their annual fair at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds (it previously having been conducted at the Tollesboro High School).

According to Grant's History of the First 30 Years of the Tollesboro Lions Club, the Club gave \$25,500 for this tract of land, purchased at public auction, improved with a home, borrowing the majority of the purchase price. This property was improved with a tobacco base and a barn. Grant's notes indicated that the Club probably borrowed \$25,000 of the purchase price.

1967

His father was the late Edgar Boyd.


Mr. Boyd was a personable man who was liked by all who know him. His unexpected death has caused much sorrow among his many friends in this area.

Born in Lewis County on Feb. 18, 1912, he was the son of the late Charles P. and Bessie Hord Bane.



Kentucky's School-Saving Lions BY JERRY SHIELDS

here's not much in Tollesboro, a small but feisty farming community of about 1,000 in the Appalachian foothills of northeastern Kentucky. There's no city hall, no mayor, no chamber of commerce, not even local police officers. But, thanks to the local Lions club, there is a high school. And that's no small matter in a town where raising crops and raising kids are the lifelines of the community and the high school is its heart.

Located in the far eastern half of Lewis County and just south of the Ohio River, Tollesboro residents have considered themselves to be outsiders of sorts in matters of government and school affairs managed at the county seat in Vanceburg, 17 hilly miles to the west. An intense rivalry developed between the two towns, culminating in mid-1993 when the Lewis County School Board determined not to finance needed repairs for Tollesboro Junior-Senior High school and voted to close the school's doors. They ordered a 1994-1995 school consolidation causing Tollesboro's 350 students to commute one hour each way to Lewiston High School in Vanceburg. Thus was born the "Save-the-School" campaign.

The fact that parents were extremely upset by this scenario only added more urgency to saving the local school, according to Don McCann, past president of the 20-member Tollesboro Lions Club. "So we bought it and now the students can come back to school," he says in his country-style, matter-of-fact way as he sums up and at the same time downplays four years of bitter and highly emotional litigation, an attempt to form a separate school district and other action.

Although the separately located Tollesboro Elementary School was not affected and remained open, closing the higher grades stabbed at the very heart of the community.

Like everyone in town, the Lions club saw the financial impact of having no teenagers to "hang out" in town and buy at the country store or eat at the two small cafes. The video store simply gave up and closed its doors. Property values were said to have declined as 24 homes suddenly went up for sale. Worse, however, they all experienced the emptiness, the loss of the sights and sounds of these young people. "They were gone," one woman neighboring the school was quoted as saying. "It was like they were just sucked into some kind of hole." One of the 22 senior students of what would have been Tollesboro's 1995 graduating class observed, "We were cheated out of our senior year."

But it wasn't over; the Tollesboro Lions Club had a surprise. The club agreed to pay the "surplus property" price of \$95,000 to the school district for the two large school buildings, a separate cafeteria and several maintenance and storage shops located on the six acres in the center of town.

"When we first discussed buying it, we hoped it would remain a school. One of our concerns was that we didn't want it to become an undesirable site, like

a junkyard or anything," said Charlie Hughes, who was club president at the time of the school's purchase.

Hughes was the charter president of the Tollesboro Lions Club, established in 1954, and has served as president "three or four times," he says. He also graduated from Tollesboro High, was the agriculture teacher there and served as principal of both the high school and the elementary school.

Lion McCann, who was born and raised inTollesboro, worked for 18 years as branch manager of the local bank before illness forced an early retirement. He says a community meeting of about 500 residents at the school gymnasium voted "unanimously" to keep the property as a school. "They fought for it, they voted for it, so they got it," says McCann, thrilled with the vote. He and four other Lions are on the seven-person committee which temporarily runs the school.

Classes for the first enrollment of 13 tuition-paying students began in September 1996 at what is now a private school, according to McCann. The current student body is composed of seventh, eighth and ninth graders, with one grade scheduled to be added in each of the ensuing three years. An additional 50 students were enrolled in the 1997-1998 school year.

There are three paid teachers and a large number of volunteers, including McCann, other Lions, many parents of the school children and others from the surrounding community who do everything from operating the telephone, scrubbing and painting, sweeping and mopping, bringing in lunches for the students, doing repairs and even completing an overhaul of the heating system.

According to McCann, the Lions club will turn over the school's deed to the town if it incorporates, which many of the people would like to see happen, or to an appropriate school corporation once such a corporation is formed and the mortgage is paid in full.

Most of the \$95,000 debt is already paid off thanks in large part to an interest-free loan from a local individual and because of the many Lions club fundraisers. In that fundraisers are a major part of the social fabric of Tollesboro, the club seeks to pay off the balance of the mortgage in about five years, McCann confidently observes. In addition, the school is seeking funds for a multitude of repairs and supplies.

The Tollesboro Lions Club, however, is no stranger to raising money. Beginning in 1960, it raised the necessary funds to purchase 12 acres of land and build a fairgrounds. This ambitious and challenging project now includes a horse ring, livestock and show barns, a banked go-cart racetrack, an area for tractor pulls and a mud sling. Also, there is a floral hall, ball park, tennis and basketball courts, playground, concession stand and the Lions' own clubhouse and kitchen.

According to Buddy Grant, club treasurer and past district governor, the 12-acre facility, site of the annual fair and other events at the fairgrounds throughout the year, brings in an estimated annual \$20,000-\$25,000. This does not include such things as renting the clubhouse and kitchen to groups and sponsoring other Lions club's fundraisers such as breakfasts and dinners, variety shows, wrestling matches, trap shoots, antique car shows, white elephant shows, livestock auctions and other events.

"It was, in fact, a calf auction that provided the town's first street lights back in 1954," says Grant, "and various benefits have contributed to the fire department, the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation, scholarships, assistance to local families in need and Christmas toy drives, among many other causes over the years."

"We don't have any town government," observes Lion Hughes, "so it's us and the churches that seem to get things done."

There may not be much in Tollesboro, but there is a juniorsenior high school, plenty of good people and one very active Lions club. ■




2005 - The Tollesboro Lions Club permitted the Lewis County 4-H Buckaroos to utilize the Fairgrounds for their first Fun Horse Show. Two local Girl Scout Troops make use of the Tollesboro Lions Club Clubhouse for their meetings. We permit the Girl Scouts, or alternatively the Lewis County Color Guard to operate a concession stand free of charge during the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair as a fund-raiser. Summer Little League and T-Ball organizations make use of the ballfield, and the Tollesboro Lions Club purchased a baseball pitching machine to aid youngsters in batting practice, the use of which is free to area youths.

2006 - The Lewis County Future Farmers of America utilized the Tollesboro Fairgrounds for purposes of conducting a Speed Pull which was successful in raising in excess of \$5,000 for their organization. In 2006, the Tollesboro Lions Club expended in excess of \$30,000 on improvements to the Fairgrounds, including structural improvements to the Livestock Barn, purchase of portable bleachers to accommodate 600 persons, erection of a two-story announcer's booth to use for speed events and tug pulls, the placement of new fencing and concrete barriers for crowd control and safety measures. In addition, improvements made by the Lewis County Fiscal Court improved Lions Club Lane, widening the roadway and improving access to the Fairgrounds.

<u>2007 - CONDUCTING OUR 50th ANNUAL FAIR THIS YEAR!</u> Landscaping was conducted at the entrance along KY 10. Additional improvements made to the buildings on the Fairgrounds. The interior of the Floral Hall was completely remodeled; improvements were made to the interior of the two-story elevated announcer's booth; permanent scales were put in place at the Tractor Pull area.

2008 – The Tollesboro Lions Club, Inc. donated \$5,000 towards a sight saving stem cell procedure that a Mason County was planning to undergo in China (this type of surgery is not performed or available in the United States).
 2008 – As an additional fund-raiser, the Tollesboro Lions Club conducted an auction. Member Craig A. Stanfield, a Kentucky licensed auctioneer, donated his services to conduct the auction.



2008 – At the request of the Tollesboro Junior/Senior High School, Inc., the Tollesboro Lions Club, Inc. sold to the Tollesboro Junior/Senior High School, Inc., the Tollesboro High School Property by deed dated the 28th day of July, 2008, said deed recorded in Deed Book 224 page 71 Lewis County Court Clerk Records. The purchase price was \$86,250 (this is less than the \$95,000 purchase price paid for the property by the Tollesboro Lions Club, Inc.

2009 – We went online with our first website! This website was provided for free through Office Live. When this website went defunct, we created our current website, <u>www.tollesborolions.com</u>.

2009 - The Tollesboro Lions Club, Inc. entered into a lease/purchase agreement for the acquisition of 3.423 acre tract of land extending our land holdings to KY 9 and increasing our road frontage on Lions Club Lane as well as improving the overall visibility of the property. At the same time, we were provided with a \$75,000 50/50 matching grant (indicating that minimum investment would be \$150,000). With this as a lauching pad, our Club ventured to make the most extensive improvements at one time ever created on our grounds. We far exceeded the \$150,000 minimum project cost, expending \$182,000 on improvements to the Fairgrounds (however we likely got close to \$225,000 in value when considering the cost of our labor, donated or reduced cost labor, donated materials, donated hauling of materials, etc.); this required us to borrow \$75,000. Improvements made to our grounds in 2009 include:

A). Permanent Restroom Facilities (a \$90,000 cost. This facility matched a facility put in place at the Germantown Fairgrounds in Mason County, KY and they provided us with a set of blueprints to submit to the State and to the contractors to insure that they would comply with all legal requirements. The provision of the blueprints saved us a substantial cost, probably in excess of \$5,000, possibly considerably more).

B). Purchase and erection of a large set of permanent bleachers providing seating for over 600 persons (cost in excess of \$40,000 not including the costs of setting them up or constructing them. We set these on 18 32' long concrete berms each of which weighed 17,000 lbs., that were considered as State Surplus Property and which were donated to the Club by the Kentucky Department of Highways, however we had to pick them up and transport them).

C). Reconstructed our Horse Show Ring/Arena, enlarging it and replacing the existing wooden fence with vinyl fencing.

D). The acquisistion of the 3.422 acres that extended our fairgrounds to the "AA" Hwy permitted us to construct a new "speed-pull" track, creating a much safer facility for the speed truck/tractor events.

E). Made significant improvements to our water, electrical, sewage, and lighting services on the premises.

F). Installed a lighted sign along the "AA" Hwy. (the pole was donated to the Club).

G). Constructed a new 40' x 120' pavillion on the Fairgrounds to permit additional events such as music events, small remote control cars events, archery events, and auctions.

H). Made additional improvements to the Livestock Showbarn to better provide for FFA and 4-H Youth Livestock shows.

I). Renovated our two-story elevated announcer's booth to permit it to be used for events on both sides of the structure (as, due to the acquisition of the 3.422 acres, we now have a speed-pull track on the south side and a tugpull track on the north side of this building), while permitting the main level to provide for a concession stand (this by removing the staircase that formerly was situated within the main level of the building, and placing the stairway to the upper level on the outside of the building to create more space and allowing for serving windows on both the north and south side of the structure as we would now have events on both sides of the building).

2011 We lost a long-time member of the Club with the passing of Steve Harris.

2011 - We were fortunate to be a recipient of a \$40,000 grant through the Kentucky Department of Agriculture, State Aid to Local Agricultural Fairs Program that permitted us to add a second set of permanent bleachers, adding over 500 additional seats. The total cost of this project was in excess of \$55,000 (we had estimated the costs to be \$40,000 with the erection of the bleachers to be by the members of the Club; however our total investment/costs raised considerably as, due to the number of accommodations in seating the two bleachers provided, we were required to provide handicapped parking and seating areas. This in itself would not have been costly except that it required us to provide for blacktop parking areas and concrete ramps that we had not planned for. However we were able to accommodate these requirements and pay for the additional costs out of monies raised by the 2011 Fair).

2013 We lost another Charter Member with the passing of Newt Voiers, 92 years of age.

Martin L. "Newt" Voiers, 92, of Tollesboro, died Monday, January 21, 2013 at Thomson Hood Veterans Center in Wilmore, KY. He was born December 7, 1920 in Lewis County, KY the son of the late Charles and Teresa "Tressie" Hauck Voiers.

2015 – Thanks to a generous donation by the Lewis County Farm Bureau of \$10,000, a grant we matched, we committed to making an additional \$20,000 improvement to our Livestock Barn. In addition, an \$8,000 donation through Citizens Deposit Bank permitted the Club to place concrete flooring in the new pavillion erected in 2009.

2015 – After having one of the best horse shows in the state in 2014 (with over 300 entries), the USDA visited the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair to conduct inspections of horses suspected of horse-soring. Many entries left rather than have their horses inspected, and contacted other horse-showers to warn them of the presence of USDA inspectors. The impact was significant as the fines and ramifications (including life-time bans on horse shows) can be significant and can result in Federal charges. This caused the horse-show to shrink to less than 150 entries (less than half the entries from 2014) and resulted in some negative publicity.

Inspectors concerned about possible "horse soring" at Tollesboro fair

Concerns about a practice called "horse soring" prompted the U.S. Department of Agriculture to send an inspector to the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair July 15 and 16, said Dave Sacks, a USDA spokesperson.

Four citations were written as a result of the USDA's presence, Sacks said. The inspector's presence also likely contributed to a smaller amount of participants in the horse show, said Paul Hampton, horse show manager and Lions Club member

"Any show they've been to, it affects them big time," Hampton said.

The total amount of horses for both nights this year was just 135, compared to the more than 300 horses that were shown during the Friday and Saturday nights of the horse show last year, Hampton said.

According to the USDA, soring is the practice of applying a chemical, such as mustard oil, overweight chains or trimming a hoof to expose the sensitive tissue inflicted on any limb or a horse that can cause the horse to suffer physical pain or distress when moving.

"The practice of soring horses is aimed at producing an exaggerated show gait for competition," according to the USDA. "This practice is primarily used in the training of Tennessee Walking Horses, racking horses and related breeds."

According to the USDA, a similar gait can be achieved through selective breeding and humane training methods but soring achieves the exaggerated gait with less effort and in less time. Soring was outlawed under the federal Horse Protection Act, passed in 1970.

"We don't go to all shows, but certainly when we do go to a horse show we want to make sure no horses are being sored," Sacks said.

Animals are inspected by a designated qualified person before every show. When a USDA inspector come to a show, Sacks said they oversee the DQP process to make sure all protocols and standards are being followed.

Craig Stanfield, second vice president of the Lions Clubs, said horse soring has never been an issue at the Tollesboro fair and animal health is the number one priority. However, some exhibitors did not want to "take the chance" and left the show.

"It is a legitimate concern," Stanfield said of soring. "I just wish it didn't harm us nonprofits."

Friday, one violation was discovered. The horse had two sore feet. The Friday night violation will be a federal case, Sacks said.

Three more violations were discovered Saturday. Two horses had one sore foot each. Another violation was for a foreign substance.

All of the violations were for "padded" horses.

"The one violation listed as a federal case will be addressed by USDA, while the other three violations will more than likely be handled by the horse industry organization for that particular show," Sacks said. "For the federal case, our investigators must first conduct their investigation, then the case information will be turned over to USDA's Office of General Counsel. So, any potential fine will come about after this legal process."

The fair is the Tollesboro Lions Club biggest annual fund-raiser. The Lions Club contributes to several community projects and provides glasses for those who cannot afford them. They have also spent \$275,000 in the past four years on improvements to the fair grounds, which are open to the public for recreation year-round. The grounds include a walking track, baseball field and basketball court, Stanfield said.

By Misty Maynard The Ledger Independent 2016 – As the Pavillion now had a concrete floor, this improvement permitted our Club to host the Buffalo Trace Area Development District (BTADD) Annual Meeting on our grounds. The Chair of BTADD, also a Tollesboro Lions Club Member, arranged for a \$3,818.80 ADF Grant through an arrangement with the Lewis County Judge Executive and the Mayor of the City of Vanceburg, which the Club raised to \$7,500 to permit 1,000 linear feet of blacktop to be laid on the walking track.

The Tollesboro Lions Club opted to nearly match the ADF Grant Funds to increase the amount of funds available for the walking track improvements to \$7,500 adding to the ADF Fund allocation from funds on hand to permit approx. 1000' linear feet of blacktop repaying 6' in width. 2017 – The Lewis County Farm Bureau once again stepped up to the plate, this time providing for a \$15,000 grant (which the Club had to match) to once again improve the Livestock Barn. This required the removal of the old barn (the only original structure remaining on the grounds) to construct an addition to the original covered shed to permit a significant increase in the number of livestock holding pens; allowed for a new and improveed wash-area for livestock; and permitted construction of a garage type structure to permit the storage of gates, fencing, trash-cans, and other materials on the grounds.

2017 – ALSO in 2017, significant renovation had to be made to the Floral Hall Building as it was damaged by a car being driven through it. Extensive remodeling was required to get the building back into shape, but the repairs of the damage were covered by the driver's insurance.

Lions Club building damaged by auto, suspect found

Officials are investigating an incident at Tollesboro Lions Club Park that resulted in extensive damage to the Floral Hall on the fairgrounds. A suspect in the matter has been identified. Sheriff Johnny Bivens said his office was contacted Wednesday when Jim Meadows, a member of the Tollesboro Lions Club, discovered that someone had driven a vehicle into the building on the grounds.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB 2018 YEAR IN REVIEW

2018 was a particularly busy year for the Tollesboro Lions Club. In January, the club donated \$300 to support 12 Kentucky Lions Projects, including the Kentucky Lions Eye Bank, the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation, and Camp Crescendo. Members of the Club attended the Kentucky Division of Fairs Convention where the Club donated a Case Knife and an Orca Cooler to an auction event benefiting the Charlie Kachler Memorial Scholarship Fund, in honor of a prominent Fleming Countian who operated the Ewing-Fleming County Fair for many years. Also, the club purchased 250 pairs of reading glasses to provide to a Haiti Mission Trip.

In February, the club hosted guest speaker Mackdell Long, Secretary of the Russellville Lions Club who talked to the Tollesboro Lions Club about Water With Blessings, a project to aid under-developed countries lacking clean potable water sources. The Club members immediately acted to raise \$900 (individual donations, not touching Club funds) to send 15 water filtration systems to Nepal to support a village there (the World Health Organization estimates that approximately 2 MILLION PERSONS DIE ANNUALLY due to unsafe water, sanitation, and hygiene). The Club also at the February meeting announced it had collected 108 pairs of used eyeglasses to be sent to the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation for recycling (sight preservation has been a major Lions Club International initiative since an appeal by Helen Keller to the organization in 1925, only 8 years after the founding of the Lions Club organization).

In March, the Tollesboro Lions Club agreed to sponsor a member of the Lewis County Marching Band of Pride to participate in the Lions Club Kentucky State Marching Band appearance in Las Vegas, at a cost of \$1,300 (ultimately, the Kentucky Lions Clubs Organization opted not to send the Kentucky State Marching Band to this event, however has held onto the funds submitted to be used at a future event; so while no one from the Lewis County Marching Band of Pride attended in 2018, the Tollesboro Lions Club has sponsored an individual to attend at some future date). Also in March, the Tollesboro Lions Club hosted an Awards Banquet to recognize local businesses, individuals, and members for outstanding support to the Tollesboro Lions Club and the Tollesboro Community. At this banquet, the Tollesboro Lions Club informed non-members in attendance that the Club had committed in the Fall of 2017 to erect a new playground on the grounds of the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds/Community Park in 2018. The playground equipment was a grant provided by the Center of Disease Control through the Lewis County Extension Office, with the intention to fight childhood obesity. While it was announced that the installation of the playground will be a considerable undertaking, the facility will be a great addition to the grounds and should provide many benefits to the local population. However as the playground equipment arrived, it became evident that this was a project that was not just a weekend project that the club members could install, but would require significant expense and expertise to install, and thus the Club began to look into having the equipment professionally installed, and wanted to get on it

right away as the intention was to have the Playground installed prior to the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair in July, 2018, a lofty goal once it was determined that the project exceeded the abilities of the membership.

In April, the grounds of the Tollesboro Lions Club were the site of a charitable fund-raiser for the Faithway Baptist Church, with the facilties utilized for a Rocky Mountain Horse Show. Later in April, the Tollesboro Lions Club hosted a Meet the Candidates Event with a free meal (hotdogs and hamburgers, chips and drinks) provided to attendees compliments of the Lewis County Farm Bureau, with a cake auction as a fund-raiser to assist the Lions Club with their many annual projects.

In May, the Tollesboro Lions Club hosted the first of a number of Trade Day/Flea Market Events on the grounds and nominations for new officers were made (newly elected officers would take office July 1, 2018, just weeks before the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair).

