Upcoming Programs 2022-2023



November 28: Brad Damon will continue the story of Tom Cassady's incredible career, but now staring as "Air Ace and Allied Agent in WWII". Cassaday's 1972 obituary in *The New York Times* provides a preview of this special story:

LAKE FOREST, III., July 9— Thomas G. Cassady, who combined careers as a leading undercover agent in World War II and heroic clog fights as an air ace in World War I with prominence in private business, died today of cancer at his residence here. He was 76 years old. When America entered World War II, Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox summoned Mr. Cassady to Washington and told him that French military leaders wanted him to work with the French Underground because of his knowledge of France and its people. He went to Vichy, ostensibly as naval attaché for air under Adm. William D. Leahy, American Ambassador to the Vichy, Government, but his real assignment was undercover work. . .

December will feature a special in-person interview by Karl Kleinbub with **Jerome Greenberg: A Merchant Mariner who served in the Pacific during WW2 and Korea.** In January 2023, **Chaplain and Round Table member, Ron May** will talk about his latest book, volume 3 of veterans' stories. In February we also anticipate another super program with 95-year old **Bob Brown**, who was a Sgt. Major in the Marine Corps. He served in WWII, Korea, and Vietnam. Our plans change often in order to accommodate our older veterans as we do not want to miss their stories! WW 2 TRIVIA FOR OCTOBER 2022

Inspired by Ozzie's earlier trivia reports . . .

◆ Battle of Matanikau River, Guadalcanal Campaign 23-27 Sept and 6-9 October Hoosier, Marine Veteran, Lt. Gadi Lawton was in this campaign. "So here I was—a clean, bean, second lieutenant [and] had 400 men under my command." The Japanese forces had planned to wipe out his Marine unit. "We started getting activity from both sides [of the river] coming at us through the jungle. . . We were getting peppered pretty good and getting some casualties." 


◆ Second Battle of El Alamein (23 October—11 November 1942) The British Eighth Army benefited from ULTRA codebreaking information and deployed effectively. Rommel's tank forces were low on food and fuel, but the tide began to turn in favor of the British Eighth Army. A British officer while serving in an armored tank division wrote the following in his war diary:

"Impressions during night 23-24 October: As I stand on guard in the turret of my tank under the white light of a full moon, I cannot but help that marvel that I am not afraid. All around me are great gouts of flame which show up orange or red in this light and each flash is followed at different intervals by the crack of the charge. I have passed some time trying to work out which flash is responsible for which bang and which bang for which swish of the projectile as it rushes on its way across the two miles which separate our present position from the enemy's front lines. It cannot be done though as there are so many guns firing it is impossible to distinguish between them and those nearest to me. I sometimes hear the order 'fire' and as this is obeyed the very camel scrub vibrates until it sounds like rain falling. Displacement of air in the turret is setting up a constant rattle of the wireless set and every now and again instead of the flash, crash, whistle of the shells, we get them in the reverse order as enemy planes drop bombs in a vain effort to stay what to them must be an absolute hell of destruction. Away to the west I can see clusters of flares dropped by our own planes over enemy lines and in between the gun turrets the crash of our own bombs exploding can be heard. To complete the Dantesque picture, the mango coloured Italian ack ack creeps up in to the sky searching for our planes and still the moons shines serenely down as I go to wake Sergeant Cook to relieve us of this guard at 0315."

The end of the campaign was welcome!

"Friday 30 October: Oh boy what a sleep that was last night. Disturbed by only one bomb - I sleep through all barrages now. Tried to organise my way to LRS to salvage stuff off Fearless but nothing doing. Got a bit of stuff off before we changed tanks but no time for every-thing. What I mourn most is loss of my Chalunpty which must have fallen or got shot off the B Squadron job. A fairly quiet day until evening when it was suddenly decided we were to move still further back to reorganise. Left the B Squadron barrow to be taken in to L.R.S. and travelled back with spare crews to a glorious spot right by Med[iteranean] and almost as far back as Sydney Road. A change to have sound of waves and crickets instead of guns and bombs. Three weeks here should do us all a power of good." —Park Tudor Legacy Collection


