Perspective: a particular attitude toward or way of regarding something; a point of view

When I taught Confirmation classes in the United Methodist Church, I used to tell my students this: "I want you to be able to articulate where you stand, what you believe, especially in the face of a world screaming at you that you're stupid for standing there. And I want you to be able to do this while **always** remaining open to **at least** one more new idea."

When we are able to stop and hear or see someone's perspective, things change. There is an opportunity to find common ground, or to build bridges. Willingness to look at another's perspective does not mean you have to adopt it, or even agree with it. It simply means you are open to an understanding that they are looking at something through another lens, or from a different place. Mutual regard and respect can come from this. It is my prayer to remain humble, teachable, gentle, and grounded – to maintain perspective and to gain perspective. Please God, may it be so.

# Testimony of the Month

#### **Peace**

#### **Clearing Pathways; Building Bridges**

At its best, peace is less about eliminating threats and conquering discord and more about disarming the distress caused by our differences. In effect, it takes away the occasion for war. Imagine a world where our commonality eliminates the urge to hate rather than love or to conquer rather than coexist, and you will have caught a glimpse of peace as a testimony.

## **Toward a Testimony of Peace Questions for Further Reflection**

- 1. In living with others, what are ways that you can help eliminate the unnecessary conflict and especially the escalation of disagreements toward violence?
- 2. Can you identify particular hot button issues where you find it difficult to maintain composure conducive to maintaining a commitment to peace? What makes these topics so controversial? What steps can you take to defuse them?
- 3. Philosophically or theologically, is peace always the right commitment? Why or why not?
- 4. When you survey locations where violence repeatedly prevails, can you determine its root causes and imagine ways to restore wholeness?
- 5. As you face differences with others, how will you commit to actions that unite rather than divide?

#### Friends World News: November 2025

Dear Friends,

I'm delighted to share that World Quaker Day 2025 was a resounding success!

We've now received reports of nearly 80 events in Aotearoa, Australia, Bolivia, Burundi, Canada, Denmark, France, Ghana, Guatemala, India, Ireland, Italy, Kenya, Malta, Mexico, Peru, The Philippines, El Salvador, South Africa, Uganda, UK, Ukraine, USA and Zimbabwe, including the following highlights:

- In Accra, Friends from across Africa gathered to celebrate 100 year of Ghana's Hill House Meeting
- In Australia, an international online meeting was hosted with FWCC clerk Esther Mombo as a speaker
- In Paris, Friends from across Europe and the Middle East gathered to talk about peace and service
- In Richmond (Indiana), Friends from 4 meetings sang and worshipped together in English & Spanish
- In Tacna, visitors from Bolivia joined the congregation of 'Nueva Experanca' Friends Church across the border in Peru

Various events centred around creative activities, including screenings of the recently released <u>Living</u> <u>Ubuntu documentary</u>, Quaker art exhibitions, music and drama performances.

Others undertook various acts of service and compassion, like Kamenge Friends Church who raised funds to help a <u>patient detained at the local hospital to pay her medical bills</u>.

We secured a fair amount of coverage in Quaker media, including a preparatory video recording for <u>QuakerSpeak</u>, as well as two pieces in non-Quaker media – the <u>BBC Daily Service</u> and <u>Sight Magazine</u> (Australia).

We were also glad to see three other pieces in local or faith-based media titles, <u>Times Colonist</u> (Canada), in <u>Ghana News Agency</u>, and on South East Radio (Ireland).

One of World Quaker Day's concluding events was a Love Your Neighbour themed Global Online Worship hosted by the Section of the Americas, where Sandra Elizabeth Espinoza was announced the winner of the Quaker Hymn Contest in Spanish, with a song called 'Buscando la Verdad' ('Seeking the Truth' in English).

With the Section-led Global Online Worships having been well received and attended this year, they will continue to be held into 2026. Stay tuned for the next one.

Also this month, the annual in-person Central Executive Committee and the AWPS Section Gathering both took place in Seoul, South Korea.

One big decision was confirmation that on World Quaker Day 2026 (4 October) we will host a massive open online worship meeting. The committee also agreed a holding position on the use of Artificial Intelligence. Read future editions of Friends World News online for further updates.

On a personal note, it has been a deep honour and a blessing to work with so many of you to make World Quaker Day happen this year.

From planning thoughtful events and activities, to inviting and involving Friends and communities near and far, the power of your faith in action has been truly remarkable.

The North American and Caribbean Board of Friends United Meeting write:

#### Dear Friends,

We will put the bad news first: at our current income and expenditure rate, FUM will not have sufficient operating funds to remain open by July of 2026.

We understand that this may come as shocking news, and we're taking some actions to improve the situation. Keep reading to learn more.

The Board has been aware of the magnitude of our financial crisis for several months now; in late spring, we were startled to learn that we were not certain we would make payroll. Rather than release bad news in a piecemeal fashion, we took some time to fully understand the problem. We assessed all our various forms of income and expenditures, looked at historical trends to understand how much of our current situation is temporary and how much is an ongoing problem, asked Lloyd Stangeland of Iowa Yearly Meeting to serve as our temporary CFO, and worked to reconcile bookkeeping errors.

Over time, overall giving to FUM has risen—especially for designated ministry work. What has not kept pace is support for the Ministry Support Fund, which covers the administrative expenses of FUM's work. While most of our individual ministries have sufficient funding for themselves, for the past several months our administrative expenses have exceeded income by an average of about \$34,000 a month. In the past twenty years, contributions from Yearly Meetings that funded our administrative work have decreased significantly. Individual donations have risen, but not quickly enough to make up the difference. The costs of doing our work have risen tremendously. We also experienced unexpected complications with a transfer between bookkeeping systems, which obscured the seriousness of our financial predicament.

Friends United Meeting continued....

We, the Board, are profoundly sorry to Friends for the role our own inaction has played in this crisis. Our audits have not been done in a timely fashion, internal financial controls have been missing, and we did not ensure that good accounting practices were being followed. We have not been careful enough in reviewing financial information given to us or in developing the ability of new board members to understand FUM's complex financial structure.

In response to this crisis, we are taking several steps...

# Featured Recipe: Ginger Snap Cookies from the kitchen of Pendle Hill

Seasonal baked goods are the star of the show this time of year! These spicy, comforting cookies are always a welcome treat at the end of a cold day. Makes 27 cookies

Ingredients:
2 cups butter
4 cups brown sugar
2 eggs
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 Tbsp vanilla
2 Tbsp cocoa powder
1 1/4 tsp cinnamon
1 1/4 tsp ginger
3/4 tsp cloves
1/4 tsp salt
4 cups flour

1 Tbsp baking soda



#### **Directions:**

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F and line your baking sheets with parchment.

In a large bowl or mixer, cream together butter and brown sugar. Slowly add the rest of your wet ingredients and mix until just combined.

In a separate bowl, sift together all dry ingredients. While the mixer is running on the lowest speed, slowly add the dry mixture to the wet mixture until just combined.

Scoop generously portioned cookies onto your lined baking sheets with enough room between each to allow cookies to spread as they bake. Optional: refrigerate dough for an hour before baking to limit cookie spreading during baking.

Bake for 12 minutes, or until they're crisp to your preference. Enjoy with a mug of something hot and comforting!