In June, two members of the Tollesboro Lions Club attended a Lions Club Leadership Training Seminar. A Summer Trade Days/Flea Market was held in June. In addition, the Club hosted a Garden Tractor Pull. Two members of the Club attended a meeting of the Raceland and Greenup Lions Clubs to install officers. Due to the rapidly approaching 61st Annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair, the Club had made arrangements to have the Playground Equipment installed, contracting with a professional installation company to install the equipment to comply with all required specifications, as well as to build a new fence along the majority of the northern property boundary of the fairgrounds.

July, the busiest month for the Tollesboro Lions Club first saw the installation of new officers: President Steven Pedersen; First Vice President Lee Thomas; Second Vice President Anthony Wellmon; Secretary Phil Cropper; Treasurer: Bradley Schultz; Membership Chairperson Clinton Applegate; LCIF Coordinator/Past President Craig A. Stanfield; Service Chairperson Steven Pedersen; and Marketing Communications Chairperson Craig A. Stanfield. The 61st Annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair was conducted July 13th through July 21st, with a Tug Tractor Pull (Friday's event saw over 70 entries weighing from 3500 to 6000 lbs. and lasted until 3:30 AM!) and Saddle Horse Show on Friday, July 13th; a Tug Tractor Pull (Saturday's event had in excess of 100 entries weighing from 6,000 to 9,000 lbs. and lasted until 6:30 AM!!!) and Walking Horse Show Sat. July 14th; the always popular Tollesboro Lions Club Parade on Sunday, July 15th was a rousing success; the Powers Wheels Chldren's Demolition Derby, the main event Demolition Derby (it should be noted that Girls captured first and second place of the Demolition Derby Main Event, with 22 entries in the compact class putting on a great show. In addition, there was also an unscheduled full size class with 5 cars that also put on a good show!), Miss Teen Pageant, Youth Sheep and Goat Show, and Miss Pre-Teen Pageant on Mon., July 16th. On Tues., July 17th, the Floral Hall was receiving Entries and opened in the evening; Gospel Singing by a number of acts was conducted, as were ATV Racing, Remote Control Cars & Trucks, and the Hog Show (coincidentally, the 2018 Hog Show had more entries than the fair had ever held, with 116 hogs shown by 60 youth and 32 adults in 17 Market Classes and 1 Breeder Gilt Class). Wednesday, July 17 was the Farm Bureau \$10 Carload Night, with a full evening of events including Dairy Cattle Show, Petting Zoo, Boys 3 on 3 Basketball, Garden Tractor Pull, Toddler Show, Truck/Car Dirt Drag Racing, Little Miss & Mister Contest, and a Poultry Show! Thursday, July 18th featured a Steer Show, Motorcross Race, Bluegrass/Gospel Concert, the Lions Queen Contest (won by Jordan Ray of Carrollton, KY), and the Beef Cattle Show. In addition, as an unadvertised special, the Bluegrass Mule and Pony Pullers Association put on a pony and mule pulling contest (8 teams, 2 classes, a great show!!!). 2018 was the wettest year in recorded history, and all of Friday nights planned events had to be cancelled (The Battle of The Bluegrass Truck & Tractor Pull, the Talent Contest, and the Mud Sling, as well as free eye-screenings for adults and children which would have been offered). Saturday was almost a rainout as well, with the weather causing a cancellation of the Lucas Pro-Pulling League Truck & Tractor Pull as well as the free eye-screenings. HOWEVER rain --- not always intermittent but sometimes coming down quite hard --- was not enough to stop the Mud Sling! More than 700 persons paid admission to watch the event - at times sitting through the rain on the bleachers with rain gear and umbrellas - until the entire 10 CLASS event was complete.

In August, the Tollesboro Lions Club provided scholarships to 4 local students for advancing their education. Scholarship recipients included: Jaycee Evans, Kenedy Wellmon, Cheryl Griffith, and Leslieanne Harris. Also, the Tollesboro Lions Club contributed \$500 to support the Lewis County 4-H Boosters in purchasing animals shown by Lewis County youth at the Germantown Fair. In August, the majority of the Club membership showed up for a work night to install filter fabric and rubber mulch on the recently installed playground. Also in August, the Tollesboro Lions Club fairgrounds were utilized as the site of a fund-raiser for the American Cancer Society, the Lewis-Mason Relay for Life. Two members of the Tollesboro Lions Club attended the Kentucky State Fair and participated in providing vision screenings (over the 11 day run of the State Fair, 377 volunteers from 35 Lions Clubs donated 2,073 hours proving free vision screenings to 3,450 person!),

In September, the Tollesboro Lions Club hosted a benefit Tug Tractor Pull for a family whose home was burned. Unfortunately, heavy rains severely impacted attendance and participation, however the tractor pullers played for free, waiving any winnings. Due to the inclement weather, a second benefit Tug Tractor Pull was scheduled later in the month, but it was a near complete rainout. In late September, the Tollesboro Lions Club hosted a 30 class horse show and a Fall Trade Days Event. Also in September, two members attended the USA/Canda Leadership Forum in Columbus, Ohio.

In October, the Tollesboro Lions Club held an official ribbon cutting and grand opening event for the newly installed Playground. By the way, with regards to the Playground: The playground includes a Play Smart 10 Structure (this piece of playground equipment is a large component that cost nearly 1/2 of the grant monies offered by the CDC and includes a variety of exercising equipment that is intended to work the muscles. Included on this one component are 3 slides, stairs, rock climbing wall, overhead ladder and more. Portions of this piece of equipment are ADA compliant); a 4 Seat Bouncing See Saw; a 3 Bay Commercial Swing Set; a 2 Bay ADA Swing Set (this is a handicapped accessible swing compliant with the Americans With Disabilities Act, and includes a swing that will accommodate a wheelchair); 8' Toddler T-Swing Set; a Geo-Dome Climber; and a 4 Post Superior Shade (24' x 30', 8' entry height, basically a shaded picnic shelter providing an area for adults to relax while watching their children use the playground equipment). In addition, trash cans and picnic tables were added. The cost of the completed playground equipment including the installation, the filter fabric, rubber mulch, concrete slabs for the picnic shelter and to provide for access to the handicapped accessible swings, as well as a concrete curb to keep heavy rains from washing away the mulch, etc., was approximately \$60,000 (however this figure does not include the cost of the new chainlink fencing which forms the northern boundary of the playground, which cost the Club an additional \$17,000!); however the Club was the fortunate recipient of a number of grants and donations, which permitted the club to make this significant improvements to the grounds by obtaining financing of less than 50 percent of the total costs. Attending the Ribbon Cutting/Grand Opening Ceremony were county officials and other dignitaries, local businessmen and representatives of grant providers, supporters and persons who provided aid and assistance in obtaining the equipment, installing and prepping the site for installation of the equipment, partners who provided some financing for the installation of the equipment, as well as Lions Club members and officers, as well as members of the public, including a number of families who were enjoying the new playground during the ceremony (the Club also provided a light meal for those in attendance and the Lewis County Health Department gave away t-shirts proclaiming "Walk With A Lion" to youth in attendance to encourage the use of the playground, as well as walking track, basketball court, and other grounds improvements intended to promote a healthy and active lifestyle by encouraging exercise and otherwise deter childhood obesity). The Tollesboro Lions Club would like to thank once again the Lewis County Health Department, the Lewis County Extension Agency, the Lewis County Farm Bureau, Carmeuse Lime, Kenny Meadows and Kenton Meadows (dba Meadows Excavating), The Center for Disease Control, County Judge Todd Ruckel, the board and staff of the Buffalo Trace Area Development District and the BTADD Revolving Loan Fund committee, and everyone who aided in acquiring grants and helping to aid in the installation, acquisition, and setup of the playground equipment, including our dedicated Tollesboro Lions Club members.

In December, the Tollesboro Lions Club sponsored our First Annual Christmas Parade. It was a wonderful parade, a great success, and will hopefully become an annual event. Also in December, the Tollesboro Lions Club donated just over \$350 to purchase Christmas Gifts for four local underprivileged families/families in need. The Club also held their annual Christmas Party, joining our membership and their spouses at a nice get-together for an evening meal and entertainment/camaraderie.

Throughout the year, the Tollesboro Lions Club offers assistance to local persons needing assistance with the purchase of eyeglasses. In 2018, the Tollesboro Lions Club assisted 10 individuals at a cost to the Club of \$750.

The Tollesboro Lions Club was chartered in 1954, (our 65th Anniversary will be in April, 2019), and will host our 62nd Annual Tollesboro Lions Club this July (our first fair, in 1957, was a small one day event), over 9 days, July 12th through 20th. The Tollesboro Lions Club has 26 members and meets the 2nd and 4th Monday of each month. TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB MEMBERS DONATE TO WATER WITH BLESSINGS PROJECT

On Monday, February 12, 2018, at the first semi-monthly regular meeting of the Tollesboro Lions Club, the membership was met by guest speaker Mackdell R. Long, the Secretary of the Russellville Kentucky Lions Club about participation in an important project known as Water With Blessings and how Lions Clubs in Kentucky can assist with providing clean, potable water to less fortunate persons in Nepal and other countries throughout the world (the Water With Blessings Project is working to provide safe clean drinking water in a number of poor countries where water is available by means of ponds, creeks, streams, and wells, but in areas where the water is bacteria laden and where consumption causes significant health problems, Blessings With Water is a 501c3 organization, headquartered in Middletown, Kentucky that has been providing these filters to areas in need since 2008, and has distributed over 60,000 filters in over 45 countries in the past 10 years, mostly by cooperation with missionaries and church organizations. The World Health Organization estimates that approximately 2 MILLION PERSONS DIE ANNUALLY due to unsafe water, sanitation, and hygiene. Additional information about Water With Blessings can be found on their website, www.waterwithblessings.org). The speaker, a doctor, has been on several missionary trips including to Nepal. While there, he was moved by the thought that IF ONLY clean water were made available, half of the patient load could potentially be reduced. He learned about the WATER WITH BLESSINGS project and decided to get his club involved as a rather minimal investment can improve the lives for a significant number of persons. Then after seeing the success their club created, he visited another club and challenged them to be a part. His story was told at the recent Kentucky Lions Club State Convention and he was asked by Tollesboro Lions members in attendance at the convention to consider visiting the Tollesboro Lions Club, an invitation that he readily took up. Our club responded quickly as several members of the Tollesboro Lions Club banded together to arrange (without disturbing the Club's finances) an immediate donation of \$900, an amount of money satisfactory to provide for 15 water filtration systems as well as the necessary training to properly utilize and maintain these systems (Lion Long informed the Club that 15 filters is a good number to provide for a community to include training. The project trains local mothers, each woman is known as a "water woman", how to clean water and maintain the filter. The group likes to utilize local mothers as typically a mother carries the passion, compassion and love to want to improve her children's lives and as such tend to make good partners to insure the filter is properly maintained and cared for). The Tollesboro Lions Club funds will be utilized in cooperation with a Lions Club in Nepal not only to insure that these systems reach needy families in Nepal, but also to insure that proper training can be provided in order to most efficiently clean the water and maintain the filters. Each filter is reusable and can be cleaned in the event that they get stopped up with mud or debris by flushing with a small amount of the previously filtered water, and the filters can be used over and over and thus can last for a lifetime if maintained properly, providing an adequate source of clean, safe, potable drinking water to a family or even a small neighborhood. These filters do not require chemicals or power. These filters, used in conjunction with gravity and simple tubing and a 5 gallon bucket, were developed and are manufactured in the USA (the filters are known as the Sawyer PointOne) using state of the art technology and, while not capable of removing heavy metals

such as lead, mercury, arsenic, or strychnine, each filter may clean up to 100,000 gallons of water over it's lifetime removing particulates from the water to 0.1 micron (exceeding the EPA and NSF recommendations in the US for both tap water as well as bottled water) and removing over 99.99 percent of biological contaminants including intestinal parasites, bacteria (including salmonella, cholera, and E. Coli as well as preventing dysentery and typhoid) and protozoa (including giardia and cryptospondium) from water found in wells, creeks, streams, or ponds, cutting down on the risk of health issues and resulting in a healthier environment. The healthier environment then permits these now healthy persons to be more efficient and actually take part in improving their own lives, resulting in better nutrition, less need of medications, an overall generally healthier environment in which to grow and strive and allowing formerly chronically ill persons to devote more time to improving their lives by allowing them to work in fields, raise crops, and improve their lives as a whole rather than having to spend precious time tending to sick and ill family members/loved ones, as well as providing a means of reducing the need of expensive resources such as drugs and medicines to cure ills caused solely by consuming dirty water.

Several other projects were discussed at the last meeting. The Tollesboro Lions Club donated 250 pairs of eyeglasses to a Haiti mission last month, and have since collected 108 additional pairs that will be sent to the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation for recycling (preserving eyesight is a huge Lions Club International initiative and all Lions Clubs are encouraged to collect used eyeglasses for purposes of providing them to be used for less fortunate sight impaired persons throughout the world). The Tollesboro Lions Club has recently (and continuously) assisted local individuals in obtaining eyeglasses for those in need. It was also discussed in the meeting that high school graduation is not that far away and the Tollesboro Lions Club will also once again be accepting applications for scholarships to local students planning on furthering their education. The Tollesboro Lions Club Fair Committee discussed not only the 2018 Tollesboro Lions Club Fair which will take place July 13th through July 21st, but also a proposed Rocky Mountain Saddle Horse Show event to take place on the fairgrounds, scheduled for Noon, May 12th, as well as other events such as tractor pulls and,ATV and dirt bike races (both during the fair and at other times during the year) as well as the Annual Trade Days scheduled for the first Saturday in May (coinciding with the Kentucky Derby Day), May 5, 2018.

Lions Club International is an organization, that while started in 1917 --- the organization celebrated it's 100th Anniversary last year --- in the United States of America, has grown to where today it is the largest service organization in the world, with over 1.35 million members worldwide spread among 46,000 Lions Clubs with a presence in over 200 countries!! The Blessings With Water project, by providing for clean safe water, fits in with all of the Lions Club International's "Big 5" current goals: Improving Sight; Improving The Environment; Providing for Hunger Relief; Reducing Diabetes; and Reducing Pediatric Cancers. Lions Club International has set a lofty goal to improve the lives of 200 million persons annually by Year 2021 through the Global Service Framework initiative.

The Tollesboro Lions Club was chartered in 1954, operating for nearly 64 years, and hosting the Annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair since 1957 (a fair that originally consisted of a small single day event to today's 9 day event). The Tollesboro Lions Club has 26 members and meets the 2nd and 4th Monday of each month (winter months sometimes only have a single meeting, the second Monday of each month). The Tollesboro Lions Club owns the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds (aka Tollesboro Lions Club Community Park) fronting on the "AA" Hwy., KY 10 and the Lions Club Road in Tollesboro. The Tollesboro Lions Club will be adding a playground on the property in 2018 thanks in part to a playground equipment grant from the Center for Disease Control through the Lewis County Extension Office. The playground equipment cost approximately \$30,000, with the Tollesboro Lions Club responsible for all additional costs relative to setup, including concrete and other materials as well as labor required for erecting the equipment as well as providing for the location of the playground. A big plus to this improvement is that some of the playground equipment will be handicapped accessible. This project will replace the small outdated playground currently situated on the grounds, and will be a good fit with other existing site improvements already in place on the grounds offering opportunities to exercise and improve one's health, including the blacktop Walking Track that extends around the perimeter of the grounds and a basketball court. And while the Tollesboro Lions Club has made SIGNIFICANT improvements to the grounds in the past few years (including expanding the grounds to include frontage and visibility on the "AA" Hwy several years ago, and further including multiple enlargements and improvements to the livestock barn, replacing and enlarging the horse show track including erection of vinyl fencing, creating a great area for speed pulls and other events during the fair that includes elevated bleachers providing seating for hundreds of persons, placement of benches and trash cans around the walking track as well as resurfacing a portion of the walking track, as well as the erection of and improvements to other buildings located on the grounds), the Club is considering additional site improvements.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB HOSTS AWARDS BANQUET

On Monday, March 26, 2018, the Tollesboro Lions Club held an Awards Banquet. It had been many years since the Club last held such an event, the last significant celebration for the club (other than the occasional Ladies Night or annual Christmas Party) was the Club's 50th Anniversary Celebration in April of 2004, so the Club put together a significant program and complimentary meal to honor both members and supporters of the club, there being both many supporters and members deserving of recognition. Attending the banquet were approximately 75 persons including members, spouses, and representatives from local businesses and affiliations honored for their contributions and support to the Tollesboro Lions Club. Due to the size of the crowd, the meeting was held at the nearby Family Life Center of the Tollesboro Christian Church rather than at the Lions Club Clubhouse.

As members and their spouses entered, Tammie Brown, a professional local photographer, was on hand to photograph each couple in order to create a Lions Club Membership Directory (the Club's first) and entries were passed out for door prizes which were given away at the end of the meeting. The Family Life Center was decorated throughout with emblems of Lions Club International, including tablecloths, napkins, Lions Club "We Serve" centerpieces on each table, and banners placed behind the head table and the site of the awards presentation (in addition, the photos of Lions Club members and spouses were taken using a Lions Club banner as a backdrop). A slideshow presentation from the 2017 Tollesboro Lions Club Fair (our 60th annual fair, and the club's main fundraiser) was showing from 6:15 pm as members and guests first began to arrive, through the meal, and until the Awards Presentation began.

The meeting began at 7 pm., with introductions of visitors and a short statement about SERVICE (Lions Club motto: "We Serve") by current Lions Club Second Vice President and Treasurer Steve Pedersen (who coincidentally has been elected as the Club's next President, to take office in July, 2018, and whom spent significant time and effort making the arrangements for the banquet, setting up the banquet and placing the necessary orders through Lions Club International for the awards, banners and decorations). Members then introduced their spouses and guests. Welcome and opening remarks were then made by current Lions Club President Craig A. Stanfield. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Lion Club Member Anthony Katsumi Wellman and the Invocation was given by Lions Club member Larry Tucker, the Club's longest serving active member. Then a wonderful meal was served by local caterers Skeeter and Sonia Shaw.

Following the dinner, an address was made to the Club by Greenup County Lions Club Past President and Past District Governor James "Jim" Archey. In addition to statements about Service to others, Lion Archey applauded Tollesboro's commitment to community and service, praising the Club's Fairgrounds and recent service projects including contributions for Water Filters sent to Nepal, eyeglasses (250 pairs) sent to Haiti as well as eyeglasses collected and sent to the Lions Club Eye Foundation (180 pairs) for recycling, the sponsoring of a band member of Lewis County High School to participate in the Lions Club Kentucky State Marching Band appearance in Las Vegas later this year, scholarship funds to students intending to further their academic education, and eyeglass contributions to the unfortunate as well as contributions to Project Merry Christmas among other projects. Following his presentation, PDG Archey was presented with an antique key chain from the Lions Club International's 1967 Golden Anniversary, as well as a brass Lions Club paperweight. After this presentation, the Club presented Appreciation Awards to local businessmen and supporters who deserved recognition for their outstanding contributions and support of the Tollesboro Lions Club. Recipients included: The Tollesboro Volunteer Fire Department represented by Fire Chief Gary Thomas; longtime club supporter and electrician Glenn Cole; the Lewis County Farm Bureau Board of Directors represented by Lion Jim Meadows as well as Phillip Stamm; Lewis County Judge Executive Todd Ruckel; Lewis County Sheriff Johnny W. Bivens; the Citizens Deposit Bank & Trust represented by the Bank's CEO Mike Mineer; Carmeuse Lime and Stone represented by Lisa Wellman; Kenny & Kenton Meadows of Meadows Excavating; long-time assistant serving our annual livestock shows during our annual Lions Club Fair Mary Shoemaker; the Buffalo Trace Area Development District represented by Citizen Member/Past Chair/Board and Executive Committee Member/RLF Chairman Lion Craig A. 

The Tollesboro Lions Club was organized in 1954, celebrating our 64th year as a club. The fairgrounds consists of approximately 25 acres provided with several hundred thousand dollars of improvements including our Lions Club Clubhouse/Meeting Hall, a baseball/softball/Little League field, an outdoor blacktopped basketball court, a blacktopped walking track, buildings suited to use for picnic shelters and pageants (concerts, etc.), and with numerous buildings and improvements geared specifically for our Annual Fair, including a horse show ring, pulling and motorized event tracks with elevated announcer's booths, food booths, permanent restroom facilities, large livestock show barn (for beef and dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, and goats), the Floral Hall, permanent bleacher seating for nearly 1000 persons, and numerous other buildings. The Lions Club has made a commitment to erect a new playground on the premises this year (this playground is a considerable undertaking, the funds for purchase provided and made available through the Lewis County Cooperative Extension Office and the Center for Disease Control. The playground equipment, which will be handicapped accessible and includes a swing that will accommodate a wheelchair, the purchase cost alone being

approximately \$30,000 (excluding the costs of erection, anchoring, fencing, maintaining) was made available to the Lions Club under the condition that the Club provide for set up and erection of the equipment (including labor and materials which shall include significant concrete for anchoring and setting up the playground equipment, fencing, maintenance, and placement of mulch or other "padding" around the equipment) and making the playground available to the public for use. This will allow for the replacement of the small outdated playground currently in place on the grounds.

The Tollesboro Lions Club meets the second and fourth Monday of each month throughout the summer (in winter months, the Club meets the 2nd Monday evening of the month) at 7:00 pm at the Lions Club Clubhouse located on the grounds of the Tollesboro Lions Club Community Park and Fairgrounds.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB INSTALLING NEW PLAYGROUND

Nearly a year ago, Phillip Konopka, Extension Agent Agriculture and Natural Resources of the Lewis County Extension Office, approached the Tollesboro Lions Club about a Playground Project Grant offered through the Lewis County Extension Office. In order to accommodate Mr. Konopka's schedule, a Special Meeting was called of the Tollesboro Lions Club. Attending the meeting were 16 members of the club, a significant majority, including most of the officers. At the meeting, Mr. Konopka made a presentation relative to a grant offered through the Lewis County Extension Office made available through the Center for Disease Control and Prevention asking for a commitment towards making playground space available in Lewis Co., Ky, However to proceed, the Club would need to act soon as the deadline was approaching for submission of the grant application. The ultimate goal of the project is to provide a playground to be utilized by young children in the area so as to encourage them to get outside and exercise and thus curb obesity and wean them away from time spent playing video games on televisions/ computers/cellular phones, and as such, the CDC had made money available to encourage creation of nice playgrounds (not just a swing and a slide) to make the playgrounds appealing.

Mr. Konopka passed out photos of playground equipment that could be provided by the grant, and inquired as to whether the Tollesboro Lions Club would be interested in providing space for installation of said equipment and to make the equipment available to use by the public AND to commit to the costs of installation. The grant for the playground equipment was approximately \$30,000, however this was only the cost of the playground equipment. The cost to install would be significant and would require significant concrete for proper anchoring and he did not know how much the installation costs could be or whether installation would be something that the Club membership could do on their own. However, in order to proceed, he would need a commitment from the Club not only accepting the equipment and a commitment to permit an area of our grounds to be utilized by the public for use of the equipment (the Club does have the right to restrict use to certain hours of the day and limit use during the fair), but also to commit to the significant - albeit unknown - cost of installation. He would need a commitment letter signed by the Club President whereby the Tollesboro Lions Club would accept the equipment and agree to provide for a place where the equipment could be used by the public, as well as agreeing to provide for all costs relative to installation and maintenance, fence, and mulch.

Knowing that this project and commitment would provide a health benefit to the local population and always trying to make positive improvements in the lives of others, and having made and continuing to make significant improvements to the Tollesboro Community Park/Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds, and aware that this equipment should last for years and years and as such would continue to provide for an excellent use of club resources, a motion was made and seconded by members of the Tollesboro Lions Club immediately following the presentation, approved unanimously that very evening to approve the project and authorizing the provision of a letter by the Club President

to commit to the project (which was done the very next day). By the time that the equipment started to arrive, it was too late in the year to begin installation. As the playground equipment began to arrive, it became evident that the installation was NOT something that the Lions Club members could do on their own, particularly considering that the equipment would be used by children and that the Club would want to insure proper installation to comply with all installation specifications and to insure the safety of future users. Therefore, as summer approaches and hopefully the majority of a very wet spring passes, and in hopes of having the equipment installed prior to the Tollesboro Lions Club 61st Annual Fair (the 61st Annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair will be held July 13th through July 21st, 2018), the Tollesboro Lions Club has contracted with National Playground Construction (the company that sold the playground equipment) to install said equipment, as a cost exceeding \$14,500 (this cost excludes the costs of mulch and fence, as well as site-preparation), making the total project cost approximately \$50,0000!!!

The playground equipment will include a Play Smart 10 Structure (this piece of playground equipment is a large component that cost nearly 1/2 of the grant monies offered by the CDC and includes a variety of exercising equipment that is intended to work the muscles. Included on this one component are 3 slides, stairs, rock climbing wall, overhead ladder and more. Portions of this piece of equipment are ADA compliant); a 4 Seat Bouncing See Saw; a 3 Bay Commercial Swing Set; a 2 Bay ADA Swing Set (this is a handicapped accessible swing compliant with the Americans With Disabilities Act, and includes a swing that will accommodate a wheelchair); 8' Toddler T-Swing Set; a Geo-Dome Climber; and a 4 Post Superior Shade (24' x 30', 8' entry height, basically a shaded picnic shelter in place with picnic benches and trash cans provided as an area for adults to relax while watching their children use the playground equipment as well as an area where the family can eat healthy snacks and drinks so as to stay hydrated and under shade when necessary on hot days, as well as providing respite between showers on other days). The playground will be placed near the former location of a small outdated playground that consisted only of swingsets, located near the KY 10 entrance to the fairgrounds.

UPON COMPLETION of the Installation, the Club will arrange a ribbon cutting and small opening ceremony.

NOTE: The Lewis County Extension Office acquired two CDC grants for purchase of identical playground equipment in Lewis County, Kentucky. The second playground will be installed at Garrison and thus Garrison should have a somewhat identical playground area for the youth of that community to enjoy in the near future.



FREE EYE SCREENING FOR BOTH CHILDREN AND ADULTS WILL BE CONDUCTED ON THE GROUNDS ON FRIDAY NIGHT AND ON SATURDAY NIGHT FROM 5 PM TO 9 PM BY KENTUCKY LIONS EYE FOUNDATION LION VERNA SHARP (sight conservation has been a significant part of Lionism since 1925, a mere 8 years after Lions Clubs were first founded). TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB FAIR TUG TRACTOR PULL

On Friday, July 12th, and Saturday, July 13th, during the 61st Annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair, the Tug Tractor Pull event was a great success. Tractors from a variety of manufacturers were represented including Case, Ford, John Deere, Long, Duetz, Massey Ferguson, Allis Chalmers, Oliver, and International Harvester/Farmall, with tractors on the grounds dating from the late 1930s - early 1940s competing successfully with those of much more recent manufacture. Vying for percentage as well as heavy load, the top 3 winners would receive a cash prize as well as a trophy.

On Friday night, over 70 entries participated with tractors weighing between 3500 and 6000 pounds, it took a sled weighing 10,000 pounds to determine the final heavy load winner. Winning First Percentage was Preston Northcutt on a John Deere B; 2nd Percentage went to Jerry Ross on a John Deere 40; third percentage went to Jim Tolbert on a Oliver 880. Winning First Heavy Load was Preston Northcutt on a John Deere A, second heavy load went to Ashley Black on a IH Farmall M, with third heavy load going to Tanner Hord on his 400 IH Farmall. The event went into the early morning hours, ending at 3:30 AM on Saturday.

On Saturday evening, over 100 participants with tractors weighing between 6000 and 9000 pounds competed for bragging rights, a trophy, and prize money, including many of the same tractors and drivers from the Friday night event. First place percentage went to Jerry Ross on a John Deere A; second place percentage went to Ashley Black on an IH Farmall M, and third place percentage went to Tanner Hord on an IH 400 Farmall. Heavy load was won by Josh Lykins on a Case 870, the only tractor that pulled the sled weighing 15,000 pounds the full pull length of 10 feet; with a tie for second shared by Jerry Ross on a 720 John Deere and Daulton Fryman on a 7610 Ford, whom each pulled the 15,000 pound sled a distance of 6 feet (keep in mind that this does not consider a flat or clean track, or even a solid surface under the sled, as the track - by the time that the heavy load is determined - has been torn up and dug into by many other tractors and that the sled is also pushing significant dirt from these holes that have been dug into the track by previous entries throughout the night. By the time the event is finished, the track has the same general appearance as the surface of a washboard).

An exhausting event, the Heavy load winners were not determined UNTIL 6:30 AM on Sunday morning!!!

GIRLS WIN DEMOLITION DERBY RESULTS TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB FAIR

On Monday night, July 17th, at the 61st Annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair, in the Demolition Derby Event, girls took first and second place in the feature of the compact car class of the Demolition Derby! Despite overcast skies, drizzle, and a short period of rain, the event was heavily attended, bleachers nearly full, with a good crowd on hand to watch the Power Wheels Event, the Compact Car Class Event, and a added Full Size Car Event.

The first class was the POWER WHEELS DEMOLITION DERBY, where little boys and girls operating their battery powered vehicles put on a cute show for the crowd prior to the gas powered main events. All participants in the Power Wheels Demolition Derby Class received a trophy.

Although not originally included as a class, 5 full-size cars showed up, so a class was created and the participants put on a great show, speeding through, blowing radiators, crashing hot steaming cars into each other, with the third place winner eventually pushed into the bank and into a guardrail by the eventual class winner, going after each other as fast as their damaged cars would allow, until only one vehicle remained. He did a good job, driving this car and putting a hurt on the competition, losing a tire in the first heat, but able to get the car back in running condition and compete in the Feature Event, where he was even considered for the Mad Dog trophy by some of the judges. In the compact class, 22 participants beat up on each other, again spinning around and through the ring, putting on a great show for 2 heats with 10 and 12 cars respectively, with 10 cars and drivers meeting in the feature race. At the end of the feature, TWO GIRLS outlasted the guys to take first and second place (and they weren't treading lightly either, with one of the girls also considered by some of the judges as a potential Mad Dog winner), with first place going to Amanda Smith, second place going to Natasha Burgemier, third place going to Woodie Mullins, and fourth place going to Eric Taylor. The custom-made one-of-a-kind Mad Dog Trophy goes to the driver who did some of the wildest moves and made some of the biggest hits. Several drivers were considered by the event judges for this award, with this year's trophy presented

to Jeff Hunt who competed in the Feature without a radiator, going full speed as long as he could, and putting some tremendous hits on the competition until his car would go no longer.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB ADDS PONY & MULE PULL TO FAIR

The Tollesboro Lions Club Fair added a Pony & Mule Pull unexpectantly to Thursday night's (July 19th, 2018) event schedule. TRULY UNEXPECTED as, the event was considered for a Fair Event but some due to some communication glitches and scheduling issues, the Tollesboro Lions Club did not receive confirmation that the date was firmed up, and was of the opinion that the event was scratched and therefore not placed in the Fairbook or on the Schedule of Events. However at nearly 5 pm., trailers started to arrive with pony pulling teams as the Bluegrass Pony & Mule Pullers Association had placed the event on their event calendar and participants began to show up. In addition, the sled and blocks arrived as well. The Tollesboro Lions Club hastily got on board, preparing the track in the Horse Show Warm-Up Ring, placing bleachers for spectators, and otherwise preparing for the event. However the Bluegrass Pony & Mule Pullers Association was prepared: They provided their own announcers, PA system, sled, workers whom added weights to the sled, etc., basically as self-contained event, the only other thing that the Tollesboro Lions Club had to provide was a tractor to pull the sled off their trailer, and to set the sled for the pullers occasionally.

Eventually EIGHT TEAMS showed up, making for 2 classes of 4 teams each, a heavy class and a light class. Pullers

and teams came from as far away as Columbia in Adair County, and a small town near Lake Cumberland to compete. This is a percentage pull, with the winning team pulling the highest percentage of weight the greatest distance. Teams were weighed, and then handicapped according to their weights, pulling from lightest in the class to the heaviest in the class, with additional weights added to the sled as heavier teams began to pull, the weights being added corroborated to the weight difference in the lighter to heavier teams. By the way, if you have never experienced a pony/mule/horse pull before: You will never see any athlete who has any more will to compete than these animals do. They know what is expected and they prance expectantly waiting to hear that clank when the double-tree hook catches the sled, and are ready to pull at under a second's notice. The dangerous part of the ordeal is for the person responsible to hook the sled to the double-tree, as if you place your hand in the wrong place, you could suffer a severe injury as these horses are excited and eager to show their ability, regardless the weight of the sled. And they don't want to stop at the minimum full-pull length either! They want to pull the sled as far as they possibly can.

In the light class, the teams were required to pull the sled a minimum distance of 12 feet for a full pull. In the heavier class, the minimum distance to pull the sled is 15 feet for a full pull. Winning the Light Class were Bud and Pete of O'Neill and Harp of Dry Ridge, KY, a team weighing 1656 lbs. pulling a 5130 lb. sled. In the heavy class, David Purvis of Lexington, KY took home first place honors for the first time this year, with his team Curley and Amos, the team weighing 1975 pounds pulling a 5010 lb. sled.

The Bluegrass Pony & Mule Pullers Association was only started this year, so glitches are to be expected, thus the reason that this became an unadvertised special event. However, the members of the Association were dedicated to their craft, came prepared and basically completely self-sufficient, requiring very little of the Club to put on the event (basically, the only things that the Club had to provide -- other than some financial assistance -- was a place to conduct the event with seating for the crowd, and a tractor and tractor driver for placement of the sled. They provided the sled, blocks, labor, announcer, PA system, their own event liability insurance coverage, their own awards (nice laser engraved plaques of solid wood with mahogany trim) --- basically everything else required to put on a show, and every puller and member of the Association was both personable and extremely nice to work with and the Tollesboro Lions Club hopes to make this event a part of next year's fair.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB FAIR ENDS IN NEAR RAINOUT... ALMOST! HOWEVER THE MUD SLING NOT FAZED BY WEATHER!

Despite HEAVY RAINS before the start of the event, continuing through a portion of the event, the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair was determined to end on a high note, promising not to cancel the Mud Sling due to rain (as rain makes mud. Right?), making a promise to drivers to conduct the event as long as lightning did not pose a danger to participants and crowds. The bleachers ended up being fairly full, although not overly crowded either, as people showed up to brave the weather conditions to witness the Mud Sling Event Saturday evening, July 21st, the last day of the 61st Annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair.

The Mud Sling is the one event that rain by itself (lacking lighting and high winds) couldn't end. A number of drivers contacted the Club to insure that --- no matter how much rain fell (barring lightning) --- that the Mud Sling event would prevail, and committed to bringing their trucks to play in the mud. And what mud it was. Deep, wet, sticky, messy: MUDDY. A mud-sling lover's dream, resulting in over 700 people paying the cost of admission to watch the event, walking through the sloppy wet grounds, sitting in the rain and drizzle on the bleachers, waiting for the event to begin, some with and some lacking umbrellas.

Luckily, the rain while cooling, did not make for a cold evening, due to the high humidity from the heat of the sun earlier in the day. The event started fairly early, albeit delayed, with the Kid's Power Wheels event beginning about 7 pm. HOWEVER before the first class could begin, another heavy rain came in, pelting the grounds with water, probably at least an inch, maybe more, making the track finally a good muddy consistency (earlier, the Club was busy wetting the track and working it over with a 4 wheel drive tractor operating a pto-drive rear tiller and a bulldozer to break up the dirt and mix with water to make the mud necessary for the event. After the heavy rain just before the event, the water flowed onto the track, helping make the track a real winner, with a mud sling track on the east side of the track, and the 'bog" located on the west side of the track. Sixteen Members of the Tollesboro Lions Club met Monday Aug. 13th for a "Work Night" to begin installation of filter fabric and rubber mulch for the newly installed playground located at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds Community Park. The actual installation of the playground equipment was more than the Tollesboro Lions Club could handle, thus the Tollesboro Lions Club contracted with a professional installation company at a cost of \$14,615 (the does not include the cost of the filter fabric, the rubber mulch, or the playground equipment). The Lewis County Farm Bureau has graciously reimbursed the Tollesboro Lions Club \$15,000 to reimburse the Club for the cost of installation of the playground equipment. The playground equipment was provided by a grant obtained by the Lewis County Extension Office through the Center for Disease Control to encourage kids to exercise and play outdoors rather than inside on video games and is a first class playground setup (the grant was for approximately \$35,000!!! A duplicate playground was also provided by an identical grant to be placed in Garrison); portions of the playground equipment are ADA compliant, handicapped accessible, and includes a wheelchair swing suited to use even by adults. It will be necessary to pour concrete for the shade shelter structure and the handicapped accessible wheelchair swing before the playground is completed (the costs of concrete slabs will be just over \$3,100 and the cost of rubber mulch was in excess of \$5,000 (installation is scheduled for Aug. 21, 2018). The Tollesboro Lions Club is proud to add this first class playground to the site improvements at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds/Community Park and hopes that it will be enjoyed by area youth for years to come. A dedication ceremony and ribbon cutting will be held in the near future.



TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB FAIRGROUNDS SITE OF RELAY FOR LIFE EVENT

The LEWIS-MASON COUNTY RELAY FOR LIFE, a fund-raiser for the American Cancer Society, will be held at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds August 25th, 2018. TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB TO HOST BENEFIT TUG TRACTOR PULL



TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB MEMBERS TAKE PART IN KLEF STATE FAIR VISION SCREENING

Two members of the Tollesboro Lions Club, current President Steve Pedersen and Zone Chairman Clinton Applegate attended the Kentucky State Fair on Thursday, August 23, 2018 for the purpose of vision screening under the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation from 3 pm to 8 pm. At the State Fair, over 11 days, 377 volunteers from 35 Lions Club organizations donated 2,073 hours to provide Free Vision Screenings to 3,450 persons! Of the 3,450 persons receiving free vision screenings, 2,448 were above 7 years of age, and 1,002 were under the age of 6. There were 918 passes and 84 referrals provided! Sight conservation is the main goal of Lions Club International since 1925 (a mere 8 years after the organization was created in 1917; the Lions Club International celebrated 100 years as a service organization in 2017!) when Helen Keller personally appealed to the Lions Club Annual Convention and challenged Lions to become "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness". Today, Lions Club International (which became an international organization in 1920, 3 years after the organization was originated) is the world's largest service organization, with 1.35 million members in over 200 countries with over 46,000 clubs scattered throughout the world.

The playground equipment will include a Play Smart 10 Structure (this piece of playground equipment is a large component that cost nearly 1/2 of the grant monies offered by the CDC and includes a variety of exercising equipment that is intended to work the muscles. Included on this one component are 3 slides, stairs, rock climbing wall, overhead ladder and more. Portions of this piece of equipment are ADA compliant); a 4 Seat Bouncing See Saw; a 3 Bay Commercial Swing Set; a 2 Bay ADA Swing Set (this is a handicapped accessible swing compliant with the Americans With Disabilities Act, and includes a swing that will accommodate a wheelchair); 8' Toddler T-Swing Set; a Geo-Dome Climber; and a 4 Post Superior Shade (24' x 30', 8' entry height, basically a shaded picnic shelter in place with picnic benches and trash cans provided as an area for adults to relax while watching their children use the playground equipment as well as an area where the family can eat healthy snacks and drinks so as to stay hydrated and under shade when necessary on hot days, as well as providing respite between showers on other days).

The new playground has ADA (Americans With Disabilities Act) approved features to provide for exercising, including an adult-rated wheelchair swing. The total investment of the new playground (including the equipment, installation, site preparation, mulch, filter fabric) was approximately \$60,000! Attendees included Rocky Adkins (Ky House of Representatives, Minority Floor Leader), Michelle Keller (Justice Kentucky State Supreme Court), Kentucky Lions Club District 43-Y District Governor Mary Wethington, County Judge Executive Todd Ruckel, Lewis County Sheriff Johnny Bivens, Lewis County Magistrate District 1 Terri Thomas, Members of the Lewis County Farm Bureau Board of Directors: Jim Meadows, Chairman (owner of Rip's Feed Mill, a great supporter, as well as a member, of the Tollesboro Lions Club), Philip Stamm, Rex Elam, Kathy Dillow (also a member of the Buffalo Trace Area Development District Board of Directors representing Lewis Co.), Jr. Walker, and Dwight Malone; Lewis Co. Extension Agent, Agriculture and Natural Resources Philip Konopka; Lewis County Health Department Director Anita Bertram; Buffalo Trace Area Development District Executive Director Amy Kennedy and Loan Officer Amanda Ruark, as well as Craig Stanfield (Past Chair BTADD, current member Board of Directors and Executive Committee representing Lewis Co as a Citizen Member, also Chair of the BTADD Revolvng Loan Fund, as well as a member of the Tollesboro Lions Club, Immediate Past President, current LCIF Coordinator and Marketing Communications Chairman); Buffalo Trace Revolving Loan Fund Board Member Buddy Gallenstein (also a member of the Executive Committee BTADD RLF Board, representing Mason Co.); Lisa Wellman representing Carmeuse Lime; Meadows Excavating represented by Kenny Meadows and Kenton Meadows; and the following Tollesboro Lions Club members: Steve Pedersen (current Club President and Club Service Chairman), Clinton Applegate (current Zone Chairman and current Club Membership Chair), Lee Thomas (current Club First Vice President), Anthony Wellman (current Club Second Vice President), Phil Cropper (current Club Secretary), Brad Schultz (current Club Treasurer), Mark Conrad, David Hampton, Paul Hampton, James Harris, Charlie Kendall, Terrell McCall, Daymond Thomas, and Larry Tucker. Also in attendance were a number of spouses of the Lions Club members, as well as members of the public at large, including a number of parents with their children making use of the playground facility.

The celebration opened with introductions of Special Guests and Dignataries by Lion Craig A. Stanfield, followed by

a few words by Lions Club President Steven Pedersen. Steve informed the public of just what went into the project, a project that has cost exceeding \$65,000!!! The Club was very fortunate to receive the grant for the equipment, the additional grants from partners such as the Lewis County Farm Bureau, the donated labor from Meadows Excavating. We only had to borrow \$24,000 to complete this wonderful project!

Lion Pedersen then introduced District Governor of Lions Club District 43Y to speak. After a few words, KY State Representative/Minority Floor Leader Rocky Adkins spoke, followed by Justice Michelle Keller and County Judge Todd Ruckel. Then the crowd assembled for the actual ribbon cutting ceremony, scissors operated by Lion District Governor Mary Wethington, with photos taken. This was followed by the crowd proceeding to the Pavilion where they were treated to pork tenderloin sandwiches, hamburgers/cheeseburgers, hotdogs/chili-dogs, chips, cookies, and drinks (at no cost), and t-shirts proclaiming "Walk With A Lion" were provided by the Lewis Co. Health Department to those in attendance.

ABOUT THE TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB PLAYGROUND

The playground was first brought up to the Tollesboro Lions Club by a Special Called meeting when the Club was first approached in the fall of 2017 by Philip Konopka of the Extension Office to determine whether the Club would be willing to take on the project as an approximate \$30,000 grant was available to acquire the playground equipment through a grant through the Center for Disease Control in order to fight childhood obesity and get kids outside playing and exercising in the outdoors on the playground equipment rather than only exercising their thumbs playing video games. The playground grant was for in excess of \$30,000 (picnic tables and trash cans were added to the final total to increase the cost to basically \$35,000).

Almost blind, with no idea of what the costs to complete such a project might be, the Club unanimously agreed to support the project, thinking that we as a Club could erect the equipment in a weekend at little or no cost to the club except for some concrete to anchor the equipment in the ground. Authorization was granted by the Club for the President to sign a binder taking on the project. A few days later, the Club was informed that the grant was approved, obligating the Club to proceed.

Months later, as load after load and pallet after pallet of equipment began to arrive, it became quickly evident that this WAS NOT a weekend installation project at all. Also as the equipment was to be used by children, the membership of the Club would not feel comfortable installing the equipment on their own, as no member of the Club would be able to sleep at night if a child were injured due to an incorrect installation. Thus, it was decided to ask for bids for installation.

When the first bids came in at over \$17,000, we knew we bit off more than we could chew. We finally had an installation bid of \$14,615, still a large number, but knowing that the children of our community were worth it, we determined to look into financing the installation of not only the playground, but also for replacement construction of a chain-link fence along portions of our north boundary. We got a big surprise AGAIN when fence installation bids came in at over \$17,000!!! Still we persevered. We had some money to put into the project, but not enough. So we contacted the Buffalo Trace Area Development District to look into a loan through their Revolving Loan Fund, a fund we had tapped before and with which we were still making loan payments. The Club asked for and was approved for a loan of \$24,000. Once we began construction, it became evident that we were going to need every dime, as these costs did not include concrete necessary to permit use of the handicapped accessible wheelchair swing (another \$3,000+) or for rubber mulch (another \$5,000+) and thinking to ourselves, "we'll just have to dip into our reserves and profits from our fair and hope for the best". Then the Lewis County Farm Bureau came to our aid, offering a \$15,000 grant to cover the installation costs of the playground! Then Carmeuse offered 100 tons of gravel to allow for parking. Then Kenny Meadows and Kenton Meadows informed the Club that they were donating the costs of the work they had performed to grade the site and make necessary preparations for the installation. Then Tony Hardesty donated two additional benches. AND, we thought to ourselves, we have it covered, we have it done. And we had a work night with 16 members of the Club coming together to install the rubber mulch. HURRAY! Only to have rain after rain after rain, inch after inch after inch, hit us (and everyone else too) and wash away some of the rubber mulch. So, back to the drawing board; so, we ordered more rubber mulch (I don't even know how much this cost), and we are still ordering more (to be installed very soon!). And to keep the water from washing it away, we decided it was necessary to build a concrete curb to shed the water away from the playground (another \$2,000!). But we were so close to finishing, and were able to handle these added expenses on our own and be done with it! Yes, we have some debt to repay. But we have a first class playground, a playground that we are proud of, and which we hope our community will appreciate, use and protect. A playground for future generations to enjoy for years and years to come!

The playground equipment includes a Play Smart 10 Structure (this piece of playground equipment is a large component that cost nearly 1/2 of the grant monies offered by the CDC and includes a variety of exercising equipment that is intended to work many different muscles and muscle groups. Included on this one piece of equipment are 10 components including 3 slides, stairs, rock climbing wall, overhead ladder and more. Portions of this piece of equipment are ADA compliant); a 4 Seat Bouncing See Saw; a 3 Bay Commercial Swing Set; a 2 Bay ADA Swing Set (this is a handicapped accessible swing compliant with the Americans With Disabilities Act, and includes a swing that will accommodate a wheelchair); 8' Toddler T-Swing Set; a Geo-Dome Climber; and a 4 Post Superior Shade (24' x 30', 8' entry height, basically a shaded picnic shelter) as well as picnic tables, benches, and trash cans. This is provided as an area for adults to relax while watching their children use the playground equipment as well as an area where the family can eat healthy snacks and drinks so as to stay hydrated and under shade when necessary on hot days, as well as providing respite between showers on rainy days. This structure also has already seen use for birthday parties for kids while enjoying the playground with their friends and family. The playground is located near the former location of a small outdated playground that consisted only of swing-sets and a slide, located near the KY 10 entrance to the fairgrounds.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB MARCH MEETING and BLUEGRASS LIONS DIABETES PROJECT

At the regular meeting of the Tollesboro Lions Club, March 25th, 2019, the Club heard a presentation by Lexington Lions Club member and District 43-Y Regional Chairman Pat Ryan on the BLUEGRASS LIONS DIABETES PROJECT. Attending the meeting, in addition to members of the Tollesboro Lions Club, were Tim Bowden (Past Lions Club 43-Y District Governor 1986-1987) and Roger Brown (Past Lions Club 43-Y District Governor 1990-1991), both of the Vanceburg Lions Club.

The BLUEGRASS LIONS DIABETES PROJECT is a project that will be promoted by and available to all clubs of District 43-Y in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Lions Club International has been a promoter of SIGHT PRESERVATION since Helen Keller personally appealed to Lions Club International at their Annual Convention in 1925 (this was only 8 years after the organization's inception in 1917 and only 5 years after the organization became not only a United States institution but rather an International organization in 1920) to become "Knights of the Blind in the Crusade Against Darkness". NOTE: Sight Preservation is one of the FIVE GLOBAL CAUSES supported by Lions Club International. The Five Global Causes supported by Lions Club International are: Diabetes (reduce the prevalence of diabetes and improve quality of life for those diagnosed), Vision (prevent avoidable blindness and improve quality of life for people who are blind and visually impaired), Hunger (to ensure all community members have access to nutritious foods), Environment (to sustainably protect and restore our environment to improve the wellbeing of all communities), and Childhood Cancer (to help those affected by childhood cancer survive and thrive). As such, virtually every Lions Club throughout the world (there are approximately 1.4 million Lions Club members in approximately 46,000 clubs in over 200 countries worldwide) typically promote sight preservation in some fashion by various means. Most Kentucky Lions Clubs can be counted on to provide eyeglasses to those in need, provide for and or promote vision screenings, refer vision impaired to the Kentucky Lions Eye Institute in Louisville and by supporting the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation KLEF (both of which were founded by and are supported by Kentucky Lions Clubs), the collection of used eyeglasses and reading glasses for recycling for use in other countries, and other ways (the Tollesboro Lions Club in 2018 donated \$900 for the purchase and provision/training of water filters for a village in Nepal to provide a clean source of drinking water to aid not only in improving the health of the Nepalese people but to prevent bacterial infections which cause illnesses that can lead to blindness; donated 250 pairs of eyeglasses to a Haiti mission trip; collected and donated over 400 pairs of eyeglasses for recycling; provided eyeglasses to locals in need; and assisted in eye screenings). Diabetes, in addition to causing catastrophic debilitation to organs and circulation problems within the body, is a major contributing cause of blindness. As such, Lions Club International has recognized it as a disease that it wants to bring to the forefront as many people do not know they are at risk or even have the disease until such time as the disease has caused damage to one's body. Therefore, Lions Club International is offering matching dollar grants (potentially \$3 match to each dollar provided) for the BLUEGRASS LIONS DIABETES PROJECT so as to provide for A1C screenings and assessment surveys (the survey/assessment is a simple "at risk" indicator, typically asking 7 simple questions) - and potentially retinopathy screenings - at events conducted and/or hosted by Lions Clubs organizations within District 43-Y in order to:

1). Identify those with or at risk for diabetes.

2). Lead those with diabetes or at risk for diabetes to programs to control and manage the disease.

As such, District 43-Y has begun a fund-raising campaign to build up monies so as to leverage these funds by applying for grant monies offered through the Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF) so that screenings and assessments can be conducted throughout the District at various functions (such as County Fairs, the Tollesboro Lions Club being a host of a large fair each year and it is hoped that screenings will be offered to the public at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair or other local events) to help identify those at risk and to then provide help in locating programs to control and manage the disease.

There are two types of programs that those at risk will be recommended to:

1). DPP or Diabetes Prevention Program is for those with Type II diabetes which is related to lifestyle which promotes healthier eating habits and increased physical activity.

2). DSMES - Diabetes Self Management Education and Support for those with Type I Diabetes which is related to genetics.

Both of these programs are designed to aid in the management and control of diabetes.

Following the presentation, which was well received, Tollesboro Lions Club President Steve Pedersen presented 100% Attendance Award pins to Lion Larry Tucker and Lion Charlie Kendall.

During the regular business meeting, it was reported that Lions Club 43-Y Zone Chairman Clinton Applegate had presided over a Zone Meeting hosted by the Maysville Lions Club at which 16 Lions Club members were in attendance from 5 of the 8 Clubs within the Zone. Clubs with members in attendance included Maysville, Lewisburg-Mill Creek, Orangeburg, Vanceburg, and Tollesboro.

Tollesboro Lions Club members each received the new (and first for the Tollesboro Lions Club) Tollesboro Lions Club pins, just in time to celebrate the 65th Anniversary of the Tollesboro Lions Club organization (the Tollesboro Lions Club charter was signed April 30, 1954 following organizational meetings, the first of which was held Dec. 12, 1953). These pins are in the shape of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, with a Kentucky Blue background, with the Lions Club International emblem, a "Star" showing the approximate location of Tollesboro, and a Walking Horse silhouette (the Club's main fund-raiser each year is the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair and the Horse is emblematic of how important the horse is to Kentucky and as to how our annual fair largely revolves around our Annual Horse Show), with the words "SERVING SINCE 1954" and "TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB".

The Tollesboro Lions Club has arranged for 100 trees (50 oak trees and 50 persimmon trees, donated by the Division of Forestry in Morehead) to be planted in Tollesboro this spring around Arbor Day to improve the environment.

The upcoming Tollesboro Lions Club Fair was discussed with the Fair Board still working on making this year's fair an event filled success.

Trade Day/Flea Market events were discussed with events scheduled as follows: TRADE DAYS May 3 through May 5; SPRING TRADE DAYS May 24-May 26; SUMMER TRADE DAYS June 21 - 23; and FALL TRADE DAYS Sept. 27 - 29. In late MAY OF 2019, the TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB unveiled it's first OFFICIAL TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB PIN to the club membership! The pin features the outline of the State of Kentucky in a field of Kentucky blue (symbolic of the blue and white official colors of the Tollesboro High School when the school served the community until it's closure in 2004) outlined in gold, with a gold "star" showing the approximate location of Tollesboro, with a silhouette in gold of a Walking Horse in action (symbolizing the Horse Show which has been an integral part of our fair through it's inception in 1957 as well as the importance of the Horse to Kentucky tourism and agriculture), with a small Lions Club emblem, and the words "SERVING SINCE 1954" and "TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB", to include the name of our club and referring to the Lions Club motto and the year that the Tollesboro Lions Club was first chartered to begin service to our community!

While most Lions Clubs throughout the nation (and even throughout the world) create pins to be worn by their membership and to offer for trade and as gifts to visiting Lions Club members from other clubs, this is our first official designed pin, created just in time to celebrate our 65th Anniversary of the Club's Origination. Lions Club President Steve Pedersen asked Lion Craig A. Stanfield to create a number of designs for consideration for official pin. Craig put together a number of different designs for consideration before Steve decided that the design used was the most emblematic of the Tollesboro Lions Club, it's years of service to the community, and the organizations goals and concerns. Following is the submission made to the Governor's "Beautify the Bluegrass" Initiative project through Kentucky Living and the Kentucky Electrical Cooperatives. While lots more could have been said about the project, and lots of additional photos could have been provided, the contest limits the description of the project to 3,000 characters and only 4 photos.

Photos submitted were a "BEFORE" photograph (as no photo of the old playground could be found, even after going through thousands of photos of past fairs and events, the photo submitted was an aerial view from GoogleEarth) an "AFTER" photograph (thus one showing the completed project), and the opportunity to upload 2 "WORK IN PROGESS" photos (therefore, photos used were a photo of Lions Club Members present on Work Night installing mulch and a montage photograph of the playground equipment to be installed). The application did request LARGE photos, in excess of 500 MB and up to 3 KB in size.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB SUBMITS PLAYGROUND PROJECT TO"BEAUTIFY THE BLUEGRASS" CONTEST APRIL, 2019

Our project is a new playground at the Tollesboro Lions Club Community Park/Fairgrounds Tollesboro, KY.

We had a very small playground consisting of two old galvanized pipe A-frame swingsets with 2 and 3 swings and an old metal slide. This equipment probably dated to the 1960s (maybe 1950s) and came to us second-hand through an old school in late-1980s. Quite frankly, even after going through 1000s of photos, I could not find a single photo of the old playground (quite frankly, it wasn't really something to be proud of); therefore the "BEFORE" photo I have submitted is of the grounds obtained from GoogleEarth. In 2018, with a grant from the Center for Disease Control we erected a brand new playground, handicapped accessible, state of the art equipment, with rubber mulch, concrete curbing, even concrete walkways to permit handicapped to access swings with wheelchairs. Club members designed placement of equipment insuring distances between the various equipment conformed with manufacturer's recommendations and insuring the area in which installation was to take place was of sufficient size. All site prep not requiring heavy equipment was performed by club members (removal of the old playground, old fence, and the briars and brush that covered the old fence), also installing filter fabric and rubber mulch. Actual site prep (level grade) was donated by local contractor. Cost of playground equipment over \$35,000 including the shelterhouse, picnic tables and trash cans. Installation costs were just under \$15,000 (we hired installation company due to the complexity of the installation and as we did not want to take any chances with young children involved). Concrete curbing was \$2,000+. Concrete walks, rubber mulch and filter fabric added to expense. We also had to construct a new 8' high chainlink fence in the rear to separate parking from the playground (this cost over \$17,000 however this fence covered an area larger than just the playground). In all, we spent in excess of \$75,000 including the fencing (we ended up adding \$24,000 in additional debt which we financed through the Buffalo Trace Area Development District Revolving Loan Fund; however the majority of the expense was covered by grants and community supporters). Organized 65 years ago, we are a very small Lions Club with 29 members. However we own our fairgrounds (20 acres) located on KY 10 and AA Hwy. A basketball court and a blacktop walking track continue the theme of healthy living. Our grounds also includes significant structural improvements necessary to host a first-class agricultural fair extending over 9 days each year. We will host our 62nd Annual Fair July 12th through 20th 2019. In the last 10 years, with the help of numerous local supporters, volunteers, and a number of grants, we have made between \$350,000 and \$500,000 in grounds improvements. A small but mighty force, we live the Lions Club International motto: WE SERVE. Check out our website: www.tollesborolions.com.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB ARBOR DAY PROJECT - OBTAINS TREES TO PLANT LOCALLY TO IMPROVE THE ENVIRONMENT

On April 24th, the Tollesboro Lions Club will be the recipient of 100 trees (50 Shumard Oak trees and 50 Persimmon trees) that the club has arranged to have planted in Tollesboro just in time for the April 26th Arbor Day celebration. The trees were provided and delivered by Michael Carter, Lewis County Forest Ranger through the Northeast Region Division of Forestry. Tree planting is a project recommended by Lions Club International's Initiative to Improve The Environment.

While trees provide natural beautify to the areas which they are planted, it is not just their inherent beauty that improves the environment. Persimmons provide fruits that are an important game food. Oaks produce acorns, one of the most beneficial nuts for providing energy to deer, squirrels, and other wildlife, especially during the winter months. Both oaks and persimmons become large trees (each can grow in excess of 50 feet in height, with the Shumard Oak capable of reaching heights greater than 100 feet) that provide shady canopies so necessary

to the survival of many other plants and animals. The shade created by trees also acts to cool the earth, providing an important defense against global warming. And of course, once trees mature, they sometimes become homes for different wildlife and also produce timber which we use for a variety of purposes (fuel, building materials, furniture, manufacture of paper, etc. Both Persimmon trees and Shumard Oak trees are hardwood trees, with their lumber well suited to a variety of uses). However, the most important benefit to the environment is that trees act to clean air, taking in carbon dioxide from the air that we exhale and converting it through the process of photosynthesis to oxygen which we inhale.

FUN FACT: Were you aware that the US Federal Government officially designated a National Tree in 2004? It is true. The national tree of the United States of America is the <u>MIGHTY OAK TREE!!</u>





TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB SELECTED TO RECEIVE INTERNATIONAL PAPER FOUNDATION GRANT

The Tollesboro Lions Club was selected by International Paper of Maysville to receive a \$5,000 grant for re-paving a portion of the Walking Track at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds Community Park.

In May, the Tollesboro Lions Club applied for assistance through International Paper. To apply for the grant, the club completed an online application describing the organization, it's ties to the community, the proposed use of the grant funds, and other factors. The club applied for grant monies specifically to make paving improvements to the walking track which extends around the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds/Community Park. The walking track supports and promotes healthy living and the grounds are used by many persons for walking and jogging in order to improve health as well as build muscle and energy, recuperate, etc. Health and Wellness is one of four signature causes considered for assistance through the International Paper Grant Program. The application was reviewed locally where it received a positive review, and was then forwarded for executive consideration before being officially approved. On June 28th, the club was notified that they were one of the projects chosen as a grant recipient.

The Tollesboro Lions Club intends to add \$2,500 to the grant for a total project investment of \$7,500 to permit the repaving of 1,000 linear feet of the walking track (the walking track improvements will be made sometime after the conclusion of the 62nd Annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair which will begin July 12th and run through July 20th with each night being event filled providing entertainment for the entire family). The club intends to make similar improvements to the walking track until the entire length has been repaved (it being the intention to spread out the repaving over several years so as to make future maintenance and repairs more feasible rather than to be hit with a huge cost prohibitive project in the future). This will be the second section of walking track to be repaved, the last project occurring in 2016 at which time the club was the recipient of IRP Funds in the amount of \$3,818.80 through the Buffalo Trace Area Development District (BTADD) through recommendations of the Lewis County Judge Executive Todd Ruckel, Mayor of Vanceburg Matt Ginn, and then Chairman of the BTADD (and at that time the Second Vice President of the Tollesboro Lions Club) Craig A. Stanfield. At that time, the Tollesboro Lions Club contributed \$3,681.20 to the project from their funds for a total project cost of \$7,500, sufficient to pave 1000 linear feet of the walking track.

The Tollesboro Lions Club would like to thank International Paper for their consideration of the club as a recipient of the grant funds. The Tollesboro Lions Club has been very blessed to have good community partners (volunteers, individuals, local businesses, members, and organizations) who have provided significant financial contributions to the club that have permitted the organization to improve the fairgrounds/community park.

The organization hosted the District 9 meeting in order to showcase the improvements that the organization has provided to the Tollesboro Lions Club as the Lewis County Farm Bureau has been a huge supporter of the Tollesboro Lions Club for many years. In addition to hosting "FARM BUREAU NIGHT" during the fair (where admission is only \$10 / carload), they are also sponsoring an appearance by Makenzie Thomas (singer from Wallingford, Fleming County, KY who appeared on Season 15, Jennifer Hudson's Team on "The Voice") during the 2019 Tollesboro Lions Club Fair, and have made several monetary contributions to the construction and expansions to the Livestock Barn/Showroom, have contributed to the construction of the elevated announcer's booth, and to the installation of the playground equipment on the fairgrounds. <u>TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB PLAYGROUND</u> <u>TOP 5 FINALIST IN GOVERNOR BEVINS & THE KENTUCKY</u> <u>ELECTRICAL COOPERATIVES</u> <u>"BEAUTIFY THE BLUEGRASS" INITIATIVE</u>

The Tollesboro Lions Club 2018 Playground Project was submitted through the Kentucky Electrical Cooperatives/ Kentucky Living magazine's "BEAUTIFY THE BLUEGRASS" Initiative, a partnership with Kentucky Governor Matt Bevins and has been selected as a TOP FIVE FINALIST. There were 28 submissions throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the 2019 project initiative.

The Tollesboro Lions Club installed a new playground last year and upon completion hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony Oct. 5th, 2018 with a meal and free t-shirts (the t-shirts were provided by the Lewis County Health Department with the logo "Walk With A Lion" to commemorate the event).

The new playground has ADA (Americans With Disabilities Act) approved features to provide for exercising, including an adult-rated wheelchair swing. In addition to the playground, the Tollesboro Lions Club Community Park offers a blacktopped walking track, baseball/softball field, and a basketball court to offer persons of all ages the opportunity to exercise to improve their fitness and health. The playground equipment includes a Play Smart 10 Structure (this piece of playground equipment is a large component that cost nearly 1/2 of the grant monies offered by the CDC and includes a variety of exercising equipment that is intended to work the muscles. Included on this one component are 3 slides, stairs, rock climbing wall, overhead ladder and more. Portions of this piece of equipment are ADA compliant); a 4 Seat Bouncing See Saw; a 3 Bay Commercial Swing Set; a 2 Bay ADA Swing Set (this is a handicapped accessible swing compliant with the Americans With Disabilities Act, and includes a swing that will accommodate a wheelchair); 8' Toddler T-Swing Set; a Geo-Dome Climber; and a 4 Post Superior Shade (24' x 30', 8' entry height, basically a shaded picnic shelter in place with picnic benches and trash cans provided as an area for adults to relax while watching their children use the playground equipment as well as an area where the family can eat healthy snacks and drinks so as to stay hydrated and under shade when necessary on hot days, as well as providing respite between showers on other days).

The cost of the completed playground equipment including the installation, the filter fabric, rubber mulch, concrete slabs for the picnic shelter and to provide for access to the handicapped accessible swings, as well as a concrete curb to keep heavy rains from washing away the mulch, etc., was over \$65,000 (however this figure does not include the cost of the new chain-link fencing which forms the northern boundary of the playground, which cost the Club an additional \$17,000!); however the Club was the fortunate recipient of a number of grants and donations, which permitted the club to make these significant improvements to the grounds and while resulting in adding only \$24,000 to the Club's debt. The Buffalo Trace Area Development District provided the Club with a loan through their Revolving Loan Fund.

Funding for the new playground was through a Center for Disease Control Grant through the USDA Cooperative Extension Service (this grant was in an amount of approximately \$35,000 which provided the playground equipment, shade structure, picnic tables and trash cans), an additional grant through the Lewis County Farm Bureau provided \$15,000 to cover the installation (due to the complexity of the equipment and as the equipment was to be utilized by young children, the club opted to hire a professional installation contractor rather than construct and setup the equipment themselves), with Meadows Excavating donating the site prep costs, with additional assistance from the Carmeuse Lime which provided gravel, and a host of others aiding in the construction and installation. The Club purchased filter fabric and rubber mulch which members of the Lions Club did install (\$10,000+). In addition, the Club opted to pour a concrete pad under the shelter and extending to the handicapped accessible swingset so as to permit wheelchairs to be wheeled easily onto the wheelchair unit. In addition to the construction and installation of

the playground, the Tollesboro Lions Club also installed chain-link fencing and had concrete curbing installed (\$3,000+) to reduce erosion and keep the rubber mulch in place.

The "Beautify the Bluegrass Initiative" is open to all individuals and organizations, public and private. 2019 marks the third annual Beautify the Bluegrass Initiative. All projects were required to be submitted online via forms found online at <u>www.KentuckyLiving.com</u> by 6 pm (EST) June 28, 2019. After the deadline for the submission of projects passed, The Beautify the Bluegrass Committee, the public, and the Governor of Kentucky vote on the projects. The judging process first consists of reviews and recommendations by the The Beautify the Bluegrass Committee which reviews all submissions and considers a variety of factors, including how the improvements helped the community, the scope of the project, the participation of volunteers, and the overall effectiveness of the effort. The Committee is responsible to narrow from all submissions received to five finalists from public entries (and an additional three finalists from electric cooperatives). The public is then invited to vote from July 29th through Aug. 3rd online at <u>www.KentuckyLiving.com</u> from among the top five finalists. The Governor of Kentucky selects the winner of the Governor's Award and the top Co-op project. The winner of the public voting that is not also the Governor's Award winner receives the Commonwealth Award. The award winners are announced at the Kentucky State Fair.

Governor of Kentucky Matt Bevin (or his representative) will travel to the site of the winning project to formally present the Governor's Award. Up to 200 participants and community members will be treated to lunch with the governor (and/or his representatives) provided by Kentucky Electric Cooperatives. The Governor's Award winner receives a plaque and will be featured in an issue of Kentucky Living magazine and KentuckyLiving.com. The winners of the Commonwealth Award and the Co-op Award each receive a plaque. All projects receive a certificate.

The Tollesboro Lions Club would like to thank the Lewis County Health Department, the Lewis County Extension Agency, the Lewis County Farm Bureau, Carmeuse Lime, Kenny Meadows and Kenton Meadows (Meadows Excavating), The Center for Disease Control, County Judge Todd Ruckel, the board and staff of the Buffalo Trace Area Development District and the BTADD Revolving Loan Fund committee, and everyone who aided in acquiring grants and helping to aid in the installation, acquisition, and setup of the playground equipment, including our dedicated group of 28 Tollesboro Lions Club members. We have been truly fortunate as a small club to be blessed with so many supporters in our community. The membership of the Tollesboro Lions Club -- both past and present --- has always been aware that we could not accomplish what we have in the past 64 years of our existence without the AID OFFERED BY OUR COMMUNITY, VOLUNTEERS, LOCAL BUSINESSES, OUR VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT, ELECTED OFFICIALS, and FINANCIAL BACKERS THROUGHOUT THE YEARS. We take this opportunity to thank everyone who has ever offered support to any of our ventures, fair and non-fair events, and the fairgrounds!

Beautify the Bluegrass 2019 Finalists, KENTUCKY LIVING NEWS JULY 28, 2019

Over the past year, hundreds of people all across Kentucky participated in the 2019 Beautify the Bluegrass, an initiative by Kentucky Living and Gov. Matt Bevin's office. Out of all of those projects, now is your chance to vote for the top project from among five finalists listed below.

Kentuckians are encouraged to come together to make their communities shine. The goal is to identify projects in local communities to repair, enhance or beautify.

The winner of the public vote wins the Commonwealth's Award. Gov. Bevin will select the Governor's Award from among the top five finalists. The winners will be announced on Aug. 22 during the "Best in Kentucky" awards show at the Kentucky State Fair. The overall winner will receive a barbecue dinner for 200, hosted by Gov. Bevin.

As a finalist, the Tollesboro Community Park/Fairgrounds was visited by a videographer who reviewed the grounds and the playground project (he even did a fly-over with a drone to show the size of the fairgrounds/community park; the visit coincided with the week of the 2019 Tollesboro Lions Club Fair, so he selected areas to include that did not show the carnival and the food booths but which did show the horse ring, the two pavilions and the majority of the buildings on the fairgrounds), met with and interviewed members of the Tollesboro Lions Club; Craig Stanfield and Steve Pedersen were present for interviews. He also took photos and video, and then put together an informational video that was posted on the Kentucky Living Magazine website for review by the public at large for voter consideration; the entire video takes less than 2 minutes to watch, with approximately 1 1/2 minutes of video showing the grounds and playground project.

There were 28 submissions throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky for 2019. The Top 5 Finalist Projects are described below. Voting ended 5 pm, August 5.

Camp Kysoc, Carrollton

Since November, 2018, teams of volunteers have worked to rehabilitate the grounds at "Camp Kysoc," a former Easter Seals Society facility that originally served special needs children. After years of disrepair and neglect, a group of volunteers formed a board to "Save the Soc."

Since then, more than 400 volunteers, from schoolchildren to seniors, have completed three major clean up days at Camp Kysoc, in addition to ongoing projects. Rehab efforts include cutting down and cleaning up dangerous trees, especially dead ash trees. Industries that sent volunteers included North American Stainless, Dorman Products, and Walmart. Dow Chemical donated safety equipment for the volunteers, as well as a flag pole.

"Camp Kysoc is a special facility in the hearts of many Kentuckians and members of our community. Although, it is likely it would not be used for its original purpose ever again, it is a beautiful park with paved trails, hiking, wildlife, and a lake for fishing and boating. It was a "diamond in the rough" with so much potential. The county budget did not have the funds to restore it, so it became a volunteer effort to make the camp functional again. We felt that the effort of volunteers demonstrated the importance of the camp to our county government, making it recognizable as a worthwhile use of county funds."

"Camp Kysoc is a wonderful park with handicapped accessible trails available for walking, with facilities for fishing, boating, hiking, and enjoying nature. We have a vision that one day it will be able to be used as a camp for many different groups."

<u>City of Covington</u>

Every year, thousands of people from the six states that line the Ohio River gather on one day to clean up the littered banks of the very river that provides drinking water to those that live along it. The City of Covington, its residents, and Keep Covington Beautiful took to the Covington river banks to clean up 2,030 pounds of trash and recyclables on Saturday, June 15th.

Forty-five volunteers spent four hours of their weekend ankle-deep in mud and debris to rid the river bank of the numerous single-use plastics, tires, textiles, and other littered items. The result—a clean river bank, exhausted volunteers, and this corner of Kentucky beautified.

After months of planning and recruiting volunteers of all ages gathered for breakfast then got to work. Among the items discovered in the muck were buckets, a door, suitcases, and even a Radio Flyer wagon.

"Our goal for this event was to bring the community together to clean up the river bank. We were able to accomplish this goal as well as meet new people, get outdoors, have fun, and beautify Kentucky! We hope that we also left our community inspired to care for their community through other volunteer events and in their spare time."

Garland Bend Homeowners Association, Burnside

At a community meeting of the Garland Bend Homeowners Association, citizens decided to work on the Welcome to Garland Bend sign at the entrance of the community on State Route 804 (Garland Road). The association got a good response recruiting volunteers and got to work.

The plan included replacing rotting railroad ties with a stacked paver stone wall, thinning existing perennial plants and adding some annual flowers. The project took two days working five hours each day to complete. Ten area residents volunteered to help. Garland Bend is a long established area with many homeowners that take pride in where they live. Volunteers pick up trash along area roads weekly, two times a year furnished with a dumpster by Pride for a clean up of Garland Bend.

"The Welcome sign is at the entrance of the community and benefits everyone that enters the community. There is a boat ramp and a dock here and it draws visitors to the community.

"It took two days and five hours each day to complete the project. Our goal was to replace the rotting railroad ties with a paver stone wall and spruce up the planting area and to show that we take pride in beautifying Garland Bend, Burnside Kentucky."

Rodburn Hollow Park, Morehead

What started as a discussion during a Sustainable Morehead meeting evolved to the development of the

Friends of Rodburn Hollow Park. Over the past year, 200 volunteers have worked to clean, clear, build, replace, improve, teach and learn. The longest part of the project is signage design, selection, construction and installation. These projects are expected to be complete by the end of summer. Friends have already spent over 40 hours on the project. The largest stage of the project has been general park cleanup including restoration of foot bridges, debris removal, trail improvements, painting and power washing.

As a Kentucky Trail Town, volunteers identified a strong need to sustain the park as a trail hub. There are several small walking trails and national trail access directly from the park. The park now hosts events with the Rowan County 4-H, the City of Morehead Parks and Recreation Day Camp attendees.

"Our overall goal is to promote, preserve and protect Rodburn Hollow Park."

"While memories and sustainability were both major drivers in improving the park, improving knowledge of the park, physical fitness, getting kids out in nature and the park's proximity to downtown ranked high among all involved. Rodburn is located inside the city limits of Morehead. People can take advantage of a peaceful oasis to picnic, explore, play in the creek, learn and exercise. The possibilities for this park are endless. This is a great place for kids to be kids and embrace the outdoors."

Tollesboro Lions Club Community Park/Fairgrounds

Volunteers with the Tollesboro Lions Club Community Park/Fairgrounds worked to replace outdated playground equipment that dated to the 1950's or 1960's.

With a grant from the Center for Disease Control, volunteers erected a new handicapped accessible playground with state of the art equipment, rubber mulch, concrete curbing, and concrete walkways to permit wheelchair access to swings.

All site prep not requiring heavy equipment was performed by club members, including removal of the old playground, old fence, and the briars and brush that covered the old fence. Club members also installed the fabric and rubber mulch.

In all, the group invested more than \$75,000 on the project. Though some debt is financed through the Buffalo Trace Area Development District Revolving Loan Fund, the majority of the expense was covered by grants and community supporters.

"Organized 65 years ago, we are a very small Lions Club with 29 members. However we own our fairgrounds (20 acres) located on KY 10 and AA Hwy. A basketball court and a blacktop walking track continue the theme of healthy living. Our grounds also includes significant structural improvements necessary to host a first-class agricultural fair extending over 9 days each year. In the last 10 years, with the help of numerous local supporters, volunteers, and a number of grants, we have made between \$350,000 and \$500,000 in grounds improvements. A small but mighty force, we live the Lions Club International motto: We Serve."

ULTIMATELY, the Tollesboro Lions Club Project placed third in the online public vote (although spent time in first and running neck and neck between first and second for a few days before finally being eclipsed by the projects performed by the much larger communities of Carrollton and Morehead, while outpacing the the online votes garnered by the the remaining Top Five Finalist Projects in Covington and Burnside), the club was proud of it's efforts and was still hopeful that it's project would receive the Governor's Choice award. However, when awards were announced at the Kentucky State Fair, Aug. 23, 2019, CAMP KYSOC, Carrollton, Carroll Co., KY was chosen as the 2019 recipient of the Governor's Choice Award and RODBURN HOLLOW PARK, Morehead, Rowan Co., KY was selected as the 2019 recipient of the Commonwealth Award.

<u>RESULTS TUG TRACTOR PULL</u> TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB FAIR

The 2019 Tollesboro Lions Club Fair, the 62nd Annual event, started on Friday night July 12th this year. One of the events, the Tug Tractor Pull, consisted of a two night event, Friday and Saturday, July 12th and 13th, and was a rousing success again this year. This event has two winning categories in each class, a Percentage Weight category (weight of sled pulled on the scales divided by the weight of the tractor then longest distance pulled between tractors pulling highest percentages) and a Heavy Load category (whereby the longest distances pulled by the heaviest weight are winners). Participants pay an entry fee and then compete for bragging rights, cash, and a trophy in each category, with payouts and trophies going to first, second and third place in each category. While numerous entries can be on a single driver and while an individual driver may have multiple entries on the same tractor or spread out over a number of tractors, a tractor can only win one position (in other words, if two entries are leading on a single tractor, only the driver/entrant that has the longest distance or heaviest percentage wins on that tractor, with the next place falling to a different tractor/entrant. Thus two entries driving the same tractor cannot win first and second in either category and a tractor that wins heavy load cannot win percentage regardless of the mathematical statistics indicated); a driver may win multiple places provided that the driver has entered on different tractors and has the best record on each individual tractor. Drivers have two attempts to make a full pull of 10 feet. There is a lot of strategy involved, with weights moved from the front of the tractor to the rear or vice-versa, placement of the tractor when backing up to the sled, choosing where to place a tractor during the entry/drawing process, and many other factors.

The Friday night event, a class with tractors weighing between 3500 and 6000 pounds, included 77 drivers entering on tractors made by John Deere, Ford, Long, Case, Oliver and International Farmall and lasted until 3 am on Saturday morning. The class has two winning categories, Percentage and Heavy Load. In the end, the Percentage Winners all weighed 3500 pounds with first and second place pulling 228 percent of their weight (completing a pull of an 8,000 pound sled) with third place pulling 200 percent of their weight (3500 pound tractor pulling a 7,000 pound sled) with winners as follows: First Place Percentage Preston Northcutt on a John Deere B tractor; Second Place Percentage Tyler Cooper on a Case 430 tractor, and Third Place Percentage Jerry Ross on a John Deere 40 tractor. Heavy Load winners in the class all weighed in at 6000 pounds, then with 5 drivers on two tractors successfully pulling the sled the full distance at 11,000 pounds and then going on to hitch to the 12,000 pound sled where only one tractor/driver pulled the sled the full distance. First Place Heavy Load was won by Tyler Cooper on a Case 630 tractor; Second Place Heavy Load went to Preston Northcutt on a John Deere 2030 tractor.

The Saturday night event, a class with tractors weighing between 6000 and 9000 pounds, included 65 drivers entering on tractors made by John Deere, Ford, Long, Case, Oliver, International Farmall, Duetz, Massey Ferguson and Cockshutt and lasted until 2:45 am on Sunday morning. This class also has two winning categories, a Percentage Weight category and a Heavy Load category. In the end, the Percentage Winners all weighed 6000 pounds with first place pulling 200 percent of it's weight (completing a pull of an 12000 pound sled) with second and third place pulling 183 percent of their weight (successfully pulling an 11,000 pound sled) with winners as follows: First Place Percentage Tyler Cooper Case 630 tractor; Second Place Percentage Daulton Fryman John Deere A tractor, and Third Place Percentage Tanner Hord on an International Farmall 400 tractor. Heavy Load winners in the class all weighed in at 9000 pounds with first and second place succeeding in pulling a 14,000 pound sled the full distance with third place pulling a 13,000 pound the full distance (third place went to the entry pulling the 13,000 pound sled the longest distance that was short of a full pull). After hitching the two leaders to a 15,000 pound sled, the winners

were determined as follows: First Place Heavy Load was won by Roger Neal on a Duetz 8006 tractor; Second Place Heavy Load went to Bob Lykins on a Case 870 tractor; and Third Place Heavy Load went to Kirk Alexander on a John Deere 720 tractor.

At 3 am, 9 entries on 3 tractors, all of which were Olivers (an 1855 wide front, an 1855 tricyle front, and an 1850 wide front) paid to have a fun pull on heavier tractors weighing 10,500 to 12,500 pounds, where they hitched to the sled and pulled until 4 am, no trophies, no pay-out, and no real winner determined, just having a little fun on heavier tractors and supporting the Lions Club (there are not enough heavy tractor pullers in the area to make a class that would so much as break even, thus these guys (and a gal too) just wanted to hitch up their big tractors and play a little).

FRANCES POLLEY 2019 PARADE GRAND MARSHALL!!

The 2019 Tollesboro Lions Club Parade made it's annual appearance once again, Sunday, July 14th. The Parade left the grounds of the Tollesboro Lions Club at 2:00 pm, traveled east of KY 10 through the center of town to the Citizens Deposit Bank, where the Parade then turned before returning to the Fairgrounds. Frances Polley, long retired but beloved Tollesboro Elementary School teacher and the 1995 Tollesboro Lions Club Citizen Of The Year, was selected as the 2019 Tollesboro Lions Club Fair Parade Grand Marshall was Frances Polley, beloved elementary school teacher.

The Parade was a long parade, with over 150 vehicles, bikes, semi-trucks, fire-trucks, antique cars, on motorcycles and ATVs, on horses and mules, on numerous floats (possibly the largest number of floats ever in the Parade!), Shriners on their wild vehicles, and more. The Parade end was not in sight -- not even close -- before the first half was already back to the center of town, at which time both lanes of the roadway were in use. While there may have only been 150 items in the parade, many had more than 1 person, some included large groups, as the actual number of persons participating in the Parade must have been between 500 and 750 persons based upon the number of cups of drinks passed out at the intersection of KY 10 and KY 57, the half-way point of the parade, where for the 16th consecutive year, Craig and Beverly Stanfield of Stanfield Real Estate and Auction Services -- with the help of a number of volunteers -- handed out more than 500 cups of drinks using 16.5 gallons of 18 gallons prepared of tea, lemonade and orange drink and using 220 pounds of ice for drinks and to cool the drinks down --- to parade participants, with many participants passing on the cold drinks as --- due to the heat and temperature --- many brought their own!!!

The Parade was viewed by hundreds (if not thousands!) of persons lining up the parade route: on porches of homes, under trees in yards, under tents set up in yards (several residents routinely have meals and invite family and friends, offering a place to view the Parade and set up their chairs under tents and trees to provide cover and shade on Parade Day, a huge event for the community, a day where the population swells to 3 or 4 times the community's population), at business parking areas and church parking lots, with kids at the ready, eagerly awaiting the opportunity to fill their sacks with candies and other goodies thrown from the parade participants.

A children's decorated bicycle contest was also held Sunday in coordination with the Parade with several entries.

The Demolition Derby Monday Night July 15th at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair was a great event! To start off the evening, the Kids Power Wheels Class, where 11 entries tried their driving skills in the pit. In the end, all 11 were winners and all received a trophy and a t-shirt compliments of Threads & Ink, Tony and Debbie Hunt.

Raffle tickets were sold on the fairgrounds on Monday night (these tickers were only sold on the date of event as the winner had to be present to win as the lucky person who's name was drawn won the opportunity to actually compete in the demolition derby in a car provided for the event). Just prior to the beginning of the Compact Class, Jon Kendall's name was drawn from the tickets sold and came down from the large crowd to enter the contest. It was his first time competing in a demolition derby and he was to try his skills against 9 other competitors all of whom had prior experience in the event.

There were 10 compact cars in the class and each entry made their way into the pit. The countdown began, and the flags waved to signify the start of the event. The competitors really put on a good show and after a bit of banging and clanging, six cars were eliminated, with the final 4 cars remaining all "in the money"! Surprisingly, the first of the four cars to finally be eliminated (thus placing fourth) was the car driven by Jon Kendall --- the Raffle Car!! His winnings were more than the costs of his tickets, so he not only won the opportunity to drive the raffle car, but by making it to the final four, got to "play for free!!!".

A short while later, with it down to three cars, Tyler Moore's car finally gave out, giving him third place. Then it was down to the final two, and there was a lot of room left in the pit for these two drivers to skillfully go at each other, putting on a little cat and mouse show before finally getting down to it and DID THEY PUT ON A SHOW!!! From hard back to back hits, to "playing chicken" and crashing head-on, then repeating and trying it again, really putting on a show that was appreciated by the crowd in attendance lining up the bleachers in front of the pit. Finally Chris Shelton's car was hit broadside and was pushed against the bank, still running but stuck. In the end, the winners were announced as follows: 1st Place Compact Car Class went to driver Daulton Lewis; second place went to Chris Shelton; Third Place went to Tyler Moore, and Fourth Place, driving the raffle car, went to Jon Kendall. The Mad Dog Trophy, the driver who was judged to have made the most significant attacks and hits, went to the first place driver Daulton Lewis. He and Chris Shelton did the most damage to the other cars and put on a great show, giving their cars all they wanted and more! Revved up engines, hard hits, steam and smoke rolling, bumping, clanging, crashing and bashing, parts left all over the pit! This class was exciting and enjoyed by all.

While no cars this year caught on fire and thankfully no drivers were injured, the Tollesboro Lions Club would like to thank the Tollesboro Volunteer Fire Department and the Portsmouth Ambulance Service for their presence on the grounds as this event can be unpredictable and even dangerous, even when considering the safety practices required on the cars.

PONY, MULE & HORSE PULL AT TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB FAIR

The Pony, Mule and Horse Pull at the 2019 Tollesboro Lions Club Fair was put on by the BLUEGRASS PONY & MULE PULLERS ASSOCIATION on Thursday, July 18th. With a slight delay due to heavy rains about 4 pm Thursday, the event started at 7:30 PM and ended approximately 10:30 PM. This marks the first advertised pony and mule pull in many years, as it has been several decades since the last such pull was conducted on the fairgrounds during the fair except for last year's event which was an "unadvertised special" that was well-received by the people who happened to be at the Fair who really took an interest with nearly as many people watching last year's unadvertised event as watched this year's event. However the event was very well-received, was watched by a good number of spectators, with calls coming in to inquire about the event from all over. The heavy rain in the late afternoon probably impacted the crowd, and slightly impacted the number of participants as two pulling teams more distanced from the fairgrounds opted not to come after heavy rains pummeled the grounds. However the members of the Bluegrass Pony and Mule Pullers Association indicated that the heavy rains did not impact the gravel track upon which the event was held (the event was moved from the Tractor Pulling Track, which was muddy, to a portion of the Horse Show Ring where the pull was conducted on fine gravel).

There were 2 classes offered by the Bluegrass Pony and Mule Pullers Association, and they graciously agreed to allow the Tollesboro Lions Club to add a third Open class as the Club was approached by persons wanting to see larger equine, both horses and mules, hitched to the sled to compete (which is quite an ordeal as the larger animals push the limits of the sled, requiring block to be laid quite high on the sled, almost to the sled's maximum; if more teams - particularly larger teams - competed, the Tollesboro Lions Club would have had to bring a sled over from the tractor pull track to insure that enough weight was available to finish the pull). Classes I and II were double-overweight classes and membership in the Bluegrass Pony and Mule Pullers Association was required. Class III, the open class, was a single over-weight class, for heavier teams, and membership in the Bluegrass Pony and Mule Pullers Association was not required.

A "team" consists of a 2 animal pair of ponies or mules (or horses in Class III). In addition, a pulling "team" may be the name of the owners in the event that the two animals making up the team are owned by different individuals, as in the case of some teams where the left equine animal is owned by one individual and the right equine animal is owned by a different individual, or in the case that a team of equine is owned in partnership by a team. In either case, you would then have a pulling team driving a team of equine animals); weights are the combined weight of the two animals (this weight is the that of the animals without harness). In Class 1, teams must weigh a minimum combined weight of 950 pounds (eliminating participation by "miniature" teams) and a maximum combined weight of under 1,650 pounds. Class 2 teams must have a combined weight between 1650 and 2250 pounds. The Open Class was for larger animals, with teams weighing a combined weight of at least 2250 pounds. The Open Class included two horse teams, weighing 2,850 pounds and 3,145 pounds, with the largest team consisting of a pair of mules tipping the scales at 3,380 pounds. Teams were to pull the sled a distance of 15' (in Class I, a full pull is a distance of 12') between lanes 14' in width for a "full pull" which would allow them to advance to the next round. A team would have two "hooks" to pull the sled a combined distance of 15 feet (12' in Class I). If a team failed, they could then "spot the sled" to an area of their choosing on the track and make a third attempt to get a full pull. Or alternatively, they could opt to "spot the sled" and waive their first two hooks in an attempt to go the full distance (this option to permit the team to save their strength for a better location on the pulling track). Basically while not calculated as a percentage, this is still a percentage pull in essence, as blocks were added to the sled as needed between hitches if the next team to pull were heavier than the previous team to pull, only removing blocks from the sled between heats if required in the event that the weight between the heaviest team in the class and the lightest team in the class

warranted the removal of blocks; thus in each Class, teams pull small to large so that blocks are only added when required. All participants were from Kentucky, with pulling teams traveling to the fairgrounds from Lexington, Lawrenceburg, Dry Ridge, and Crittenden to compete. Class I had 4 entries; Class II had 4 entries (in addition, a 5th pulled hitched to the sled in Class II to help the show and to practice his team, a team weighing 2,850 pounds and not eligible to win or place in the event); Class III had 3 entries. In Classes I and II, prize money and trophies went to the Top 3 pulling teams. The Open Class was a 100 percent payback, winner take all, with trophies provided to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners.

CLASS I: First Place was the Harp & Purvis Team of Pete and Mac of Lexington and Paris, KY, David Purvis Driver, team weighing 1,642 pounds pulling a sled weighing 4,650 pounds the full 12' distance. Second Place was Worm Thompson's team of Claire and Oscar of Lawrenceburg, KY, Jaden O'Neill Driver, team weighing 1,318 pounds hitched to a sled weighing 4010 pounds the greatest distance without a full pull, with their last full pull being a sled weighing 3,370 pounds. Third Place went to the Ballard and Ballard team of Bill and Dick of Lexington, KY, Jamie Ballard Driver, team weighing 1,650 pounds, hitched to a sled weighing 4,650 pounds, with their last full pull a sled weighing 4,010 pounds. Fourth Place went to the Butch Beasley team of Tiny and Pat of Lawrenceburg, KY, Jaden O'Neill Driver, team weighing 1,321 pounds, hitched to sled weighing 4,050 pounds, 3,410 the weight of the sled that they last pulled the full distance of 12 feet.

CLASS II: First Place was the Purvis and Kane Team of Caddy and Tim of Lexington, KY, weighing 2,219 pounds pulling a sled weighing 5,090 pounds the full 15' distance. Second Place, also a Purvis and Kane Team of Lexington, went to Patch and Buck with a combined weight of 2,184 pounds pulling a 5,010 pound sled the full 15' distance. In Third Place was the Beasley and Thompson Team of Lawrenceburg, KY consisting of Claire and Pat with a combined weight of 1,650 pounds, the heaviest sled pulled the full distance weighing 3,650 pounds, and hitched to a heavier sled that they pulled short of a full pull. In Fourth Place, also a Beasley and Thompson Team of Lawrenceburg, KY, made up of Tiny and Oscar, with a combined weight of 1,650 pounds, the heaviest sled pulled the full distance by the team was 3,250 pounds. NOTE: In Class II, both teams placing third and fourth moved up in weight to pull in the class, with neither of these teams actually weighing 1650 pounds, but as 1650 pounds was the minimum weight for the class, their performance was based upon the minimum class weight of 1650 pounds. NOTE ALSO: In Class II, a heavier team with Jason O'Neill the driver, pulled unofficially for the benefit of the crowd and to give his team some practice as this team had not pulled together since last year. This team was not eligible for placing in the class.

CLASS III: In the Open Class, First Place went to the Jason O'Neill Team out of Dry Ridge, KY consisting of Prince and Rock, weighing 2,850 pounds and pulling a 6,410 pound sled 13'4" for the win. Second Place went to Shorty Adam's Mule Team of Beck and John of Crittenden, KY, weighing 3,380 pounds and hitched to a 6,970 pound sled which they pulled a distance of 10' 5" (3 feet shy of the win, the only team of mules in the competition). Third Place went to the Jason O'Neill Team of Dick and Charlie, of Dry Ridge, KY, weighing 3,145 pounds, hitched to a 6,010 pound sled.

The Pony and Mule Pull was a success and contracts are already in place to host the event again next year! Look for it in next year's schedule and be sure not to miss it! It is a great event!!!

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB HOSTS DISTRICT DAIRY SHOW DURING ANNUAL FAIR

On Wednesday, July 17th, the Tollesboro Lions Club hosted the District Dairy Show. This event was held on the grounds of the Tollesboro Lions Club the same day as the Tollesboro Lios Club Dairy Show, but held Wednesday morning prior to the annual fair event. This is the first time that the Tollesboro Lions Club has hosted the event. The event was a success and was convenient (and efficient) for the show-persons whom were going to show their dairy animals at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair event following the District Show.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB RECEIVES INTERNATIONAL PAPER FOUNDATION GRANT

The Tollesboro Lions Club was selected by International Paper of Maysville to receive a \$5,000 grant for re-paving a portion of the Walking Track at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds Community Park.

In May, the Tollesboro Lions Club applied for assistance through International Paper. To apply for the grant, the club completed an online application describing the organization, it's ties to the community, the proposed use of the grant funds, and other factors. The club applied for grant monies specifically to make paving improvements to the walking track which extends around the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds/Community Park. The walking track supports and promotes healthy living and the grounds are used by many persons for walking and jogging in order to improve health as well as build muscle and energy, recuperate, etc. Health and Wellness is one of four signature causes considered for assistance through the International Paper Grant Program. The application was reviewed locally where it received a positive review, and was then forwarded for executive consideration before being officially approved. On June 28th, the club was notified that they were one of the projects chosen as a grant recipient.

The Tollesboro Lions Club intends to add \$2,500 to the grant for a total project investment of \$7,500 to permit the repaving of 1,000 linear feet of the walking track. The club intends to make similar improvements to the walking track until the entire length has been repaved (it being the intention to spread out the repaving over several years so as to make future maintenance and repairs more manageable rather than to be hit with a huge cost prohibitive project in the future). This will be the second section of walking track to be repaved, the last project occurring in 2016 at which time the club was the recipient of IRP Funds in the amount of \$3,818.80 through the Buffalo Trace Area Development District (BTADD) through recommendations of the Lewis County Judge Executive Todd Ruckel, Mayor of Vanceburg Matt Ginn, and then Chairman of the BTADD (and at that time the Second Vice President of the Tollesboro Lions Club) Craig A. Stanfield. At that time, the Tollesboro Lions Club contributed \$3,681.20 to the project from their funds for a total project cost of \$7,500, sufficient to pave 1000 linear feet of the walking track.

The Tollesboro Lions Club would like to thank International Paper for their consideration of the club as a recipient of the grant funds. The Tollesboro Lions Club has been very blessed to have good community partners (volunteers, individuals, local businesses, members, and organizations) who have provided significant financial contributions to the club that have permitted the organization to improve the fairgrounds/community park and wish to extend their thanks to all who aided the Club in it's endeavors.

The LEWIS-MASON RELAY FOR LIFE, an awareness and fund-raising event jointly hosted by the Lewis County and Mason County American Cancer Societies, was held at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds, Saturday, August 24th, 2019. This is the second consecutive year that the American Cancer Societies of Mason and Lewis Counties joined together to host the event, and the second consecutive year that the event has been conducted at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds, an ideal location for the event as the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds is located nearly equidistant to the county seats of both host counties, Vanceburg (the county seat of Lewis County, KY) and Maysville (the county seat of Mason County), each located less than 15 miles (Vanceburg to the east, Maysville to the west) from the event site. In addition, the fairgrounds has a walking track in place, restroom facilities, benches and trash cans in place along the walking track route, and has pavilions located nearby for shade or cover in the event of rain, as well as for seating during the opening and closing event ceremonies. The event included an Opening Ceremony, a Survivor's Caretaker's Walk, the Team Walk, a Luminaria Ceremony, and a Closing Ceremony. The event was well attended and deemed a great success. The Top 5 Fund Raising Teams were: First Place: Rip's Farm Center of Tollesboro, KY raising \$4,170.50; Second Place: Carmeuse Lime & Stone \$3,565; Third Place: Tollesboro Christian Church raising \$2,281.03; Fourth Place: Primary Plus raising \$2,141.20; and Fifth Place: Meadowview Regional Medical Center raising \$1,985. While the event was a success and raised \$24,667.86, monies raised were short of their goal of \$30,000.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB MEMBERS PERFORM VISION SCREENING AT KY STATE FAIR

Tollesboro Lions Club members attended the KY State Fair to volunteer their services to promote the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation (KLEF) perform free vision screening services. The KLEF has offered and performed free vision screening at the KY State Fair for many years. The vision screening is performed as a series of tests, set up in 4 stations. In Station 1, testing determines the vision distance reading (such as 20/20 for good vision capabilities) and is the testing station in which Tollesboro Lions Club members Clinton Applegate and Steve Pedersen volunteered their time Thursday afternoon/evening, Aug. 22nd, and Friday afternoon/evening, Aug. 23rd, from 3 pm to 8 pm each day. In Station # 2, peripheral vision (side to side, up and down capabilities with the eyes focused on a central point) testing is performed. Tollesboro Lions Club member Craig Stanfield volunteered his time performing this test, Sunday, Aug. 25th, the early shift, from 9 am to 3 pm. In Station 3, air pressure glaucoma testing is performed. Glaucoma is an eye condition caused by abnormally high pressure in the eyeball that can cause damage to the optic nerve, and is one of the leading causes of blindness for persons over age 60. In Station 4, the results of the 3 vision screening tests performed in Stations 1 through 3 are reviewed and assessed, with recommendations made as necessary. A KidSight vision screening service is also offered free during the fair for children ages 6 months to 6 years of age (this process involves a trained Lions Club member using a high tech screening device to examine the eyes for vision anomalies so that referrals can be made to professionals to insure that corrective measures can be made before correctable vision problems worsen or become permanent). 3,380 persons were provided with free vision screenings by volunteers at the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation State Fair booth in 2019, 813 of which were conducted on youth from 6 months to 6 years of age.

Lions Clubs originated over 100 years ago, established in 1917 and becoming an international organization in 1920. Sight Conservation has been a goal of Lions Club International since Lions Club International was approached by the personal appeal of Helen Keller who addressed Lions Club members at their 1925 International Convention at Cedar Point, Ohio where she pleaded with Lions Club members to become "Knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness". As such, all Lions Clubs throughout the world and encouraged to do what they can to promote sight conversation and as such all clubs are encouraged to collect used eyeglasses which can be recycled for continued use. Kentucky has a number of Lions Club founded organizations that promote sight conservation. The Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation was founded in 1954 with the mission to provide vision services through education, detection, prevention, treatment and empowerment. The KLEF not only conducts vision screening. The organization is tasked with the equipping and maintaining the Vision Van (founded 2002, a mobile screening operation available for setup in an indoor site to offer vision screenings at health fairs and other events where individuals gather throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky) for vision screening services throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky, conduct the KidSight program (a vision screening service for children), operate an Eyeglass Program (providing recycled eyeglasses to needy in Jefferson County, KY) and the Eyeglass Recycling Program (used eyeglasses collected for recycling are cleaned, sorted and repackaged for distribution in low to middle income communities), as well as maintain both the Patron Program (providing necessary eye surgery to non-insured or limited insured Kentucky residents) and the Holloran Trust Program (organized in 1967, providing services to needy blind persons in parts of Kentucky). The Kentucky Lions Eye Institute (now the Kentucky Lions Eye Center) was founded in 1967 and is the home of the University of Louisville's Department of Ophthalmology and Visual Sciences. The Kentucky Lions Eye Bank promotes eye, organ and tissue donation and promotes sight restoration through corneal transplant, ocular research and medical education.

Today, Lions Club International has expanded their goals to include their "Big 5": Improve Sight; Improve The Environment; Provide for Hunger Relief; Reduce Diabetes; and Reduce Pediatric Cancers. Lions Clubs International is the world's largest service organization with 1.4 million members worldwide scattered over more than 46,000 clubs in over 200 countries.

From 28 submissions of projects throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky in 2019, the Tollesboro Lions Club Playground Project, was selected as a Top Five Finalist in the Beautify the Bluegrass Contest hosted by the Kentucky Rural Electrical Cooperatives, and placed third in the public online voting at <u>www.kentuckyliving.com</u> last month. As a Top Five Finalist, a videographer visited the Tollesboro Lions Club, interviewed members, took photos and video (including drone footage), and prepared a very nice short video about the project which was posted online on the Kentucky Living website for review by the voting public. The video was delightful testament to the Club's hard work, approximately 1 1/2 minutes long (just under 2 minutes with pre-face and a short appearance from Gov. Bevin at the end congratulating each finalist on their projects and thanking them for their work in Beatifying the Bluegrass).

The Tollesboro Lions Club Playground Project was an early leader for a day or two early in the contest, then ran neck-and-neck for a day or two with the two winning projects, before finally getting behind in the point total. But a valiant effort regardless as our small community made the state take notice, a Top Five Finalist, ending up in third place in the public voting, beating out projects conducted by the City of Covington as well as a project in Burnside, all something that our Club and cur community, can be proud of. While aware that the Tollesboro Lions Club Project was out of the running for the Commonwealth Award (the project receiving the most votes online), the Club still was hopeful that Governor Bevin could choose our project over the two projects that received more votes. The winner was announced at the Kentucky State Fair August 23rd and the 2019 Governor's Award went to the Camp KySoc Project in Carrollton, Carroll Co., KY and the Commonwealth Award went to Rodburn Hollow Park, Morehead, Rowan County, KY. The Tollesboro Lions Club offers congratulations to the winning projects. Perhaps the Tollesboro Lions Club will be able to enter another project in the near future.

The 2019 Governor's Award went to the Camp KySoc Project in Carrollton, Carroll Co., KY and the Commonwealth Award went to Rodburn Hollow Park, Morehead, Rowan County, KY). The Tollesboro Lions Club Playground Project was an early leader and then ran neck-and-neck with the two winning projects for several days when contest voting was first opened up, before finally getting behind in the point total; but a valiant effort regardless as our small community made the state take notice, a Top Five Finalist and ending up in third place in the public voting, beating out projects conducted by the City of Covington as well as a project in Burnside, as well as whatever projects were conducted through the state that did not make it as a Top Five Finalist, and something we can be proud of. Next the club discussed a number of upcoming events including two mud sling events planned on successive weekends in September, the 14th and 21st, with the Mud Sling on the 14th a Points Run for Hall Motorsports and the 21st being an Open Event. PASSING OF A 60 YEAR MEMBER OF THE TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB SITE OF SUCCESSFUL FUND-RAISER FOR TONY CORNS

On Saturday, October 26, 2019, the Tollesboro Lions Club hosted a fund-raiser for Tony Corns, a local truck driver. Tony suffers from Berger's Disease, a disease which attacks the kidneys that is requiring Tony to take dialysis three times a week and not permitting him to continue to work. This fund-raising event was a little different. Since Tony was a truck-driver, a "Trucks for Tony" Semi-Truck Poker Run was organized. These local semi-truck drivers paid \$50 each to participate in a semi-truck "convoy" driving from the Tollesboro Lions Club through a planned route to Maysville and Flemingsburg before returning to Tollesboro, stopping along the way to visit 4 local trucking companies. At each trucking company, the driver would draw a playing card (one card for each of the 4 trucking companies at which the trucks stopped). Upon returning to the Tollesboro Lions Club, drivers received their 5th card to determine who drew the best hand and the holder of the best hand would win \$200! (NOTE: Drivers were also provided the opportunity to buy a bonus card with which they could improve their 5 card hand for an extra \$25). SIXTY-TWO semi-trucks and drivers participated! Then the convoy proceeded on the "AA" Hwy to the Tollesboro Lions Club where they lined up their trucks and where the fund-raising events then continued, the next fund-raiser being a meal, followed by a live auction.

A huge crowd awaited the arrival of the trucks, attending the event and supported Tony by enjoying the meal with serving beginning at 4 pm. Heather Renee French Henry (Miss America 2000) was present and sang the National Anthem. TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB NOVEMBER MEETING

The Tollesboro Lions Club held their November meeting at the Tollesboro Lions Clubhouse at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairground on Veterans Day, Nov. 11, 2019.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by prayer, then the club sat down to a meal provided by Skeeter and Sonia Shaw. Following the meal, t

hree persons in attendance were recognized as Veterans and thanked for their service, these being Lions Steve Pedersen and Denny Hornback of the Tollesboro Lions Club, and the District Governor, Jeff Lorenzen. It was noted that Lions Don McCann's 60 Year Service Award pin had just arrived (Don just celebrated his 60th consecutive year as a Lions Club member, but sadly passed away just a few days later); Don is only the second member of the Tollesboro Lions Club to serve 60 consecutive years, quite a milestone. It was also announced to the Club that a memorial to Don has been placed on the Tollesboro Lions Club website, <u>www.tollesborolions.com</u> that includes a photograph taken in 1999, and all members were encouraged to review it.

The Club opted to open the meeting with guest speaker Jeff Lorenzen of the Erlanger Lions Club, the current District Governor of District 43-Y. District 43-Y covered approximately 1/2 of the state, and represents 92 Lions Clubs with 2,027 members.

The District Governor reiterated to the Club that the 2020 USA-CANADA FORUM will be in Louisville, KY Sept. 17-19, and urged the Tollesboro Lions Club to attend and to volunteer during the event. He also informed the Club that the State Convention will be in Lextington, May 1st through May 3rd. He encouraged the members to check out the new Kentucky Lions Clubs website, KYLions.org and encouraged members to consider making a \$500 donation to the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation to become Finis Davis Fellows and to the Lions Club Eye Foundation in the amount of \$1,000 to become Melvin Jones Fellows (Finis Davis is Kentucky's only International President of Lions Clubs International and Melvin Jones was the founder of Lions Clubs, founded in 1917).

Following the presentation by Mr. Lorenzen, the Club discussed their business, beginning with the Secretary's Report by Secretary Phil Cropper, followed by the Treasurer's Report by Treasurer Steve Pedersen.

It was reported that the Club had paid for 2 eye exams since the last meeting.

The recent fund-raising event for Tony Corns was discussed for the benefit of those members who could not attend. Tony, a truck-driver, was diagnosed with Berger's Disease, a disease which affects the kidneys and which required him to quit work and take dialysis treatments three times a week. The event included a Semi-Truck Poker Run, a meal, and a live auction and was a rousing success! There were 62 semitrucks/drivers participating in the Poker Run, which left the Tollesboro Lions Club in "convoy" fashion, stopping at 4 truck stops along the route, which extended to KY 11 at Maysville, then to Flemingsburg, then returning to Tollesboro on KY 57.

It was discussed that two Quarter Auction Fund-Raisers had been conducted on the grounds since the last meeting. The first raised \$729 to benefit the New Creation Praise and Worship Center. The second raised \$546 to benefit the Lewis County Middle School Academic Team.

The results of the coloring contest by First-Graders who visited the Club in October were announced. Each class was provided with a Lions Club logo for each student to color. On the reverse was a cartoon Lion design that could be colored for additional consideration in the case of a tie. Winning artworks were to be selected from all entries, a best boy's artwork and best girl's artwork, with each winner to receive \$5. There were 41 entries submitted, 23 from Mrs. Meadows Class and 18 from Mrs. Corn's class. While it was originally decided that a Best Boy and a Best Boy artwork winner would each win \$5, it was decided at the meeting that a \$5 award would be given to "Best Boy Artwork" and "Best Girl Artwork" per classroom, and from these, a "Best Overall" award would be presented, earning that individual an additional \$5 prize, for a total prize money of \$25.

In Mrs. Corn's Class, the Best Boy's Artwork was that of Drake Anderson and the Best Girl's Artwork what that of Dixie Ginn. In Mrs. Meadows class, the Best Boy's Artwork was that of Tanner Mason and the Best Girl's Artwork was that of Teslarai Insko. Each of these four students will be awarded \$5 cash. The

artwork chosen from these winners as the Best Overall Artwork Prize, was that of Teslarai Insko, earning her an extra \$5 award. The Tollesboro Lions Club wants to extend their appreciation to the students for coming out to the Lions Club and thank them for their participation in the coloring contest.

Also brought up was a recent BBQ Contest held on the grounds on a cold Nov. 1st and 2nd weekend. A first-time event, the organizers promise a bigger and better (as well as earlier in the season) event next year.

The blacktop walking track was discussed and it was recommended to suspend the paving project until spring due to unseasonably cold weather.

The Christmas Party was discussed. This year the Club will be celebrating at Caproni's and entertained by the redneck comedic/musical duo of the Moron Brothers.

The Club approved a donation of \$300 to support 4 youth in Project Merry Christmas.

The Club approved a November donation in the amount of \$250 to the Lend-A-Helping-Hand Food Pantry in Tollesboro, as well as an additional donation of \$250 for December, these two months historically being the months in which more needy families are served than any other months. The Lend-A-Helping-Hand Food Pantry operates out of the old Tollesboro High School Gymnasium and typically serves 350 families per month, although in November and December, the number of families served typically raises to 450 to 500 families in November, and 400 to 450 families in December.

Next, Lion Craig Stanfield brought up two items for consideration by the Club. The first was a benefit auction to be held in May or June to benefit the Tollesboro Lions Club. Craig suggested writing to parks, recreational areas, museums, race tracks, distilleries, outdoor and indoor dramas, and other "day trip" areas around the state (as well as a few areas outside the state) asking for support (avoiding local businesses that are hit constantly by organizations for support by numerous organizations), and volunteered to prepare and send out the letters and make the necessary contacts. Provided that enough organizations and businesses offer their support, an auction event would be conducted in late spring/early summer to benefit the club. In the event that not enough items were donated, the items would be donated to other groups that conduct auction events. The Club approved the event. Next, Craig brought up the Kentucky Historical Society Historical Marker Program through the Kentucky Historical Society and asked the Club to support and draft a resolution in favor of obtaining a Historical Marker for the Tollesboro Community to be placed at and in honor of the Tollesboro High School (a property from which a significant number members of the Tollesboro Lions Club graduated, a property accquired and owned by the Tollesboro Lions Club after closure by the Lewis County Board of Education, which became the Tollesboro Christian School and provides for the Lend-A-Helping-Hand-Food-Pantry to this day, and which is currently owned by Lion Stanfield). Craig informed the Club that there were only 8 Historical Markers in Lewis County, the closest to Tollesboro being the Cabin Creek Historical Marker located between Tollesboro and Ribolt, and the Cabin Creek Covered Bridge Historical Marker. Craig suggested that, if approved, the county (and/or potentially the Lewis County Board of Education) be approached to consider paying for the costs of obtaining the historical marker. The Club voted to draft a resolution in support, and authorized Craig to complete the marker application.

Being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

SECOND ANNUAL TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB CHRISTMAS PARADE EVENT <u>A GRAND SUCCESS!</u>

Building upon the success of last year's event (the First Annual Tollesboro Lions Club Christmas Parade was held last year, Dec., 8, 2018), the second annual Tollesboro Lions Club Christmas Parade was conducted Saturday, Dec., 14, 2019. Beginning slightly later in the day at the suggestion of last year's participants (so as to allow Christmas lights on the floats to be "lit"), the 2019 Parade began at 4 pm. Lineup for the Parade began at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds at 3:00 PM, with the Parade beginning at 4:00 PM. Officers of the Lewis County Sheriff's office blocked travel through KY 10 and KY 57 at the intersection during the Parade. Floats were presented by a number of local churches, as well as the Lewis County Future Farmers of America; with several fire engines from a number of local fire departments; several elected officials; a few antique tractors and automobiles; several Shriner's vehicles; a few ATVs; a number of semi trucks, farm trucks, and rollbacks representing local farms and businesses; and a few equine entries as well, not to mention an appearance by Ol' Saint Nicholas himself!

Leading the parade was Parade Grand Marshall, Tollesboro's own Allen Bane, followed by the Lewis County Marching Band of Pride, which marched the entire parade route while playing Christmas songs.

The Parade lined up at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds, leaving the fairgrounds by means of the main entrance on KY 10, thence traveling eastwardly through town, through the intersections of KY 10 and KY 57, to the Citizens Deposit Bank & Trust lot, where the Parade then turned around and extended back through town to return to the Fairgrounds (following the same route used during the annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair Parade held each year in July).

<u>TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB JAN., 2020 MEETING AND RECOGNITION BY KENTUCKY ASSOCIATION OF</u> <u>FAIRS & HORSE SHOWS</u>

The Tollesboro Lions Club met Monday, January 13th, 2020 for their first meeting of 2020. Following the opening of the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Lion Charlie Kendall, followed by Prayer by Lion Larry Tucker, followed by a meal before beginning to discuss business matters.

In the absence of the Secretary, no minutes were discussed; however the last business meeting would have been in Nov., 2019, as the December meeting of the Club consisted of a non-business Christmas Party at Caproni's in Maysville, December 9th, which was a very nice event, well attended, with good food and which included entertainment by the Moron Brothers Bluegrass and Comedy Team.

Under Old Business, at the November meeting of the Tollesboro Lions Club, the Club voted to support the placement of a Historical Marker at the Tollesboro High School. The Tollesboro High School was built in 1937 (however was constructed upon the site of the Tollesboro Consolidated School which was constructed in 1921) and served the Tollesboro Community as part of the Lewis County Educational System through 1994. The Tollesboro Lions Club purchased the property from the Lewis County School Board and permitted the property to serve the community as a Christian School and a Food Pantry, before eventually conveying the property to the Tollesboro Christian School Inc. where it continued to serve the community, until the Christian School was closed in 2012, with the Food Pantry still in operation at the site to current days. Most of the membership of the Tollesboro Lions Club graduated from the Tollesboro High School, or had family who taught at or graduated from the facility (the Tollesboro Lions Club's First President, Charles M. Hughes, was a Principal of the Tollesboro High School), and the Club owned the property for a period following the closure of the school and through the organizational years of the Tollesboro Christian School. As the property approaches it's 100th Year (considering the construction date of the Tollesboro Consolidated Schools of 1921) of service to the Tollesboro community, it was brought up that the property should be honored with a historical marker. The Club therefore unanimously voted in support of a Historical Marker to be placed at the location of the Tollesboro High School, and further authorized the preparation of a resolution in support of the Historical Marker placement, as well as authorizing Lion Stanfield to prepare the necessary paperwork for submitting the proposal to the Kentucky Historical Society for their consideration. Lion Stanfield has prepared a resolution to Lion President Lee Thomas for his signature.

In regular business, the first item to be discussed was the recent attendance at the 2020 Annual Convention of the Kentucky Association of Fairs and Horse Shows held at the Galt House in Louisville, January 9th, 10th, and 11th. Tollesboro Lions Club members Steve Pedersen and Clinton Applegate attended the event. The Tollesboro Lions Club provided 3 knives for the Charlie Kachler Memorial Auction event, two of which sold at auction and one which was raffled (the two knives sold at auction each brought in excess of \$100 each). At the business meeting held on the last day of the event, January 11th, 2020, the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair was recognized and honored with an award by the by the Kentucky Association of Fairs and Horse Shows as the recipient of the 2019 Class A Catalog Award (Newspaper Print). As Lion Pedersen had left the event Saturday morning, Tollesboro Lions Club member Clinton Applegate was still on hand to attend the business meeting, and thus was available to represent the Tollesboro Lions Club and receive the Award at the Event. Lion Applegate brought the award to the meeting Monday night and presented it to the membership.

Also at the Annual Convention of the Kentucky Association of Fairs and Horse Shows, it was determined that the Tollesboro Lions Club is eligible to apply for a Division of Fairs grant, a 75-25 matching grant, with applications due by Oct. 1st. In-kind labor can be considered as part of the match. It was discussed that permanent bleacher improvements at the Mud Sling/Demolition Derby Track would be a much needed improvement, as well as replacement of the announcer's booth (however it is planned to replace the announcer's booth prior to this year's fair, well before the deadline for submission of projects for grant consideration in October). It was also determined at the Annual Convention that we should be able to receive partial reimbursement for the costs of putting on the Pony and Mule Pull event which has had a successful showing at the fair the last 2 years.

Always a topic at the Annual Convention is how to improve our fair and what new events may be added to increase the number of fair attendees during our July Event. Clinton brought up the possibility of adding Wrestling Matches to the Event Schedule; he was in contact with a number of Wrestling Match promoters/organizers during the Convention. Discussions will continue through the Fair Board to determine whether the costs of adding such an event are feasible.

When discussing the 2020 Fair, discussion began on how to honor Veterans at the Annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair. Also discussed was an event during the fair to permit Special Needs Children to ride carnival rides one day during the Fair.

Lion Larry Tucker reported about a recent donation that the Tollesboro Lions Club had made to the Juvenile Diabetes Research Fund. Recent research has been successful that has permitted patients from glucose level monitoring requiring manual administration of insulin to automated monitoring with automated administration of insulin.

Lion Craig Stanfield notified the Club that the 2019 Year In Review was posted on the Tollesboro Lions Club website, www.tollesborolions.com. The Year in Review includes stories and photographs of many of the projects and programs that the Tollesboro Lions Club was involved with throughout 2019. The 2019 Year In Review consisted of a 71 page letter-sized booklet available for download or print. It is a large file, 4.5 MB in size (compressed). The 2018 Year In Review is also available for download from the website, and it consisted of 31 pages and is just under 2.5 MB in size (compressed), however it was prepared for printing on legal size paper. It was also brought up that, for those who have not reviewed the website, that there are numerous files available for download describing the growth and history of the Club, available for review or download from the "History of the Tollesboro Lions Club" webpage.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB FEBRUARY MEETING

The Tollesboro Lions Club had their first February meeting Monday, February 10, 2020 with 21 members in attendance. The meeting began with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Lion Charlie Kendall, followed by Prayer led by Lion Phil Cropper. After the blessing, the Lions Club members sat down to dinner prior to beginning the business meeting.

The business section of the meeting began with a presentation by Hospice of Hope Director of Home Care Services Kayla Hay and Volunteer Coordinator Melanie Strode (Kayla is a grand-daughter of Lion Phil Cropper; Melanie was the 2010 Tollesboro Lions Club Fair Queen) who discussed services offered by Hospice of Hope. Founded in 1988, Hospice of Hope is a non-profit community based organization providing services and support to terminally ill persons. Hospice of Hope operates two hospice care centers with a 5 bed facility located in Mt. Orab, Adams Co., Ohio and an 8 bed facility in Maysville, KY. The organization covers a 4,200 sq. mile area serving 6 Kentucky counties (Bracken, Fleming, Lewis, Mason, Pendleton and Robertson Counties, KY) and 6 Ohio Counties (Adams, Brown, Clermont, Clinton, Highland and Pike Counties, OH). Hospice of Hope offers 24/7 support, highly skilled nursing care with an emphasis on symptom management and end of life care, offering services at home in nursing home and at hospital care rooms and long-term care facilities, including care at their two in-patient centers in Maysville and Adams County. They offer medication deliveries to patient homes, ad offer volunteer companionship, transportation services, small errands (including cleaning and laundry services) short inpatient respite care with principal caregiver needs relief, personal care (bathing dressing wounds, feeding, light household duties) emotional support through licensed social workers, spiritual support by non-denominational chaplains, bereavement and follow up support, grief counseling, and even pet therapy (bringing dogs into the home as well as into their support centers). Hospice of Hope accepts referrals by family, friends, the patient, health care facility or physician. While many think that Hospice only serves cancer patients, that is not true: They will provide services to anyone diagnosed with an incurable disease with life-limiting prognosis. A significant portion of Hospice care is provided by volunteers who are thoroughly vetted by a process including an interview, training, and a number of other requirements such as criminal background and driving history checks. Following the presentation, the Club offered a space during the fair to Hospice to provide additional exposure to the organization.

Following the presentation, the Club began it's business meeting. First, the Secretary's report was read by Lion Secretary Phil Cropper, followed by the Treasurer's report by Lion Treasurer Steve Pedersen. As part of the reports, it was reported that \$400 was spent on the Floral Hall for repairs due to a leak that developed in the roof (apparently the fiberglass skylight roof panels had outlived their life expectancy and had to be replaced with metal). Both the Secretary's and Treasurer's reports were approved. Following these reports, old business was discussed.

Lion Clinton Applegate reported that The Kentucky Simmental Association State Youth Livestock Show date (which was approved last year) would be conducted on the grounds of the Tollesboro Lions Club this year (the first time it has been held on the grounds of the Tollesboro Lions Club), with the dates set as June 5th and 6th.

Lion Craig Stanfield reported that progress was being made on the historical marker the Club has recommended applying for to be placed at the Tollesboro High School, with the application to be submitted in the fall. Lion Stanfield

also reported that a Lewis County resident suggested that Lucille Parker Wright Markey, who was born in Tollesboro, should warrant a historical marker as Tollesboro was her birthplace. As some of the Club may not be familiar with Mrs. Markey, Lion Stanfield gave a brief history of her life: Lucille Parker was born in Tollesboro in 1896 on the Parker/Toncray/Brewer Farm just off the "AA" Hwy on KY 57. She married Warren Wright in 1919, who inherited Calumet Farm in 1932 upon the death of his father (at that time, Calumet Farm was involved in the breeding of Standardbred horses; it was Warren Wright who decided to change from Standardbred horses to Thoroughbred racing horses); she inherited Calumet Farm upon her husband's death in 1950; Lucille guided Calumet's operations following the death of Mr. Wright, eventually marrying Gene Markey, a screenwriter. She mated a mare -- Donatrice -- in 1951 to her prized stallion Bull Lea (one of the greatest thoroughbred sires of all time), resulting in a colt born in 1952 which she named Tollesboro. A stallion, Tollesboro was bred, owned, trained and raced by Calumet Farm, entered in 45 races, winning 8 firsts (the most prestigious of which the \$6,000 Gold Coast Purse at Hialeah, Jan., 1956 racing as a 4 year old) placing second in 5 races, and showing third in 4 races (thus performing in a win, place, or show in 17 of 45 races, or nearly 38 percent of his races) with career earnings of \$32,240 (actual earnings in 1950s dollars not adjusted for inflation). After his racing career ended, the stallion Tollesboro was used for breeding, with progeny records indicating that he sired no fewer than 14 off-spring between 1960 and 1965, at least 8 of which were raced. During the Wright/Markey ownership/operation of Calumet Farm, 8 Kentucky Derby winners were produced (Whirlaway, Pensive, Citation, Ponder, Hill Gail, Iron Liege, TIm Tam, Forward Pass), two of which went on to win the Triple Crown (Whirlaway 1941; Citation 1948); 4 of these 8 Kentucky Derby race winners produced by Calumet Farm were produced after Mr. Wright's passing. Calumet Farm also produced three Triple Tiara winners - the Triple Crown for 3 year old Fillies: Wistful (1949), Real Delight (1952), and Davona Dale (1979) --- Davona Dale won 8 straight races in 1979, including the three races making up the National Triple Tiara and the 3 races making up the New York Triple Tiara, the only filly to ever win both! Mrs. Markey, when she passed away in 1982, created a charitable trust that had a value in excess of \$500 million dollars and she made significant contributions to the University of Kentucky medical center with the Lucille Markey Cancer Center named in her honor. After informing the Club of Mrs. Markey's connection to Tollesboro, Lion Stanfield reported the he did contact the KY Historical Society to see if a 2-sided historical marker honoring two different elements would be permitted, and if so, what the additional costs would be to create a historical marker with the two sides having two different messages. He was informed that the cost to make the sign two-sided with different messages would result in a cost increase of \$500 (plus tax if applicable); however a historical marker would only be permitted to honor one subject matter (meaning that to honor both the Tollesboro High School as well as Mrs. Markey would require 2 markers resulting in an increase in cost from \$2500 to \$5000 provided that each marker had identical text on each side). Lion Stanfield will continue to apply for a historical marker for the Tollesboro High School.

Lion Clinton Applegate reported that the company considered for a wrestling event during the 2020 Tollesboro Lions Club Fair had been contacted by the Fair Board with a date secured pending submission of paperwork. He also discussed that the fair board was considering adding a 3-D archery contest during the fair, with both youth and adult classes; however all the logistics have not yet been worked out.

Lion Steve Pedersen brought up that he had been in contact with the carnival company about offering free carnival rides and lunch on the grounds for Special Needs Children on one day during the fair from 11 am until noon with a free lunch provided following from noon until 1 pm. The carnival company has been contacted and was agreeable and supportive of this arrangement.

Lion Steve Pedersen had Lions Club President Lee Thomas connect his computer onto the television screen in the clubhouse to view the My Lion reports of the Tollesboro Lions Club on the Lions Club International website.

Lion Steve Pedersen then mentioned some upcoming Lions Club meetings including: District 43-Y meeting March 7, 2020, Lexington; Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation meeting March 22 Louisville; District 43-Y Convention May 1 through May 3rd; Lions Club International Convention, SIngapore, June 26-June 30; and the USA-Canada Forum which will be held in Louisville this year, Sept. 17-19. Several members of the club will likely attend the USA-Canada Forum as the host is Louisville, thus close to home. Also in Louisville, the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation will have a booth set up during the Kentucky State Fair offering free eye screenings during the 2020 KY State Fair scheduled this year for Aug. 20 through Aug. 30; last year, 3 members of the Tollesboro Lions Club volunteered their time to perform free eye-testing services at this event.

Lion Pedersen indicated that Tabby Liles would be conducting a quarter auction in the Tollesboro Lions Club Clubhouse March 2, 2020 and that the proceeds would go to the Lewis County Education Foundation for purposes of funding a scholarship program. Tabby and her cohorts have raised several thousand dollars to benefit local non-profit organizations over the past several years, with last year conducting 5 quarter auction events at the Tollesboro Lions Club Clubhouse with great success.

Lion Craig Stanfield reported that International Paper, which provided a \$5,000 grant towards re-paving a portion of the Tollesboro Lions Club walking track last year, has extended an invitation to members of the Tollesboro Lions Club (as well as other organizations within the area who were the recipients of grant monies) to attend a luncheon and mill tour at the Maysville Mill, February 20th. Four Tollesboro Lions Club members (Lee Thomas, Steve Pedersen, David Hampton, and Craig Stanfield) intend to attend this event. Lion Stanfield will RSVP the names and numbers of attendees to International Paper.

Lion Pedersen brought up that the Fair Board is interested in honoring veterans during the fair and further suggested that the Club make a donation to the Wounded Warrior project from the gate proceeds the night of the event honoring veterans.

Being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

On Thursday, Feb. 20, 2020, members of the Tollesboro Lions Club attended a luncheon and mill tour at International Paper's Maysville, Ky. Mill. The Tollesboro Lions Club, as well as the Kentucky Gateway Museum, Mason County Women's Crisis Center, Tom Browning Boys and Girls Club, Licking Valley College Development Corporation, St. Patrick School, Maysville Rotary Club, Bracken County Athletic Department, and the Mason County Intermediate School were each represented as recipients of 2019 International Paper Foundation Grants. International Paper contributed grants to these nine organizations in 2019 totaling \$50,000!

Representatives from each organization were invited to explain what the funds received were utilized for. All organizations made good use of the grants donated by International Paper, and it was interesting to hear how each organization used the funding they received. While the nine recipients used the grant funds in different ways, all were utilized for the improvement of lives throughout the region, in Bracken, Lewis, and Mason County. All grants also fell under one of International Paper's signature causes: Education, Hunger, Health and Wellness, Environmental Initiatives and other critical community needs. The Tollesboro Lions Club funds are to be used for walking track improvements/repaving at their Community Park at Tollesboro, meeting the Health and Wellness cause.

The group of community members learned about the history of International Paper and it's local operation in Maysville. International Paper was organized in 1898. They now have 52,000 employees serving 25,000 customers in 150 countries. The Maysville Mill was built by Temple Inland in 1992. It was purchased by International Paper in 2012. The Maysville Mill has approximately 200 employees and uses 100% recycled containerboard for the production of paperboard that is used for corrugated boxes and shipping containers. Since the 2012 purchase, International Paper has committed to the future of the Maysville Mill operation by investing in updating the facility to improve efficiency, safety, and environmental stewardship.

The visitors representing the nine organizations then dressed in safety gear before embarking on the mill tour. The tour of the mill was a fascinating process to view, with lots of information exchanged and questions asked and answered about the operation.

International Paper employees that spoke to the group included Mill Manager Doug Wadley, Finished Products Manager Micah Evans, Purchasing Manager Kenny Johnson, Environmental Health and Safety Manager Mike Tumey, Human Resources Manager Becky Mullikin, and Communications Coordinator Heather Smeltser.

The Tollesboro Lions Club sincerely appreciates the grant provided by International Paper to permit on-going improvements to the Tollesboro Community Park Walking Track. <u>OUARTER AUCTION RAISES FUNDS TO SUPPORT THE LEWIS COUNTY EDUCATION FOUNDATION</u>

Tabby Liles, Charity Stout, Becky Cooper, Kay Hargett, and Tracy Applegate organized and conducted their first Quarter-Auction Fund-Raising Event of 2020, Monday, March 2nd at the Tollesboro Lions Club Clubhouse. Hosted by the The Tollesboro Lions Club, the ladies were successful in raising \$775 (plus additional monies from sales of concessions), with these funds to be provided to the Lewis County Education Foundation, an organization poised to create additional scholarship opportunities for Lewis County High School graduating seniors intending to pursue higher education opportunities. While this is the first such event of 2020, these ladies have conducted Quarter Auction events in other venues throughout Lewis County for many years, moving to the Tollesboro Lions Club Clubhouse in 2019 and hosting five quarter auction fund-raising events, successful in raising \$2,500 in last year to benefit a number of local organizations which included Lewis County Little League; the March for Babies - a national organization founded by the March of Dimes; the David Iery Foundation; New Creation Praise and Worship Center; and the Lewis County Middle School Academic Team.

IT'S OFFICIAL... COVID19 PANDEMIC CAUSES CANCELLATION OF TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB FAIR



At their Monday, June 8th meeting, members of the Tollesboro Lions Club met at their regularly scheduled club meeting to discuss the 2020 TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB FAIR. Invited as a special guest was a member of the Lewis County Health Department, invited to attend in order to inform the membership of the minimum requirements that would be mandated in order to conduct their Annual Lions Club Fair as well as limitations as to what events could be conducted during the fair, as well as what the guidelines would be for admitting spectators, collecting monies, sales of concessions, policing the crowds after they were admitted, and potential actions that could be put in place in the event that activities failed to properly provide for required social distancing and other effects (including the potential for removal from the grounds of parties not complying with the state-mandates, potential closing of the fair during events or prior to the completion of the week's festivities, etc.). After considerable discussions and not finding any way to satisfactorily conduct the fair it was unfortunately decided that the Club could not conduct their annual fair, at least not in July. Therefore a motion was made, properly seconded, and ultimately approved to suspend the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair for the month of July (thus holding out hope that a smaller scale event could be conducted later in the year provided that social distancing guidelines are more relaxed in the late summer/early fall months).

The Tollesboro Lions Club organized in Tollesboro in 1954. The Annual Fair has been a local institution since 1957, originally began as a single day of events conducted on the grounds of the Tollesboro High School. The fair today typically would have taken place over a 9 day period (so as to include two weekends) conducted on the 20+ acre Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds. The Annual Fair would have included pageants, motorized events, horse shows, livestock shows and more, as well as the ever popular annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair Parade. This year's event would have been the 63rd Annual Fair. The Tollesboro Lions Club Fair is the official Lewis County Fair event.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB SITE OF DAIRY PRODUCT PROMOTION

The Kentucky Dairy Development Council, partnering with Prairie Farms Dairy Products was present at the Tollesboro Lions Club Tuesday, June 23rd to provide a free box of dairy products to people in need as part of the USDA Covid Food Assistance Program consisting of a Mixed Dairy Box Product Assortment which included a number of fresh Prairie Farms Dairy Products. Included in each box were (2) gallons of 2% milk, (2) 14 oz. UHT Premium Chocolate Milk and (2) 14 oz. UHT Premium Strawberry Milk, 1 lb. French Onion Dip, 1 lb. Sour Cream, (1) box Cream Cheese and (1) 24 Small Curd Cottage Cheese.

Anyone could receive the dairy product; they simply had to show up. There was no need for identification or proof of residence or need. Vehicles were lined up early, and for a bit it appeared that a long wait would be likely. However once the line began and the volunteers (at least 15 persons, wearing face masks and gloves) started placing a box of the Dairy Goods in each vehicle, the line really started moving quickly. In short order, vehicles arriving later had virtually no wait. All in all, 1100 boxes were passed out, with the event (scheduled for 9 am) beginning at 8:30 am and ending at 11:30 am.

Dairy products are very healthy as are an important source of essential vitamins and minerals, carbohydrates, protein, calcium, phosphorous, potassium, riboflavin, niacin, and Vitamins A, D, and B12.



TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB SITE OF EMERGENCY DISASTER TRAINING DRILL

The Tollesboro Lions Club became one of three locations for training Monday, June 22nd, for EMERGENCY DISASTER SERVICES, also known as EDS. A large tent and a secondary tent were set up, numerous trailers were put in place to offer training in the event of a need to provide for disaster assistance in the need of an emergency. Services included emergency lighting, the placement of numerous portapotties, a hand-washing and shower house set up, as well as other necessary items that would be needed and necessary in the event of a disaster.

Emergency Disaster Services, or EDS, was established in 1989. While their corporate offices are in Lexington, KY, a significant number of their mobile units are stored in Maysville, KY. Emergency Disaster Services has set up to provide for assistance for 32 storms, and have provided for 621,541 meals. They can quickly mobilize and deploy to locate in areas where a disaster has struck and provide portable trailers which can provide temporary living quarters; mobile sleeping units; portable kitchen facilities; basic washing, laundry and bathing facilities; emergency management control headquarters (office trailers/base camp/base of operations); and communications services in the event of a disaster such as a tornado, hurricane, flooding, or other (including non-weather related) disaster. Services can include emergency potable water sources, restroom facilities, bathing facilities, power sources, cellular phone communication tower units, WI-FI services, emergency lighting, and other infrastructure in an area where permanent infrastructure is down, damaged, or otherwise inoperable.



The photo shows just a portion of the number of training equipment trailers setup on the grounds of the Tollesboro Lions Club Monday, June 22nd. The top photo shows one of the emergency washing facilities providing for a place to wash hands and face set up on the outside with shower facilities available inside. These units can also include laundry facilities. The middle photo shows a number of the sleeping berths which can range from units to accommodate a single individual or family to those offering 8 individualized bedroom units, to those offering simple sleeping berths for up to 42 persons. The bottom unit shows the large tent which had been set up to accommodate the training operation, as well as one of their many office trailer units.

1969 - The Tollesboro Lions Club sold 2.27 acres of land upon which was situated a home, this property being a portion of that property purchased in 1968, to Steven E. Harris and Patricia A. Harris by deed dated the 7th day of June, 1969, as recorded in Deed Book _____ page 510 Lewis County Court Clerk Records, for \$10,500.

1978 - The Tollesboro Lions Club conveyed 3.66 acres of land to the City of Tollesboro, KY being a portion of the property acquired by the Tollesboro Lions Club by deed recorded in Deed Book 111 page 297 Lewis County Court Clerk Records, this conveyance by deed dated the 24th day of April, 1978, said deed recorded in Deed Book 131 page 497 Lewis County Court Clerk Records.

1987 – The City of Tollesboro, Kentucky, subject to a Proposed Plan By the City of Tollesboro, Kentucky for the Equitable Disposition of All Assets and Discharge of All Obligations of the City, conveyed to the Tollesboro Lions Club the 3.66 acres which was conveyed to the City of Tollesboro by the Tollesboro Lions Club, Inc. by deed dated the 24th day of April, 1978, this conveyance by deed dated the 26th day of February, 1987, said deed recorded in Deed Book 148 page 462, Lewis County Court Clerk Records.

1997 – The Tollesboro Lions Club, Inc. purchased the Tollesboro High School from the Board of Education of Lewis County, Kentucky by deed dated the 10th day of January, 1997, said deed recorded in Deed Book 175 page 569 Lewis County Court Clerk Records. The purchase price was \$95,000.

2008 – At the request of the Tollesboro Junior/Senior High School, Inc., the Tollesboro Lions Club, Inc. sold to the Tollesboro Junior/Senior High School, Inc., the Tollesboro High School Property by deed dated the 28th day of July, 2008, said deed recorded in Deed Book 224 page 71 Lewis County Court Clerk Records. The purchase price was \$86,250 (this is less than the \$95,000 purchase price paid for the property by the Tollesboro Lions Club, Inc.

2009 - The Tollesboro Lions Club, Inc. entered into a lease/purchase agreement for the acquisition of 3.423 acre tract of land extending our land holdings to KY 9 and increasing our road frontage on Lions Club Lane as well as improving the overall visibility of the property.

2020 – In April, 2020, the Tollesboro Lions Club had their lease/purchase agreement (referred to above, dating from 2009) rewriten by an attorney and properly recorded.

April, 2020 – The Tollesboro Lions Club acquired a 5.818 acre tract of land for \$45,000, this tract of land adjoining the Fairgrounds on the east boundary next to the demolition derby/mudsling track and the speed tractor pull track areas (we borrowed \$55,000 for the purchase and intended renovation of the acquired land; however this is the year that our Annual Fair had to be postponed (not conducted in July) due to the Coronavirus Pandemic (also known as Covid-19) which required social distancing and would have required significant changes (including the lack of spectators and attendees at the Horse Show) in order to permit the fair to operate.







PROPERTY DESCRIPTION (LEASED PREMISES)

Property has not been surveyed to date. Actual acreage/ dimensions will vary somewhat, more or less than those shown. Located in the community of Tollesboro, Lewis Co., KY and bounded and described as follows: Bounded on the south side of the KY 9 "AA" Hwy. right of way; on the west side by the Fairgrounds Rd. (aka Lions Club Ln., Grainery Ln., or Bane North Rd.); adjoining on the north side the property currently owned by the Tollesboro Lions Club; and on the east side bounded by retained lands of Richard H. Sexton/Lorena M. Sexton/the Lorena M. Sexton Living Trust (collectively known as "SEXTON") and as further shown on the following exhibit (Exhibit A. A larger copy of exhibit A is attached hereto for reference).

LEASE TERMS

The parties hereto agree to a lease of the subject property for the following terms: The Tollesboro Lions Club will pay to "Sexton" the sum of \$8,000 in August each year beginning in 2009 (payment due date made to insure that payment is due after the annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair), with the Tollesboro Lions Club receiving possession of the property upon execution of this agreement. By agreement of the Lessors, said payment shall be made to Richard H. Sexton as long as he is living; then to Lorena M. Sexton (providing that she survives Richard H. Sexton); then to Debbie J. Williams (final payment at the very least is to be made to Debbie J. Williams -- or her heirs/assigns/devisees or alternatively as indicated by surviving Sexton Trustee in the event that at the death of Debbie J. Williams, she is survived by either Richard H. Sexton or Lorena M. Sexton --- as final payment is only to be made after the death of Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton). A lease payment of \$8.000 shall be made for 16 consecutive years. A final payment of \$7.000 shall be due and made in Year 17 if both Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton are deceased --- it being the intention of the Lessors that final payment is made after both are deceased in order that the Trust may convey the property to Debbie J. Williams. If either Richard H. Sexton and/or Lorena M. Sexton survives to Year 17, the final payment shall not be considered due or paid until after the death of both Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton; however, the Tollesboro Lions Club may continue use of the subject property without additional payments until such time as both Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton are deceased. After the Tollesboro Lions Club has paid the lease monies indicated (a total of \$135,000), the property is to be conveyed to the Tollesboro Lions Club as a donation/gift, for no further consideration (no further payments, it being the specific intention of the Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton as individuals, trustees, managers, and in any other capacity to give full consent and to bind their heirs/assigns/trustees/successor trustees to convey said property to the Tollesboro Lions Club at completion of Lease Payment schedule as indicated. The Terms of this lease are assignable; there is to be no provision for escalation of lease payments; the lease rate is "fixed"; the Tollesboro Lions Club shall not "pay off" the lease early. The Tollesboro Lions Club shall provide a written agricultural use right of way to the retained acreage of "Sexton" (where it presently exists or as may be altered by the Tollesboro Lions Club, provided access is substantially equal to what presently exists).

LEASE AND DONATION AGREEMENT

THIS LEASE AND DONATION AGREEMENT executed and delivered as of _____ April 2020 by and between Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton, Trustees of the Lorena M. Sexton Living Trust dated August 19, 2004, Box 18, Tollesboro, Kentucky 41189, as Lessor, and Tollesboro Lions Club, Lions Club Road, Tollesboro, Kentucky 41189, as Lessee,

WITNESSETH, that the parties entered into a Memorandum of Understanding relative to terms of the long term lease and future donation of property on 6 June 2009;

WHEREAS, the parties agreed to enter into an actual Lease which was never prepared although the parties have continued to comply with the terms of the Memorandum of Understanding; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to enter into a Lease and Donation Agreement;

WITNESSETH, that Lessor does hereby lease and agree to donate to Lessee the property known as "Sexton Property" of 3.52 acres +/- as shown by the drawing attached hereto as **Exhibit A**, on the following terms and conditions:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. **TERM** The term of the leasehold hereunder began on 6 June 2009 and shall continue until the death of both Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton. At the time of the death of both Richard

H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton, the then Trustee of Lorena M. Sexton Living Trust shall convey the property to the Tollesboro Lions Club as a donation for no further consideration.

2. LEASE PAYMENTS Lessee shall pay to Lessor as rental the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), in August of each year for sixteen consecutive years, beginning in 2009. Payment due date is in August of each year after the annual Tollesboro Lions Club fair. A final payment of Seven Thousand (\$7,000) will be made in year seventeen, if both Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton are deceased. It is the intention of the parties that final payment will be made after both Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton are deceased. If either Richard H. Sexton and/or Lorena M. Sexton survive to year seventeen, the final payment shall not be considered due or paid until after the death of both Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton, If either Richard H. Sexton and/or Lorena M. Sexton survive to year seventeen, the Lessee may continue use of the subject property without additional payments until such time as both Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton are deceased. After the Tollesboro Lions Club has paid the Lease monies totaling \$135,000, the property is to be conveyed to the Tollesboro Lions Club as a donation for no further consideration, The parties acknowledge that eleven payments have been made. There are five payments of \$8,000 remaining. The final payment of \$7,000 will be made in August 2025 if both Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton are deceased at that time. If not, the payment will be made after the death of both Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton.

3. **INDEMNITY** Lessee shall indemnify and hold Lessor harmless from all claims of personal injury and property damage arising out of Lessee's use and possession of the Premises.

4. **<u>POSSESSION</u>** Lessee has been entitled to possession of the Premises since June 6, 2009.

5. ASSIGNMENT Either party may assign the Lease and Donation Agreement,

6. <u>EASEMENT</u> Lessee shall provide a written agricultural use right of way easement to the retained acreage of Lessor where it previously exists or provide an agricultural use right of way easement substantially equal to what presently exists, at the Closing. The parties acknowledge that Lessor retains the right of agricultural use right of way during the term of this Lease.

7. **DEFAULT** If Lessee defaults in the payments hereunder, Lessor shall give Lessee thirty days notice to correct the default. If Lessee does not correct the default in thirty days, Lessor at Lessor's option, may terminate the leasehold and may re-enter the Premises and retake possession and recover damages including court costs and legal expenses.

8. <u>**CLOSING</u>** Within ninety days of the death of the second to die of Richard H. Sexton and Lorena M. Sexton, Lessee shall pay the Lessor the final lease payment and the property shall be deeded to Lessee.</u>

9. **NOTICE** All communications between the parties, including notice of Lessee's exercise of this option, shall be in writing and deemed delivered to Lessor if and when it is deposited in any U.S. Post Office, postage prepaid to, or if it is personally delivered to, Lessor at Box 18, Tollesboro, Kentucky 41189.

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10. **<u>TIME</u>** Time is the essence of all provisions of this Lease and Donation Agreement.

11. ENTIRETY AND SUCCESSORS This Lease and Donation Agreement shall be the sole writing concerning the Premises between the parties and no oral agreement may vary the written terms hereof. The covenants and conditions herein contained shall apply to and bind the heirs, legal representatives, and assigns of the parties hereto, and all covenants are to be construed as conditions of this Lease and Donation Agreement and governed by Kentucky law.







